1 INTERVIEW Today is November the 10th, 2016. This is Michael 2 MR. FOX: 3 Fox, Investigator, NTSB, out of the Washington, D.C. office. 4 currently located in Howard County Public School System, Pupil Transportation Office, located at 5451 Beaver Kill Road, Columbia, 5 6 Maryland. And I'm going to -- we are going to be interviewing 7 David Ramsay. He's the director of pupil transportation here. So for the tape, we'll go around the room and introduce ourselves. 8 9 We'll start with you, Mr. Ramsay. Can you state your full 10 title -- correction, your name, your full title, and spell your 11 last name, please? 12 MR. RAMSAY: It's David Ramsey, R-a-m-s-e-y, and I'm the 13 Director of Transportation for the Howard County Public School 14 System. 15 MR. FOX: And spell your last name. 16 MR. RAMSAY: R-a-m-s-a-y. 17 MR. FOX: Thank you. 18 DR. MARSHALL: Rafael Marshall, M-a-r-s-h-a-l-l, Human 19 Performance Investigator with the NTSB. 2.0 INTERVIEW OF DAVID RAMSAY 21 BY MR. FOX: 22 So, Mr. Ramsay, thank you for meeting with us today. 23 mentioned, we had received a drug test result from Y&L 24 Transportation. The NTSB interviewed the owners over there

yesterday and they gave me a report from your office concerning

- 1 the accident driver involved in our Baltimore, Maryland crash that
- 2 | happened last Tuesday, specifically Mr. Glenn Chappell. I
- 3 received a notice from the owners over at Y&L stating that he was
- 4 | not qualified to drive, and we just wanted to work through some of
- 5 | the paperwork that you have, your office.
- 6 Can you explain your process, how you get a notification from
- 7 the bus company and the process of whether they're accepted or
- 8 not?
- 9 A. Sure. Any of our prospective candidates are sponsored by one
- 10 of our independent school bus contractors. The first step that is
- 11 required by a bus contractor is that they are to submit the
- 12 complete record of the applicant's MVA driving record. The second
- 13 piece of information they're to submit are the drug test results.
- 14 The third piece is that the contractor sends the applicant to get
- 15 fingerprinted so we can look at their criminal background. And
- once we review that information, then we make a determination if
- 17 the candidate is eligible to continue through with our
- 18 | certification process. But those are the three basic components
- 19 that first need to be accomplished.
- 20 Q. So can you go through the chronological process of how Y&L
- 21 sent you the appropriate paperwork, and then your responses to
- 22 those requests?
- 23 A. Well, actually we have other pieces. This actually involves
- 24 several companies that we have paperwork with Mr. Chappell. So,
- 25 here, we could do this --

- 1 Q. So in addition to Y&L, there were other motor carriers --
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 Q. -- or companies that responded?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 Q. I see. And can you identify what they are?
- 6 A. The first one is we have a request from Tip Top
- 7 Transportation, and we received this September 23rd, 2014. And
- 8 with it is the attached driving record of Mr. Chappell. And at
- 9 that point, after reviewing the driving record, I informed the
- 10 company that he would not be a candidate to be certified in Howard
- 11 County. And my reason for that is I noticed seven seatbelt
- 12 violations on his driving record.
- 13 Q. What was the date, sir, again?
- 14 A. That was on October 30th, 2014. I have a note in which I did
- 15 | not approve this candidate. And then my admin had also informed
- 16 the company on September 23rd of 2014, as well, that the candidate
- 17 was not eligible for further consideration.
- 18 Q. All right, sir. Is that the oldest record you have?
- 19 A. That's the oldest one, yeah. That's the oldest one.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. And then let's see here. So that's this one.
- 22 Q. Can we clip them together so we keep them in, you know, one
- 23 | stack? Or did you already staple all --
- 24 A. This is all yours.
- 25 Q. Oh. Oh, okay. Great.

