INTERVIEW

MR. HUMM: Okay, I'm going to start it. Today is December 19th, 2023. I'm conducting a phone interview with Vicky Faulkner. This is in reference to NTSB Case Number HWY23FH013, the truck crash in Millersburg, Oregon on May 18th, 2023. My name is John Humm, H U M M, I'm the survival factors group chair with the NTSB.

Thank you so much, Vicky, for agreeing to participate in this interview; I appreciate your time. Could you please say your first and last name and spell your last name for the transcriptionist?

MS. FAULKNER: Yes, I'm Vicky Faulkner, F A U L K N E R.

MR. HUMM: Thank you, and Vicky is spelled V I C K Y, is that correct?

MS. FAULKNER: Yes, with a Y.

MR. HUMM: Okay, thank you, and Vicky, before we start this recording, could you just give me your verbal consent that it's okay for us to record this interview?

MS. FAULKNER: Yeah, that'd be fine.

MR. HUMM: All right, thank you very much.

INTERVIEW OF VICKY FAULKNER

BY MR. HUMM:

Q. So, Vicky, let's just start real quick, I know it's been -- I apologize, it's been a few months since the crash itself. But if you can, you know, kind of put yourself back in your mind to -- where were you driving on May 18th -- or the day that you

witnessed that crash?

A. Yes, on May 18th, my husband and I had an appointment in Salem, Oregon for that afternoon. So, we were on the I-5 freeway and we left Albany, went north, and as we kind of went past the Jefferson-Millersburg area, there's a couple of rest areas and a lot of farms off on the right-hand side. We kind of come up behind these two semi-trucks and as we kind of got a little closer, the one in the back pulled clear over into the parking lane and would whip really fast back into the first lane. Then he went a little bit and was back over there in the parking lane and whipped again.

So, my husband and I, you know, backed off, slowed down quite a bit, and got behind him some and then the third time that he was pulled over and whipped back out again, we got over in the faster lane to get farther away from him, not really knowing what he was doing. We kind of had a conversation about how we thought the truck driver maybe was getting really sleepy and that it was a good thing there was a rest area coming up really soon. So, I know he pulled over at least three times, possibly four, I've kind of lost count over the time.

But as he got back into the lane, he went over the bridge that goes over the river and then it widens out right there for the start of the turning lane because there's kind of a sharp turn that goes back towards the river for the rest area. As he's kind of getting over into the pull out, I kind of relaxed a little bit

and I said oh, good, he's going to make it to the rest area because we were kind of, you know, concerned about him being that sleepy and whipping around that much.

I kind of said something to my husband about I don't see his brake lights going on and the husband said that he was probably going to just pull in. There's kind of a wide spot right there on the road and usually there might be, like, two truckers will be parked there sleeping. There was one truck there already and there was some kind of a white vehicle that we saw behind it and it had some people moving around and there was one man standing right behind the white vehicle.

The truck driver never put on his brakes and he never started to turn and so as he's going forward to the truck, I'm going he's going to have to stop, he needs his brakes. We'd seen the man that was behind the white vehicle, he's got -- his eyes got huge and all of a sudden, he just started pumping his arms and legs and he went running for the grass and I never did hear whether he got out of the roadway. But he was moving. There was other people that were in the vehicle and it just happened really fast. But he never -- we said a second time, he's still not putting on his brakes and he just smashed right into that back of that white vehicle and he hit the back of the truck that was parked there sleeping.

Then he kind of bounced backwards and then we couldn't see the white vehicle at all anymore. It had, like, just disappeared

and then the big fuel tank -- the big, round, barrel fuel tank on the truck come flying and arching out towards us because we were getting even, where we had been right behind him. But we were right even with the semi-truck and this big, huge gas barrel is launching over and it's got a big hole ripped out of it and the diesel fuel was just like a big waterfall and spraying. It was just fuel going everywhere. Then I said something to my husband about watch out for the gas tank and he got clear over into the -- from the fast lane, clear over into the pull-out lane clear on the far other side of the freeway and was driving over there.

That gas tank landed kind of, like, right beside us and it was still just leaking like crazy. So, we got kind of on past it and the trucks had kind of all stopped, you know, moving forward and the front of that -- or the back of that parked sleeping thing, it had hit that so hard it had, like, lifted it up and dropped it back down. But like I said, the truck that hit him, he bounced backwards. Then as we got kind of around it, I hadn't seen the white vehicle anymore, so I scooched forward in my seat, and I got turned around and was looking back and I said well, there's -- the white vehicle is coming up alongside of the trailer and it's really twisted and mangled. You just can't even recognize it anymore.

At that point, we didn't see any people. I don't know if they were there or not there, but I didn't see any people. But that white vehicle was just totally mangled and I said something

to my husband about well, are we supposed to stop and help if there's any people and he asked me if I thought anybody would survive something like that. I got kind of quiet and I said no, I don't (audio glitch) survive and -- you still there? I'm hearing a beep.

