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1 INTERVIEW 2 (3:52 p.m.)3 LT Okav. We're doing an interview with Mr. Tinifu Vailaina? 4 5 MR. VAILAINA: Correct. 6 LT Vailaina? You are -- you were doing a fire 7 watch during the welding, and your position on board is the 8 seaman. We have Lieutenant , Frank Thomsen, and Mr. Roy 9 Hall, Jr. Today is -- it's 1552, December 6, 2018. We're here 10 doing the investigation of the fire and sinking of fishing vessel 11 Jeanette. 12 Just to let you know, this is being recorded. Do you 13 understand that it's being recorded? 14 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah. 15 LT Okay. 16 INTERVIEW OF TINIFU VAILAINA 17 BY LT 18 Can you please tell us the story of where you were and 19 everything that happened from the beginning all the way to the end 2.0 while you were on board? 21 Okay. 22 And take your time. Let's not rush -- yeah. 23 First of all, I went down there 8 o'clock because I am 24 chipping -- I use the chipping gun for chipping the rust from the 25 boat, you know. And I saw the guy -- these two guys, we work

together 1 week already. So he cut, cut the beam on the second section of the -- because we finished the first one. The second one, he cut. And nobody watch, so I use the chipping gun. After that one, I go -- I told the guy, the engine room guy, is somebody watching the -- because all the time, the chief like that, you know? And because I am a deck guy, you know.

Then I -- then after that one, I told this guy, I go -- did you knows the place you cutting the beam? And he say there is the hallway. So I go up. I look around because we have a -- the hallway, we have two, you know. I run from the bathroom all the way, you know, from the storeroom. I come around in front of the chief's room. When I come open my room, I say, okay, nothing alarm for the fire alarm because the -- our room, we have a fire alarm on.

So after that one, I went down there. We start the work.

After 9 o'clock, we came up and nothing happened, because half an hour of break, after that one, 9:30, then we went downstairs and we start again the job. And after that one, you know, sometime —my second time I come up, I think it may be 20 minutes, you know, from after work, then I come up. I look around. I open my room too, you know. It's nothing. No alarm, fire alarm too. Nothing. Then we went down there, so we finished to cut the plate. Then I bring down from — I help the guy. He cut and I bring down, you know?

And about 19 more minutes to 11, and the other guy come,

assist, and he say, oh, it's lunch time. So that's the time I go up, you know. I no open my room. I go straight to the bathroom, because my room is over here, and the bathroom -- because I come from the bow, the bow door, the step that we come up. Then I come around the bathroom over there and I went inside.

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I wash my hands about 5 more minutes, and I hear a fire alarm, you know? Then I come, I hear another alarm which is on. Then I open my room, the smoking come on the air condition. Then I stop the alarm but is more worse, you know? I can't, I can't see anything. And I hear the other guy yelling the fire, you know, the other side, he said, from the storeroom.

So I try to get my stuff, my passport. I can't. So I turn around. I come around. I can't see nothing, you know? And I We call a fire, then I grab the fire bottle. come out. We try to kill the fire, but is very strong smoke and we no have a mask. had to -- and I went out. I saw my other, the crew of my boat, they bring -- two guys, they bring the big hose, the firehose. we bring inside to try to kill the -- then after that one, I saw the truck is coming, that they pass the hose, and I -- the quy come, he had no mask, no nothing, you know? And I come -- the other guy come with a (indiscernible) and he hold the hose, he try to. And I said, hey, that door is closed, because the door when you go inside, that one that you (indiscernible), and they go back again.

So the guys, they still over there. They spray -- they stay

outside. They spray the -- I told him, that's the toilet you're spraying, not inside. The fire from inside. And the other guy come with the mask. After there weren't no water. I said, no water, you know? And we try to grab another hose. Us, we try to pass inside, but it's more worse, you know?

And another truck is coming. Then the guy, he sit down and all the fire, the security -- and the security come. He say, hey, you guys go outside. I say, no, I want to help the guy to, you know, to kill -- because he spray the toilet. I told him the fire inside the middle of the boat. It's over there, the storeroom.

Then after that one, the big -- another truck is coming.

Then I saw the guy. They bring the hose. Then he sit down, no helmet, no nothing, you know. No shoes. Nothing. They sit down like this and hold the hose. His boss, they tell him to spray the window, the one window they broke from the pilothouse. But under the window, we have a pail, a net. So he's very close to the window. But this guy, they spray the -- put the water, they sit down and spray the water, they spray the net.