- 1 A. That's all yours.
- 2 Q. This is your copy. Okay.
- 3 A. That's all yours.
- 4 Q. I did not realize that. So thank you. Okay, so this is Tip
- 5 Top.
- 6 A. That's Tip Top.
- 7 Q. I understand. This is all the related paperwork for that.
- 8 A. That's with that.
- 9 Q. And who is this down here? Is that -- that's Tip Top?
- 10 A. That's with the -- she's the manager, yeah.
- 11 Q. Do you by chance have contact information for Tip Top?
- 12 A. Yeah, I can get that. I can get that for you.
- 13 Q. Okay, so we'll get that later. All right. And then what's
- 14 next?
- 15 A. So then it looks like -- this is a form that we have of just
- 16 all of the components of what we expect this process. So we have
- 17 the contractor applicant verification form; driving record, when
- 18 | we receive it; fingerprint and reference number when we receive
- 19 it; the CJIS Maryland, which CJIS is the Criminal Justice
- 20 Information System, so both for the state of Maryland and the FBI;
- 21 DOT physical exam, pre-employment drug test, and then just other
- 22 steps that we take along the process. So this is our check-off
- 23 list.
- So, with this, we received the information from Mr. Chappell.
- 25 So this is his U.S. DOT card that we received at the time, and his

- 1 license.
- 2 Q. Is that in this stack here, too?
- 3 A. It is, um-hum. It is.
- 4 Q. Oh, I see it. Okay.
- 5 A. We have a copy of his medical examination report. And then
- 6 | over here -- so let's see here. I have an email from, it looks
- 7 | like someone in, yeah, Baltimore City, in which we were just
- 8 getting verification if the driver was approved in Baltimore City.
- 9 And so this is a thread of emails: Please -- is Glenn R.
- 10 Chappell currently a certified school bus driver in the city? And
- 11 then our response back was he is not certified. His in-service
- 12 expired on 6/24/15. His DOT physical is good; doesn't expire
- 13 until 8/31. And his MVA doesn't expire until 6/16. And we just
- 14 say thank you.
- 15 Q. Sir, now, please help me. I might need a sticky note. Who
- 16 is going -- this is the same email?
- 17 A. Yeah. So Catherine is one of my secretaries that's
- 18 responsible for the --
- 19 Q. Okay, Catherine is in your staff?
- 20 A. Correct. Catherine Magers.
- 21 Q. Magers?
- 22 A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. I think I talked to her yesterday.
- 24 A. Yeah, you did.
- 25 Q. Yeah, she was very helpful.

- 1 A. Yeah.
- 2 Q. And she is staff here at Howard County?
- 3 A. Correct. Yeah.
- 4 Q. All right, sir.
- 5 A. And so basically what Catherine's responsibility is, is
- 6 pulling all this together, and she goes through the initial
- 7 screening. And if there is something that is in the driving
- 8 record or the MVA record that she believes needs to be brought to
- 9 my attention, then that's what she does.
- 10 Q. And so this email is going to who?
- 11 A. It looks like a representative in Baltimore City, because if
- 12 someone is certified in another jurisdiction, we will reach out to
- 13 them to say, hey, is this so-and-so certified? If they say yes,
- 14 then we'll just review the information. They still have to go
- 15 through the entire process, but we just reach out because it has
- 16 an impact on if they -- for their behind-the-wheel observations.
- 17 Under COMAR, you either have a 3 or 9-hour observation. So if we
- 18 | have someone that's certified in Baltimore City or Baltimore
- 19 County as a school bus driver, for our observations we only need
- 20 to spend 3 hours with them as opposed to 9 hours.
- DR. MARSHALL: How would you know if they're certified in
- 22 other places?
- MR. RAMSAY: We send them an email. We reach out to them.
- 24 DR. MARSHALL: So is he certified anywhere else besides
- 25 Baltimore City? Do we know that?

