LUTHER BURR - CHRIS MAGGIO STATEMENT

Dog Day - 5/6/2016

We departed Ternsco from heli-pad 1 with Maggio, myself and 12 dogs for the Denver. Leading up to about the lake the flight went ~~super smooth~~ normal. Very light turbulence. I asked Maggio about the wind that day and he shook his head and said it was "not good". He mentioned that he had to take an alternate route back to Ternsco on some flights due to the wind, and that he had to fly slowly to avoid turbulence. As we passed through Paradise Valley the valley itself was wide open with a big bright rainbow but we could see the clouds were moving in as we approached the Denver. Nearing the Bluff and the lake the clouds were thick, you could not see up glacier towards Dog Camp. The Bluff and a little bit of the near west wall were visible so Maggio decided to try to follow the wall into camp. He flew very slowly. We were very low to the Bluff and close to the wall as we made our approach to Dog Camp. Lower and closer to the wall than I had ever been flying into Dog Camp. I noticed Maggio was really concentrating because he was constantly looking down at his gauge panel which I found abnormal. There was not much turbulence as we followed the wall in. I asked if he had had to follow the wall in all day and he said it was the first time he had to all day. We made it to Dog Camp and landed in North Park to unload myself and the dogs. Normal landing. I thanked Maggio and offloaded with the dogs. I did not see him leave or which direction he left in. My impression was that as long as conditions didn't worsen, he could have followed the wall in again with the next load. At no point on the flight did T. feel nervous or in any danger.
