3	MR. LARUE: It is 8:32 on Monday, July 12th. We're here		
4	at Coast Guard Sector Delaware Bay. We're talking by phone to		
5	can we just get you to say and spell your name please?		
6	MR. KRATZ: Sure. First name is Paul, P-A-U-L. Middle		
7	initial is A. Last name is Kratz, K-R-A-T-Z.		
8	MR. LARUE: Okay. Great. And Mr. Kratz, you were a		
9	passenger onboard the DUKW the day of the accident?		
10	MR. KRATZ: Yes, that's correct.		
11	MR. LARUE: Great. All right. I'm going to have		
12	everybody else here in the room identify themselves for the		
13	record.		
14	MR. KRATZ: Okay.		
15	MR. LAWRENCE: I'm Captain John Lawrence from K-Sea		
16	6 Transportation.		
17	MR. FITZGIBBONS: John Fitzgibbons with Ride the Ducks.		
18	MR. FINE: Lieutenant Commander Matt Fine with the Coast		
19	Guard.		
20	INTERVIEW OF PAUL KRATZ		
21	BY MR. LARUE:		
22	Q. Paul, can I get your age first please?		
23	A. Sure, 53.		
24	Q. Great. Where were you seated on the DUKW the day of the		
25	accident?		

A. I was in the last seat in the back on the starboard
 side.

3 Q. And were you on the window seat or the aisle seat?4 A. Aisle seat.

Q. Great. All right. If we could, I'd you to just walk us through the events of that day as best you can remember and, you know, try to be as detailed as possible and then we'll follow up with any questions after that.

9 A. Okay. You want me to start when we got in the water or 10 I don't know where you want me to start?

11 Q. Actually, if you don't mind, tell us a little bit about 12 the -- what you remember from the safety brief that was given by 13 the captain.

14 A. Okay.

15 Q. And then --

Okay. We got on the vessel on dry land, and the captain 16 Α. 17 was up front, and he said that he had, you know, some things to 18 talk to us about about the safety. He showed us where the life 19 preservers were, how to get them down, how to hook them, you know, 20 put them on and hook them around you. You know, I was in the back 21 of the boat. It was kind of hard to hear. I don't know if he 22 said anything else after that about the safety issue. He did say, 23 you know, because it's close quarters on the streets and everything and sometimes on the water, do not put your arms or 24 25 head or legs out of the boat. You know, keep everything inside.

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He said especially be careful like if you're pointing to something, you have a tendency to put your hand outside the boat -- or the vessel I guess he called it -- don't do that, you know, things like that.

Q. Okay. And then if there's anything else you think is important, you know, between there and the water, go ahead and fill that in, but otherwise just tell us about the, you know, the trip leading up to the accident.

9 Α. Okay. We went in the water. We were cruising around. He was pointing out different things. 10 We were heading back up 11 river and he was not driving the boat. The mate was, but he was 12 sitting right next to him, facing us, explaining things, what this 13 is, what that is. All of a sudden it started to smoke and he got 14 the mate out of the seat. He got in the driver's seat, so to 15 speak, and you could smell the antifreeze. It smelled like 16 antifreeze. It wasn't like a fire smoke. It was antifreeze, from 17 what I could tell. He shut it down and the mate got up and got on 18 the hood of the vessel, so to speak, and I couldn't see what they 19 were doing but it looked like they opened it up to make sure there 20 was no fire, and I heard them say that there was no fire.

And then it was like the -- I'm going to call it smoke but it was like the fumes from the overheated engine were coming back to us, so he took out a roll of duct tape and apparently taped over some kind of vents or something and then they threw the anchor.

And then he, he was either on a cell phone or he was on the radio. I couldn't tell which because I couldn't see but I could see he was talking to someone, and I don't know what he was saying. I couldn't hear it. And then finally he got off and then kind of said to us, we're waiting for a tow. You know, we'll just hang in there or -- what should be, you know, a couple of minutes or whatever for someone to come to tow us.

8 And then he was explaining some things and then all -- I 9 was -- like I said, I was in the back of the boat, and then all of 10 a sudden I could see the look of panic on his face and he kind of 11 jumped up and he grabbed the radio. And I don't know what he was 12 saying because I couldn't hear, and that's when I stood up and I 13 turned around and there was the barge. So I started grabbing life 14 preservers and pulling them off and kind of just throwing them 15 around, like just over my head, just pulling them off the rack. 16 And then I look and then I saw the barge was -- I don't know how 17 close. Real close. And I turned around. There was a little girl 18 beside me. I turned around and put a life preserver on her, and 19 then that's when we got hit, and I ended up in the water, and 20 pretty much, you know, just trying to get free.