- 1 MR. RAMSAY: I'm not sure. I'm not sure.
- 2 BY MR. FOX:
- 3 Q. So just again going back to this email, Catherine Magers from
- 4 | your office sent an email to what person?
- 5 A. It looks like Michelle.
- 6 Q. Best?
- 7 A. I'm assuming so.
- 8 Q. And do you -- do we know who she is? I mean, this is going
- 9 to where? This is going to Baltimore County?
- 10 A. Baltimore City.
- 11 Q. City?
- 12 A. I'm assuming so because Steve James is copied on there. So
- 13 Steve James works in Baltimore City. If you look down at the
- 14 bottom, Steve James.
- 15 Q. Oh, okay. I see now.
- 16 A. Yeah.
- 17 Q. Steve James. Okay. So it was copied to him.
- 18 A. Yeah.
- 19 Q. Okay. So Michelle Best. Best. And then cc'd to Steve
- 20 James.
- 21 A. Yes.
- 22 Q. Now, and their response was what? Or they just --
- 23 A. Well, right here it says --
- 24 Q. It's saying, "I apologize for getting back to you -- is not
- 25 certified for the City"?

- 1 A. Yes. Now, remember, this was -- what date was this sent out?
- 2 Q. '15, September '15.
- 3 A. '15. So, you know, it's not uncommon for drivers to -- you
- 4 know, if they don't show up for training, then they lose their
- 5 | certification and then they come back and they regain their
- 6 certification. But at that point when we sent him the email,
- 7 | yeah, it looks like on here his in-service expired on 6/24/15. So
- 8 what this tells me is he probably was certified at one time,
- 9 didn't attend the mandatory training, so they removed his
- 10 certification and I guess he got it back. Well, I'm assuming he
- 11 got it back at some point.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- 13 A. But when we sent this email, at this point he was not
- 14 certified.
- 15 Q. I see. All right.
- 16 A. Okay? So that's that. And then the next email is from AAA
- 17 Affordable. Do you have that one?
- 18 O. Yes.
- 19 A. And Catherine says, "I'm forwarding information on
- 20 Mr. Chappell for consideration for certification in Howard County.
- 21 He is employed by us." Actually, this is coming from AAA
- 22 Affordable to our office. "He is employed by us and is currently
- 23 certified in Baltimore City as a school bus driver. Attached in
- 24 the email is a memo noting -- indicating his drug test and
- 25 results." So, once again, they're going through the approval

- 1 process of sending stuff over.
- 2 Q. So they're asking if he can be certified in the county?
- 3 A. Right. Um-hum. Right.
- 4 \mathbb{Q} . And this is on -- what is the date on this, sir? Oh,
- 5 September the 3rd.
- 6 A. Of '15.
- 7 Q. September 3rd, 2015.
- 8 A. Correct. And then over here is the accompanying paperwork
- 9 that we had talked about. So they have to fill out all of this
- 10 information.
- 11 Q. Okay.
- 12 A. So this is from AAA Affordable, and attached is a copy of a
- 13 driver's license and the medical certificate, and then a copy of
- 14 his driving record.
- 15 Q. Okay. And this document is your document?
- 16 A. Um-hum, that's our document.
- 17 Q. So the contractor would fill out the appropriate information
- 18 and fax it back or email it to you?
- 19 A. Right. Right.
- 20 Q. Okay, so they're sending --
- 21 A. Yeah, and so what it says is the undersigned contractor
- 22 | certifies that a review of the information, all disclosed former
- 23 employers have been contacted, blah, blah. It just goes
- 24 through all the expectations that we have. It has, I have
- 25 attached the applicant's complete driving record, and then, you