So I go over there, tell the guy, please, can you put your hose a little bit? Because you spray the net, you no spray the hose. So his boss is coming to, you know, to tell him, you know, where -- and the guys they told me, okay, you stay over there because I can't see nothing, you know. These guys, they sit down and hold the hose.

So -- and the security, they come, but they take us. You

- know, they say, no, you guys go; it's more worse. I'm really
 pissed off because, you know, I can help the guy because they
 don't know where's the place to the fire. That's why the guy say,
 where they start the fire? I say, inside of the cabins -- the
 hallway underneath and the ceiling from the work deck. So I tell
 the guy, that's the place over there. It's the middle of the boat
 they start the fire, the storeroom.
 - Then after that one, then we come outside. So we cannot go, because those guys, they come, the security, take us, all the crew, you know. And I come around the other side. I saw the boat, it go like this. I told my boss, hey, can you call another guy? Because we can't grab our pump over there because the stern of the boat is real clear, you know, only the -- then we try to pump the -- I saw a lot of water.
 - And my boss says he's going to come with the pump, he's going to come. So they bring one pump from, I think from the American Victoria. So we try to help to start. About 45 minutes, then the pump, it stops, and they bring another pump from the other guy, West Pacific, has two pump.
 - Then the security come again. They take -- because all my crew, they go over there, you know, and we try to pick it up the water from the bucket and, you know, for -- we're going to save the boat, you know?
- 24 Q. Yeah. I saw you.

25 A. We're going to save the boat, but we can't do nothing. The

security come again and they said go out, you know? And I saw those guys, they come with the hose, you know. The hose is not strong. No more water. So they connect only the big one over there by the big pump. That's the one they help a lot, but the rest, not enough water for to kill the fire, you know, because the foam -- the boat, it gets the foam and -- because I saw that one before. I saw a lot -- two boat, I saw the fire in.

I saw the American Queen too before, the white boat, it sink.

And I saw a couple boat like Jeannette, the old Jeannette? Yeah.

And after that one, we look, when we look at the boat, I cry because I have a little -- the boat's like -- that's my house, you know. He help a lot from my (indiscernible), because I know the old man. He's a good old man. He's always a good guy, you know. I cried. The boat -- take him out, you know. You know, we're going to -- because I make money the boat. I make money the boat.

But the first time I came the boat, is not too, not too good trip, you know? I went to the boat my first trip. You know, I go up to the mess, you know, because I fish a long time. I know this captain, the owner. I know, I no fishing with him, but I know he came on the boat. A lot of my friends. That's why I cry, you know? I told the guy you have to take care of business, you know? Because the chief left, and he give the list to the guy to repair, the job to do.

So those guys -- he didn't tell me, you know, the welder guy finish -- the time we finish our work, I go over there, shut off

- 1 | work light because it looks like a spotlight they using for to
- 2 | look up the thing we chipping, you know. And I go shut it off,
- 3 you know, because I know it's danger, you know? Is going to burn.
- 4 I never know that happen.
- 5 0. Yeah.
- 6 A. Because I know of a lot. Even in the boat top, outside, we
- 7 fishing. I can't sleep because I always watching the smoke. Some
- 8 fire, they start from a smokestack. So I always stay over there
- 9 looking. I call the other guy, you know, watch out, you know.
- 10 Now the guy, they see that happen now, I told the guy, when the
- 11 | boat fire -- he lucky he can kill the fire because all the foam,
- 12 the foam is very danger, you know?
- 13 Q. Right.
- 14 A. So after that one, the boat is taken out, you know.
- 15 (Indiscernible) only one small the boat. I can't pack my
- 16 (indiscernible). That time I came back over a year when I left go
- 17 | fishing to the other side. Six years, I sign my contract
- 18 Elizabeth I (ph.).
- 19 BY MR. THOMSEN:
- 20 Q. Tinifu, from -- how long you been on board? How long you
- 21 been on board?
- 22 A. That boat?
- 23 Q. That boat.
- 24 A. I start fishing on the boat. I came to American Samoa
- 25 January '14.

