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INTERVIEW

MR. CHHATRE: -- November 15, 2016. We are currently at the NTSB headquarters, located at 490 L'Enfant Plaza East, S.W., Washington, D.C. We are meeting regarding the investigation of explosion of building 8701 Flower Branch Apartments, Silver Spring, Maryland, that occurred on August 10, 2016.

My name is Ravi Chhatre. I'm with National Transportation Safety Board, located in Washington, D.C., and I'm Investigator in Charge of this accident. The NTSB investigation number for this accident is DCA16FP003.

I would like to start by notifying everyone present in this room that we are recording this interview and we may transcribe it at a later date. Transcripts will be provided directly to the interviewee for review and identifying any typographical errors. The transcripts may be posted in NTSB's public docket.

Also, I'd like to inform Mr. Patrick Francisque --

MR. FRANCISQUE: Francisque.

MR. CHHATRE: Franscisque.

MR. FRANCISQUE: That's a French name, but American (indiscernible) easy to say Francisque.

MR. CHHATRE: Okay. I'd like inform Mr. Patrick Francisque that you are permitted to have one other person present with you during the interview. This is a person of your choice: your supervisor, friend, family member or, if you choose, no one at all.

Please state for the record your full name, spelling of your 1 2 name, organization you work for, your title, business contact 3 information such as mailing address, and whom you have chosen to 4 be present with you during your interview. 5 MR. FRANCISQUE: My name is Patrick Francisque. Patrick, 6 P-a-t-r-i-c-k, Francisque, F-r-a-n-c-i-s-q-u-e. 7 And whom you have chosen to be with you? MR. CHHATRE: Well, I'm alone. 8 MR. FRANCISQUE: 9 MR. CHHATRE: Okay, no one. Okay. 10 MR. FRANCISQUE: Maybe I should have taken a lawyer or 11 something like that? 12 MR. CHHATRE: It's up to you, but --13 MR. FRANCISQUE: Oh, to tell you quite frankly, I may be 14 interested in a lawyer because I might sue those people from the 15 place because my car was damaged in it. But apart from that --16 MR. CHHATRE: So you have no issue talking to us without a 17 lawyer? 18 MR. FRANCISOUE: I have no issue talking to you, especially 19 if you do the work that you say you do, which is to make sure that 2.0 basically accidents are understood and do not happen again. 21 MR.                       INTERVIEW OF PATRICK FRANCISQUE
23
         BY MR. CHHATRE:
24
         So Mr. Francisque, please tell us what happened on the day of
25
    the accident, which is August 10th.
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A. Yes. August 10th, I was in my car that day. It was about —
it was approaching midnight. I had been out because that day was
a certain number of thing I have to have done. And I had parked
my car in front of the building, because not living in the block
of apartment, I could not leave my car overnight inside the inside
parking of the place. They would have towed the car.

So basically my sister-in-law, who lives in an apartment in the block of apartments, told me to put my car on the street because since she had a car herself and basically there is a kind of -- she has a kind of card, but she didn't have it for a guest. So she told me that if I left the car, the car probably would be towed, because it had happened to a whole bunch of people. And basically she told me to park on the street. And I park on that particular space because that was the nearest from her apartment.

Usually there is a lot of people who park on that street. It's always full of cars, you know. And I was really lucky to have found it. I considered myself at the time to be lucky for having found it because usually, especially when you come in the evening, there is a lot of people who park their car for the night and you are unable to find space near the block sometimes. There are other times when I come and had to go maybe 1 block or sometimes 2 block away to park the car. So I was very happy and basically I arranged, you know, to make sure that I was able to find that space again.

Q. So which street you park? Do you know?

- 1 A. I was parked on Arliss.
- 2 Q. Arliss. Okay. And was that in front of the building that
- 3 exploded, or --
- 4 A. That was in front of the building but it was not in front of
- 5 | the apartment that (indiscernible). I was about -- there were
- 6 about two or three cars that were in front of the apartment and I
- 7 was -- basically I was parking behind, I was parking behind the
- 8 third car from the car -- or from the place, from the car that was
- 9 in front of the building that blew up. I think it was a taxi was
- 10 parked over there.
- Okay. So I arrive at -- it was about 11:00. I stayed in the
- 12 car for a little while. I must tell you that, as I told you, my
- 13 | sister-in-law lives over there. She has trouble with my brother,
- 14 | who is her husband. Sometimes they have arguments, and I didn't
- 15 | want to either witness it or I didn't want to get into it,
- 16 | basically. So what I did, I went to the car. I sat in the car
- 17 | and basically I would wait until they were almost going to bed to
- 18 return. So that -- by that point, whatever argument they were
- 19 having, they are already finished doing it. No one would pick me
- 20 as a witness or try to say where or what do you think of this or
- 21 that, (indiscernible) why are these not good and --
- 22 Q. Okay.
- 23 A. You know, so that's what I did. That's why I was in my car
- 24 at that time.
- 25 Q. Okay.

A. The explosion, I thought that the explosion took place after midnight, but in fact it took place before midnight, you know.

So I was in the car. I listen a little bit to the radio and I was kind of -- I had to go to work the next day because I had found a job in the Washington area. I did not (indiscernible) I work as an interpreter. I do two languages. I do French and I do Asian Creole. And there was a conference pertaining to Haiti and I had been taken by a company to basically do the interpreting for the conference. And I was supposed to go the next morning at 8:00. You know, it was a conference that was a -- it was a medical confidente that was organized by the Institute of Biology and Micro -- the one that take care of -- it was a part of the NIH basically.