- 1 know, it goes back through all, you know, all the pieces that we
- 2 have. Yeah, they sent it over to us.
- 3 Q. Yes, sir.
- 4 A. And then this is verification, the next document, for their
- 5 pre-employment drug test.
- 6 Q. Yes, sir.
- 7 A. Okay? And the medical examination report from Concentra.
- 8 And then over here, once again, this is the CJIS report. On this
- 9 one, this is the state, and then this is the FBI. And under the
- 10 CJIS report, once again we state ineligible.
- 11 Q. I see the note here, but I don't see anything -- what does it
- 12 say? Supported criminal --
- 13 A. Well, flip it on the --
- Q. Oh, so there's -- I was going to say, is there a report? Oh,
- 15 okay, so there's this. Then I have seen a similar report.
- 16 A. Okay. So what Catherine does is highlights everything for
- 17 me. So the nol prosses I can't look -- I don't consider, because
- 18 they didn't prosecute. But the other things that concerned me in
- 19 here were the probation for a violation of ex parte order.
- 20 Q. Maybe we should highlight like you did on yours. We can do
- 21 it later.
- 22 A. Okay. Wherever you see checkmarks. So under here, the nol
- 23 pros, you know, the State's Attorney's Office decided not to
- 24 prosecute, so I can't factor that in there.
- 25 O. I see.

- 1 A. But the ones that are, when their final disposition has been
- 2 given on the outcome of a case. So you can see that he had a
- 3 variety of different charges.
- 4 Q. Yes, sir.
- 5 A. And then under the federal, this is the federal report,
- 6 there's nothing on the federal level.
- 7 Q. So, now, dealing with AAA, this packet here, did you send a
- 8 document or email to AAA to say he was not qualified? I see that
- 9 | it says ineligible, but was there -- you know, they sent it --
- 10 obviously they sent in this package that we're looking at and
- 11 saying, hey, we want to add him as a driver for Howard County.
- 12 And then this document here, after you reviewed the criminal
- 13 history, it says ineligible, CM. So is there a communication back
- 14 to AAA saying he's --
- 15 A. I don't have that. It probably was just a --
- 16 Q. Email?
- 17 A. It could have been, or a verbal to say we've already reviewed
- 18 the record and he's not eligible.
- 19 Q. Is it possible that maybe Catherine would know? Would she be
- 20 | the one, or would it be you personally doing that?
- 21 A. Yeah, I mean, Catherine has many, many hundreds and hundreds
- 22 of telephone calls. I can pull her in and ask her.
- 23 Q. Could you please? That would be great.
- 24 A. Yeah, absolutely.
- Q. We'll just wait a second. That would be awesome. Thank you,

1 sir. 2 (Pause.) 3 MR. FOX: We're currently waiting for Catherine Magers to 4 come into the room. So we'll just let the tape run so we don't 5 have to turn it off and introduce ourselves again. 6 (Pause.) 7 Is she coming? MR. FOX: Yep, she sure is. 8 MR. RAMSAY: 9 MS. MAGERS: Hi. 10 MR. RAMSAY: Here's Catherine. 11 MS. MAGERS: Hi. Good morning. 12 MR. FOX: Catherine, Mike Fox from the NTSB. 13 MS. MAGERS: Mike. 14 This is Dr. Marshall with the NTSB. MR. FOX: Good morning. 15 MS. MAGERS: Dr. Marshall. 16 MR. FOX: Please have a seat. We are on the record. 17 MS. MAGERS: Tell me about this. MR. RAMSAY: 18 You're on the record, Catherine. 19 MR. FOX: Yes, we're on the record. 2.0 MS. MAGERS: And on camera, also? 21 This is just -- we do this because we can't keep up 22 with the notes fast enough, especially when we're dealing with 23 pieces of paper. 24 MS. MAGERS: Perfect. 25 MR. FOX: And we just want to make sure that we've touched

upon everything in the sequential order. So joining us in the 1 2 interview is Catherine Magers. INTERVIEW OF CATHERINE MAGERS 3 4 MR. FOX: And for the record, could you state your full name, 5 your title, and spell your last name? 6 MS. MAGERS: Catherine Lavin Magers, M-a-q-e-r-s. 7 secretary. 8 Yes, ma'am. Well, thank you for coming. MR. FOX: 9 MS. MAGERS: You're welcome. 10 So, currently, what we're doing is discussing the MR. FOX: 11 various procedures that your office has for certifying drivers for 12 contract work for the County, and we're specifically working on 13 Glenn Chappell, who was the driver of the school bus that was 14 involved in the crash last week. And we are -- we've reviewed 15 what appear to be two or three requests for positions at various 16 companies, and I wanted -- we looked at Tip Top Transportation and I see the audit trail on that. We're currently reviewing the one 17 18 for AAA, and let me --19 I don't know if you want to show her your copy. 2.0 So, from what we understand -- and maybe you can explain it 21 from your perspective of how this process works? 22 MS. MAGERS: Sure. Sure. Do you know if these happen to be 23 in chronological order? 24 MR. RAMSAY: No, the first -- yeah. 25 MS. MAGERS: They are? Okay.