- 1 Q. Of this year?
- 2 A. No, 2014.
- 3 Q. So you've been on the Jeannette since 2014?
- 4 A. Yeah. Then I start fishing in June. That's the last time
- 5 for the (indiscernible). Then the boat came. After, they went,
- 6 the boat come and go to the shipyard to the (indiscernible).
- 7 Q. Okay. That day, yesterday, what was your job that day?
- 8 Yesterday before the fire, what was your job?
- 9 A. We work in the -- I'm chipping the --
- 10 Q. You're chipping?
- 11 A. Yeah. I'm only the one they chipping, and those guys, they
- 12 | welding. These two guys welding.
- 13 Q. Were you doing fire watch?
- 14 A. Yeah, because that -- yesterday, I went down there. The guy
- 15 | cut the beam. I told the guy, because all the time, the chief, he
- 16 take one guy up there. Those guys, they know already. But I went
- 17 over there and nobody -- I told the guy, hey, somebody up there is
- 18 | -- you know, that's why I do the two job. The chipping -- I do my
- 19 job because only one chipping gun, and these guys, they -- and
- 20 after that one, I go up and only -- maybe the first time, 15
- 21 minutes, something like that, you know.
- 22 LT : Your job was a paint chipper? Chipping paint?
- MR. VAILAINA: Yeah, yesterday.
- 24 LT Yesterday that's what you were doing? You
- 25 | weren't doing a fire watch; you were paint chipping.

- 1 BY MR. THOMSEN:
- 2 Q. Did somebody tell you to do, to do fire watch? Did somebody
- 3 tell you to go up, or you just did that on your own?
- 4 A. No. Nobody tell me to watch. I'm the one they -- went over
- 5 there. Because I know is danger. You know, I told the guy,
- 6 nobody's go up there. That's why I come chipping the thing and I
- 7 go look around, come back, you know. I think four times, I no --
- 8 and the third time, I no open my room. But the first time and the
- 9 second, I open the room. And my third time, I no open the room,
- 10 so I come back down there and I work. And after that one, we go
- 11 for the lunch, so we clean the hands. And I hear the alarm. I no
- 12 hear the big alarm. Only the small alarm in the room.
- 13 Q. The modular one?
- 14 A. Yeah, that's the one I hear when I washing my hands. You
- 15 know, maybe --
- 16 Q. So that's the reason why you opened your door.
- 17 A. Yeah. That's the one. I open the door. Then I saw the fire
- 18 come and straight through my room. It's very strong. They come
- 19 from the air condition, very strong. The smoking. I can't
- 20 | breathe. I try to get my passport but I can't, you know. I say,
- 21 | forget it. (Indiscernible) but I don't want to die. So I run
- 22 away.
- 23 Q. So did you hear any other alarm? So you heard the modular --
- 24 | the little fire alarm.
- 25 A. Yeah.

- 1 Q. Did you hear any other alarm?
- 2 A. Yeah, I hear the alarm. So then I open my room. I head into
- 3 | the fire, but I hear the other guy say fire to the other side. He
- 4 said from the storeroom. Then I came out. Those two guys, I --
- 5 because they have two bottles right over there. So the other guy
- 6 trap the other one. I come, grab the other one, you know. We try
- 7 to kill the -- but we don't know the main point the fire come
- 8 because it come from the air condition, the smoking.
- 9 BY LT:
- 10 Q. So I'm sorry. I just want to back up a little bit. Your
- 11 job, your job yesterday was what? What was your job yesterday?
- 12 A. My job is --
- 13 Q. Yesterday, what was your job?
- 14 A. Yeah, that's -- my job is chipping and a watch.
- 15 Q. Chipping paint and being a fire watch.
- 16 A. No, I no, I no paint. Only the chipping.
- 17 Q. Only chipping --
- 18 A. And watch.
- 19 O. And be a fire watch.
- 20 A. Yeah.
- 21 O. Both at the same time.
- 22 A. After chipping, then I go up. You know, I come, I come
- 23 chipping a little bit, then I go up watching. Because I watching
- 24 the -- some fires. So I look around.
- 25 Q. Were you told to be -- who told -- did someone tell you to be

- 1 both a paint chipper and a fire watch?
- 2 A. No, nobody tell me to.
- 3 Q. So why'd you -- why were you being a paint chipper and a fire
- 4 | watch yesterday if no one told you to do it?
- 5 A. Because I know this, you know, I know this guy working down
- 6 there. He's very danger. Because I know, I know before a lot of
- 7 | time, you know, some boat because --
- 8 MR. THOMSEN: I'm going to, I'm going to ask a question in
- 9 Samoan.
- 10 LT : Yeah.
- MR. THOMSEN: (Samoan).
- MR. VAILAINA: Nobody tell me to -- those guys, the -- for
- 13 me, I go over there --
- 14 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 15 MR. THOMSEN: Nobody told him to do the chipping. Nobody
- 16 told him to do the fire watch. He just did it on his own.
- 17 BY MR. THOMSEN:
- 18 Q. Tinifu, the drills. You know, to abandon ship, firefighting,
- 19 | flooding, man overboard. (Indiscernible) drills?
- 20 A. What?
- 21 Q. (Samoan) -- when was the last time (indiscernible) drills?
- 22 A. (Samoan).
- 23 Q. So, what, last month? Late last month?
- 24 A. Yeah, last month.
- 25 Q. So last month was the last time they did drills.