14 Q. Okay.

A. And I was supposed to do the interpretation over there.

So I was there, and that's one of the reason also I was in the car because, you know, all those kind of thing, you have to be suited up in those things. And basically I had given my suit to laundry, and I'm going to pick it up. And it was in the car and basically, when I was going to go to bed to the apartment, I was going to take it with me.

So I was in the apartment, and basically everything looked normal out on the street. You know, the atmosphere in the neighborhood, there is a lot of Hispanics who live in the area and a lot of them live in those apartments. But there's always a lot

- 1 of people, because seemingly one of the things that they do, there
- 2 | are several people who lives in the apartment. They kind of --
- 3 you know, if your apartment is -- has been rented seemingly by
- 4 six, seven or eight, while under the name of one person, but
- 5 basically six or seven person might be paying. And they are able
- 6 to get into the apartment. You know, sometimes what they do,
- 7 | those who work at night, they are in the apartment during the day.
- 8 Those who work in the day, you know, they are in the apartment at
- 9 night.
- 10 Q. So do you --
- 11 A. So that's a little bit the way, seemingly, things were.
- 12 Q. So do you remember what time you went to your car?
- 13 A. Well, as I told you, I came back with the car probably around
- 14 11:30.
- 15 Q. 11:30, okay.
- 16 A. Since generally my sister-in-law went to bed around midnight,
- 17 | so I was waiting for her to more or less go to bed because her
- 18 | husband, meaning my brother, often when she had an argument with
- 19 my brother, she would kind of take it on me.
- 20 Q. So do you walk from the apartment to your car?
- 21 A. Yes. You walk from the apartment to the car.
- 22 Q. And do you --
- 23 A. You know, but I've not yet returned to the apartment. I was
- 24 | waiting for it to be about midnight. My brother had given me a
- 25 key. So I would wait when they went to bed and I would go to the

- 1 apartment. That way I was not into any argument. Because often
- 2 | my sister-in-law say, well, you always taking for your brother,
- 3 da, da, da, da.
- 4 Q. So what is the apartment number, the building number where
- 5 your --
- 6 A. The number of the building where she live is 8652.
- 7 Q. 8652.
- 8 A. And she lives in apartment 12.
- 9 Q. Okay. Okay.
- 10 A. That building being the third building from the one which
- 11 exploded when you go down.
- 12 Q. Okay. On Arliss Street?
- 13 A. No, not on Arliss. When you go on Piney Branch.
- 14 Q. Okay. Piney Branch.
- 15 LT. OLIN: Piney -- 8652 Piney Branch.
- 16 MR. CHHATRE: Okay.
- 17 MR. FRANCISQUE: Yeah.
- 18 BY MR. CHHATRE:
- 19 Q. So 8652 Piney Branch. That's what I was asking. Okay.
- 20 So when you came from your home or wherever, you parked
- 21 directly at that car location or you went to the apartment and you
- 22 walked back?
- 23 A. Well, no, what I do -- what I did, as I told you, generally
- 24 | there are a lot of people who park in the area and it's some --
- 25 it's very difficult. I'm not sure exactly why I was able to find

- 1 parking that -- because a lot of people want to park, you know, in
- 2 | front of the building because they just get out of their building
- 3 and they get into the car. So I was able to find that parking
- 4 | space, you know. And I was in the parking space because, as I
- 5 told you, the conference had already begun.
- 6 Q. Right.
- 7 A. I arrived for the beginning of that. During the day I spent
- 8 | the whole day working, so I left the car because I didn't go with
- 9 the car; I used Metro. You know, because I need parking downtown.
- 10 Basically the conference was taking place, as I told you, at the
- 11 NIH. It was taking place also at the Voice of America because it
- 12 was USIA that organized.
- 13 Q. So when you're in your car --
- 14 A. There were a whole bunch of (indiscernible) and things like
- 15 that.
- 16 Q. Did you smell any gas odor when you are sitting in the car?
- 17 A. No. I'll tell you from me, no. There was no gas -- you
- 18 know, I know the smell of gas. There was not.
- 19 Q. No. Were your windows down in the car or the windows were
- 20 up?
- 21 A. My windows were up because I'm very careful when I'm in
- 22 Washington. You know, sometimes people -- how can I say that --
- 23 there are people sometimes -- especially in that neighborhood,
- 24 there are people sometimes, I don't know exactly, they are drunk
- 25 or on whatever.

- 1 Q. Okay.
- 2 A. You know, one day I was attacked in my car because one of
- 3 them -- well, not in that particular neighborhood. You know, but
- 4 I was in my car. There was a guy who was on the front of the
- 5 | seat. I was not sure where I was going and I want him to ask the
- 6 direction to the person. When I asked the person for direction,
- 7 | the person told me can you give me \$1. And when I got to give the
- 8 \$1 to the person, the person pulled a knife on me. Luckily for me
- 9 I had a car that had automatic windows. And since I'm very -- how
- 10 | could I say that -- wary, I had not pulled the thing completely
- 11 down. I pulled it only just enough to give him. And that was --
- 12 | thanks to that, that I -- so basically when I'm in Washington,
- 13 generally my windows are always up.
- 14 Q. So how could you smell the gas if the windows are up?
- 15 A. I didn't. I told you I didn't smell gas.
- 16 Q. Okay. Right.
- 17 A. And I had been to the car several times because the
- 18 | conference lasted 1 week.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. You know, I never smelled gas in the area.
- 21 Q. In that area. Okay.
- So what happened after the building exploded?
- 23 A. Well, as I told you, I was basically doing my things and
- 24 | basically suddenly there was a white flash. There was a white
- 25 | flash, and I know that's going to seem to you kind of bizarre, I