1 MR. RAMSAY: Tip Top was the first. And we've already 2 discussed Tip Top. 3 MS. MAGERS: Okay. And so then you're up to --4 MR. FOX: AAA. 5 MR. RAMSAY: Yeah. 6 MS. MAGERS: AAA. 7 MR. FOX: And they may be in backwards order. He was laying 8 them out for --9 (Pause.) 10 I think we could start with this one, right? MR. FOX: 11 this one? 12 MS. MAGERS: Exactly where I am, yes. Give me just a moment 13 to go through my work. 14 MR. FOX: Yeah, no, no. We've shuffled them around. 15 MS. MAGERS: Sure. 16 MR. FOX: So you take your time to put them in the order as 17 you understand the file. 18 MS. MAGERS: Chronological. 19 MR. FOX: And I'm going to put mine in the same order so we 2.0 can take a look at them. 21 MS. MAGERS: And then -- oh, September 9th. September 9th. 22 Okay. 23 MR. FOX: Would it be this one first, September 2nd? 24 MS. MAGERS: Yes. This arrived in the -- the contractor's

So I need to verify that. So I reach out to the next county or city. The reply came back, no, he's not current in his certification.

After I put all the pieces together -- I've got to see why I determined -- I'm thinking I determined he was ineligible because of criminal issues.

 agency enforces COMAR regulations? Who would be the government

 - MR. RAMSAY: Well, since this comes under the education article, so we would -- the Maryland State Department of Education. And so every 2 years they come in and they audit our records.

MR. RAMSAY: I think this past year. So we're still waiting for the -- I can't remember if they've submitted the final report or not, to us or not.

MR. FOX: And is it graded, so to speak? Is there some type of matrix that they say you're doing good or bad or satisfactory?

MR. RAMSAY: Yeah. Yeah, no, no, they'll just report their findings. So typically they will do a sampling of, I want to say, 25 drivers, 25 buses. Don't quote me on the exact number. They pull that, and what they're looking for is to make sure that, you know, our drivers are in compliance with, you know, all of the preliminary requirements as well as the continued employment or certification requirements, so our training, physical, things along those lines.

And then similarly, with the -- when they random sample the buses, inspection records are up to date, make sure all the buses have been inspected, if they've been pulled out. And then you have the Motor Vehicle Administration that manages that piece, or oversees that piece.

MR. FOX: If there were issues of noncompliance, what type -- is there any type of prosecution or --

MR. RAMSAY: No, what they can -- you know, and I'm not an expert on this, so I don't know. But typically they would -- if there were repeat findings, then they could put you under a performance program where they would closely monitor a

jurisdiction's performance and follow up. But I'm not an expert with that, over that.

And then, of course, there are some monetary findings, and this gets into when they -- each of the jurisdictions are eligible for money for the students with disabilities. And so we're actually in the process of putting together our final report to submit to the Maryland State Department of Education. So we have about 1200 students that due to their IEP, their Individual Education Program, the County receives money from the State to contribute to the transportation. And if they find that we submitted a name and it's not reflected on the IEP, then they would start -- they would hit us with a monetary act, or deduction, I should say, fine, deduction.

(Whereupon, Ms. Magers enters the room.)

MS. MAGERS: No, I cannot substantiate the email. This would be an attachment. I can't substantiate the email.

MR. FOX: Okay. All right. Well, thank you for checking.

