

RECORD OF CONVERSATIONS

Narrative:

The following is a synopsis of the information provided by multiple persons in multiple telephone conservations on the noted dates. Calls are in sequence earliest to latest.

<u>May 19</u>

Deputy Chris Faiman (Kings Cty Sheriff's Office. Not at site; at launch airport)

- Glider launched at 1227 pm today
- Club heard from pilot about 1 hr later- all OK
- No more comms/no return
- Club plane w 2 POB launched at 1830 to find
- Found wreckage in 2 locs ¹/₄ mile apart (wing + remainder on opposite sides of ridge)
- Wreckages approx. 1000' down very steep ridge from access road
- 35° 56 12.5 -120° 13 00.6

James Rickey (Club member/tow pilot/director of Mx. Not at site; at launch airport)

- Central California Soaring Club
- Pilot: Jan Zanuito
- Pilot's airplane, not Club airplane
- ICA-Brasov IS-29
- Pilot's first flight in this AC
- Deptd out of Avenal Glider Port (CA69)
- Dan Gudgel (other club member) reported ax to NTSB & FAA- Not sure who he spoke with

<u>May 20</u>

Troy Wise (FAA Fresno FSDO)

- Ryan Smith will be other FAA inspector
- Pilot had called Troy/Fresno FSDO a while back asking about this AC that he was interested in purchasing, and its supposed life limits, and whether that limit was applicable in US

- AC mfgd in Romania
- FAA told pilot they'd need relevant data before rendering decision

Rick Eason (co-owner)

- The airplane was purchased a few months ago from owner in KS
- AC trailered to CA (Merced, one of the co-owners' home towns)
- AC had not been flown in 6-8 years
- Pilot was also A&P/IA ("incredibly competent")
- The new co-owners "thoroughly" inspected aircraft post purchase
- The AC was then trailered to Fresno where it was inspected again
- Then it was trailered to CA69 and assembled by pilot w co-owner assistance
- Pilot had a 1 YO parachute that was recently repacked by pilot
- The searching tow pilot thought he saw a chute (on ground) near the wreckage
- The pilot wore a GPS tracking device on a lanyard around his neck
- The two co-owners also co-owned another glider, a Grob
- The pilot was a very experienced glider pilot, much more so than Mr. Eason
- The accident flight was the first flight of the airplane since its purchase by these two
- The pilot also had a mobile phone with him with an App that allowed his wife to see his location
- The wife sent a screen shot to Mr Eason re which she stated that the location of the pilot/AC had not changed in a long time
- Cal Fire personnel were the ones who reportedly first accessed the wreckage on the ground, and confirmed the pilot fatality

<u>May 21</u>

Chief Manuel DaFonte (Kings County FD)

- Not at site; supervised access recovery from ridge road
- Pilot/main site was about 500' down from ridge road
- Accessible on foot to "moderate" hiker, but ropes help descent & ascent
- Noone went down to wing etc on 'other' side of ridge
- Personnel did take photos on scene, but all at night
- Body recovery began approx. 330 am morning of 5/20
- Primary LEO contact Det Samuel Weimer (was on site)
- Secondary Det Sgt Mark Lusk
- Coroner:

Jeremiah Gilson (Coroner, Kings County Sheriff Office)

- Responded to site
- Pilot w partially opened chute found "not far" from aircraft
- No mobile phone observed/recovered
- Lanyard on pilot but no tracking device attached; not recovered
