2	MR. HUMM: Today is December 22, 2023. I'm conducting a
3	phone interview with Julie McCrae. This is in reference to NTSB
4	Case Number HWY23FH013, a motor coach crash in Millersburg,
5	Oregon, on May 18, 2023.
6	My name is John Humm, H-u-m-m. I'm the Survival Factors
7	Group Chair for the NTSB.
8	INTERVIEW OF JULIE MCCRAE
9	BY MR. HUMM:
10	Q. Julie, thank you so much for taking the time to do this
11	interview. We really appreciate your willingness to participate.
12	Could you please say your first and last name, and spell your last
13	name for the transcriptionist?
14	A. Yes. Julie McCrae M-c-C-r-a-e.
15	Q. Thank you. And then as we discussed just before recording
16	could you please give your verbal consent that it's okay for us to
17	record this?
18	A. Yes, it is.
19	Q. Thank you. And then the last thing I'd like to remind you,
20	Julie, is if you could just limit the interview today to just the
21	things that you remember hearing or seeing that day, and try not
22	to speculate as best you can.
23	A. Yes.
24	Q. Thank you. Okay, Julie, thanks again. So I know it's been
25	several months, and I apologize for that. So do your best. Maybe
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1	let's go back to the day May 18th. Do you remember at all what
2	you were doing just before you were leaving the house or what,
3	what was why were you, why are you getting in the car, and
4	headed, headed away from your home?
5	A. So I'm a home health nurse. So I pretty much drive between
6	visits for my job. So I was heading northbound on I-5 away from a
7	patient's home, and I was heading towards my house to finish up my
8	day.
9	Q. Okay. And so as you got on the, the expressway or I think
10	it's I-5 I believe
11	A. Um-hmm.
12	Q do you remember when, when you first saw the crush that,
13	sorry, the truck that was involved in the crash? Do you remember
14	that at all?
15	A. Yes. I was driving northbound north of Albany, and you want
16	me to go into like the complete detail now what I saw?
17	Q. Yeah. So I would say from now just tell me your story,
18	everything that you from when you first saw the truck up
19	through the crash, anything at all that you remember seeing,
20	hearing, whatever. Yeah. I'll just be quiet and listen now.
21	A. Okay. So, yeah, I was driving northbound past Albany, and I
22	was coming up behind a white semi-truck, and I was going to get
23	ready to pass him. There was an orange jeep coming up on the left
24	passing him and passing the lights of my truck. And the semi-
25	truck veered into the passing lane, causing the orange truck to
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1 -- or the orange jeep to veer off into the shoulder to avoid 2 hitting him. The orange jeep sped off, and the white semi-truck 3 corrected itself, and got back into the right-hand slow lane. So 4 I backed off. I was, like, I'm going to stay behind this guy. 5 And he swerved about one, maybe two more times towards the 6 shoulder, the right shoulder at this time, and then once again 7 towards the passing lane. And that's when I was, like, oh my God, 8 this guy's going to, going to cause an accident. So that's when I 9 called 911, and reported a swerving truck. They transferred me to 10 the Oregon State Police Department.

11 While I was on hold waiting for them I continued to follow 12 the truck with some distance behind him, and he continued to 13 swerve between the right shoulder and the left passing lane. So 14 there was no cars passing him. They were all kind of backing off. 15 And we got to the rest stop that is on I-5, and he started to veer 16 off again. I was, like, thinking to myself, oh, maybe he's 17 falling asleep. He's going off to the rest stop. He passed the 18 exit for the rest stop, and just past the exit there's a pretty 19 large shoulder, and there was a Target semi-truck pulled off onto 20 the shoulder, and I witnessed the white semi pass the exit, and 21 then ram into the truck.

At that time, I pulled over. The state police came on. I was reporting what happened saying, hey, he just hit somebody. You guys need to send somebody. They asked me some questions about what the truck looked like and where I was located. And I

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1 confer that they're going to send EMS towards there.

