MR. KAMINSKI: Today's date is March 13th, 2024, my name is Ronald Kaminski, I'm with the National Transportation Safety Board. Kaminski is spelled K-a-m-i-n-s-k-i, first name Ronald, R-o-n-a-l-d. I'm here at the Rushville Fire Department, Rushville, Illinois fire department. This is case HWY24MH004 (sic), Case Number 193921.

So I'm going to be talking with Chief Nick Menelee (ph.)?

MR. MENELY: Vic Men-eel-e.

MR. KAMINSKI: Vic Men-e-a (ph.). And Chief, why don't you spell your name and give us your title?

MR. MENELY: My name is Vic Menely, V-i-c, Menely,
M-e-n-e-l-y. I'm the fire chief for the Rushville Fire Department
and the Schuyler County Fire Protection District.

INTERVIEW OF VIC MENELY

BY MR. KAMINSKI:

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- Q. Okay. And why don't we start with the time you were notified and when you got out there and what all you did.
- A. We were notified, the page come in 11:31 and I responded to the firehouse, got my squad out, and went to the scene. We had a pumper engine in front of me, they got on scene a little bit before I did. The first thing we did is see what we had, looked things over, I did not see any drivers to either vehicle. We always usually find the driver laying out in the road or standing around or something and there was nobody, so we was thinking maybe

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- 1 | we was going to have some fatalities for that reason. The truck
- 2 \parallel ahead of me pulled off the line and started extinguishing the
- 3 | fire, the other trucks come in behind me and started doing the
- 4 | same thing and we had the fire under control and basically out
- 5 | within 10 to 15 minutes. After the fire was secure, I told
- 6 dispatch to notify the coroner, the coroner was notified, and when
- 7 | the coroner come on scene, I turned the scene over to him.
- 8 Q. Okay. And how many vehicles -- vehicles did you have out
- 9 | there?
- 10 A. Well, we had one, two, three, four, five, and Truck 10 would
- 11 | be six.
- 12 | Q. Okay. And you said there were three engines --
- 13 A. It was my squad, the three engines and a tanker.
- 14 Q. Okay. And the brush unit?
- 15 A. And the brush unit.
- 16 \parallel Q. Okay. And any issues out at the scene? There was -- you had
- 17 | plenty of water, there was --
- 18 | A. We had no issues, we had plenty of water, all equipment
- 19 worked sufficiently. We had the fire out, as far as I'm
- 20 | concerned, in record time.
- 21 | Q. Okay. And if you don't mind, if I have any follow-up
- 22 | questions, I can call you back and --
- 23 A. That's fine.
- 24 | Q. Okay. Oh, and I forgot to ask, I apologize. You don't mind
- 25 | that I recorded this information?

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          No, that's fine.

MR. KAMINSKI: Today's date is March 15th, 2024, my name is Ronald Kaminski, K-a-m-i-n-s-k-i, I'm with the National Transportation Safety Board and I'm going to be talking to Schuyler County Sherriff Bill Redshaw and this is regarding the crash in Rushville, Illinois, highway crash 24MH005.

Sheriff, do you mind if we record our conversation?

MR. REDSHAW: I do not mind.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okav.

MR. REDSHAW: That's fine.

MR. KAMINSKI: Great.

INTERVIEW OF BILL REDSHAW

13 BY MR. KAMINSKI:

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- Q. So why don't you give us a description of when you were notified and you got out there, what you saw.
- A. Yeah, I was standing -- I remember I was standing right in front of the office here and that's probably three-quarters of a mile away and I heard, through the door out front, the dispatch make reference to a semi/bus accident, I didn't catch it all, where it was, I was outside, and then it came through 9-1-1, our 9-1-1 operator's in McDonough County.
- 22 | Q. Right.
- A. And so anyway, I heard that part, I stuck my head back in, I said fill me in on what and where that was, they explained where it was, out on the other side of the intersection on 24 near the

golf course and I looked that way from right here, say probably three-quarter of a mile away, and the black smoke was rolling probably a hundred feet in the air at that time, it was unbelievable. So anyway, I proceeded. On the radio, I did hear that my chief deputy and the chief of police had been on a call together on a stolen vehicle and they left from there, so they were right ahead of me.

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When I got there, I radioed to the chief deputy, since he was on the scene first, where he might need me at first and I stopped right at the Ellen Scripps street and blocked traffic. I did radio back to the office and asked them to get somebody else out here as soon as possible so I could proceed on down and -- which is only a few hundred feet from where it was and which they did, and two other officers come out besides my chief deputy and I.