- Q. Yeah, oh yeah -- no, I'm here.
- 7 | A. Okay.

- 8 | Q. Yeah.
 - A. Okay -- oh, Frank's trying to call me; he'll hang up.

 Anyway, so we got around the vehicle and we were kind of talking quietly and it was -- I looked at the clock and I said honey, it's 2:07 and it wasn't just minutes after that that we saw a couple of police cars just screaming down from Salem going back down the south freeway. So, there was just -- cars had just responded absolutely just -- you know, they were moving right along and had their lights going. By the time we got off at the exit in Salem, it was 2:11 and I think we had passed, like, seven police cars that went screaming towards from that direction.

So, other than that, we did make it to our appointment, but then later would get in and out of my side of the vehicle and it just -- absolutely just reeked of that fuel smell. So, we ended up going down to a car wash to get that diesel off of the outside of our car. But anyway, it kind of threw us in kind of a really weird mood the rest of the day and, you know, we really didn't even know what happened like you say until later. But what we saw

- was just -- was that initial crash and it happened really fast.
- 2 Q. Yeah, you have a really good memory.
- A. Oh, it was pretty -- yeah, it was pretty vivid. Pretty traumatic.
- 5 Q. Yeah, I'm sure it was. So, I just wanted to just step back
- and clarify a couple of things. So, you were the passenger in the car and your husband was driving, is that correct?
- 8 A. Yes, I was the passenger.

- 9 Q. Okay, and then were you in the front seat, like, right next 10 to him in the right, front, passenger seat?
- 11 A. Yeah, I was in the front.
- Q. Okay, and do you guys know, like, approximately about how fast you guys might've been driving that day? Like roughly?
- A. I'm not real sure on the fast. He's sitting right here if you --
- 16 Q. Yeah, if your husband, Craig, remembers that would be good?
- 17 A. Yeah, he was in the car.
- 18 MR. HUMM: Yesh.
- MS. FAULKNER: Do you remember how fast we were driving before we started slowing down behind the truck?
- 21 MR. FAULKNER: 70?
- MS. FAULKNER: 65, 70, probably?
- Okay, we were probably doing about 65, 70, and then we slowed way down when he kept whipping or whatever. We got farther behind him, and then the other truck that was going ahead of him that was

driving -- when he kept whipping in and out and we backed off and slowed down way behind him, that other trucker kind of pushed on the foot pedal and he kind of got way out in front of him so that nobody was really near him when it all happened. Then it was a ton of cars behind us, but they were -- you know, they were back a few car lengths. But yeah, we slowed way down and then we got clear over basically getting off of the freeway and driving out there in the parking side out there on the fast side just to get away from all of this debris that was --

MR. FAULKNER: (Indiscernible)

MS. FAULKNER: Well, yeah, you were speeding back up again to -- you did -- like, I'm hollering to watch out for that fuel tank and --

So, it did not hit us, but it landed right beside us. BY MR. HUMM:

- Q. Yeah, wow, and so, when you say he was whipping back and forth, do you mean -- so, he was, like, in the right lane and then would quickly go over to the shoulder area or in the far lane?
- A. He was in the right-hand -- the slow lane and there's, like, little bridges, and the little guard rails and things, and then there's all those fields, but there's places there where you can pull over and change a tire or whatever. It's not really places that, like, if you're driving at freeway speeds, your reaction would have to be not over there very far, or you would drive off the edge of the -- these little bridges, and the guard rails, and,

you know, the stuff they put alongside the freeway. He's clear over there in that parking lane where you would pull over and change your tire.

Q. Okay.

- A. And then whipping -- you know, so he doesn't hit the guard rail, he's whipping right back into the -- but you know how a semi-truck, when they're going left and right, if they're doing that fast, that usually makes the trailer sway really bad. My husband's a forklift driver, so he's like I don't want anywhere near that.
- 11 | Q. Sure.
- | A. So, he was trying to do a lot of evasive driving.
- Q. Did it seem -- was he -- do you think he was trying to pass or do you know what he -- like, could you tell at all what he was attempting to do, like why he kept trying to -- why he kept moving into that parking lane?
 - A. We just thought he was probably getting sleepy and either nodding off or rubbing his eyes, you know, because we couldn't see him, we were behind him.
- 20 | Q. Okay.
- A. But we just kind of -- you see a sleepy driver every once in a while. There's a big, long, straight stretch that -- they built it, I think, so the airplanes could land on the freeway to make it that long and straight. It's part of that freeway that that many miles of long, straight road, they do get truckers every once in a

while out there that will fall asleep.

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fine.