saw a little, a little shock wave coming. You know, the shock wave came at me, basically blew up all the windows that were on the right side of the car and it also -- the shock wave also kind of -- the side of the door basically, I had to kind of -- it was pulled in by the shock wave. I realized that after the fact. But as I told you, I saw the shock -- the flash and I saw the shock wave coming at me.

And basically my first impression was, wow. You know, it's kind of -- it's like, you know, time becomes suddenly slow and my -- I'll tell you frankly I said, oh, here too? Because remember there was -- had been a whole bunch of things that happened in France and then (indiscernible). And I said over here too? So, and basically came up.

The window blew up. Luckily for me, as I told you, when I saw the shock wave coming, I was kind of -- I did not really try to get down, you know, because the shock wave was coming sideways to the car. It wasn't coming straight. As I told you, I was not in front of the building. It came kind of sideways and it blew out the windows that were on the right side the car. It did not blow the windshield, you know.

So basically I find myself, there was a whole bunch of piece of glass and things like that. But I was not wounded by it. The only place where I was wounded, I had near my right ear. But something small sitting here, a piece of glass.

Q. Did your car windows shatter?

- 1 A. The one on the right side. The front and back window on the
- 2 | right side door.
- 3 Q. Okay.
- 4 A. As I told you, the windshield did not.
- 5 Q. Okay. And what did you do then? What happened after that?
- 6 A. I have to tell you, frankly that it came out, without
- 7 absolutely no -- you know, it's like you are one moment
- 8 everything's okay, the other moment all hell broke loose. I was
- 9 kind of, wow.
- 10 You know, I think I stayed in the car kind of wondering
- 11 whether I was dreaming or what happened, you know. In fact, I
- 12 | went out of the car and I returned; I sit back in the car. I
- 13 think I must have done that at least twice, you know. Because I
- 14 was looking at the thing. I return in the car. I said, well, but
- 15 | I am not bleeding. I am not seeing the thing. And I went out and
- 16 I look at it again. You know, and I must have done it at least
- 17 | twice.
- 18 Well, evidently at that point -- no, before I did that, there
- 19 was standing near a woman and a man who were in the building.
- 20 Because at some point I saw a Hispanic woman and a Hispanic man,
- 21 | they pass -- as I told you, the window had blown up and was open.
- 22 And the woman said, can you help us? The guy had -- the guy was
- 23 bleeding.
- 24 Q. Okay.
- 25 A. She wasn't, but the guy was bleeding. His head was bleeding.

- 1 | She said, can you help me? I think I may have tried to call the
- 2 police, but I'm not sure. As I told you, it's a little bit
- 3 | confused. I think I tried to call the police and then I hung up.
- 4 And I was looking at it, because basically, as I told you, there
- 5 was a flash, there was the shock wave. The apartment that was on
- 6 top of the apartment that blew up, basically it went down on the
- 7 building. Basically it's a building that has, I think, two or
- 8 three -- two or three --
- 9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Floors.
- 10 MR. FRANCISQUE: Floor. You know, the floor that was on top
- 11 of where -- I must tell you that the explosion came from the
- 12 apartment that was on the first floor. There were two apartments
- 13 on top of it that basically went down on it.
- 14 BY MR. CHHATRE:
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. And there was a lot of flame. As I told you, I saw the flame
- 17 were white, but as they began attacking with their materials, it
- 18 | became kind of yellow, red, you know, a little bit of everything.
- 19 So as I told you, I saw that couple. I think they were --
- 20 they must have been in the building, you know. They went -- they
- 21 passed going toward Piney Branch. And as I told you, the woman
- 22 said, can you help us? So I look at that.
- 23 At that point, as I told you, I had to go to work 8:00. So
- 24 what I did, I took my suit that was in the car and basically I
- 25 took also my -- I had a computer and I had also a kind of -- the

computer was in a kind of pack, you know, those backpacks you can
put your stuff in, you know. And I took all those and basically I
went to the apartment where my brother was.

Basically I came inside. They told me they were not sleeping. They said you are not -- are you back? And I said, there has been an explosion next door; did you hear what happened? And they said, no, we didn't. In the apartment they didn't know that the thing had blown. They had not heard the noise.

Q. Oh, they did not. Okay.

2.0

A. So when I told them that, my brother was in bed basically, he got dressed and he went out to see. The woman also, seemingly, got dressed, but she did it after him because the two of us, we went outside.

I said, but, look, that thing has blown up and the building is basically flame, you know. And he looked. He said, oops, you know. At some point his wife came also and at that point -- it was at that point that there were firemen who began -- the police, I must say the police was very quick. They came quickly. Because the explosion, after maybe 1 minute, at most, 1 or 2 minutes, they were beginning to get call and you could hear, you know, the noise of their sirens. You know, so they came quickly.