MR. RAMSAY: Right. So for us it could be criminal, it could be the driving record.

MS. MAGERS: Well, everything has to be -- all the ducks have to be in alignment. So even if another county or city says okay, I don't know why they're saying okay, but I'm going to follow COMAR. And if all the ducks don't align, so we're going to say no.

DR. MARSHALL: Yeah, I guess I just wanted to find out how much communication there is between counties on things like this. You know, so if a driver is eligible in one other county and you've rejected that driver in Howard County, is there any communication back to the other county on why you've rejected that driver?

MS. MAGERS: If another county asks me the same question I'm asking, "Catherine, is so-and-so currently certified in Howard County," I'll either reply yes or I'll reply no, this driver's observation is expired, or no, this person hasn't attended in-

service classes, he or she is not currently certified.

DR. MARSHALL: I guess my question is we sort of had the same issue when it came to commercial drivers some years ago, where a driver would go from, I guess, one -- you know, so they all have to have medicals.

MR. RAMSAY: Right.

2.0

DR. MARSHALL: So they'd go from one doctor to another until they'd finally get -- you know, until they'd finally get their certificate. And there's no communication between the doctors or anything so that nobody knows, you know, whether they've been rejected from another place.

MR. RAMSAY: Right. Right.

DR. MARSHALL: So in this case, I can see that also happening, where you've got counties that aren't speaking to each other and so a driver can just shop from one county to another until they finally get certified.

MR. RAMSAY: Yeah, so it gets back to the subjectivity as we're reviewing the records. Now, I can share that there is a essential repository database for severe infractions in which we are obligated to submit. So it's the Maryland State Department of Education's Disqualified Database.

MS. MAGERS: MSDE.

MR. RAMSAY: Right. So if a driver were to test positive on a drug or alcohol test, we are required to submit that to the Maryland State Department of Education. And part of our process

is we have to check that database, as well as any other jurisdiction, to make sure that there's a driver not in there.

So on something like this, this wouldn't rise to the occasion with a CJIS or an MVA record review of someone ending up in that database. Typically it's COMAR violations and the names would be submitted there. Or if there was -- we discovered that there was a behavior that was exhibited that was so egregious and we believed that no county should hire this person, then we would submit the name to MSDE.

MR. FOX: So he did have an assault charge on there. Did that not rise to the level?

MR. RAMSAY: It's not a crime of violence. And a crime of violence is defined -- and I have the chart. But that's what COMAR states.

MR. FOX: Okay. So just for clarification, none of the violations that you vetted was a breach of COMAR, was in violation of a COMAR standard?

MR. RAMSAY: It could be interpreted. You know, when we look at assault, and depending on first degree, second degree -- and once again, it gets back to be, it's very -- it can be very subjective when you have the conversation.

MR. FOX: Right.

MR. RAMSAY: The COMAR specifically states a crime of

1 violence, and I -- I'll pull the information for where it defines 2 the crime of violence. And then there are obviously some other 3 areas within COMAR. But, you know, this was kind of twofold. 4 One, he had the assault on his record, and then just the other 5 aspects that were on there. It was just too much stuff. 6 MR. FOX: Right. 7 MR. RAMSAY: Yeah. 8 MR. FOX: Let me ask you a question. This is a one-time submission, and then I enter

them into a flag program upon my certification. I have a connection with the MVA and I put them on a flag roster; tell me any activity of any of my certified drivers that's bad.

These are prerequisites: They go to be fingerprinted, and then I have that CJIS report. That's a one-time item. Physicals are annual. This is a one-time -- they give me this memo that so-and-so has been tested for pre-employment and is added to their random drug-testing program, and then the rest begins.

Behind the wheel, that's initially a 9-hour observation, and then we give it every other year. COMAR requires it every 24 months. Transit evaluation is optional, a flat-nose bus versus a long-nose bus. The criminal background information form is a one-time item that we solicit, we collect at our pre-service class.

