I'm just here as a juvenile officer UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: because you are 17.

> Yeah. Okay.

UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's why I'm here. They're going to be the ones talking --

I know, but --

UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: They're going to be the ones talking to you.

TROOPER MICHEL: So, yeah, I'm -- like I said, I'm Trooper Jayme Michel with Illinois State Police and with me is Kevin --TROOPER DAWES: I'm Trooper Kevin Dawes (ph.).

Okay.

BY TROOPER MICHEL:

And so since we are in a police department here -- this is the campus police here at Wright State University here in Ohio, you are a juvenile, I'm going to read you this before we move any further with an interview. Okay? So before asking you any questions, I'm going to advise you of your Miranda rights.

You have the right to remain silent. That means you do not have to say anything. Anything you say can be used against you in court. You have the right to help you -- you have the right to get help from a lawyer. If you cannot pay for a lawyer, the court will get one for free. You can ask for a lawyer at any time. You

have the right to stop this interview at any time.

Do you want to have a lawyer?

- A. Do I need one? What the hell?
- 4 TROOPER DAWES: It's just we have to--

5 BY TROOPER MICHEL:

- 6 Q. I have to ask you these questions. Since you're a juvenile,
- 7 I have to read your rights up front.
- 8 A. Okay. Well, I have no idea. Just -- so you just want to
- 9 know what I know about what happened, which is --
- 10 0. Yeah.

- 11 A. -- nothing more than is on the news.
- 12 Q. So do you want to have a lawyer? I just have to ask --
- 13 A. I have no idea how to answer that. I mean, I'm going to say
- 14 no, but like --
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. -- I'm probably going to regret this if --
- 17 Q. Do you want to talk to me?
- 18 A. Yeah. I want to know what this is about.
- 19 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, and like he said, this is on
- 20 your own free will and you, you can --
- I know. But this, like, stuff scares me because
- 22 | like usually like you hear and you're supposed to say, yeah, I
- 23 will not say anything without my lawyer present. And like --
- 24 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.
- 25 -- this doesn't seem like it's, like something

that I did something wrong, and so it's like -- it's just a random
thing and -TROOPER DAWES: Just for the sake of the camera interview.

It's October 4th, 2:38. We always just do that at the beginning
of the interview and -
Okay. Yeah.

TROOPER DAWES: -- I don't want to get too far. And you're at the --

No. Cool. Cool.

TROOPER DAWES: We are at the Wright State Campus Police Department.

TROOPER MICHEL: I'll just need your signature here stating I read this to you, and then I'll have him sign his.

TROOPER DAWES: And we did talk to your -- our supervisor talked to your mom and --

You already did?

TROOPER DAWES: No, he just, he just let her know we were going to talk to you and she said it was okay to him.

Oh. So my mom said it's okay?

TROOPER DAWES: That's what she told our --

TROOPER MICHEL: That's what she told our supervisor, Jonathan.

If she told you that, okay, then no problem. You should have led with that. Gosh. I was wondering if you'd gone to my house.

UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Yes.

: I was wondering how we ended up at the school and not the house.

### BY TROOPER MICHEL:

- Q. So like I said kind of here before we started, you said that you were in the area of this crash. I guess what was the nature of your guys' trip over in Illinois?
- 8 A. Okay. So basically my mom's boyfriend lives in Illinois, 9 right? Kind of a long distance relationship.
- 10 0. Where is he located at?
- 11 A. Near Highland. There's --
- 12 Q. Near Highland?
- 13 A. Can I get my phone to -- there's like a smaller town --
- 14 Q. It's not that big of a deal, but --
- 15 A. Oh, okay. So just --
- 16 Q. So you came from -- I guess you drove from your residence
- 17 here in Ohio?
- 18 A. Yeah. Xenia.
- 19 Q. From Xenia.
- A. To Illinois. We do that a lot, probably several times a

- 22 | Q. So your mom's been dating this person for quite some time?
- 23 A. Yeah, a couple years.
- 24 Q. Do you remember the last time you went there before the 29th?
- 25 | A. Oh, my gosh. Not --

- 1 Q. Or did she go by herself sometimes?
- 2 A. She does also go by herself.
- 3 Q. But I guess Friday, last Friday, the 29th, who all went on
- 4 | that trip?
- 5 A. Okay. So there was my mom and my brother and me. Sometimes
- 6 my sister goes as well, but that -- it was just my brother and my
- 7 mom.
- 8 Q. It was just you three? And when you say that, I don't know
- 9 everybody's name, so --
- 10 A. Okay. So my brother --
- 11 Q. I talk to a lot of people.
- 12 A. No, that's fine.
- 13 | Q. And that's the reason that this is recorded, too, is I want
- 14 | to know --
- 15 A. Okay.
- 16  $\mathbb{Q}$ . -- who I talked to.
- 17 A. Well, my brother's name is Joshua.
- 18 Q. Joshua.
- 19 A. And my mom's name is Heather.
- 20 Q. What's Joshua's last name?
- 21 A. like mine.
- 22 Q. Okay. And mother's name is Heather?
- 23 A. Heather.
- 24 | Q. Riggs?
- 25 A. Heather Riggs. Yeah, Riggs.