2	So when I saw the truck hit the other semi-truck I did not		
3	see the van. I just saw him hit the Target truck. I saw one		
4	individual kind of run into the field to avoid the accident. I		
5	assumed that was the Target truck driver. So when I went up to		
6	provide assistance I just assumed it was the white semi-truck		
7	driver and the Target driver. When I went up there to provide		
8	assistance, and walked towards the field and around the white		
9	semi-truck that is when I saw the, the van and the victims of the		
10	van accident.		
11	Q. Okay. Do you so as you go back to when the you saw the		
12	truck veer into the lane with the orange jeep, so the jeep was in		
13	the left lane. He was in the, the right lane. Did the jeep honk		
14	at all or do you know what caused the truck to, to move back? Do		
15	you recall that?		
16	A. I don't, I don't remember hearing a honk.		
17	Q. Okay. And then about how many times did you see after the		
18	jeep would you estimate that he swerved and as I understand it		
19	he swerved from the right lane into the shoulder? Did he ever		
20	move like to the left lane?		
21	A. Yeah. He was kind of bouncing between the right shoulder and		
22	the left, crossing the left, the center line between the right		
23	lane and the left lane so he		
24	Q. Oh, okay.		
25	A. Yeah.

1	Q. Okay.		
2	A. He would never go, he would never go as far as the left		
3	shoulder, but he was bouncing between, like, crossing the middle		
4	line, and then crossing the shoulder line to the right.		
5	Q. Okay. So he was taking up almost three if you count the		
6	right shoulder as, as a lane, which it isn't, but he was crossing		
7	almost three, three lanes then from the right lane, left lane, and		
8	then into the shoulder.		
9	A. Yeah.		
10	Q. Okay. Can you give me an idea roughly as best you can about		
11	how fast you guys were all traveling?		
12	A. Let's see. I was getting ready to pass from where it all		
13	started. So I think I was going about 70. And then when he		
14	veered off to the jeep, and then I slowed way down. I gave him		
15	quite a pretty large berth. So I think I was going about 60,		
16	maybe 65 behind him.		
17	Q. Okay. And when you slowed down to give him room were there		
18	any other cars that were kind of in his area or was it by that		
19	point was it relatively cleared out? Were people backing off or		
20	speeding up?		
21	A. I think after the orange jeep one or two cars, like, were		
22	able to pass him, but then he continued to swerve, and then		
23	everybody else who was starting to pass him kind of slowed way		
24	back. So all of us pretty much stayed behind after that.		
25	Q. Okay. And you never got a look inside at him while he was		
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2 A. No. I stayed behind him.

Q. Okay. Did you when he veered -- so at the, the exit that Santiam, I believe it's like Santiam rest stop at that exit, did you ever see from the moment he went past that exit to the point where he made contact with whatever vehicle you saw did you ever see any brake lights, or did you ever observe any brake lights?

9 Q. Okay. And now so then you, you pulled over. About how far 10 ahead of the truck, the Target truck, would you say that you 11 pulled over after the, after the crash?

12 A. I pulled off behind him.

13 Q. Oh, okay.

14 Yeah. Because I had a, like I said, I had (indiscernible) a Α. 15 distance behind him. And so when he crashed, I pulled off to the 16 shoulder, and I was, I was pretty far behind. I would say I 17 pulled off maybe a car length or two from the actual exit, and the 18 accident happened, yeah. And then he -- so the way it's set up is 19 there's the exit off to the rest stop, and there is probably about 20 -- I'm really bad at feet measurement -- so like maybe four or 21 five semi-truck lengths of shoulder and field. And they were more 22 north towards the end of that little field shoulder area, and I 23 was closer towards the actual exit onto the -- just past the exit 24 to the rest stop.

25 Q. Okay. All right. Yeah. So, yeah, I've -- okay. So I've

1 been to the, the scene. So I know exactly what you're talking 2 about.

3 A. Okay.

4 Q. That's a great description. Thank you.

5 A. Um-hmm.

6 Q. So, and I hate to ask this now, but if you could go back in 7 your mind to approaching the, the crash. You came upon the white 8 truck. What did you see as best you can describe, and as best 9 you're comfortable describing?

10 Yeah. So when I ran up, I ran in toward the field so I don't Α. 11 go on the road side or between the trucks. I came up around the 12 field side to the truck, and definitely was not prepared for what 13 I saw (indiscernible) inspecting just the two trucks. So I came 14 around the corner, and that is when I saw -- the first thing I saw was the female on her back, and then the man next to her with his 15 16 intestines out. And I kind of just stood there in shock kind of 17 taking in the scene. I remember seeing blood spatter on the 18 Target truck, and kind of how it was kind of torn apart on the 19 side there. And I looked off to the side, and that's when I saw 20 the van that was pushed up kind off to the side in front of the 21 Target truck. And then I saw three gentlemen on the ground kind 22 of in front of the white truck. There was severed foot. There 23 was a gentleman on his stomach that another bystander was talking 24 to the 911 operator about. I came up to offer assistance, and he 25 said you got this one. I'm going to go check on the others. I

1 was, like, yeah, I'll stay here. So I stayed with that guy for, 2 for a little while. You could tell he was pretty, pretty injured. 3 He had very irregular breathing. He was kind of like had like the 4 frothy breathing in which you know that there was -- when he was 5 breathing he was kind of breathing out bubbles and stuff. Couple 6 times he would try to move, and I would tell him you, you need to 7 stay. I know it hurts. You just need to stay.