- A. Well, not just truckers, cars, too. But there's just a long, straight -- I mean, it kind of goes up and over a little hill here and there, but it's just a really long, long straight stretch of road. So, we've seen people before out there that, you know, get sleepy and so, we just thought well, you know, if he can make it to the rest area, he can pull in and get some sleep, he'll be
- 10 | Q. Okay, so it was --
- 11 A. But he didn't pull into the rest area.
- Q. Yeah, so -- okay, so it wasn't like he was, like, moving into
 the shoulder and speeding up, it was just kind of like he was
 moving over and then it looked like -- almost like he was correct
 and, like, pulling back into the driving lane or something?
- A. Yeah, it was more like he had just kind of taken a turn and
 was correcting and getting right back into his lane again. But it
 was kind of scaring us.
 - Q. Sure, yeah, absolutely. I can appreciate that. Anything else unusual about the trucks -- the truck that impacted the vehicle? Anything unusual about his driving behavior that you noticed at all that maybe you haven't discussed already?
 - A. I can't really think of anything else. I just -- where he was -- you know, he pulled off of the road multiple times. I know he did at least three times, possibly four, and then that fifth

time, he was pulling off of the road after he -- going over the bridge. Then, I mean, it does widen up there, so if he was following the lines, maybe, at that point, I don't know because he got over the bridge and pulled over to the right.

But it actually does widen and there is -- you know, there's a white striped line because it makes almost like U turn to turn sharp enough because you really have to put on your brakes. I've gone into that rest area a lot of times and you really got to put on your brakes after driving the freeway to slow down enough to make that really sharp turn to go down into that rest area. My husband and I never saw anything for brake lights what-so-ever.

Q. Yeah.

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- A. So, if he did put them on, it was after we were already starting to pass him and, you know, wasn't behind him anymore. He maybe did, I don't know.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- A. But I know from the time that we were behind him, we never saw brake lights and so, we were like already kind of getting on edge if he's driving right at those parked vehicles. Then he just slammed right into them and shoved it all forward. I said he even did damage to the back of the truck that -- the guy that was sleeping.
- Q. Yeah, did you see at all if there was a trailer behind that white van? Did you notice that at all?
 - A. No, we only saw the white vehicle for just a really short

window.

- Q. Sure.
- A. Because we were behind those two trucks and like I said, the one, you know, kind of speeded up and went out farther. Then we were right behind the truck that crashed and then because he had pulled in and out so many times, we had actually got over into the second lane got a little farther away from him that way as well.
- 8 Q. Sure.
 - A. So, we were still behind him and when we went over the bridge and stuff, we were probably about two car lengths probably behind him and we didn't see any -- you know, any brake lights. Then he hit all of that and other than identifying that the color was white and seeing the man that started pumping his arms and running, I mean, it just -- it was just like -- it was almost like you blinked your eyes and all of a sudden, the white -- it was like a magician or something, the white vehicle just completely disappeared. I didn't see it again until I turned around and when I looked back, it was still kind of rolling really slowly forward alongside that front trailer.
- 20 | Q. Yeah, okay.
 - A. But it was pretty unidentifiable. It was just mangled and it was just, like, sticking -- you know how metal gets when it gets mangled and it's going every different direction and whatever.

 It's like I really don't know what kind of vehicle, you could still see that it's white, but as far as knowing what -- I mean, I

- did find out later what kind of vehicle it was. But at the time, I didn't really know.
- Q. Right, and I know this is a very tough question to answer because you're in a moving car, but do you know -- if you had to estimate how fast the truck was going when he hit the van, what would estimate? What would be your best guess?
- A. He had to have been doing at least 60, 65, because like I said, we had kind of slowed down because I'm pretty sure we were doing, like, at least 65. So, if we slowed down, I think he was probably doing at least 60. He could've been going faster, but I think he was doing at least 60 when he hit all of that.
- Q. Okay, that helps, thank you. I actually -- I don't really have any other questions. You've done an excellent job of recounting that. Is there anything else from that day either before or after -- you know, before, during, or after the accident that stands out in your mind that you think I should know that I haven't asked about?
 - A. It was a nice day. It was a warm afternoon. I know when we got to our appointment, we were sitting out there in the sun and kind of -- you know how you do after an accident and whatever, you kind of -- anything that's warm and, you know, get yourself comfortable and kind of get back to something reality. We eventually went and got out car washed to get that -- you know, that diesel smell off the whole side of our car.
 - Q. Sure.

1	A. We finally went to a place and just sat down and just ordered
2	a thing of chicken tenders and just kind of sat there and didn't
3	really talk very much, just kind of tried to do something normal
4	and, you know, get back to where you're yourself again.
5	Q. Right.
6	A. So, it was a bit of a shock.
7	Q. Yeah, okay. Well, thank you again for your time. I really
8	appreciate it. I think I'm going to end this interview if you
9	could just hold on one second?
10	A. Uh huh.
11	MR. HUMM: Let me just stop it.
12	(Whereupon, the interview was concluded.)