- Q. And would you state your name for me?
- 2 | A.
- 3 Q. And your last name?
- 4 A.

- 5 | Q. And what's your birthday?
- 6 | A.
- 7 Q. Okay. And so we're kind of talking about the crash that 8 occurred.
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 Q. Do you know where you were at whenever the crash happened?
- 11 A. So I heard that the crash happened like -- well, I don't
- 12 know. I don't know exactly where it happened, right, but it was
- 13 on the 40, right?
- 14 | O. Um-hum.
- 15 A. So we took the road -- because there was another crash, I
- 16 | think, right, that happened maybe before?
- 17 | Q. Yeah.
- 18  $\mid A$ . So we got off the 781, I guess, or whatever it is to take the
- 19 40 because we thought we'd at least keep moving. That's what we
- 20 | always do.
- 21 Q. I know you're not familiar with Interstate 70, but do you
- 22 guys remember where you guys would have got off the interstate at?
- 23 Or who was driving, I guess, at that point whenever you got on 40?
- A. We switched actually. So let me try to remember. I was
- 25 driving.

Q. Okay.

- 2 A. I was driving on the 40. But actually I stopped driving
- 3 because we stopped for gas on the 40, and then after that --
- 4 Q. Do you know what time that was?
- A. If I looked at Google Maps I might could figure out the gas station we stopped at.
- Q. Okay. Maybe we can help you out with bringing up a Google Map on your phone.
- 9 A. Is it important?
- 10 Q. Well, I just like to know where everybody's --
- 11 A. Okay. Sure, sure, sure.
- 12 Q. -- at during this --
- 13 A. Yes. I got that. So let me describe it. So we got on the
- 14 | 40, right?

- 15 | O. Um-hum.
- 16 A. So there was a lot of traffic, a lot of trucks.
- TROOPER DAWES: From Interstate 70, you got on 40. Can you describe who's driving and where they're sitting in the car?
  - I was driving. But basically like the crash, so you guys are interested in that, right? So I think we were ahead of it because we saw emergency vehicles coming the opposite way.
- 22 BY TROOPER MICHEL:
- 23 Q. Where were you at when you seen the emergency vehicles?
- A. It was before we stopped for gas. Again, I'm trying to -- I should probably find the gas station to help you.

- 1 Q. Okay. Yeah, we can, we can get to that later.
- 2 A. Yeah.
- 3 Q. So you're driving --
- 4 | A. Yes.
- $5 \parallel Q$ . -- Heather's in the car, Josh is in the car.
- 6 | A. Yes.
- 7 Q. Where is Heather sitting at?
- 8 A. Oh, my goodness. Probably in the passenger seat and my
- 9 | brother's probably behind.
- 10 Q. So does that mean front seat passenger?
- 11 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 12 | Q. Okay. And brother's behind you or behind mom?
- 13 A. I don't remember.
- 14 Q. Okay. Just in the back seat somewhere?
- 15 A. Yeah. Because it was a van, right, a van.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. So three rows of seats.
- 18  $\parallel$  Q. And what kind of van is that? It's a --
- 19 A. It's a Toyota. It's black.
- 20 | Q. Okay.
- 21 A. And yeah, so after we stopped for gas, me and my brother -- I
- 22 | think my brother drove the rest of the way because my mom was
- 23 pretty tired.
- 24 | Q. I gotcha. So --
- 25 A. But, yeah, I don't know, what does the driver even matter?