So I proceeded down there, I did see that it was a school bus, I couldn't tell if it was one of the Schuyler-Industry school buses, I wasn't sure. I did get the license plate, I did call the -- Dr. Beau Fretueg, the superintendent of the schools, he answered on his cell phone, I told him what we had, wasn't sure what it was, I gave him the plate number, it was still smoking and you couldn't see a lot. I did finally cross the ditch, get into the field and I did see the Schuyler-Industry on the side of it, actually, just the Schuyler. And I talked to him, I don't know if I called back or I was still on the phone, I explained to him that yes, it was one from their district and if there was any way

possible that they could get us some info on possibly the driver and if there was anybody aboard, et cetera, because there was -- you know, from where we had -- we could not tell, I did take some pictures while I was right there. I started calling other people, I had the office call (indiscernible), my chief deputy had already said he got a hold of the Illinois State Police, the captain of Troop 6 phoned me personally and we started talking and he explained more what we had and she started the -- everything rolling as far as the state police, you know, their reconstruction, et cetera and et cetera.

And they -- they arrived, you know, pretty quick like on the scene at different times and they started in on their investigation. I asked the Illinois State Police if they would take over that investigation because of the, you know, commercial vehicle and the fatalities and that and they said they sure would. So mine was mainly either making phone calls to here and getting other officers on the -- out there to help what we do, so people started showing up on the Ellen Scripps Drive, which is across the field there, probably a hundred yards.

- Q. By the golf --
- A. Yes, right by the golf course, right at the pro shop, they were on the west side of it.
- 23 | Q. Um-hum.

A. Word had gotten out, I was receiving phone calls from people that knew me wanting to know, you know, like if their kids were on

board, which, part of the time I did not know, later on I did know, but I just -- if it was somebody I knew, I said well, I'm certain they're not. But anyway, that just -- it just seemed like all the time it was nothing but phone calls and then the state police started arriving, and so I went and I gave them the best information I could on what was happening, where and what, and what we had. And then as more of them showed up, we went through that again and the captain and Acting Lieutenant Ed Kopp (ph.) showed up and I, you know, briefed them on everything that was up to date and everybody like started doing their job, what needed to be done and what had to be done.

Of course, you know, the fire was out pretty quick like, no question about that, in fact, the time I approached from where I was blocking traffic up to there, the fire was pretty much out, it was still -- still smoldering, but most of it was done, we started checking, we checked on the driver of the truck and the others and has been said before that we soon realized there was nothing we were going to do as far as saving lives. So most of it after that was just, you know, addressing the police with stuff and -- hang on just a minute.

Q. Sure. Okay.

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A. So yeah, to just finish up there, yeah, we -- and then people started showing up. We had to, you know, address that, too, and of course, by that time I had two deputies and the chief of police and my chief deputy and they were keeping an eye on things and I

think, from your testimony, the chief of police, he helped in getting a lot of witnesses and talked, which helped out immensely, because then we related that all to the Illinois State Police what we gathered and we just kind of worked together and gathered all the information.

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People started showing up, we started backing them off and then myself, the coroner -- and once we were pretty much so certain of who was on the bus and the truck driver and the owner of the truck, the company had shown up, and so he talked to -- he spoke to -- he's the only one I didn't communicate with, but I did go with the captain of Troop 6 and the master sergeant and I, myself, and the coroner, we went.

We had asked -- we called in some ministers and we even got a hold of the school, we got counselors and ministers at the school pretty quick like, then we asked -- we asked the families to go over to the pro shop, which is just right across there, near, which they did, and we went over and met with them and explained with the families, it would've been the families of the two -- the three children, one family, the Millers, there was two, and the other, the Driscoll, was one.

All the family was there and we had to, you know, explain to them and notify them that yes, we were certain that it was their children that was on that bus. And we had a minister there at the time and we talked with them and the best we could do, we had went and had -- then they wanted to have news media, wanted to have a

news deal set up, there was a couple TV stations, some others, we went to the firehouse and set that up there. And I can't remember exactly in order everything that was happening, but anyway, they did have -- we did have a news release as soon as we could to explain what took place and what we knew at that time. We did go to the -- and then myself, again, and the trooper I went with and the coroner, we went to the bus barn and we met with the daughter of the driver of the school bus --

Q. Um-hum.

A. -- and she was there with a young child in her vehicle. One of the school board members was there, just happened to be there, and he was there with her to console her. And actually, another bus driver, who used to be a former chief of police in this town, was there. And so I asked her if she needed anything, right off she wanted her other two children present, one was in the middle school and one was at what we call Webster School.

