Hello Mike,
F/O contacted just now and provided the
following responses to your questions:
1. Did you have any idea you would encounter significant turbulence prior to your departure?
F/O : No not really. The Radar was showing green and didn't indicate the level of turbulence we experienced. We know from the winds, and looking outside it was going to be bumpy, but not what we expected.
If so, what information (specifically) did you receive, and where did it come from (or whom did you talk to)?
F/O : The tower was closed and so was AMA departure. We didn't receive any information and mainly talked to Center [ZAB]
2. Prior to departure, and during climb out, did you hear anything on the radio at any point discussing any level of turbulence
in the greater AMA area at altitudes under 10k?
F/O No there was no talk about the turbulence. It was after midnight and there were very few flights operating at that time.
If so and you can recall, what were the discussions?
F/O : No one really. We were just talking to Center.
3. During/following your turbulence encounter(s), did you make a PIREP to either ATC, company dispatch or FSS?
F/O : No, I don't think so. I was hand flying as we were climbing out through the worst of it.
If so, whom did you advise, what did you relay, and what was the response?
F/O I don't think we did. I really don't remember.

4. Do you recall being solicited for PIREPs from air traffic control (AMA departure)?

F/O : I don't think we did. I really don't remember.

5. Was the severity of turbulence you encountered something that you would want to know about in advance, with or without passengers onboard?

F/O : Absolutely!

6. Aside from the turbulence, do you recall anything else significant about the weather near AMA, or anything of note with you aircraft's response to the turbulence during climb out?

F/O : Not really, other than what I already shared. The turbulence was worse than we expected, and the showers we were deviating around.

7. Anything else of note on these topics that you think is important?

F/O : No