- $\square$  Are -- what are trying to find out exactly? I'm sorry.
- 2 Q. Yeah, I just -- well, of course, we've looked at like people
- $3 \parallel$  in the area and there's like -- so there's like a four-way in
- 4 | Montrose --
- 5 A. How did you even find out that we were there?
- 6 Q. We had a lot of people working this. This is kind of a big
- 7 | incident.
- 8 A. I heard it killed some people.
- 9 Q. Yeah. It was, it was kind of a --
- 10 A. Two people or three? Wait. So there was the driver of the
- 11 | truck and then one other car and then two people in a house,
- 12 | right?
- 13 | Q. I think confirmed, what was it, like --
- 14 | A. That's what was on the news.
- 15 Q. -- five, somewhere in there.
- 16 A. Yeah. So like three people killed in a house because of the
- 17 ammonia that got out.
- 18  $\parallel$  Q. Where did you hear about this at?
- 19 A. In the news. I didn't look myself. My mom was literally
- 20 | reading it to me on our way back, which I believe we also took the
- 21 40 back, at least the first part of it, before we got on the
- 22 | highway, because it doesn't let us slow down. So she was reading
- 23 | the story about what had happened Friday night.
- 24  $\mathbb{Q}$ . So something I want to ask you about the gas station.
- 25 A. Yeah, yeah, yeah.

- Q. So you're at the gas station. Did you get gas? Did your mom
- 2 get gas? Did your brother get gas? Who fueled up the car?
- 3  $\parallel$  A. I don't really -- I don't think it was me. But I might have,
- 4 I might have done the thing where I like buy the gas with the
- 5 nozzle and then I went in and used the bathroom and told my
- 6 | brother to watch it. I think that's what I did.
- 7 Q. Okay. I get it.
- 8 A. Not that it probably matters.
- 9 0. Yeah. No, no, no.
- 10 A. That's as accurate as I can give you.
- 11 | Q. Okay. So you guys make that stop, then you guys -- where do
- 12 you guys continue on? Do you go to Highland and stay that night?
- 13 | A. Yeah.
- 14 Q. Do you stay at her boyfriend's?
- 15 | A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. Yeah, I'm pretty -- we went out for a funeral. Anyway --
- 18 Q. Somebody on his side?
- 19 A. -- it probably doesn't matter. Yeah
- 20 | Q. Okay.
- 21 A. Exactly. His mom, yeah.
- 22 | Q. Okay. So I guess we'll get back to where you were at and
- 23 everything, what you can remember what -- how long do you think it
- 24 was before you started seeing ambulances and stuff like that?
- 25 A. Well, again, it was pretty much before we stopped for gas,

- 1 pretty close to that.
- 2  $\mathbb{Q}$ . Do you remember anything in that little town you were driving
- 3 through or do you remember the name of it?
- $4 \parallel A$ . Oh. Okay. So what's the name of the town --
- 5 Q. Or anything -- do you remember anything specific about the
- 6 | town?
- $7 \parallel A$ . I feel like there's a town that starts with a T, right?
- $8 \parallel Q$ . Um-hum.
- 9 A. And then further on, maybe the next town over.
- 10 Q. Starts with a T? Okay. Yeah, so --
- 11 | A. Yeah.
- 12  $\parallel$  Q. -- the name of the town is Teutopolis. A lot of the --
- 13 A. Yeah, something like weird like that.
- 14 | Q. Okay.
- 15 | A. So we were beyond that obviously. Maybe, maybe one --
- 16 | another town further beyond that one going towards --
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. That's where we stopped.
- 19 Q. So let me ask you this. I know you're driving --
- 20 A. I think it was one of those Phillips 66 stations.
- 21 Q. There you go. Okay.
- 22 | A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. Yeah, yeah. I remember that one. I think I looked at that
- 24 one as well.
- 25 A. Do you know which one I'm talking about?

- Q. Yeah, yeah, yeah. So --
- 2 A. Okay then.

- 3 | Q. -- 1505 West Main is where --
- 4 A. I mean, I can look. Want me to --
- 5 Q. No, that's where that's at. I remember that now.
- 6 A. Okay.
- 7 Q. I looked at a lot of different areas.
- 8 A. (Indiscernible) Double O's or something.
- 9 0. Yeah.
- 10 | A. Okay. Cool.
- 11 Q. So I guess let me ask you this. While you're driving, at any
- 12 point while you're driving do you notice any cars coming at you?
- 13 A. Oh, obviously. There's plenty of people coming the other
- 14 | way.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. Lots actually.
- 17 | Q. Even --
- 18 A. Lots of trucks, lots of cars.
- 19  $\mathbb{Q}$ . Okay. And then what about behind you? Is there anybody
- 20 | behind you?
- 21 A. Definitely. Definitely. It was pretty crowded.
- 22  $\parallel$  Q. Was there, was there a bunch of traffic -- can you remember
- 23 | like anything about once traffic got diverted off of I-70, you're
- 24 on 40, do you remember like going through an intersection where
- 25 like a flagger was like, hey, go on through at a stop sign?

