## 1 INTERVIEW

- 2 (1:55 p.m.)
- 3 MR. GUNTHER: I'm Karl Gunther. I'm investigating an
- 4 accident with the National Transportation Safety Board that
- 5 occurred September 9th, 2010, in San Bruno, California. It's our
- 6 number DCA-10-MP-008.
- And, again, I'd like to advise you for the record, one,
- 8 the proceedings are being recorded and, two, you're allowed to
- 9 have anyone with you that you wish. It can be an attorney; it can
- 10 be anybody.
- MR. GUNTHER: So, again, are you represented today by
- 12 counsel?
- MR. DE LA TORRE: Yes.
- MR. JAQUES: And Dane Jaques, for the witness.
- MR. GUNTHER: Okay.
- 16 INTERVIEW OF EDUARDO DE LA TORRE
- 17 BY MR. GUNTHER:
- 18 Q. What I'd like to do is get your name, address, and phone
- 19 for the record.
- 20 A. Okay. My name is Eduardo De La Torre. Do you need me
- 21 to spell that out?
- 22 Q. No --
- COURT REPORTER: If you would, please.
- MR. DE LA TORRE: Okay. It's -- the first name is
- 25 Eduardo, E-d-u-a-r-d-o. The last name is De La Torre,

- 1 D-e, L-a, T-o-r-r-e.
- 2 BY MR. GUNTHER:
- 3 Q. And address and phone for the record?
- 4 A. My address is \_\_\_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, California
- Q. Okay. And what is your affiliation and job title?
- 7 A. I'm an apprentice gas tech for PG&E.
- Q. What I'd like you to do is on September 9th, just
- 9 basically start at the beginning of the day and just describe
- 10 everything that you did.
- 11 A. I reported to the Milpitas yard at 6:00 in the morning.
- 12 I went over our safety tailboard with Pete Beck. I prepared tools
- 13 for the day, to get ready to work on the UPS change-out in
- 14 Milpitas. I also, like, worked on the -- did the inspection on a
- 15 crew check on the foreman's truck the first part of the morning.
- 16 Q. Um-hum. Okay. What kind of formal training -- well,
- 17 first, what are your formal training, like high school, college,
- 18 and then training at PG&E?
- A. PG&E, the whole apprenticeship program is training.
- 20 They send you to schools in San Ramon and all of that.
- Q. And are you in an apprenticeship for something?
- 22 A. For a gas technician.
- Q. Okay. And are you covered over the OQ program?
- 24 A. Yes.
- MR. GUNTHER: Okay. All right. I'm going to turn over

- 1 to California PUC.
- 2 MR. SHORI: I'd like to come back.
- 3 MR. KATCHMAR: All right. I'll go.
- 4 MR. GUNTHER: All right. Pete?
- 5 BY MR. KATCHMAR:
- 6 Q. When did you start for PG&E?
- 7 A. I started seven years, July -- I mean June 25th, 2003.
- 8 Q. Okay. And can you explain -- after you did the
- 9 inspection on the two vehicles -- and during your explanation --
- 10 what you did and during your explanation, can you try to throw in,
- 11 "It was about 3:00 that this happened," or, "It was about 5:00
- 12 that this happened," or whatever?
- 13 A. Well --
- Q. Just in your own words, just let us know what kind of
- 15 things happened between -- after your vehicle inspection.
- 16 A. Okay. I'm not too sure on the times, but --
- 17 Q. That's good, just generally.
- 18 A. Well, I started on the vehicle inspections about, say,
- 19 9:00-ish -- 9:00 in the morning. I got done with that about
- 20 10:30. I pretty much had a little meeting with my foreman about
- 21 the scope of the job was going to be. I followed my foreman and
- 22 my local tech around a little bit, doing research on breaker
- 23 panels and stuff, things like that, of that nature. Then it was
- 24 lunch time.
- And after lunch, we came back and had another little

- 1 tailboard with my foreman, Pete Beck. We were going to wait on
- 2 the engineer to come in to get ready to do the work we were
- 3 supposed to do.
- 4 So it got to be about 1:30 when the contract engineer
- 5 came in and pretty much after that -- after that, I was there to
- 6 assist my foreman and the local guy, gathering tools for them --
- 7 whatever they needed.
- Q. Did you notice any abnormal situations going on? Did
- 9 anybody say, "Oh, no. Look at that"? You know, was there any --
- 10 was there any excitement?
- That's okay. You can say "no." That's a good answer.
- 12 A. Not to my recollection.
- 13 Q. Okay.
- MR. KATCHMAR: Okay, I'm done.
- MR. GUNTHER: Sunil?
- 16 BY MR. SHORI:
- 17 Q. I think I stepped in and I wasn't sure if we got -- I
- 18 got your title as apprentice gas tech?
- 19 A. Yes.
- Q. If you could describe a little bit of what exactly
- 21 normally is under that that you would perform or that you would
- 22 do?
- 23 A. I'm allowed to do wiring under the supervision of a
- 24 journeyman or a foreman, read prints, assist the foreman or the
- 25 journeyman with whatever tools they need, things of that nature.