MR. FOX: So all of these fields are in a program that's managing the drivers' due dates and expiration dates, and then it will flag you by some kind of email or prompt if something is going to fall out of compliance?

MS. MAGERS: That's me. That's my job. Yes, I monitor the certification. I maintain the records to see that all of our drivers are up to par.

MR. FOX: Is this an Excel spreadsheet or is it a --

MR. RAMSAY: No, it's an Oracle database.

MR. FOX: So it's a system management software program?

MS. MAGERS: Um-hum.

MR. RAMSAY: Different systems -- you know, I can't speak to

what other systems do, but this is what we do in Howard County, and it's just a tool for us so we can make sure that folks are in compliance. I mean, ultimately, it's the contractor's responsibility to make sure that their employees are up to date with their DOT physicals and make sure that they have all of their drivers enrolled in the drug and alcohol testing program.

But we, interestingly, with the MVA flag program -- and obviously that's come to light with part of the investigation, is the time in which jurisdictions are notified if something occurs on one of our drivers' driving records. And the only way that we're made aware of it is through self-disclosure of the employee, notifying their employer that, hey, I got pulled over on 95 for speeding, or if it comes up through the flag program. We have to rely on the flag program and/or the contractors notifying us. But the flag program is our primary source to receive that information.

MR. FOX: In your role, do you ever suspend a driver, so to speak? If they get in an accident or something of that nature, is that part of your protocol?

MR. RAMSAY: Um-hum.

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MR. FOX: And when you suspend a driver, do you monitor -- do you have a protocol on the number of days they would be suspended or the length of time that they're not behind the wheel?

MR. RAMSAY: Yeah, it's twofold. I mean, once again, it depends on the particular infraction that we're dealing with. So,

- for instance, I typically will get involved for COMAR-related issues. I have to rely on the contractors to deal with other employee, specific employee issues, because the school bus drivers are not employees of the school system. So like yesterday, I met with someone who was assessed five points, so I permanently disqualified them as a driver.
 - MR. FOX: Five points. How was that generated?
- 8 MR. RAMSAY: I was alerted through the MVA flag system.
- 9 MR. FOX: Oh, through the flag system.

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- MR. RAMSAY: Yeah, through the flag system.
 - MR. FOX: So aside from the Motor Vehicle Department, if a -is it your procedure, if there is a school bus incident or
 accident, does that go to the office and does your office vet
 those things?
 - MR. RAMSAY: We do. All of the accidents are reviewed by what we refer to as the Accident Review Committee. It's a committee comprised of the Howard County Police Department, Maryland State Police Department, our driver instructors, managers, area managers, representatives from our safety and risk management office. And who else? Oh, and a driver representative.
 - And so the committee, for all of our accidents, they come in this room and they read the reports, put information up on the screen, and then the committee makes a determination of the preventability or non-preventability of the accident based on the

National Safety Council's guidelines for preventability or nonpreventability of an accident. So all of them are --

MR. FOX: You said a point system?

MR. RAMSAY: No, it's either preventable or non-preventable.

MR. FOX: Oh, non-preventable or preventable.

MR. RAMSAY: On the part of the driver. So they're very high standards. You know, it's higher than when the law enforcement — you know, someone could be at fault, but they may not issue a ticket or citation for that. And so what we look into, and really the guiding principle, did the driver do everything in his or her power to prevent the accident from occurring.

MR. FOX: Understood.

MR. RAMSAY: And so we would then intervene if a driver -- all of our drivers who have a preventable accident, they're required to go through what we call a driver improvement program. It's a 1-hour class with our driver instructors. Because we want our folks to succeed. So they would go through this class. If a driver has two preventable accidents within 24 months in which there's appreciable damage or bodily injury, then COMAR states that I have to disqualify them unless I believe that there is a compelling reason not to.

MR. FOX: If there was a driver that had a preventable accident, at that point are they considered disqualified?

MR. RAMSAY: Uh-uh.

MR. FOX: Or they're still qualified in the system, but are

- they flagged in the system, saying that they shouldn't be driving?