- 1 A. I, I remember -- there was a flagger, but I can't remember if
- 2 it was after we stopped for gas or before.
- $3 \parallel Q$ . It could've been both sides, I mean.
- 4  $\mid A$ . He was just kind of standing around. He wasn't really waving
- 5 at me, I think.
- 6 Q. Okay.
- $7 \parallel A$ . I could be getting this confused with earlier.
- 8 Q. Okay. And I know you had a long trip, lots of hours, but
- 9 whenever something like that, you know, a crash like that happens,
- 10 | I didn't know if you started thinking about, you know, who was all
- 11 | around you during that, like during that area? Anything you can
- 12 | think of?
- 13 A. Well, I would have known if I had been like near it.
- 14 | Q. Okay.
- 15 A. Right? Because it --
- 16 Q. Do you remember, do you remember if --
- 17 A. Didn't it explode or something? The truck?
- 18 Q. I don't know if you'd call it explode, but I mean it --
- 19 A. Oh. Well, I heard that maybe it flipped. Did it flip?
- 20 0. Yeah.
- 21 A. Is that how it got -- why did it flip? Did it go off the
- 22 | road? What happened?
- 23 Q. Yeah, it went off the road to the right and then it flipped
- 24 | over on its side.
- 25 | A. Oh, my God.

- Q. Yeah. So do you remember seeing that anhydrous tanker anywhere when you were driving?
- 3 A. I don't know how I would have recognized it. There was a lot 4 of trucks.
- Q. Yeah. Do you remember if you were behind a truck or behind a car anytime that (indiscernible)?
- A. I was behind several trucks. I was behind this, this like
  boxy maybe trailer or RV. And he was going super duper slow, so I
  passed him.
- 10 Q. Passed him? Yeah, yeah.
- 11 A. Yeah. After that -- that's pretty much before we stopped for 12 gas. Yeah.
- Q. Okay. So there's -- do you remember what kind of camper setup this was? Was this like a pickup truck pulling a camper?
- A. Oh, wait, I actually passed two people. Another was a truck, yeah.
- 17 | Q. Okay. So you passed two people?
- 18 | A. Yeah.

- 19 Q. Okay. Where was -- do you remember where that was at?
- A. But that was early on, though. Wait. Actually no. One of them was shortly before the gas station.
- 22 | Q. Okay.
- 23 A. Yeah. That one was a truck.
- 24 Q. So you're coming up to the --
- 25 TROOPER DAWES: Do you remember what the truck was pulling?

- TROOPER MICHEL: That's what I'm asking about that camper.
- 2 BY TROOPER MICHEL:
- 3 | Q. Do you remember anything specific about the camper that you
- 4 passed?
- 5 A. A camper?
- 6 Q. Because you said it was like a --
- $7 \parallel A$ . I feel like it -- it just had a really big trailer. It was
- 8 terrible visibility, so as soon as I could get past him, I wanted
- 9 to. He was going really slow.
- 10 Q. Yeah.
- 11 A. I think it was black, but I could be wrong. I just remember
- 12 | it being this big box. It was dark.
- 13 Q. Yeah. Was that before the flagger or after the flagger, the
- 14 | quy that was kind of waving?
- 15 A. I could not give an answer to that that I'm sure about. I'm
- 16 | not sure.
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. I'm trying to get the sequence of events, right --
- 19 Q. Right.
- 20 A. -- but I'm --
- 21 | Q. And I guess let me ask you this. So you're driving along.
- 22 | You can remember passing like a truck pulling --
- 23 A. At least two people, maybe three.
- 24 | Q. -- a camper trailer at some point.
- 25 | A. Yeah.

- Q. And then you said you think you passed a truck tractor or semi trailer of some sort?
- A. Yeah, maybe two, maybe two. I don't remember.
- Q. Okay. And I guess let me ask you this, too. So you drive through, did you drive through like clean and you don't see a
- 6 crash or -- were you after the crash or before the crash?
- 7 A. I did not see a crash, hear a crash or anything. I just 8 remember seeing the emergency vehicles coming the other way.
- 9 Q. Coming at you. So you must have been in that window 10 somewhere between the crash and the emergency vehicles?
- 11 A. Which is -- basically I just thought like it happened behind me, basically.
- 13 | Q. Okay.