So I got a hold of the principal there and they brought the child from the middle school and they were going after the other and we explained to her at that time, also, you know, that it was her mother that -- you know, that was driving the bus and she called her husband at that time. I asked her if she'd like to have a ride home, she said she was fine, she'd wait for her husband and he was probably 30 minutes out or more, 45. So -- excuse me -- and then, like I said, I don't remember the news conference before or after that time, but after we completed that,

went back to the scene. I think our first call was right around 11:30 in the morning and I left there approximately 7:30 at night, after I went back up to the scene after the other stuff, and just to get everything finished up, it took that long to get the vehicles separated and get the trailer set back up --

Q. Sure.

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A. -- and then I asked them if they would go -- we went a roundabout way to get to Beardstown, we didn't go through our intersection, didn't go through town. I asked them to -- you know, I didn't want that bus to be seen by -- the least amount of people as possible, so we took it down to 24 and 103 and crossed across 103 going east and then across the Illinois River and to Cass County and took it to Belville Garage and parked it inside. So that's where the -- and it's still in there, that's --

O. Yeah.

A. -- that's what we did with the bus, just to try and do that stuff. We had earlier parked the fire trucks and our equipment and everything else we could to block people from seeing across that field and seeing it. And some of the parents did come within close and of course, we asked them not to and they -- and they listened, they went back and even when we went to, you know, talk to them and explained that, you know, yes, it was your child and all three of the children, and they -- of course, any parent would, right off, you know, wanted to see them, one of the last things and of course, you know, that couldn't be and we explained

- 1 | that the best we could, that it just can't be. So what else?
- 2 | Yeah, so like I said, we -- and then once we got to the -- bus
- 3 | moved on a trailer, they were actually able to set up the semi and
- 4 | got it set back up after they unloaded a lot of sand and they just
- 5 hooked up to the front end of the semi itself and they towed it
- 6 back to Beardstown. And I think they went the same route that we
- 7 | took to Belleville's garage over there, so --
- 8 | Q. Okay.
- 9 A. Most of the day was, like I said, you know, taking phone
- 10 | calls and talking to people and trying to get everything
- 11 | straightened out and just working with the Illinois State Police
- 12 and everybody else that showed up, so --
- 13 | Q. It sounds like you guys, you all did a great job there.
- 14 | A. Well, we just -- you never know, you know what I mean,
- 15 | something like is -- you don't train for those kind of things, you
- 16 | just -- common sense, I quess, helps you through it, so --
- 17 \parallel Q. Right, right. Okay. And I have your phone number and
- 18 | e-mail, I'll --
- 19 A. Yeah, that's my cell phone, you have the office number, and
- 20 | that cell phone's good any time, I gave it to everybody, I don't

1 INTERVIEW 2 (11:43 a.m.)3 MR. KAMINSKI: Today's date is March 15th, 2024, my name is 4 Ronald Kaminski, K-a-m-i-n-s-k-i, I'm with the National 5 Transportation Safety Board. This is regarding highway crash 6 24MH005. I'm here at the Rushville County Sheriff's -- excuse me, 7 Schuyler County Sheriff's Department and I'm going to be talking 8 to the Rushville police chief, Mr. Rick Wright. Chief Wright, can you spell your first and last name? 9 10 MR. WRIGHT: Yes, my full name is Richard, R-i-c-h-a-r-d, 11 Wright, W-r-i-g-h-t, Chief of Police of Rushville. 12 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. And why don't you give us -- oh, do you 13 mind if I record this conversation? 14 MR. WRIGHT: I do not mind. 15 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. I believe I forgot to ask the deputy 16 that. 17 INTERVIEW OF RICHARD WRIGHT 18 BY MR. KAMINSKI: 19 So why don't you give us a description of when you got the 2.0 call or when you were notified and you got out there, what you 21 saw. 22 As previously stated by Chief Deputy Boyd, we were together

on Lawn Street investigating a vehicle theft, both of us were out

of our patrol vehicles, so we were on portables. We heard -- it

was scrambled to me, we just heard somebody say that -- something

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like all units, Rushville units or Schuyler units or something, there is a vehicle crash, a semi versus a semi (sic) coming into town. I did not know which direction at that time and before -- I think I might've asked where it was at and the next thing I heard was our central dispatch, out of McDonough County, come across and then they said it again that there was a semi versus -- a bus versus semi and I asked where, you know, east or west, and they said -- or I asked for a cross street and they said Parkview or Scripps, so that told me it was out by the golf course.

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So we both took off, I was in my vehicle at the time, headed that direction, and when I turned off of Wilson onto 67, I could see a huge plume of black smoke and I radioed -- I said it out loud to Chief Deputy Boyd, I said, do you see that smoke and where it was at, I knew it was close to town just by where I could see it. As he said, we -- we proceeded through, as we drove through, I could see, out of the corner of my eye, vehicles off on the shoulder on the right side, I did not identify how many. I could see somebody was there.

I was watching the fire and as I come up, I could see the semi was rolled over in the ditch and as said before, we couldn't even see the school bus at that time until we got right up on it, you could see the school bus. Chief Deputy Boyd pulled over, closer to the scene, I went on past so I could go up and block traffic at Scripps, the other end, and I observed a Hickory-Kerton Water pickup setting there blocking traffic and spoke to the

gentleman there, who I knew, and I just said do you want me to
take over, do you have it, he said I'll stay here and turn
traffic. So I went -- turned around and went back a ways and put
my car crossways in the road to ensure nobody came any closer.

