4	Transportation Safety Board, and we're at Stone County Fire
5	District
6	MR. McNEVIN: Protection District.
7	MR. MUISE: Protection District Headquarters.
8	MR. McNEVIN: Yes.
9	MR. MUISE: Investigating the incident involving the stretch
10	duck 7 from July the 19th.
11	So, would you guys tell us your names, position, and spell

20	Q. Well, Brad, do you want to go first, since you were first on

22	MR. MUISE: I'm sorry. We need to get your voice on the

- 3 BY MR. MUISE:
- 4 Q. Sorry, Captain. Go ahead.
- 5 A. That's fine.
- 6 Q. Just tell us what you saw, what you heard.
- 7 A. Water was pretty rough when we was getting there. We took
- 8 some pretty good damage to our boat getting there. And as we
- 9 pulled up on scene, seen life jackets floating all over the lake,
- 10 and around the Belle. And then we was advised that a boat had
- 11 picked up, that a pontoon had picked up two victims out of the
- 12 lake. Then we were instructed to remove a victim from the port
- 13 wheel of the Branson Belle. We worked with two guys from Indian
- 14 Point Marina to remove her from the wheel. And that's what we was
- 15 working on when water patrol showed up on scene.
- And prior to us showing up, there was two victims on the
- 17 tugboat for the Belle. They'd already pulled them out. And
- 18 | that's about all I noted at that point from when we first showed
- 19 up.
- 20 INTERVIEW OF DEPUTY CHIEF BRIAN McNEVIN
- 21 BY MR. MUISE:
- 22 Q. Chief, tell us -- you were on-scene, onshore, correct?
- 23 A. Yes. I was incident commander. I got their first, right,
- 24 seconds before Brad did. He was in the water, told me what he
- 25 had. I established command. And then we just -- I had already --

while I was en route there, I already started calling for mutual aid assistance from two, Mercy EMS, TCAD EMS, Western Taney Fire District, Branson Fire, and just tell them to send anything they could.

And got there, and when I first pulled down in there, I could see everything was on this, and I had a, one of their employees said, well, it's over there, which was -- he was directing me to the other end of the *Belle*. So, I went over there. We had to cut a chain on a fence and get down in there. And found out, they said well, where are you, I said, well, I'm over here. They said, well, we're over here, where I originally was. So, I went back.

Well, as I was leaving, another employee come running up and said we need somebody down here to the front of the *Belle*, we've got a victim. Okay. So, I had an engine with me that had just pulled up. I said you all go down there and check that. I went back and got with Chief Bernt (ph.), who's the chief of Western Taney, and that's when we decided, because of this, and it was more of a treatment, triage, transport type situation, we decided we would move all the injured parties to the lower level of the *Branson Belle* dock.

And there was a TCAD supervisor, paramedic supervisor.

We put him as EMS operations command on the dock to oversee all the treatment triage. We left all of the fire rescue boats and everything else that was assisting with getting people out of the water. We put them over on our fire ground 1, which is our

initial tactical operations channel. And I put, by that time,

our, another deputy chief, Mike Moore, he had arrived, and I told

him, I said I need eyes on the boat, the *Belle*, so he went over

there as operations command on the *Belle*, and let me know what all

was going on over there.

And then, of course, I can't remember, it was about 45 minutes, wasn't even an hour, they had already triage treated, and had probably transported everybody that needed to go to the hospital. And they were gone, which just left water activities of finding people.

And Branson had dive, or Western Taney had divers, so they took over diving down. I think they made four different dives.

And then Brad, when he got the first three taken to the shore, he, and he went back to the tug.

And I thought you said you got three off the tug.

MR. SNIDER: Yeah. We pulled two off the tug.

MR. McNEVIN: And then there was two more on the, the away side, that's port, right, the right side of the boat, if you're looking at the boat.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Starboard.

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MR. McNEVIN: Or whatever. The offside from where I was, there was supposed one at the rear and one at the front.

MR. SNIDER: Well, we pulled two off the tug, and then they hand-carried the little boy, we brought him off, and took them to shore. And then once we unloaded them, then we went around to the

10	would have been on the port side of the Belle right about in there
11	somewhere.

13	MR. SNIDER: Yeah. That was the little boy.
14	And then after we put them onshore, when we went around and
15	picked up the one off the bow of the Belle.