- 14 A. Had to have.
- 15 Q. Yeah, yeah, yeah.
- 16 A. Because they were coming that way.
- 17 Q. Right. And like the time --
- 18 A. I could be wrong.
- Q. -- like looking, looking at like times and stuff, I know we've had like a large group working on all these people that are in the area of this crash --
- 22 A. There must be a lot. It was crowded.
- 23 Q. -- and it looks like at that Phillips 66, if I'm remembering
- 24 correctly, it was somewhere around 8:45, 8:46, somewhere in there?
  - $\| A. \|$  I think we got to Highland at like maybe 10.

- Q. So you got to Highland at 10?
- 2 A. Thereabouts, because I know my mom's boyfriend wanted me to
- 3 | get drinks --
- 4 Q. Okay.

- 5 A. -- at Walmart in Highland, (indiscernible) there somewhere.
- 6 And it, like it closes at 11. So I was like, okay, I got a window
- 7  $\parallel$  there. So we got -- probably around 10 we were there, maybe a
- 8 little bit after.
- 9 Q. Okay. So you said somewhere around 10 p.m. you get there at
- 10 mom's boyfriend's.
- A. Or earlier. I'm not sure, because I had plenty of time,
- 12 again.
- TROOPER DAWES: What's mom's boyfriend's name?
- 14 TROOPER MICHEL: Yeah.
- James Carter.
- 16 TROOPER DAWES: James Carter?
- 17 Yeah. Yeah.
- 18 BY TROOPER MICHEL:
- 19 Q. Do you remember what time you left that morning, too, I guess
- 20 | from Ohio? I guess like when you left your house.
- 21 A. I mean, I can work backwards, do math, but that's about all.
- 22 0. That's all?
- 23 A. Yeah. I --
- 24 Q. Did you stop anywhere eat along your trip?
- 25 A. Yeah, (indiscernible)

- Q. A drive-thru, sit down?
- 2 A. Yeah, Panera. We went there.
- $3 \parallel Q$ . Do you remember what time that was at?
- 4 | A. No.
- 5 | Q. No? Okay.
- 6 A. Well, it's the one we usually go to. I bet my mom could tell
- 7 you.

- 8 Q. Okay.
- 9 A. I just don't know because, again, she, she does most of the navigating.
- Q. So I guess before you got gas, let me ask you this. I keep going back to like gas station and stuff.
- 13 A. Yeah. No, it's important.
- 14 | Q. It just -- it's something that --
- 15 A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. -- I seem to know because I was watching all these people in
- 17 this area at the time during the crash. And so something I
- 18 noticed at the gas station is, I noticed you get out, you go to
- 19 the bathroom, like you said.
- 20 A. Yeah.
- 21 Q. Your mom's in the front passenger seat. Was she awake before
- 22 | that?
- 23 A. Oh, yeah, yeah. She was awake the whole time.
- 24 | Q. Awake the whole time?
- 25 A. But after we stopped, again, me and my brother switched

- 1 driving.
- 2 Q. Okay. And your brother --
- 3 A. So he was driving after that.
- 4 Q. Okay. Gotcha.
- 5 A. Yeah. We switch like that, kind of do it in shifts.
- 6 0. Gotcha. Understood.

stuff like that about --

- 7 A. Yeah.
- Q. Was there any conversation between your mom and brother and
- 10 A. Oh, sure. Yeah.
- 11 Q. What about after like after you see the emergency the
- 12 | vehicles?

- 13 A. Oh, yeah. We were like, something must have happened back
- 14 there. And like, oh, we're glad that we're ahead of that and not
- 15 behind it because it probably stopped everything, so --
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. We were super relieved that that happened in that order
- 18 | basically, but also wondering what happened, which is why she was
- 19 on the news later looking for what happened.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. So --
- 22 TROOPER DAWES: Later that night she was on the news?
- No, I don't -- well, you could ask -- you'd have
- 24 to ask her. I just know that as we were driving back here, she
- 25 was reading to me a story from some paper, maybe two. We were

really curious. But we didn't find out that much.

TROOPER DAWES: Did you guys drive back by the house on the way home? Like what time would it be like we're driving through like Effingham, Teutopolis area on the way home? To where you would buy gas again.

# BY TROOPER MICHEL:

- Q. Because you probably wouldn't want to go on 40 --
- 8 A. I didn't see --
- $9 \parallel Q$ . -- again to avoid --
- 10 A. Going back, I don't remember seeing anything, like, oh,
- 11 | that's where they crash happened. I think --
- 12  $\parallel$  Q. Was it daytime or nighttime when you were driving back?
- 13 A. It was, it was daytime when we were going back.
- 14 | Q. Okay.