Now everyone was kind of -- the people of the building, I didn't pay any attention to it because, as I told you, me, I went to do that, I put my suit and all my things that I would need for the next day there. I drop them, and basically we went out to see

- 1 | what was going on. And the police came and basically the fire
- 2 brigade came also. And they were beginning to clear up. They
- 3 begun basically to cordon off the area.
- 4 And at some point they came to the building -- the building
- 5 that was next to the building that blew up, seemingly, was also in
- 6 flames. But not like the other one, but basically there were
- 7 pieces and flames that were going, and it was threatening
- 8 basically to get the building that was behind it.
- 9 So basically the firemen get ready to (indiscernible). They
- 10 began cordon off, and at some point they came to the building that
- 11 | we were living. They said everyone has to leave.
- 12 Q. So they --
- 13 A. Even though the third building had nothing. But they said
- 14 | they are (indiscernible). We don't know exactly what's going on,
- 15 | everyone has to go out. So basically they evacuated that building
- 16 that was 8652.
- 17 Q. Okay. So --
- 18 A. So they cordon off, they cordon off the building. They
- 19 cordon off -- in fact, they cordon off all three building.
- 20 Because they had everyone evacuate, basically they could not
- 21 | return to the building. It was only maybe 2 or 3 hours later
- 22 | basically they said that the building where we were living, people
- 23 could return. It was about 3:00, 3:30 in the morning by the time
- 24 they said that.
- But in the meantime, those who were supposed to get the fire

- 1 | out had to get the fire out. Those who were in charge of
- 2 security, they took care of security. You know, the police, they
- 3 | work together, basically the police and the fire brigade.
- 4 Q. So do you know what happened to the couple who came to ask
- 5 | you for your help? Do you know where they went?
- 6 A. Not really. I am not sure what happened to them. As I told
- 7 | you, after I -- as I told you, at first I was kind of, you know,
- 8 what? What happened exactly? You know, after that when I began
- 9 to take care of my own affairs, at that point, as I told you, the
- 10 fire brigade and the police, they did their work very good. So
- 11 suspect that people who had been wounded were taken care of quite
- 12 quickly. Because the police came very quickly. The fire brigade
- 13 came, they came quickly, within minutes.
- 14 Q. So what happened after that? After you were asked to
- 15 evacuate --
- 16 A. We were asked to evacuate. Basically everyone stayed out,
- 17 | you know. My sister-in-law almost was regretting that she got
- 18 dressed to see -- I think she said, I should have stayed in my
- 19 apartment and lock it. But at that point -- so we stayed about 3
- 20 | hours going on. The fire was fierce. It really burned the
- 21 building almost, I would not say to the ground, but it was a hell
- 22 of a fire.
- 23 Q. Okay. Well, I guess -- anything else you want to add? Did
- 24 your --
- 25 A. Well, at this time, as I told you, there was no talk about

- 1 gas. But after that, I heard they think -- they're saying the
- 2 gas. But, for example, my sister-in-law who lives in the
- 3 apartment had never heard of talk about gas, smelling gas or
- 4 things like that.
- 5 Q. Okay. Did your brother or sister-in-law say anything that
- 6 they smelled gas in the area at the time, or --
- 7 A. He neither. He neither. Because I must tell you, but he
- 8 does not live in that one. His wife live in the apartment.
- 9 Because they do not see eye to eye, that they are --
- 10 Q. Right, right.
- 11 A. -- kind of things, he has bought a house in Maryland that is
- 12 | not far from where I live in West Virginia. You know, he bought a
- 13 house in a place called Sandy Hook. When the woman is too much
- 14 trouble for him, he goes over there, you know. When he works in
- 15 Washington he is at the apartment because since he is the one
- 16 paying the apartment, you know. As I told you, there are from
- 17 | time to time things, but I'm not going to tell into private
- 18 things.
- 19 Q. Right.
- 20 A. And as I told you, when I go there, I try not to get into it.
- 21 Q. Okay. But they didn't say anything about -- your sister-in-
- 22 | law didn't say anything about a gas smell or --
- 23 A. No. Neither of them ever talk. Because I go from time to
- 24 time over there.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- 1 A. As I told you, I go sometimes for -- because I have work in
- 2 Washington, and I also go there sometime to see my nephew.
- 3 Q. Okay.
- 4 A. Because she and my brother have a son, you see -- I go
- 5 (indiscernible) because when they are having arguments, I consider
- 6 it's not too good for him. So often what I do when I go over
- 7 | there, I take the kid; we go have dinner or, you know, we go to
- 8 the movies, you know, those kind of things. So they want to have
- 9 | the argument, have the argument between yourself, not in front of
- 10 the kid.
- 11 MR. CHHATRE: Okay. That's all I have.
- 12 Kelly?
- 13 BY MR. EMEABA:
- 14 Q. Well, I don't have much to ask you, but just one -- just one
- 15 question. Relative to your position on Arliss, which you say you
- 16 parked in front of the house, if -- I don't know if you can
- 17 | actually draw -- I mean, look at the diagram we have up there and
- 18 be able to, if you can recall it, where your actually position
- 19 was?
- 20 A. Well, the building has three parts sitting here. They are
- 21 | the left part, middle part, right part.
- 22 Q. Yes.
- 23 A. The one that blew up is the middle one.
- 24 Q. Okay.
- 25 A. Okay? My car was almost to the corner of Piney Branch.