And then when I popped up to the surface, the little girl was next to me and I completed hooking her life vest and kind of pushed her out of the way. And then I was looking for my girlfriend, Barbara, and finally found her and swam over to her and then we -- about, I don't know, three minutes I guess went by

1 we were in the water, and then all of a sudden we heard all the 2 sirens and all the police boats and I guess it was a Coast Guard 3 boat that showed up though I don't know, and they pulled us out of 4 the water.

5 Q. Okay. Great. How did you get out of the water?6 A. It was on a police boat.

7 Q. Okay. Were there other people with you on the police 8 boat?

9 A. Yeah. I don't know any -- the only name I know is 10 Barbara. She was on the boat with us and --

11 Q. That's Barbara Anderson?

A. Myself, Barbara, and a Mr. Keen. I don't know his firstname, was on there.

14 Q. Was he the larger gentleman?

A. Yes. Because I helped them, I helped the police people get him on the, on the boat. He was the last one. And there were a couple other people but I don't remember who they were, even if knew them.

19 Q. Great.

A. I'm going to say maybe two more people, I guess. Couldhave been three. I don't really know.

Q. So you said it started to smoke, what you described as, you know, engine overheating?

24 A. Uh-huh.

25 Q. Where were you seeing the smoke coming from?

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1 A. From the engine compartment, you know, up front.

2

Q. On any particular side or --

A. Both sides. And you could smell it. It smelled, you know, like they popped a hose or, you know, you could smell the antifreeze.

Q. What color was it?

A. The smoke was like a whitish color.

8 Q. You said you were grabbing life jackets. Did you happen 9 to get a life jacket on yourself?

10 After I popped up, like I said, but when I came up out Α. 11 of the water, the little girl popped up next to me and she had --12 I put the life jacket on her but I couldn't get the strap around 13 her in time, so when she, she kind of bobbed up next to me and 14 she's holding onto the, to the life preserver, and it was an adult 15 one. It wasn't a -- you know, a juvenile one, and it was really big for her. But I got the strap around her and hooked it. And 16 17 like I said, I was looking for other people and they -- most of 18 them had life preservers.

And then I was trying to find Barbara and I found her and I swam over to her, and she was holding onto, I think a little boy, and he was okay and she was okay. She had her life preserver on. And then I'm kind of bobbing around like, oh, I guess I better grab one and one kind of floated by and I just reached out with my arm and grabbed it and just kind of pulled it to my chest. I did not put it on. I wasn't going to take the chance. I knew I

1 had to hold onto it till I got to a boat or something.

2 Q. Okay. How long were you under water, and then do you 3 remember how you actually got out of the boat?

A. Let's see. I don't really know how long I was under water but I know I was -- and that's why I'm all kind of congested now. Ever since I've been in the water I've been congested, so I know I sucked in some water and -- but I don't really know how long I was under water. I don't know. It seemed like three days but --

10 Q. I can imagine.

A. I don't know. I guess if I had to guess, well obviously under a minute, but I don't, I don't really know.

13 Q. And do you remember how you got, you know, back to the 14 surface out of the boat?

Well, I kept feeling things like around my legs, and I 15 Α. don't know if it was the canopy or the -- I don't know what it was 16 17 but I kept feeling things like not really holding me but hitting 18 me on the legs, and it could have been the little girl too because 19 she was next to me, because when we went in the water, I kind of went in first and then something fell on top of me and I assume it 20 21 was that -- the little girl that was next to me. And I could kind 22 of feel like, like a body part of some sort, like an arm and a leg 23 or something as I was trying to kick to get away from the boat. 24 And then I started to look up and I couldn't see

25 anything, and then all of a sudden I saw daylight and that's when

1 I started to go up and I popped up.

2 Q. Okay.

A. But you could kind of feel like nothing really holding me but I was hitting things with my legs, and I don't know what it was. Maybe it was like the side structure of the canopy or something. I don't really know, but you could feel things that you were hitting.

8 Q. Let's see. Can you swim?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Okay. Did you end up going to the hospital? Do you 11 have any injuries?