- 1 A. Well we go -- no, our trip is only 21 days.
- 2 Q. So what were the drills that you guys did? I mean, what were
- 3 the drills that were conducted? (Samoan).
- 4 A. The fire drill. They normally --
- 5 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 6 LT : Just fire drills?
- 7 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah.
- 8 MR. THOMSEN: So I -- he says, I did a fire drill before
- 9 that, and they did the fire drill out at sea.
- 10 LT : That was a month ago?
- 11 MR. THOMSEN: They did -- last month they did drills while
- 12 they were out at sea.
- 13 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah.
- 14 LT : Okay.
- 15 MR. THOMSEN: So prior to that, he's saying that I did do a
- 16 commercial fishing vessel exam, and most likely I did drills.
- 17 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 18 MR. THOMSEN: He said on his fourth time going up to check is
- 19 when he saw the smoke. You said (Samoan), Tinifu, that that guy
- 20 | told you to go up? After you told him it's dangerous?
- 21 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah, that's why I -- yeah, after I told
- 22 him --
- MR. THOMSEN: That he told you to go check.
- MR. VAILAINA: Yeah, that's what he told me. Then I go up
- 25 because I know it's danger this way.

- 1 MR. THOMSEN: Okay.
- 2 LT : Fourth time that day, yesterday.
- 3 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah.
- 4 LT : Starting at what time? When did you start
- 5 work? 8 o'clock?
- 6 MR. VAILAINA: 8 o'clock.
- 7 BY MR. THOMSEN:
- 8 Q. You said that you went up above, and somebody was handling
- 9 the fire hose? You said the guy was getting the fire hose ready?
- 10 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 11 Q. Where is that? At that bow?
- 12 A. No, the stern.
- 13 O. At the stern.
- 14 A. Yeah, right under the -- another fire pump, we have a hose on
- 15 the, on -- yeah, that's the one they try to --
- 16 Q. So you and the other guy, the deck boss, was getting that
- 17 hose ready. And then what?
- 18 A. Yeah. And we try to bring the -- spray the place because we
- 19 can't go inside. The smoking very strong. It's why he can't grab
- 20 | something, save something, clothes or something, you know.
- 21 Q. So what about SCBAs? You know, (Samoan). The fire suit.
- 22 A. (Indiscernible) the storeroom. (Samoan).
- 23 Q. (Samoan) -- how many SCBAs do you have onboard?
- 24 A. (Samoan).
- 25 Q. Two. No, three.

- 1 A. I don't know because they have two new one.
- 2 Q. So one SCBA was near the fire.
- 3 A. Yeah.
- 4 Q. And where was the other SCBA?
- 5 A. The other one, the other one, they have a mask and, you know,
- 6 you have some hose at the back --
- 7 Q. And where was that one at? (Samoan).
- 8 A. They have a -- they stack the other one. They stack the big
- 9 pack, and the other one is stored because they have two -- they
- 10 hanging over there, the big one. The old one. But the new one,
- 11 they have stacked inside a big -- a basket.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- MR. THOMSEN: I'm going to switch to the Samoan language.
- (Conversation in Samoan)
- 15 MR. THOMSEN: I'm trying to imagine the location.
- 16 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 17 MR. THOMSEN: He said both SCBAs were in the same locker, one
- 18 | in, one in a container, the other one hanging up.
- 19 MR. VAILAINA: (Samoan).
- 20 MR. THOMSEN: Okay, and it's adjacent to the, to the
- 21 storeroom.
- MR. VAILAINA: We try to --
- MR. THOMSEN: So they couldn't get to it.
- MR. VAILAINA: -- get it, but we can't get it. It's the one
- 25 | we try to -- that's why we stay in the front of the door, the

- galley from the -- that's the only place to be open to -- for us to spray the water.
- I have another question for you, but it's -
 it doesn't have to do with SCBAs. My question is, the two

 welders, the two people welding?
- 6 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah, two people welding.
- Did they think you were a fire watch?

 Did they think you were a fire watch, or did they think you were a

 paint chipper?
- MR. VAILAINA: Yeah, I'm a -- yeah, I'm a -- I do the, I

 do --
- 12 LT : Can we shut that door, maybe? So they'll
- 13 leave us alone?
- 14 BY LT:
- 15 Q. I just want to know if they were relying on you --
- 16 A. No --
- 17 Q. -- as a, as a fire watch, or were -- I just want to -- I want
- 18 to understand that better.
- 19 A. I do the -- yesterday, most of the time I'm a fire watch, you
- 20 know. I watch the -- and I -- sometimes I go over there, only use
- 21 the chipping. And this guy want to use it, then get it when I
- 22 come back. But the 1 week already, I work with the guy. I always
- 23 chipping and --
- 24 Q. You're always chipping paint around him while he's welding?
- 25 A. Yeah. Yeah.