- 1 Q. And how long have you been an apprentice gas tech?
- 2 A. I'm going on my third year.
- 3 Q. Third year?
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. And do you know which OQ categories, operator
- 6 qualifications, covered sites are -- covered tasks you're
- 7 qualified for?
- 8 A. I'm not too sure. We've got -- I've got a list of what
- 9 I am qualified on.
- MR. JAQUES: I think that list has been produced to you,
- 11 as well.
- MR. SHORI: It has, but I'd like to know if he's aware
- 13 of what should be on that list.
- MR. DE LA TORRE: It's not coming to my mind right now.
- 15 BY MR. SHORI:
- Q. Okay. How often do you do inspections of a crew truck
- 17 and the supervising --
- 18 A. Once a month.
- Q. Once a month. And why was this time chosen to do that?
- 20 Were you due or --
- 21 A. Well, yeah, it's due. Because we try to always get them
- 22 done at the beginning of the month.
- Q. Okay. You said there was either one or two tailboards
- 24 that you participated in. How many tailboards did you participate
- 25 in on that day?

- 1 A. Three -- to my recollection, it was three.
- Q. Okay. Can we go to the first one, when that was held,
- 3 who was there, and around what time?
- A. The first one was at 6:00 in the morning. That was me
- 5 and my foreman, Pete Beck. Just about 6:00 in the morning, about
- 6 what the scope of the day was going to be. Kind of -- he was
- 7 telling me what -- to get the truck ready, to do the truck
- 8 inspections, just --
- 9 Q. What were the scope -- I'm sorry, were you finished?
- 10 A. Yeah. I'm sorry.
- 11 Q. What was the scope going to be? What was communicated
- 12 to you?
- A. At the beginning of the day, what was communicated to me
- 14 was to -- for my projects was to do the foreman's truck, to pretty
- 15 much assist them in what they needed. The contract engineer, my
- 16 foreman, and the district -- this guy, to assist them on what they
- 17 needed. Also, that we were going to wait around on the contract
- 18 engineer to come on, before we really started our project, the
- 19 project we were there for.
- Q. Okay. And then the second board -- the second
- 21 tailboard, when was that held?
- 22 A. That was after lunch. But that was me and Pete Beck.
- 23 He was -- because we were still waiting around for the contract
- 24 engineer to come in. That's when he was telling me we were just
- 25 going to wait around and then do -- you know, do some research

- 1 with the local guy.
- 2 Q. Yeah.
- A. And wait -- before we get into anything, wait for the
- 4 contract engineer to come in.
- Q. And what time -- you said you're from Stockton --
- A. Yes, I'm from Stockton.
- 7 Q. -- normally? Okay. So what time did you start work
- 8 that day? To basically -- you're traveling from Stockton to
- 9 Milpitas?
- 10 A. No, I stay in a hotel in Milpitas.
- 11 Q. Oh, so you're already local?
- 12 A. Yeah, I'm already there.
- Q. Okay. What was the -- in terms of the scope of the
- 14 work, what had to get done that you were going to be involved with
- 15 that day? What time was that work supposed to have been
- 16 completed?
- 17 A. I don't think we had a set time on what time it was
- 18 supposed to be completed.
- Q. Okay. And then you say there was a third tailboard,
- 20 right?
- 21 A. That's when the contract engineer came in and I think we
- 22 were all involved in that. He was pretty much telling us what we
- 23 were going to get ready for.
- Q. Okay. Was there anything discussed -- you said that he
- 25 came -- kind of came late. Was there an expected time?

- A. He was supposed -- he let us know he was going to be
- 2 there about 1:30.
- 3 Q. Okay.
- 4 MR. SHORI: I think that's it for me. Thank you.
- 5 MR. GUNTHER: PG&E?
- 6 MR. FASSETT: No questions.
- 7 MR. GUNTHER: City?
- 8 MR. CALDWELL: No.
- 9 MR. GUNTHER: Okay. I don't have any follow-up. Does
- 10 anybody have any questions operationally? Okay.
- 11 BY MR. KATCHMAR:
- 12 Q. This is always my last question. Is there anything that
- 13 we have not asked you here today that you know of that you think
- 14 that we need to know?
- 15 A. No.
- Q. Okay. You're going to get a list of our names and
- 17 numbers and stuff. If you do, next week, think of something,
- 18 "Hey, these guys should know this," please give one of us a call.
- 19 We'll make sure that the other guys get it.
- 20 A. Okay.
- Q. Thank you.
- MR. GUNTHER: Okay. Any more operations questions?
- 23 Go ahead, Rick.
- MR. NARVELL: Off the record for a minute, please.
- 25 (Off the record.)