8 And then his breathing became very, very irregular, kind of 9 similar to agonal breathing which is just not effective breathing. 10 So I stayed with him for maybe a minute longer, and I kind of saw 11 that there was nothing I could do for him. So I got up, and I 12 looked around. I found a woman on her back. I went up to her, 13 and she did not speak English. I speak very, very little Spanish. 14 So I was asking her (untranslated Spanish) her pain. She pointed 15 to her ribs. I lifted up her shirt to ensure there was no like 16 puncture injury or anything. She was not bleeding externally that 17 I could tell. So I told her you need to just lay here. I know it 18 hurts. You need to lay here. Don't move. Ambulance is on the 19 way.

To her right towards her feet was a gentleman on his stomach propped up on his shoulders with blood coming down his face. He was alert and oriented for the most part. So I was able to talk to him. He said I'm fine. My face and my head just really hurts. I was, like, do you hurt anywhere else? He was, like, not that I can tell. So I was, like, okay (indiscernible) I know it hurts.

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1 I know you're scared. Just stay here. Don't move.

I do remember a gentleman standing who when I was talking to the woman was able to translate a little bit for me.

4 And then I went to the van. There was -- so the way the van happened it looked like the impact caused like the front passenger 5 6 seat to kind of buckle forward. So there was a man kind of laying 7 on the back of the front passenger seat on his back. He had a 8 bloody face. Again, there was nothing that I could really do. 9 There was no external (indiscernible) I could really take care of. 10 So I talked to him a little bit; told him that you just need to 11 focus on his breathing, stay calm, don't move.

Behind him on the passenger back seat was another gentleman who was laying completely like supine on his stomach between the second row and the front passenger seat. I could not -- the way he was laying I couldn't get a pulse or anything. So I put my hands on his ribs, and I was able to feel a very -- what I thought was very mild movement, but he was unresponsive.

In the middle of the second row was the gentleman that was essentially folded in half. He looked like he was kind of standing with his feet, and his front half was kind of down touching his toes. Again, I couldn't reach him. So I watched for breathing. Didn't see anything.

I walked around to the driver's side of the door, and that's when I saw another gentleman who was on the floor of the (indiscernible) passenger -- or I'm sorry, driver's side in the

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1 van, but there was no external injuries, and I didn't get a pulse, 2 and I didn't see him breathing.

So I walked from there kind of back to the scene to kind of 3 4 see if there was anybody else that I missed. That is when I saw a 5 gentleman kind of more in the middle of the field with a black 6 shirt and a dog on a leash kind of watching everything. He kind 7 of looked dazed. So I ran up to him -- no. I'm sorry, that's not 8 correct. He looked kind of dazed, but I kind of just assumed he 9 was a bystandard (verbatim). I went back around. I was talking 10 to people, and being like is there anything I can help? And saw 11 the guy in the black shirt with the dog walk over to the slope of 12 the hill. That was kind of between the white semi-truck front end 13 and the Target truck, and he kind of stumbled or tripped or 14 something and into a sitting position. That's when I ran up to 15 him, and I was like are you okay? Were you in the accident? He 16 was, like, yeah, yeah, I'm fine. I'm like were you in the 17 accident? He was, like, yeah, yeah, I was, I was driving. I said 18 you were driving this truck? And I pointed to the, the white 19 semi-truck. He was, like, yeah. I'm like what was going on? 20 I've been following you, and you have been swerving. What 21 happened? And he said I don't know. I'm just really dizzy. I'm 22 so tired.

23 So that's when I started asking him like are you having chest 24 pains? He said, no, I'm just really, really dizzy. And I was 25 like are you a diabetic? And he was, like, well, no, but I'm

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supposed to go see my doctor to have blood work done. And I was, like, okay, well, are you hurt anywhere? He was, like, no, no. I'm just, I'm just really dizzy. I'm just really tired. I was, like, okay, well, you need to sit here, and the EMTs are on their way, and so don't move.