A. I did not go to the hospital. I just have some bruises on my, my right bicep in the back. I don't know what I hit. And my back is like a little sore, but that's about it. But I didn't go to the hospital or the doctor.

16 Q. Okay. Did you hear any instructions from the captain or 17 from anybody, you know, prior to the barge hitting?

A. No. No, I didn't, because once I turned around and saw the barge I just started ripping off the life preservers and I really wasn't paying attention. My main focus was to get as many of those either in the water or on the boat as possible off that -- I'm going to call it a rack, whatever they were -whatever was holding them.

Q. Did you have any issues getting the life jackets down?
A. No. Huh-uh. No. And I must have -- because I remember

1 the captain saying to get them down you pull the yellow tab and I 2 just started ripping yellow tabs down and just kind of scattering 3 them, you know.

Q. Did you hear any sound signals or anything like that
from the -- either from the DUKW or from the tug and barge?
A. No.

7 Q. You said you couldn't hear any of the radio calls from 8 where you were?

9 A. No. I couldn't -- I knew he was talking but I couldn't 10 tell you what he was saying, but I know he was, he was talking 11 something, and then like I said, when I saw the look on his face 12 when he saw that barge and I turned around and saw the barge, and 13 then I looked down at the water to see if there was a wake in 14 front of the barge to see if it was still moving, and it was.

15 Q. How far away was the barge when you first turned around 16 and noticed it?

A. Boy, that's kind of hard to say but I'm going to guess, and it's a total guess, it's like, I don't know, 50 feet, maybe a little farther away than that.

Q. And you know, I know in a situation like that, you know, time starts to warp and everything, but how long from the time you first looked back and saw it until you -- until it collided with you?

A. I was asked that question by a friend of mine and I'm going to say probably around 15, 20 seconds.

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- 1 Q. Okay.

2	A. Because I'm, I'm trying to think. I quick jumped up and
3	I started pulling the tabs, and I must have pulled about five of
4	those yellow tabs which would mean, what, about 10 life preservers
5	I got down. And then, and then it hit. I went down on my knees.
6	And then it just kind of well, obviously it kept coming, and
7	then the boat turned and then I just went face first into the
8	water.
9	Q. So from the time you looked back or, you know, you saw
10	the look on the captain's face and looked back and saw the barge,
11	you had time to pull five tabs and then it hit?
12	A. Right.
13	Q. Okay. All right. I think that's all the questions I've
14	got. I'll pass it onto Matt Fine now.
15	A. Okay.
16	BY LCDR FINE:
17	Q. It's Matt Fine with the Coast Guard.
18	A. Okay.
19	Q. Can you tell me a little bit more about you said the
20	captain he had started talking to you guys about what to do.
21	Can you expand on that at all?
22	A. You mean the safety thing?
23	Q. No, no. Once you're in the water, it's anchored. You
24	said he's talking to you about, you know, we're in you know,
25	are we on fire? Is someone coming?

1 A. Oh, okay. Yeah. He says that they were having engine 2 trouble and that he was waiting for a tow.

A. Boy, I really don't remember but I don't think so.
Q. Okay.

Did he do this over the loudspeaker?

6 A. I think he was just talking to us.

Q. You were able to hear him all the way in the back8 without the loudspeaker?

9 A. I heard that, yeah.

10 Q. Okay.

Ο.

A. Yeah. I heard him say we're waiting for a tow. And at that point in time he didn't seem to be panicked, you know. I mean, there was no --

14 Q. Sure.

A. It was almost like, it was almost like he's done this before, and I'm not saying he did, but he was real calm about it. It wasn't like he was, you know, like oh, my god, we're dead in the water and we need a tow, you know. It was just like all right, you know, we're here. I shut the engine off. We have engine trouble and we're waiting for a tow.

Q. We keep getting a common theme of people just kind of got popped out of the boat. Do you remember actively swimming toward daylight or was it one of those things where you were in the boat one minute and out the next?

25 A. Yeah. It was -- I was in the boat and I heard the barge

1 hit, and like I said, as soon as it hit I went down on my knees.
2 It knocked me on my knees. And then within like, you know, a
3 second, I was -- the boat kind of titled to the right and then I
4 went face first in the water. And you can't really see under
5 there. I'm sure you guys know that.