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out after -- I noticed it after I pulled the victim out of the 1 2 wheel, I noticed the little boat was running around. And it 3 wasn't long after that they put it back on the Belle. 4 MR. MUISE: The crew on the Belle, tell me about what they 5 did for you. 6 MR. SNIDER: There was two of them, from what I understand, 7 on that tri tune (ph.), they had jumped off to try to save people. And they told me that the life jackets they were wearing almost 8 9 caused them to drown. They were pretty wore out, and having a 10 hard time breathing when we got there. 11 MR. McNEVIN: Have you talked to Sheriff Doug Rader (ph.)? 12 MR. MUISE: No. 13 MR. McNEVIN: Because he had a off-duty deputy that was 14 working security on the Belle, they're required to have that. 15 He's the one that actually jumped in the water. And the lady that 16 survived, he's the one that actually pulled her out of the water and helped her get out. That's what he told me at church the 17 18 other day. So, his deputy was, did that lady. 19 MR. MUISE: All right. So, I understand you had some damage 2.0 to your boat. Was there anybody hurt, any responders?

MR. SNIDER: No. We were not injured on the response. We took a pretty large wave off the bow of the boat when responding. And our boat has been out of service ever since.

MR. MUISE: Tell me again, what's fire ground 1?

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MR. McNEVIN: Yeah. That's our initial tactical operation.

We have a repeated primary frequency that we're dispatched on, and 1 2 everybody gets en route, and then we talk back to our central 3 dispatch. Once -- it's our procedure that once we get on scene, 4 everybody goes to a simplex channel, which is our fire ground 1, and that's our initial operations channel. If we need to divide 5 6 off of that, we have three others that we can go to, such for 7 water supply, or this or that or the other. 8 MR. SNIDER: It's basically just our operations channel. 9 MR. McNEVIN: Yeah. 10 Is that a 800 megahertz frequency do you know? MR. MUISE: MR. SNIDER: 11 No. It's still VHF. 12 MR. McNEVIN: Yeah. 13 Branson's the only one running UHF. MR. SNIDER: 14 MR. MUISE: Are you guys familiar with narrow banding? 15 the cause any problems for you guys? 16 MR. SNIDER: Uh-uh. We're narrow band compliant. 17 MR. McNEVIN: The reason we went to VTAC 11 is because not 18 all of the other responding units have our fire ground 1. Western 19 Taney Fire does. But they use that VTAC 11, and Taney County had 2.0 that, everybody has that, we have it. But I don't think Taney 21 County has our actual fire ground 1. So, we put them on that. 22 MR. MUISE: And you knew that ahead of time? 23 MR. McNEVIN: Hmmm?

MR. MUISE: You knew that ahead of time?

MR. MUISE: Is there some sort of mass rescue plan for the whole county?

MR. McNEVIN: Emergency management plan that is supposedly put together by the county emergency management coordinator, and, you know, everybody puts in information, and it's a Stone County emergency management plan of what you're going to do, and who you're going to call and everything else.

But he was out there that night. But, you know, we pretty much knew what we had -- and, out there, as far as the incident, and what we had available at that time. So, we know what -- we work pretty close together around here. And, you know, what one doesn't have, the other one does. And everybody has a little bit of this, and a little bit of that, and a little bit of everything. So, we know what to call.

And I knew, because the visual thing we had was it sunk. It, there were 10 people popped up, but there were supposed to be 20 people on it. Well, at that time, I knew that, okay, we've got bad stuff. So, I Just started calling for everybody. Told dispatch to call all these agencies, tell them what we got, tell them send anything and everything they can spare to us to get enough resources there. Because I'm a firm believer in you can call and then cancel. But it's better to have it and not need it than need it and not have it.

MR. MUISE: So, that number, 20, is that --

MR. SNIDER: That was our initial --

1 MR. McNEVIN: That's the initial --2 When we initially got paged we were paged that MR. SNIDER: 3 the duck sank, there was 20 onboard, 10 were missing. That was 4 our initial understanding. 5 MR. MUISE: Did they say 20 just because it's a 6 predetermined, hey, this is a level so and so --7 MR. SNIDER: That -- I have no idea --MR. MUISE: -- incident --8 9 MR. SNIDER: -- where they came up with that number. Because 10 even after we was on scene for a while, that was still the 11 number --12 MR. McNEVIN: Yeah. 13 MR. SNIDER: -- we were operating off of. 14 Yeah. And we didn't --MR. McNEVIN: 15 MR. SNIDER: For quite a while. 16 It took us a while to actually figure out, get MR. McNEVIN: 17 information of actually who -- how many souls were on the duck, 18 and it got jacked up, because we had -- we knew we had treated and 19 transported 19 from the deck, from the dock. We're going by 2.0 that's 19 people off that duck. Okay? We've got 19 here, 8 over here, that leaves us this many unaccounted for. Well, come to 21 22 find out, after the long run, somehow or another, some people that 23 were on the Belle for the show, something happened to them, and 24 they got intermingled, so they got shipped all down there.

actually, there was only 14 from the duck. So, we have 14, and

then 8, and that let them know how many they had left.

MR. MUISE: The final number, who gave you that, and what time did you get it?

MR. McNEVIN: The final number of what?