- 1 Q. Okay. Are you able to identify from -- please.
- 2 A. My car was about here. This is the building that exploded.
- 3 And I told you it's three block.
- 4 Q. Yes.
- 5 A. You know, there was the right part, the left part -- I think
- 6 that was -- that one, it is in three parts. Okay. The building
- 7 | that explode was that one, the one that blew up. Me, I was a
- 8 | little bit over here. I was next to the building, but I was not
- 9 | next to the apartment that blew up. That's why I told you the
- 10 | shock wave came a little bit sideways.
- 11 Q. So are you able to place your vehicle where you think you
- 12 (indiscernible)?
- 13 A. My vehicle was about here. There were, I think, at least two
- 14 -- there was a taxi that was parked in front of, in front of the
- 15 unit that blew up.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. Okay. There was another car. There was space for another
- 18 | car but the car wasn't there (indiscernible). There was my car
- 19 over there.
- 20 Q. Okay. Okay.
- 21 A. So basically I was supposed to be the third car. Yeah, that
- 22 one.
- 23 Q. Okay.
- 24 A. The other (indiscernible).
- 25 Q. So when in the car, if you can recollect, sitting in your

- 1 car, were you back-in the building or were you facing the
- 2 building?
- 3 A. No, because the head -- the front of the car was over there.
- 4 | The back of the car was over there. The back of the car was
- 5 toward Piney Branch. The front of the car was toward basically
- 6 | the street (indiscernible) on the street. So basically I was
- 7 sitting in it and I told you I saw the shock wave. Basically the
- 8 apartment blew up, as I told you, there was a white flash.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. Basically. And there was a shock wave. The shock wave came
- 11 at me. It blew up the windows over there. The windshield was
- 12 not -- and also the -- as I told you, all that side basically the
- 13 shock wave kind of put it in.
- MR. EMEABA: Okay. Thank you. That's just the question I
- 15 have for you. Thank you.
- MR. FRANCISQUE: You're welcome, sir.
- 17 MR. STAEBLER: So --
- 18 MR. EMEABA: Please --
- MR. STAEBLER: Doug Staebler, Washington Gas.
- 20 BY MR. STAEBLER:
- 21 Q. So just, where -- how did you get to your car that last time?
- 22 Did you come from 8652?
- 23 A. Basically I came in the car and I stayed in the car.
- 24 Q. Okay. So you were -- how long were you in the car?
- 25 A. About 15, 20 minutes.

- 1 Q. Fifteen, 20 minutes.
- 2 A. I arrive about at 11:30.
- 3 Q. So you parked at that time or --
- $4 \mid A$. I found the car at that time and I sat in the car.
- 5 Q. And you sat.
- 6 A. I was waiting for those people who were in the apartment
- 7 (indiscernible) because, as I told you, they regularly had
- 8 arguments.
- 9 O. Yeah.
- 10 A. And I didn't want to get into it.
- 11 Q. Okay. And while you were there did you see other people
- 12 coming in and out of the building at all or out of the apartment
- 13 building next --
- 14 A. Well, seemingly there are people who came out, but basically
- 15 I was in the car. I was listening to the radio and I was thinking
- 16 about my own things because, as I told you, the next day I had a
- 17 | job to do. So basically I was at the time what I was going to
- 18 have to do --
- 19 O. Yeah.
- 20 A. -- and I didn't pay attention to it really.
- 21 Q. Pay attention, okay.
- 22 A. From what I was told by ATF and (indiscernible) they're aware
- 23 of people who came out while I was in the car.
- 24 Q. Okay.
- 25 A. But to tell you, for me, I was not really following who was

- 1 doing what or that they were. Because in that time, me, I was
- 2 | waiting basically for them to go to bed so that I can return into
- 3 | the apartment and not get into it, because the next morning I had
- 4 to go to be at work by 8:00, which means that I had to leave
- 5 | Silver Spring about 6:30, 7:00 in the morning since I was not
- 6 taking my car.
- 7 Q. Right. Okay. And just -- so you saw the white flash of the
- 8 explosion in the middle apartment.
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. And what --
- 11 A. And the immediately the other apartment fell down on it
- 12 immediately.
- 13 Q. Fell down. Okay. And you didn't -- okay, so -- and you
- 14 didn't see the fire or the explosion in the other apartments, just
- 15 | -- it just seemed like --
- 16 A. No. It was that apartment basically, the one that was on the
- 17 ground floor.
- 18 Q. Okay. Ground floor apartment?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 Q. Okay. And then describe -- excuse me -- what happened after
- 21 the explosion, what you saw. Was there a fire immediately? Was
- 22 there --
- 23 A. There was a fire, as I've already told you, but at first the
- 24 | fire was white. And then after that, it begin kind of yellow. It
- 25 begin to give some reddish things, you know. But initially it was

- 1 white flame.
- 2 Q. And was it a big flame, a small flame? Where was the flame,
- 3 do you remember?
- 4 A. The flame was in the apartment. There were white flame all
- 5 over the apartment.
- 6 Q. Okay. In the apartment that exploded? That was where the
- 7 | fire was?
- 8 A. Yeah, the apartment that exploded, and as I told you, the
- 9 explosion was a big explosion because the floor that was on top of
- 10 | it collapsed.
- 11 Q. Okay. And was the first floor still there or it's just the
- 12 | second --
- 13 A. All two apartments -- I think there were three floor.
- 14 Q. Right.
- 15 A. The two floor that were on top of the apartment collapsed on
- 16 lit.
- 17 \mathbb{Q} . And was -- but the first one was still intact, the first
- 18 floor -- or that collapsed also?
- 19 A. Well, I'm not sure if there was an apartment behind it. But
- 20 basically, as I told you, the two top floor fell on -- inside the
- 21 apartment that had exploded.
- 22 Q. Okay. And so there was just a fire at that time. Because I
- 23 saw footage where there's a big fire at some point, but that's --
- 24 A. Well, yes, as I told you, when it begun it was a white flame.
- 25 But when it begun, basically because there was, there was a whole