6 By that time the EMTs had arrived, and they started kind of 7 dispersing, and they had one of the EMTs kind of tagging, and I 8 asked if there was anything I could help with. So she asked if 9 I'd help tag the deceased. So I tagged the gentleman with the 10 intestines out, and the female. And by that time I was kind of 11 starting to lose it.

12 So I walked to the front of the semi-truck, the Target semi-13 truck where all the other bystanders were kind of gathering, and 14 then we all kind of talked, and we're like that was really rough. 15 Thanks for stopping. We all kind of shared a hug. And then 16 that's when the state trooper showed up, and they told me --17 they're asking did you see the accident? And the ones who said 18 no, he's like, thank you for your service. Please go on your way. 19 He asked did you see the accident? I was like yes He got to me. 20 I did. Okay. I need you to just sit in your car, and don't move 21 until one of us comes and talks to you. So I went back to my car, 22 and I sat there until one of them came to interview me.

Q. Okay. Well, that was -- I didn't realize that you had -that you were essentially the first responder. I'm very sorry that you had to witness that and see all that. And thank you for

1	taking care of the victims as best you could. I know you didn't
2	have the equipment or, you know, to do, do that much, but the
3	support you provided I know is very much appreciated. So thank
4	you. Just so I just want to be sure that I understand kind of the
5	because I, I am trying to figure out like who was ejected from
6	the vehicle, who was still in the vehicle. So I'm just going to
7	run down. And, again, I, I don't want to bring back any bad
8	memories. So if you at any point need to stop, that's fine.
9	So as you approached the van you saw there were three men on the
10	ground. One I know one you said had the intestines out. The
11	other might have like a severed limbs. And then there was one,
12	one woman on the ground. Now, as I recall so the one that you,
13	that you were with that had the, the had the frothy breathing,
14	the agonal breathing.
15	A. Um-hmm.
16	Q. Do you know if the EMTs took care of him? Do you know if
17	that was the gentleman that was air lifted at all? Did you
18	A. I, I don't know. I know that I was in that area when the
19	EMTs showed up, and one of the bystanders said, you know, he's
20	kind of pointing around who is deceased, who is deceased,
21	(indiscernible) he told the EMTs he was responsive but he isn't
22	anymore. And that's when I kind of walked off.
23	Q. Okay.
24	A. So I don't know.
25	Q. Okay. And
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1 A. (Indiscernible).

2	Q. No, that's fine. Did you see anybody at all in the front		
3	right seat? So you have like the driver's seat, but then the seat		
4	that was immediately to the right. Did you see anybody there?		
5	A. Yeah. So the, like the front passenger seat, is that what		
6	you're asking?		
7	Q. Yes. I, I because you mentioned the front passenger seat,		
8	and I wasn't sure if you meant by passenger the first row or if		
9	you were talking about the actual seat in the, in the front right.		
10	A. Yeah. So there wasn't anybody in the front passenger seat		
11	because the front passenger seat was collapsed forward.		
12	Q. Okay.		
13	A. So like the back of the passenger seat was down, and then		
14	laying across that was a was the gentleman that had like the		
15	bloody face and		
16	Q. Okay. So the and if I, I just want to make sure I		
17	understand. So the front right seat was actually the seat back if		
18	you think of it as upright. It was fully forward or was it fully		
19	reclined like you were laying down?		
20	A. Fully forward.		
21	Q. Oh, okay. All right. Yeah. When I saw the vehicle it had		
22	been fully reclined, and I assumed that it broke during the, the		
23	rear impact. So, okay, thank you. That's some good information.		
24	I appreciate that. Okay. And how are you doing now?		
25	A. I'm okay.

1	Q. Okay. I can imagine that from everything you saw that it was
2	obviously quite the ordeal. So is there anything else from that
3	day that stands out in your mind that I haven't asked you about?
4	A. No.
5	Q. Okay. Well, I thank you very much for this, this account. I
6	mean you, you were the first one on the scene, and you've been
7	able to give details that no one else has been able to. So I
8	really appreciate I appreciate your time and willingness to, to
9	talk about this.
10	A. Yeah.
11	Q. I'm going to, I'm going to stop the recording right now. I
12	think I've asked all the questions that I need to.
13	A. Okay.
14	Q. If you could just hold on just a second.
15	A. Okay.
