

Activity: Balloons vs. General Aviation


<u>Source</u>: FAA Annual General Aviation and Part 135 Activity Survey under the category "lighter-than-air" (category also includes airships).

- Number of active lighter-than-air aircraft account for
 1.4% of all General Aviation active aircraft.
- Lighter-than-air hours account for <u>0.3%</u> of all General Aviation flight hours
- Balloons used for sightseeing account for <u>35%</u> of lighter-than-air flight hours

Letters of Authorization (91.147)

- Each operator intending to conduct passenger-carrying flights for compensation or hire must apply for and receive an LOA from the Flight Standards District Office nearest to its principal place of business.
- "Operator" means any person conducting nonstop passengercarrying flights in an airplane or helicopter for compensation or hire that begin and end at the same airport and are conducted within a <u>25-statute mile radius</u> of that airport.
- An operator must comply with the provisions of the Letter of Authorization received.

Applications for LOA

Applicant must:

- Provide certain identifying information such as name, address, place of business, persons responsible, type aircraft, etc.
- Register and implement its drug and alcohol testing programs. Information regarding these programs must be included in the LOA application.

Oversight of LOA Holders

- FAA Order 1800.56, National Flight Standards Work Program Guidelines - describes oversight requirements for Part 91 Air Tour operators.
- Airworthiness inspectors must conduct two of the following inspections on 10 percent of the air tour operators that have authorization via a LOA within the region:
 - Ramp check;
 - Spot check;
 - Aircraft records review; or
 - Airworthiness Directive compliance Inspection
- One inspection must be a maintenance inspection and the other must be an avionics inspection