6 Q. Sure.

A. And you know, like I was -- I was just trying to kick to get up and I kept hitting things with my legs, and then finally I looked up and I saw daylight, and I, I guess I was about, I don't know, four or five feet underwater.

11 Q. Okay.

A. And I just swam, and as soon as I got up, I'm like,whew, okay. Now I'm okay, because I know how to swim.

14 Q. Thank you, Paul.

15 A. Okay. You're welcome.

16

BY MR. LAWRENCE:

Q. This is John Lawrence. Paul, I was just wondering, have you -- at any time remember seeing anybody on the barge, whether it was before the -- before you got struck or after you came up? A. No, not before we got hit, but when I looked at the barge, I actually had to look almost straight up to see the bow,

22 the part -- you know, the very, very front of it --

23 Q. Right.

A. -- to where anybody could be standing and I was like almost underneath it at that point so I didn't see anyone, but

1 then when I came up out of the water, there was someone on the 2 back of the barge looking down.

3 Q. When you came out of the water?

A. Yeah, when I came up. We were still in the water and the barge kind of went past and then there was, there was a couple of people standing on like, looked like the back of the barge, looking down.

8 Q. Would that, would that be on the tugboat or the barge?9 A. That was the barge.

10 Q. On the barge?

A. Uh-huh.

12 Q. So then that was just as it was passing by? So it was 13 almost immediately after you came up?

14 A. Right. Right.

15 Q. Okay.

A. Because I started looking around, because I didn't know where it was and I didn't want to get run over again.

18 Q. Yeah. No, I understand. Okay. Do you remember how 19 many people there were?

20 A. On the boat?

Q. On the -- no, on the barge. You said when you same up, you said you saw --

23 A. No. I said I saw one.

24 Q. Just one?

25 A. One person.

One person? Then, again, I imagine it must be difficult 1 Q. 2 to -- you know, you remember that but do you remember what he was 3 doing or what he was looking at? 4 Α. Just kind of looking over. 5 Q. Okay. 6 Α. The edge. 7 Okay. And that was on the side -- so you didn't see the Q. tuqboat at all? 8 9 Α. No. 10 Okay. So that was on the opposite side from where the Ο. 11 tugboat was, I guess, where you came up? 12 Α. Yeah, right. I was on the starboard side of the, of the 13 barge. 14 Thank you, Paul. That's all I have. Okay. Ο. 15 Α. All right. You're welcome. 16 BY MR. FITZGIBBONS: 17 Q. This is John with Ride the Ducks. The timeframe from when the boat first lost -- the smoke and all that until the 18 19 impact of the boat, you got any timeframe on that? I really didn't, didn't look, but if I had to guess, 20 Α. 21 would be about maybe 10, 15 minutes. 2.2 Okay. That's all I have. Q. 23 BY MR. LARUE: 24 Q. Hey, Paul, it's Liam LaRue from NTSB again. 25 Α. Uh-huh.

Q. Just two more quick questions.

2 A. Okay.

1

Q. I thought, I thought I heard you say earlier that you had a hard time hearing something? I don't know if it was the safety brief or something he said after that.

A. No. I heard the safety brief because that was done on dry land. That was fine. But when he, he was up front talking, and I think he was pointing things out, and there were people like sitting in front of me and they were talking, so it was hard to hear him.

11 Q. Was he talking over the PA system at that point?12 A. No.

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. No.

Q. And then just the last question, if you guys are good, is there anything else you can think of that -- you know, that we haven't asked you about that might be, that might be useful?

18 Α. No, not that I can think of. I mean, we were facing up, 19 up river, so we didn't see the barge. It was coming behind us, 20 but he was facing us, talking to us, so he would, he would have 21 been the one to see, to see it first, him or the mate. The mate 22 was up on top of the engine compartment, so that's about it. You 23 know, we didn't see it coming. We had no idea until he started to 24 like panic. You could tell it -- you could tell by his reaction 25 and what he was doing, you could tell that something was going on

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1 and that's when I stood up and turned around. 2 Q. Right. 3 Then, you know, everything happened. Α. Right. All right, Paul. We appreciate you taking the 4 Q. 5 time to talk to us this morning. 6 Α. Okay. 7 I just want to confirm that you're okay with us Q. 8 recording this? 9 Α. Yes, I am. 10 All right. I'm going to shut it off right now. Ο. 11 Α. Okay. 12 (Whereupon, the interview was concluded.) 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25