- 1 | bunch of material in there, at some point it became yellow; it
- 2 become red. At some point there were a little bit of smoke you
- 3 see, but not that much.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. You know, and as I told you, I was there at the beginning of
- 6 the fire. By the time the fire was, I had gone to my brother,
- 7 | then basically we came and kind of look. But we didn't -- we
- 8 | could not approach near the building because the police did a very
- 9 good job. They cordon off --
- 10 Q. Cordoned off.
- 11 A. -- the whole thing.
- 12 Q. Right. And how about as far as people getting out of the
- 13 building, rescue, did you notice people coming out? I mean --
- 14 A. Well, the one that I -- as I told you, the one I'm sure came
- 15 down from that was the woman and the man.
- 16 Q. Right.
- 17 A. Those two were coming out from the building, and the guy was
- 18 | wounded. Something had either fell on his head or something
- 19 because there was -- there were blood coming out of it. You know,
- 20 | he could still talk. He could still walk. But as I told you, the
- 21 | woman was with him. She was the one who told me, can you help us?
- 22 And I think at that time I may have called the police on my
- 23 | cell phone, you know. But finally I called them and at some point
- 24 | I told myself, what am I doing? I cannot do anything for them.
- 25 So the police is going to come anyway, so I hung up. Besides we

- 1 were beginning already to hear sirens and things like that. As I
- 2 | said, they did arrive -- they responded quick. I want to emphasis
- 3 on that.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. Within about 1 minute, there were police. There were fire
- 6 people. There were a whole bunch of people. And as it went on,
- 7 | there were more and more of them. But the first one arrive within
- 8 1 or 2 minutes.
- 9 Q. Um-hum. Okay. But you said, so -- that you were able to see
- 10 a white flame in that first --
- 11 A. The initial explosion was white flame.
- 12 Q. Right. And then in that apartment, which then says that
- 13 apartment was still --
- 14 A. Basically it came out from the apartment.
- 15 Q. Right.
- 16 A. There was a white flame came up from the apartment with the
- 17 | shock wave.
- 18 Q. Yeah. And then what happened? Was there a fire right after
- 19 that or was there --
- 20 A. Oh, after that, the fire continued. Basically, I told you,
- 21 | at first it was white. And then after that, it begun getting
- 22 | yellow, reddish, you know, and all kinds of color.
- 23 Q. And how about the size of the fire? Was the fire contained
- 24 | in the first floor apartment? Is that where you saw the fire at
- 25 first and then --

- 1 A. No, it -- basically the white flame blew out of the
- 2 apartment.
- 3 Q. Right. And then after both -- well, after that flame blew
- 4 out of the apartment, what did you see? What fire was there?
- 5 A. As I told you, the fire continued. It was -- there were
- 6 white flames.
- 7 Q. Inside the apartment?
- 8 A. In the apartment.
- 9 Q. Okay. And so the apartment was still intact? You could see
- 10 | the apartment still?
- 11 A. No. The apartment, as I told you, the two other floor
- 12 | basically collapsed on it.
- 13 Q. And, and but --
- 14 A. But the flames continue. Basically they were --
- 15 Q. Coming out of that collapse?
- 16 A. Yes, exactly.
- 17 Q. Okay. And how about -- and just 87-0- -- the other building
- 18 | next to it, was that building intact or did it --
- 19 A. The one was behind it basically. You see when you go in
- 20 there was another one over here.
- 21 O. Yeah.
- 22 A. And there was a third one. There is -- I think there about
- 23 | four building in the block of apartments, four or five, I think.
- 24 Q. But, see, the 8703 attached to the -- was that building
- 25 damaged by the explosion, do you remember? This -- so, right, so

- 1 this building exploded.
- 2 A. Um-hum. Um-hum.
- 3 Q. Was there anything happening with this building at all? Did
- 4 you -- was this --
- 5 A. I don't think it got on fire, but they cordoned off -- they
- 6 cordoned it off also. Basically they cordoned off three building:
- 7 | this one, that one, and the one that was behind it.
- 8 Q. Right.
- 9 A. That one was on fire because of sitting near the flame and
- 10 all the material that were flaming up basically were going on this
- 11 side. And at some point, seemingly, there was a little fire on
- 12 it. Because the police and the firemen, they had everyone
- 13 evacuate the place, you know. And they also cordon that one more
- 14 for security because that one didn't have anything. But to be
- 15 more secure and make sure that nothing happen, they also cordon in
- 16 that.
- 17 Q. And so those other buildings the top floors collapsed
- 18 | immediately with the explosion, is that --
- 19 A. No, that's when the floor collapse, at the time of the
- 20 explosion.
- 21 Q. Yeah, just --
- 22 A. Basically all the apartment that were on top of the apartment
- 23 that blew up, they collapsed on it.
- Q. Okay. And then when you got out of your car, right, so you
- 25 grab your stuff and you walked back --