- 1 (On the record.)
- 2 BY MR. NARVELL:
- 3 Q. Mr. De La Torre, this is Rick Narvell from the Human
- 4 Performance Group.
- 5 Would you, at the conclusion of your testimony, be able
- 6 to provide me with a general description of your activities,
- 7 work/rest information, with respect to the four days, 96 hours
- 8 from this accident back?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Okay. And we'll get that off the record. Thank you.
- 11 Can you just give us just a brief word or two just about
- 12 your overall health? How would you characterize it?
- 13 A. Good.
- 14 Q. Good. Okay.
- Do you happen to recall the date of your last, most
- 16 recent physical?
- 17 A. No.
- 18 Q. Okay. Is there a requirement at PG&E to have a physical
- 19 in your position?
- 20 A. Not to my knowledge.
- Q. Okay. On the day of the incident, had you taken any
- 22 medications? Are you on prescription medications, over the
- 23 counter or dietary supplements?
- 24 A. No.
- Q. All right. And do you know anything about your vision

- 1 in terms of the rating? Do you know what your vision rating is?
- 2 A. I don't know what my rating is.
- 3 Q. Okay. Any problems seeing?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 Q. Okay. Reading glasses, contacts, prescriptive lenses --
- 6 anything?
- 7 A. No.
- Q. Okay. All right. And the same question with respect to
- 9 your hearing.
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Any problems with hearing?
- 12 A. No.
- 13 Q. Okay. All right.
- On the day of the incident, which is a week ago today,
- 15 the 9th, can you just kind of give us a general description of
- 16 your work load that day as you went about your business? Was it
- 17 high, normal, or low?
- 18 A. On that day, it was between normal and low.
- 19 Q. Between normal and low. Okay.
- 20 Anything unexpected develop that might have caused an
- 21 increase in work load of any nature?
- 22 A. I don't think I understand that question too well, but
- 23 like you mean --
- Q. Was there anything abnormal or unusual in the course of
- 25 your work day that would have resulted in maybe a higher work

- 1 load, you know, busier, more things to do, more tasks -- those
- 2 kinds of things? Or was it just normal to low?
- 3 A. Just normal to low, because assisting -- with assisting.
- Q. Okay. Any problems, again, throughout the day of any
- 5 equipment -- of your equipment, whether mechanical, electrical or
- 6 otherwise? Anything break?
- 7 MR. FASSETT: Just to clarify, you're talking other than
- 8 the incident, correct?
- 9 MR. NARVELL: That's right.
- 10 BY MR. NARVELL:
- 11 Q. Other than the incident? Thank you.
- 12 A. No.
- Q. Okay. All right. Anything that might have been a basis
- 14 for a distraction or a pre-occupation that day?
- 15 A. No.
- Q. Like, for example, a recent death in the family,
- 17 financial -- adverse financial news -- as examples. Anything that
- 18 may have distracted or preoccupied you?
- 19 A. No.
- Q. And I'll extend that question, if you know, to any of
- 21 your co-workers there that day?
- 22 A. None.
- Q. Okay. All right. And then, finally, Mr. De La Torre,
- 24 were you subject to and provided samples for post-accident drug
- 25 and alcohol testing?

- 1 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Can you give me an idea -- if you know -- of the
- 3 times that you provided them and what you provided?
- A. Urine sample about 3:30, 4:00 in the morning.
- Q. And this would have been on the 10th, now?
- 6 A. The 10th, yeah.
- 7 Q. So between 3:30 and 4:00 a.m.?
- 8 A. Yeah.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. And also a breath sample.
- 11 Q. All right.
- 12 A. Or breathalyzer.
- Q. Would that have been about the same time?
- 14 A. About the same time.
- Q. Okay. And have you been informed the results of either
- 16 or both?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. Tell me, go ahead.
- 19 A. The urine sample came back negative, which is good. And
- 20 the breathalyzer was zero, point-zero-zero.
- Q. That's an immediate read-out?
- 22 A. Yeah, that's an immediate read-out right then and there.
- Q. And do you know what -- was that -- what was the
- 24 reading?
- 25 A. Zero -- zero-point-zero-zero.

1	Q.	Okay, very good.
2		When were you informed of the results of your drug test,
3	do you re	call?
4	Α.	Monday Monday morning.
5	Q.	Okay. All right. And have you since returned to work?
6	А.	For part of that Monday, yeah.
7	Q.	Okay. Very good.
8		MR. NARVELL: Thank you. That's all I have.
9		MR. GUNTHER: Okay. Does anybody have any more
10	questions	?
11		Would the witness like to make a statement for the
12	record?

15 do appreciate it.