MR. McNEVIN: Sheriff Rader. Because he had been trying to contact the duck people. And he never got a response. And he said I know they've got a manifest and all this other stuff. So, finally, after about -- oh, it was well over an hour, hour and a half, he finally -- they showed up. And he called and left numerous messages, hey, you duck sunk. You need to give me a call back. Because -- and then they finally brought all of that out there to him. And that's when we -- I talked to him briefly, and he said it was 31. We had 31. And that's -- he told me, he said we had 2 crew members and 29 people. I said okay. So, that's when we figured out that, you know, that's where we got the lot number. And then we sorted out exactly how many injuries from the duck.

MR. MUISE: So, the 31 was -- make sure I have this right, came from the duck to the sheriff to you as the incident commander.

MR. McNEVIN: Yeah.

MR. MUISE: And that process took an hour and a half?

MR. McNEVIN: Well, it took an hour and a half for the sheriff to get it, because he couldn't get a hold of the duck

- 1 people to get the exact number. It kind of went -- well, it -somebody -- we were talking. And somebody said that a duck will 2 3 actually hold 36 people. And it was almost full. That's what we 4 were told initially. After we got the initial for 20, we said okay, so, we're looking at, if it's almost full, we're looking at 5 6 maybe 30 people. And he said yeah, probably, because it was 7 almost full. That's what we got. So, we're, then we kind of ramped up to well, we, possibly could have had 30. 8 9 And then, it was a while, because I think the sheriff was 10 trying to get, starting to get a little frustrated, because the 11 duck people would not call him back. And so, they finally showed 12 up. Because I talked with the three guys from Ride the Ducks that 13 was there. 14 That level of ICS training do you guys have? MR. MUISE: 15 MR. McNEVIN: I've got all the way up to --16 MR. SNIDER: I've got --17 MR. McNEVIN: -- everything from 100 all the way up to 400, I

- 21 MR. MUISE: Have you participated in a drill with either the 22 Belle or Ride the Ducks?
- MR. SNIDER: I have participated in, I believe, three
 training events with the *Belle*. And two of them also had the
 ducks involved with our fire boat and Western Taney. We, usually

- once a year we do a training with the *Belle* and the fire departments.
 - MR. MUISE: How about the Coast Guard auxiliary? Did you see them out there? Or were they there that night?
- 5 MR. SNIDER: No. The only --
 - MR. McNEVIN: He called from -- he was on his way from St.

 Louis. And that's when everything had sort of died down, and all
 we had was Western in diving, and he was asking me what do you
 need. And I said well, have you got a boat with sonar. No. I
 said okay. We've got plenty of boats.
- I said have you got any divers. He said, well, no, not with me.
- Okay. Well, we need sonar, try to find the duck. We need divers to go down in the water to relieve the Western Taney people. And he said well, do you need an extra boat. I said no.

 I think we got that pretty well handled.
 - He said you need a helicopter. I said, well, I don't know what good that would do.
 - So, that's what I told him, and I just told him briefly what was going on, what we had, and everything, got him up to date.

 And then he showed up later. Real nice guy. And he just -- he wanted to help. But sometimes you just ain't got the right stuff.

Very slowly, just go from the Belle over to State Park Marina, and establish a grid pattern, and just go back and for the and back and forth, real slow, because there could be something else out there that we don't know about. If one made it that far, then there might be something that we didn't know. And he did. And he did that for little over an hour. And he called and said I haven't found nothing. I said okay.

And he said 15 that's how we're identifying a lot of people. Because they 16 finally got those pictures and the names on the ticket. 17 that's how they went to identify the deceased people. 18 But it was well into it before they showed up or the sheriff 19 had any information. Because I kept asking him do we have a 2.0 number. And he says no. The ducks hadn't called back. I said 21 okay. So, then it was well into it before he finally said it was 22 31, 2 crew, and 29 members. Said okay. 23 Then we were still, then we went to sorting out how many 24 transport, they were transported as they came off the duck, not 25 the Belle. And it, we ended up -- so I think somehow he got a

So, they just punch a button, and automatically Mercy com comes in, while Stone County's talking, Mercy's on the phone with them. So, Stone County gets all of their stuff, and then they say, well, we're going to hang up and dispatch our stuff. You continue talking to the Mercy people. And we get dispatched and then Mercy com dispatches the ambulance from wherever they're at, and then they start talking to us.

And they were listening to us when we were on the way out there, and things like that.

And they actually call us on our primary, which, you know, they know our procedures. They'll call and say we're approaching the scene, switching over to fire ground 1, and they'll get on fire ground 1, they'll say we're here, where do you want us. They just kind of fold in with the whole mix.

MR. MUISE: And in this case the call went to Taney County because the deck crew called directly (indiscernible).

MR. McNEVIN: Yeah. I don't know how Taney County got it.

We got it first. And I told them, central dispatch, to call Taney

County and Western and all these other people. So, somebody might

have been at the other end of the bell and called, and Taney