- 1 Q. Is that part of the welding process, for you to chip paint?
- 2 | I don't understand why -- why are you always chipping paint around
- 3 the welders? Is that part of the deal, or you're just cleaning up
- 4 | the paint job?
- 5 A. No, no, no, no. The rust that -- with the rust. Yeah, and
- 6 those guys, they -- he sees some hole in the, in the beam. So he
- 7 | welding the -- you know, he welding the block to cover the hole.
- 8 And after that one, you know, and I go to the chipping the thing
- 9 and put primer, you know.
- 10 Q. You chip all the extra paint off so that you can repaint
- 11 | where it's been welded?
- 12 A. Yeah, I repair the -- when all the welding -- no, we don't --
- 13 | I'm not to paint when after welding. Then I paint straight the --
- 14 maybe after lunch, then the guy finish in the morning, then I go
- 15 | chipping the paint. I put the -- I put primer, you know.
- 16 Q. Just so I --
- 17 A. (Indiscernible) the place is not too hot already, you know?
- 18 LT : Is there -- maybe you could -- I just want to
- 19 better understand why he's always chipping paint around the
- 20 | welders. Is that part of the welding process, to chip the extra
- 21 paint away, or is this coincidence?
- (Conversation in Samoan)
- MR. THOMSEN: Do you understand what he's --
- MR. HALL: I think, I think what he's saying is that his job
- 25 is just to do the chipping. And while he's chipping, if there's a

- MR. VAILAINA: We have to do the one Monday, you know. We have to keep going to finish the one section, you know. That's why (Samoan).
- 7 MR. THOMSEN: Okay, so let me -- so I think I know now. So 8 on the weekend --
- 9 (Conversation in Samoan)
- MR. THOMSEN: Okay. The deck boss told him over the weekend to begin the chipping process down on wet deck on Monday. So on
- 12 Monday, he started chipping. Tuesday, he started chipping.
- 13 Wednesday, he started chipping. So that's what he means about
- 14 nobody told him. It was -- he was actually informed to do that on
- 15 the weekend, so Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday. (Samoan). The two
- 16 guys who are welding on Monday, were they following you or --
- 17 (Conversation in Samoan)
- 18 BY MR. HALL:
- 19 Q. On Monday, were the welders doing welding on the wet deck?
- 20 A. Yeah.
- 21 Q. On Tuesday, were the welders doing welding on the wet deck?
- 22 A. Correct.
- 23 Q. And Wednesday, they were doing welding?
- 24 A. Yeah.
- 25 Q. And on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, you were doing

- 1 chipping. 2 Yeah. 3 0. With the welders. 4 MR. THOMSEN: (Samoan). 5 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah. 6 MR. THOMSEN: So Monday, Tuesday, (Samoan). 7 MR. VAILAINA: Yeah. Okay. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, they were 8 MR. THOMSEN: 9 welding, but his job was separate from theirs. They were doing 10 their own stuff on Wednesday. 11 So you weren't -- they weren't working with LT12 the -- he wasn't working with the welders. But he said, if he came across an issue --13 MR. THOMSEN: 14 He would tell --LT15 MR. THOMSEN: -- perforated metal, he would let them know. 16 Okay. That makes sense. Got it, got it, got LT 17 it. 18 BY LT 19 So just to rehash, you were never -- you were only told to be 2.0 a chipper, right? 21 Yeah. You were never told to be a fire watch. You were never told 22
- 24 A. Yesterday the guy welding, he told me to go watch --

to be a fire watch?

25 Q. The guy that's welding isn't your boss, though. Who's your

- 1 boss?
- 2 A. The deck boss.
- 3 Q. The deck boss is your boss, right?
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. Did the deck boss tell you to be a fire watch?
- 6 A. No, he no tell me about fire watch.
- 7 Q. Did the deck boss tell you to be a fire watch?
- 8 A. No. He no tell, because I saw the guys they welding, then I
- 9 told the guy -- because an older engine room guy, if someone --
- 10 | that's the guy they watching the thing. And I go over there, and
- 11 nobody was --
- 12 Q. Yeah, I know. You were taking the initiative. But did your
- 13 boss tell you to be a fire watch?
- 14 A. No, never. No.
- 15 Q. Never. Okay. You took initiative. That's great. I'm
