1 INTERVIEW 2 (3:30 p.m.)MR. MUISE: Okay. This is Marcel Muise. I'm an investigator 3 with the National Transportation Safety Board. It's 3:30 p.m. in 4 Santa Barbara, California. With me is Drew Ehlers, also 5 6 investigator with the NTSB, and we are interviewing the owners of 7 the vessel Grape Escape. 8 Bob and Shirley, can you give us your name, please, or spell 9 you name for us? 10 SHIRLEY HANSEN: I'm Shirley Hansen, S-h-i-r-l-e-y, and 11 Hansen is H-a-n-s-e-n. 12 MR. MUISE: And Bob, just common spelling? 13 BOB HANSEN: Yeah, Bob Hansen, B-o-b, Hansen, H-a-n-s-e-n. 14 MR. MUISE: Okay. And you're the owners of the vessel Grape, 15 G-a-r-a-p-e, Escape --16 BOB HANSEN: No, Grape. Like, the fruit. 17 MR. MUISE: Okay. BOB HANSEN: G-r-a-p, like Paul, and e, as in excellent. 18 19 MR. MUISE: Okay. Got it. 2.0 BOB HANSEN: G-r-a-p-e. 2.1 SHIRLEY HANSEN: We're farmers. 22 BOB HANSEN: We're farmers. We grow grapes in our area. 23 That's really interesting. So as I mentioned, MR. MUISE: 24 we're investigating the fire aboard the Conception. 25 BOB HANSEN: Uh-huh. 26 INTERVIEW OF SHIRLEY AND BOB HANSEN:

MR. MUISE: And we're really interested in your story, what you saw, so if you could just walk us through that evening --

BOB HANSEN: Okay.

MR. MUISE: -- you know, what happened out there?

BOB HANSEN: All right. At 3:30 in the morning we're at anchorage there Platts Harbor, and we hear some pounding on the boat. It's just my wife and I on board. So I get up and I go to the salon door, open the door, and there are five people in a rubber dinghy at the transom of our boat, at the rear of the boat, and they're calling for help and they said their boat was -- their vessel was on fire. So --

SHIRLEY HANSEN: And you couldn't miss it.

BOB HANSEN: Yeah, and so I could see the vessel was completely on fire from one end to the other. It was already completely engulfed. There wasn't a spot on that boat that wasn't burning. Flames could have been 30 feet high.

The five gentlemen, we brought them on board. I had -- the boat is built such that it has a walk-through transom. So I could open the door to the transom and slide the injured crewman with a broken leg on board into the cockpit of the boat. Then we brought the rest of the crew on board.

My wife and I got them towels to dry with. I went up in the helm with the captain and we hailed the Coast Guard. It was, you know, it was one of those things I didn't think about when I got out of bed. I didn't grab any glasses, so I couldn't read. But

we knew we were in Platts Harbor -- give them, you know, an accurate lat and long, but that gave them a pretty good idea where we were. A little later on I called back and gave them my exact lat and long.

Then after that, we -- like I say, I stayed on standby up there with the captain in the helm. My wife brought -- we dried these guys off. She brought a -- some pillows out of the salon to try and make the guy with the broken leg more comfortable. She brought out a blanket and put a blanket over him to keep him warm because we couldn't put him in the salon. It was too -- we couldn't move him.

The guy with the -- there was another injured crewman with a twisted ankle. We put him in the salon and then my wife picked out several of our long sleeved tee shirts for the guys to put on to keep them warm. The captain, we gave him a pair of Levi's because his were ripped quite a bit, and then we also gave him one of our jackets to keep him warm.

And I stayed in the helm, like I said, waiting for instructions from the Coast Guard. I asked the Coast Guard if there was anything they wanted me to do, if they wanted me drop — to pick the anchor up or not, and then they said, no, we want you to stay exactly where you were. And then a little while later they hailed us back and said can we put two of the other crewmen in the dinghy and give them a flashlight.

So we gave them -- two of the crewmen that were in good

shape, we gave them a flashlight and two handheld VHFs that I always carry with me at the door. So -- and then they went out to look for survivors. They were there until the rest of the -- the fireboat and everyone else showed up, and it was probably over an hour. We were 25 miles -- nautical miles from the Oxnard Channel Islands Harbor, and so you can understand why it took so long for anybody to show up.

