

On August 7<sup>th</sup>, at an unknown time in the afternoon, Mike Young and I were working on drill pad ED-L when we heard a tremendous crash and witnessed pieces of helicopter flying into the air. I told Mike to call in that the helicopter is down at ED-N Pad over the radio. I then ran up the hill towards the crash sight as fast as I could. On my way, I passed the helicopter pad that I was later told Jim was flying to land on. I witnessed that one of the ~~togg~~ legs on the back end had been damaged and pulled up from the structure. I had a hard time determining the location of the crash so I yelled out, I received a response from Bruce (unknown last name) from Bowt Drilling. When I arrived on scene two drillers and Bruce were attempting to pull Jim from the helicopter wreckage. I immediately started to help. I could see that Jim was not conscious and that his right shoulder was severely injured. Once we got Jim from the helicopter I immediately began CPR. I did chest compressions and asked one of the drillers to get me a barrier from the first aid kit. I attempted several breaths but was unable to get a seal. I continued chest compressions. I attempted several more times to give rescue breaths but the breaths were only getting into his stomach. So I continued compressions, for an unknown amount of time, all the while trying to get Jim to respond by talking to him and asking him to blink his eyes, which were open the whole time. I was asked by a driller if I needed a break and realized that my arms were really tired and we switched places. While he was giving compressions I ran to the drill and grabbed there back board. When I got back I took over compressions again and we switched back and forth until emergency crew arrived. Emergency crew took over and I helped with breaths and C-spine until the lead EMS called Jim deceased dead.

Rocky Barker Exploration

I was working on our drill when the crash happened. Bruce had just left to be picked up by Jim. Jim came in and when he went to land, it sounded like the helicopter miss fired or backfired a couple of times (I can only remember hearing it twice). After I heard that I heard crashing through the trees, so I ran to see and help. When I got there, the helicopter was in pieces. Dave was right in front of me and we started yelling Jim's name. He didn't call back. We tried calling several times. Still, no response. Dave and I went to the ~~the~~ helicopter to look for Jim. When we got there, Jim was still strapped in his seat belt and had his helmet on. (The helicopter was laying on the driver side so Jim was on the ground in his seat.) He was taking a ~~long~~ long deep breath about every 10 seconds. We kept calling his name to see if we could get a response. We never got one. Jim was sitting in his seat and ~~had~~ his hands clasped over his chest. We couldn't see his face, Dave pushed his shirt down and Jim's face was blue. Dave cut the helmet off and undid his seat belt so we could get his head away from his chest so he could breath. ~~then we took his head~~. After the helmet was off and his seat belt undone, we notice he wasn't breathing anymore. His right shoulder was dislocated and right arm stuck between the ground and the helicopter. So, we pulled him up and began CPR. He tried breathing but it never made it to his chest. We kept doing chest compressions until help arrived.

Pilot was unresponsive appeared to be breathing. Worked at moving  
him from helio by the time we had him out his breathing had  
stopped. Mike & Rocky arrived on scene just as we were working  
to get Jim out.

Vitals checked CPR started till rescue arrived.

After rescue personnel arrived moved back to site.

About 1:30 P.M. To 2:00 P.M. Aug 7th, Rocky and I william (Mike) Young buckled up in Helicopter with Jim the Pilot, ~~the~~ But this time and we flown in Helicopters AT Pogo since May 2006, Jim started engine but he turned it off while it was revving up, then he done it a second time, all along looking at the panel switch board, I Thought I detected a different type noise not of the normal when he started the engine finally

Jim dropped Rocky and I off AT ED-L Pad, Then second trip dropped his wife Melinda where we were AT, Jim slung in a spinner and base AT ED-L, and done some other slinging, about two hours later he picked up his wife, then came back a bit later to pick up Bruce Anderson, Boat long year supervisor AT Ed-N heli pad, we heard him land as usual, but soon as he lands there were an awful stretching noise from the Helicopter, then I heard it crash, and seen some wood debris flying and helicopter pieces, more than likely pieces of rotor blades.

ALSO I noticed a log sticking up about five inches on heli pad on the ~~left~~ left side

Bruce Anderson had just called for a pickup from the helicopter and headed up the trail to the landing pad me ~~and~~ (David V. Jeppesen) and Kirby Braeger were finishing up our task at work. The helicopter came in and was going to land. When the helicopter was landing I heard some different noises coming from the helicopter that wasn't normal a couple loud pops like backfires then the sound of it winding down and right after the sound the helicopter makes when lifting a heavy load but much louder Example: like a lawnmower makes when you eat too much or tall of grass and it tries to keep going.

Both me and Kirby look to the direction of the helicopter I could kind of see the helicopter ~~fall~~ fall back or tip away from the landing pad but not on it. Kirby Braeger yelled and we instantly ran in the direction of the landing pad. I first noticed Bruce Anderson standing by the pad and looked down the hill and notice the debris and the cab of the helicopter we continued down hill to the helicopter I began yelling for Jim the pilot as we got to the helicopter I seen Jim still in the cab. I couldn't see his face and called out to him He didn't respond. I noticed he was still breathing a little and called out again still no response. I pulled back his vest from his face and noticed his face was purple and that his chin was in his chest and the strap to his helmet was really tight. I cut the strap and carefully removed his helmet we were calling for a response from him. Bruce called on the radio during the

like down that we needed help. Jim stopped breathing and I decided to get him out. I unbuckled Jim and we figured out how get him out we pulled the instrument panel out and had to free his arm. I'm not sure when Mike and Rocky arrived but we pulled Jim from the helicopter. Rocky started chest compression. I was holding Jim's head steady and calling out to him. Kirby was looking for a first aid kit and then took over compression. Rocky gave Jim a breathe and I heard bubble. Rocky took over doing compressions. Bruce and Mike were on the radios and helping direct the response team up the hill. Once they arrived they took over CPR.