- 1 A. Yeah. I grabbed my stuff and I went over there because they
- 2 | had not yet cordoned it off.
- 3 Q. Okay. And did you --
- 4 A. When I had to return, because I had left some things in the
- 5 car, basically I wasn't able to access the car for nearly 7 or 8
- 6 days. The police had cordoned off everything and basically I
- 7 | think it was the next Monday or Tuesday that I was able.
- 8 Q. To get back, yeah.
- 9 A. To get back. They called me to tell me there a whole bunch
- 10 of car that are inside. If that's your car, come and identify it
- 11 and --
- 12 Q. I remember the car.
- 13 A. At the time they also asked a whole bunch of question. You
- 14 can take their files also.
- 15 Q. And when you -- walking back, did you smell gas at that
- 16 point? Anything? No? Hear anything?
- 17 A. No.
- 18 O. No.
- 19 A. I must tell you, for me, I did not.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. Me personally, my first impression that it was maybe an
- 22 explosion, maybe a bomb or something. That's what -- I didn't say
- 23 that, but that's what I was -- especially because I follow, you
- 24 know, (indiscernible). There has been a whole bunch of things.
- 25 Me, my first thought when I said, here too? You know.

- 1 Q. Okay.
- 2 A. Well, evidently they said that a lot of people said that they
- 3 smell gas and things like that, but I'm not sure. As I told you,
- 4 I don't live there. I was there for the weekend. I was there for
- 5 about a week because the conference had began on Monday. You
- 6 know, and I think the explosion took place on Tuesday.
- 7 Q. Okay. And so -- but when you're parked, when you're parked
- 8 there, were there other people outside? Did you -- I know you
- 9 said you didn't pay much attention, but were --
- 10 A. Well, I didn't -- usually, I thought that there usually be
- 11 | because I'm having -- you know, the place, as I told you, I come
- 12 quite regularly. You know, there is always a whole bunch of
- 13 people who are walking. Because I've explained to you basically
- 14 the way they --
- 15 Q. Right, use the apartment.
- 16 A. You know, I consider it almost for like a timeshare. You see
- 17 | there are some people that go to work in the morning, you know,
- 18 they are in at night. Those who work at night, you know, they are
- 19 in, in the morning.
- Because they did it in Maryland, they do not give
- 21 (indiscernible) for that. But I know that in Virginia they do, at
- 22 some point they used to -- they had talked about it in the news.
- 23 What they would do, they would check when someone had rented an
- 24 apartment that there was only one family. But they don't do that
- 25 in Maryland.

- 1 Q. Okay. Yeah, I heard -- because I heard a report that in the
- 2 | corner of 8703 there was, you know, some air conditioning units
- 3 and there were two individuals sitting there --
- 4 A. No, there was, there was -- there was an air conditioning,
- 5 yes, next to the apartment.
- 6 Q. Right.
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 Q. But they said there were -- I guess there were two people
- 9 sitting out here. Did you notice these two people sitting out
- 10 | there at all?
- 11 A. Not me.
- 12 Q. No. Okay. And then, I quess, right, there are sidewalks
- 13 here too. Is there -- right, there's people walking down --
- 14 A. There were not really -- well, I guess I didn't pay
- 15 attention. As I told you, sometimes they are. Because I suspect
- 16 that there are some people who rent the apartment. As I told you,
- 17 | those we see during the day, you know, they kind of walk around.
- 18 Q. Right.
- 19 A. Sometimes I've seen some of them. Because I'm someone who
- 20 generally sleep very late. Often when I go to -- how do you call
- 21 | that; how do you call that, they sell food at the -- the
- 22 | supermarket that's over there, Giant.
- 23 Q. Yeah, Giant. Yeah.
- 24 A. You know, generally the Giant is open and typically when I
- 25 need something, I go to Giant. And sometimes when I go over

- 1 there, I see people kind of walking, you know. So they -- I know
- 2 | that they do that. There are some people, you know, they -- as I
- 3 told you, they are timeshare. One basically has the time
- 4 (indiscernible) person, they simply go around. I see people
- 5 | walking around, mainly men. You know, not children but adults.
- 6 MR. STAEBLER: Okay.
- 7 MR. CHHATRE: Rachael?
- 8 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:
- 9 Q. So after you heard the explosion, did you hear another
- 10 explosion after it?
- 11 A. No. There was only one explosion and a fire.
- 12 Q. And what kind of car do you have?
- 13 A. I have a Saturn.
- 14 Q. What color is it?
- 15 A. Green, forest green. It's a four-door.
- 16 MS. GUNARATNAM: That's all.
- 17 BY MR. CHHATRE:
- 18 Q. Can you put an "X" where your car is?
- 19 A. Here. I was not far from the -- I was not far from the curb,
- 20 you know.
- 21 Q. And when you are waiting in the car for, you said, about an
- 22 hour, you are sitting in the car?
- 23 A. No. Maybe half an hour.
- 24 Q. Half an hour, okay.
- 25 A. I arrived about 11:30. I suspect that's why I found -- as I

- 1 told you, during the day I don't go to work with it, but when I
- 2 | return home sometimes I take the car and I go do an errand. And
- 3 when I return from the errands, the parking space was there.
- 4 Q. So do you see any people walking on the street or in front of
- 5 the building?
- 6 A. Well, as I told you, there might have been, but basically I
- 7 was not really --
- 8 Q. Okay.
- 9 A. -- thinking who was, you know, or --
- 10 Q. But do you see the street with too many people or you only --
- 11 A. No, about three there, what it was.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- 13 A. There were about three, you know. Because I seen people kind
- 14 of going up and down, you know, but --
- 15 \mathbb{Q} . No, that day. Not other days. That day did you see --
- 16 A. Not that day.
- 17 Q. Not -- yeah, other days doesn't matter. That day you --
- 18 okay.
- 19 MR. CHHATRE: All right. I have no more questions.