But on top of that, if the Coast Guard or the firefighting boat was within 5 minutes, it wouldn't have made any difference. By the time I opened that door, that boat was totally engulfed. It was unapproachable. And when the captain told me -- originally I thought there had been a commercial boat out, looked like they were fishing for squid or something. And they were out there and I thought, well, maybe it was that boat and I thought, oh, okay, I got the crewmen here; we're all right, but the other boat's on fire. And then when they said, no, they were on a dive boat and the exact words, "There were 34 souls still on board." And I looked at that boat and I thought I am so helpless here. I cannot help him.

But our vessel is large enough, we could have handled every one of those people. It's a 60-foot Hatteras Sport Fisherman. I think it's like 60-ton rated. I usually carry 1700 gallons of diesel and I only had about 700 on me. 1,000 gallons of diesel weighs 7500 pounds. I could have carried them all. I just felt so helpless. Like, you know, if the guys just would have woken me

up, like, an hour ago, you know? I'm still speechless. I'm still speechless, you know. But it's just the way it worked out.

But anyway, then we -- you know, the Coast Guard eventually showed up. They brought three EMTs on board, checked out the vitals of our injured crewman who was with the broken leg. Found he was okay where he was. They couldn't airlift him out of there. Our boat is such that it's got outriggers and things that are sticking out and they couldn't get him out of there. So -- and the captain wanted to stay with the Coast Guard, so he -- we transferred him to the Coast Guard boat, and then when I was instructed it was time to go, I took their dinghy and the four remaining crew members into Oxnard to the Channel Islands Marina or Channel Island Harbor Coast Guard Station. So that's how we did it.

My wife talked to the crewmen more than I did because I was busy running the boat and -- you know, I did talk to them some but, you know, she was down in the salon with them and so she can tell you a little more about what they were saying and so forth. But on my end, that's kind of where I'm at with it.

MR. MUISE: Wow. Thank you, Captain. That's an amazing story and thanks for what you did do out there. I know you said you felt kind of helpless, but thanks for taking care of that crew out there.

BOB HANSEN: Oh, man. It's really -- you feel helpless. I had the tools. I had the tools. I couldn't put the fire out, but

SHIRLEY HANSEN: -- of the galley and saw -- looked orange,

everything was orange. And he --

BOB HANSEN: Didn't he say that the ceiling tiles were falling --

SHIRLEY HANSEN: -- said the ceiling tiles were falling down and he could not get to where the stairs were to go down and help any of the people below deck. And he turned around and he called for the other crewmen to get up. He said he called fire. And that the crewmen should -- and so they got up and jumped into the water. The one crewman, he apparently fell on the deck and broke his leg that way. So how they got him off and into the dinghy, it must have taken a while.

BOB HANSEN: Yeah, they said their dinghy was tied up at the back of the boat or was back there and they cut it loose. So I'm assuming it was tied up and they swam back there and got in the dinghy. Now we're assuming that the fellow with the broken leg, they must have come around and picked him up. Or is that what they said?

SHIRLEY HANSEN: No. They didn't say how they got him.

BOB HANSEN: Somehow they picked him up.

SHIRLEY HANSEN: And I never thought of asking questions. I sort of -- the two youngest of the men were crying and the only thing I asked the youngest, I think he is, was how he got his glasses, because the rest of the them were just in underwear and tee-shirts.

BOB HANSEN: Yeah, they appeared to have just rolled out of

bed and jumped off the boat.

SHIRLEY HANSEN: Yeah. And I said, well, how did you get your glasses? And he said they're the first thing I reach for when I wake up. And so he, at least, had his glasses, but it was -- his girlfriend was down below and she was one of the ones that perished, and he was crying. He was devastated.

And the other younger man, this was just his weekend job and he didn't know how he was going to get back to Santa Barbara. He didn't have keys or wallet, nothing. And so they didn't -- I didn't think to ask them questions about, well, how -- you know, the -- oh, I know. The man in charge of the galley said that there were a lot of phones and cameras and batteries being charged in the galley and he worried that that was, perhaps, the cause of the fire. But, you know, that was the only thing that any of them said about what could have caused the fire.