- 24 Q. Yeah, just -- so when you got out of your car --
- 25 MR. CHHATRE: Identify.

- 1 MR. STAEBLER: Oh, Doug Staebler.
- 2 BY MR. STAEBLER:
- 3 Q. When you got out of your car, had the building already
- 4 | collapsed, right? It collapsed immediately?
- 5 A. I told you it collapsed immediately --
- 6 Q. Immediately, boom.
- 7 A. -- during the explosion.
- 8 Q. Yeah. Okay.
- 9 A. Basically the explosion, the collapse, and all the rest
- 10 collapse on.
- 11 Q. Okay.
- 12 A. You know, that's why it was -- it was a big explosion. It
- 13 was a big explosion because basically two (indiscernible)
- 14 collapsed the rest of the building. I think the one have about, I
- 15 think, three floor.
- 16 Q. Three floors, yeah.
- 17 A. In the building. You know, the two floor that were on top of
- 18 the thing collapsed immediately on it.
- 19 Q. I know there was -- so I guess there was debris all over the
- 20 street, your car?
- 21 A. It's kind of low. Curiously it collapse inside. You know,
- 22 it collapsed inside.
- 23 Q. Just dropped down.
- 24 A. It didn't collapse outside.
- 25 Q. And the flame -- as I understand it, I think there's four

- 1 apartments a floor, I think, correct? Because like -- yeah, my
- 2 understanding would be -- I guess, I'll just -- it was kind of --
- 3 | it's kind of divided up like this. So you -- this apartment
- 4 exploded. But it seems like you saw the flash more towards the
- 5 middle of it, not over here, right?
- 6 A. It dropped inside here, but not -- you know, there was a door
- 7 that was over there.
- 8 Q. Yep.
- 9 A. Okay. The apartment was on the -- on this side of the door
- 10 basically that was in the apartment basically that there was the
- 11 explosion in. As I told you, it was a white flame.
- 12 Q. Yeah.
- 13 A. And basically the apartment that were on top of it basically
- 14 | collapse inside it.
- 15 Q. Right. And collapsed down to where the first floor apartment
- 16 | collapsed to?
- 17 A. Yes. But you didn't see the -- on the side, because there's
- 18 | a slope, and I think that there's an apartment that is supposed to
- 19 be underneath the one that's on the first floor on Arliss Street,
- 20 you know.
- 21 Well, they say that the explosion took place in the one that
- 22 | had -- that was at (indiscernible). I don't know. You will have
- 23 to do your work. But apparently the thing was in the apartment
- 24 that was on the first floor on Arliss.
- 25 O. Yes.

- 1 MR. CHHATRE: Any questions for you?
- 2 BY UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:
- 3 Q. I just wanted -- I guess my drawing is sort of -- I only put
- 4 on the front door. This is the common door that would have gone
- 5 | into these.
- 6 A. Exactly.
- 7 Q. Each apartment also has --
- 8 A. That's what I assume, there were three --
- 9 O. Three doors. So --
- 10 A. Yeah.
- 11 Q. -- each -- the front apartments here each had a door, an
- 12 entry door on the front. So this is the common entrance with the
- 13 stairwell that goes into the --
- 14 A. Yeah.
- 15 Q. And then the two apartments --
- 16 A. Exactly.
- 17 Q. -- would have had -- there would have been an entry door on
- 18 the front there. So --
- 19 A. Yeah, that -- yeah. That one was, as you said, the one where
- 20 | there was a staircase and another staircase, but they are, you
- 21 know --
- 22 Q. And you mentioned you talked to the ATF, they interviewed you
- 23 about --
- 24 A. Yes. When I came to pick up my car, we had an interview that
- 25 lasted at least 1 hour and a half, because they ask you a lot of

- 1 questions. You know, I'm sure that you will be able to get their
- 2 (indiscernible) whatever they did. They also have --
- 3 Q. And how long --
- 4 A. They also have a movie. But because seemingly -- I did not
- 5 realize it at the time, but as I told you, the police arrive there
- 6 quickly. There was a police car, seemingly the police car was
- 7 | behind my car and they had --
- 8 Q. A video, yeah.
- 9 A. -- a video of it. At the time I did not realize it. As I
- 10 told you, I was kind of in shock. I did not realize that the car
- 11 was behind my car, you see. But they get quickly.
- 12 Q. And how long was that after -- when did you get your car
- 13 back? How long after the incident?
- 14 A. It took at least 8 days. Because I got the car -- I think
- 15 | the explosion took place on Tuesday. I think I got my car the
- 16 next Tuesday.
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. It was at that point that they decided it was not a crime
- 19 scene anymore and they said everyone who had cars come and get.
- 20 MR. CHHATRE: Okay, if not -- off the record.
- 21 (Whereupon, the interview was concluded.)