BOB HANSEN: Here's my -- you're the National Transportation Safety Board. Here's my question. I go to a hotel, 3:30 in the morning, I guarantee there's somebody at the front desk. You're a floating hotel. Why the hell wasn't there somebody awake, playing video games, for all I care. Am I wrong?

MR. MUISE: So those are all issues that we will be looking at. I can assure you of that.

BOB HANSEN: I mean, it must be for hotels, because I've never been to a hotel where, I don't care what time you get up, there's somebody at the front door. And on top of that you would

think -- it's not just about fire. What if -- I was an engineer

When --BOB HANSEN: (Indiscernible) because I could see -- you know, 8 9 I've had the boat 11 years. We bought it in Ft. Lauderdale and we 10 brought her on her bottom all the way to Southern California. 11 I've seen enough of this. I know what we're looking at. 12 MR. EHLERS: Sure. 13 BOB HANSEN: You now? 14 MR. EHLERS: And do you -- and have any recollection at all 15 of whether that fishing boat was still in the area when you were woken up in the morning? 16 17 BOB HANSEN: It did show up -- I'm sure it showed up later 18 because a commercial boat did come to help with the rescue. 19 MR. EHLERS: Oh, okay. Do you have --2.0 BOB HANSEN: Now, I (indiscernible) that one, because it was 21 a commercial boat. But you know, even that -- that had nets out 22 of there. You can't just, like, cut everything loose and go, you 23 know. 24 MR. EHLERS: Yeah. Do you remember the name of it, by any

1 BOB HANSEN: Those are not fast traveling boats. Yeah. Do you remember the name of it? 2 MR. EHLERS: 3 BOB HANSEN: No. I didn't take a photo of it or anything. 4 But I know there was one there. 5 MR. EHLERS: Okay. 6 BOB HANSEN: And I remember seeing, like I say, you know, 7 they have these funny little, not really a skiff, but a tender, I guess you would call it, that they'd use to drag the net around. 8 9 MR. EHLERS: Sure. 10 That's a purseiner. MR. MUISE: 11 MR. EHLERS: Yeah. 12 MR. MUISE: Yeah. Which -- who was the first rescue boat to 13 show up? Was it the Coast Guard or the fire department? 14 BOB HANSEN: I think it was probably the -- the Coast Guard 15 and the fireboat came up about the same time. 16 MR. MUISE: Did any of them come on board to help our with --17 BOB HANSEN: (Indiscernible) the Coast Guard boarding the 18 boat, because they came and they boarded our boat to see -- check 19 the vital signs of the fellow with the broken leg. 2.0 MR. MUISE: Okay. So that was actually my question. Thank 21 you. How about the helicopter? What time did that show up? 22 BOB HANSEN: About the same time. None of them really came 23 -- I would say it was close to an hour from the time that we woke 24 up -- and, like I say, I took photos here, and it was at -- you 25 know, they got us around 3:30, and my photos -- you know, I love

this thing. You know, I took photos of the boat at 3:55 and there 1 was nobody there yet. Oh, in fact, here's another one at 4:11. 2 3 So, like I say, it was -- could have been an hour. My wife took 4 some photos, too. She might --I have the photos --5 SHIRLEY HANSEN: 6 BOB HANSEN: You know, and the odd thing, I didn't -- I feel 7 kind of weird. I didn't want to be one of those lookie-loo things, you know. I just thought, well, okay, maybe somebody 8 9 wants to see these. I'll take a couple photos here, you know. 10 And that was it, and my wife --11 SHIRLEY HANSEN: Where's the time? I don't see a time on 12 mine. 13 BOB HANSEN: Okay. Yeah, it's here at the top. So the Coast 14 Guard was at the back of our boat at 4:43 in the morning. 15 MR. MUISE: Do you mind sharing those pictures with us? 16 BOB HANSEN: Sure. 17 MR. MUISE: Okay. If I send you an email --18 BOB HANSEN: (Indiscernible) something and then I can just 19 email them over to you. Sure. Is this a cell phone? Can I text you at 2.0 MR. MUISE: 21 this number? 22 BOB HANSEN: Yeah. Yeah. You can text my number. 23 MR. MUISE: Okay. I'll text you my email address then. 24 MR. EHLERS: Yeah, we'd love to see that picture you took the