- Q. And who was that, that you ran into?
- A. Kraig Kotter.
- 7 | Q. Okay.

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- A. He was -- he's -- I don't know if he's still on the fire department, I believe, but he works for Hickory-Kerton Water department, also.
- 11 | Q. Okay.
 - A. But Kraig was blocking traffic and he said he would do it, so I went back to see if I could assist. I went back and I spoke to Chief Deputy Boyd, I remember him telling me just he said stay back, it's still exploding, and then I said okay and I went on past the scene, walking, and I knew at that time, being it was a county and we help each other, my job at that point is to assist them and go talk, try to get information. Let him handle the scene if he needs to.

And I went back and there were two semis setting along the road and one car, the car was in front, there was a female standing outside and I -- I knew who she was, she's one of my officer's wives, that witnessed it. So I went to her and I asked her if -- her name is LeeAnn Eifert, E-i-f-e-r-t. I asked LeeAnn, I said, did you witness it, she said yes, I was right behind the

semi. And I got her -- I know her information, so I said what did
you see, I turned my -- made sure my body camera was on and I said
tell me exactly what you saw, and she went through that.

- Q. Would we be able to get a copy of that?
- A. Yes, you can -- I haven't even given it to the state police or anybody yet, but yes, you can get that.
- Q. Okay.

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- A. I can tell you now what was said.
- 9 Q. Sure, sure.
 - A. So she said that she looked up and saw the bus was across the line in the wrong lane. She said approximately in the wrong lane for 15 seconds and I said that's an awful long time, but okay. She said it was in the wrong lane, she watched the truck driver try to move over, she could see him moving over off into the ditch or onto the shoulder and she said then she saw them impact and she said both vehicles, the -- or the -- both vehicles come off the ground, as soon as they impacted, they both come off the ground and immediately exploded into a ball of flame.

After I got that information from her, I said okay, I went back to the next driver, truck driver, and asked them what they saw and the first truck driver said we were about a mile behind, we all have been traveling from Macomb, we were probably a mile behind that truck. He said we knew -- half a mile or a mile, but he said we had been following it all the way from Macomb, but he said we didn't see a thing. He said he didn't see anything, the

next truck driver said the same thing, so at that time I directed them -- I said you can back up and there's a place to turn around and you can go around Scripps, I said we have another officer -- at that time I knew the sheriff, because I heard the radio traffic, I knew the sheriff was on scene down there blocking traffic, so I told them to back up and go, to get them out of there --

O. Um-hum.

2.0

A. -- and not being there when everybody got -- everybody else got there that we needed, responders. And I believe that was the first and then, at the other end, on the west end, we had a truck, and I don't think any other vehicles, just one truck, semi, and we went and told him to back up and get turned around and I remember Jeff asked me to go move -- to Dep. Boyd, move my vehicle so we could let that semi back up and get out of there, and we did that.

And then at that point, sometime in that point, one of my off-duty officers, who I believe is the one that actually called it in, because his wife called him, he come and he's also EMS, so he was there to help block traffic, I believe he -- and I went and started talking to any witnesses, any others, or looking for any other witnesses, and the superintendent, I believe the sheriff had called him, I know he did, and the superintendent came out and the director of the bus barn came out and I went up and started talking to the director of the bus barn and said do you know who's on it, who the driver is, what bus this is and how many children

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- 1 could be on it and I just started gathering information. He gave
- 2 | me a preliminary of who he thought might be on it, but then he
- 3 \parallel went back to the bus barn and wrote a note with all the names on
- 4 | the bus, including the driver, would they ask him for -- I said I
- 5 | needed middle initials, dates of birth and everything, because I
- 6 knew when the state got there, they would need this.
- 7 | Q. Sure.
- 8 A. So I collected all that. And at some point, another
- 9 gentleman brought that to us and we -- state police had been on
- 10 | scene by this time and we provided the information to them and, as
- 11 | Chief Deputy Boyd said, we -- at that point, we -- we become scene
- 12 security just to keep everybody back because we were starting to
- 13 get a lot of spectators and family members showing up, so at that
- 14 point we were just there to assist the state and make sure the
- 15 | scene was kept secure.
- 16 | Q. Okay. And so -- yeah, that's interesting, we have the -- I'm
- 17 | not sure that the state police were aware of the woman because
- 18 | they just mentioned the off-duty firefighter, Tanner Carson, I
- 19 | talked to, we talked to.

- Q. And so did you get toned out, did you get -- did they call you on the radio, dispatch, did you hear it, see it?
 - A. I heard it on my portable radio on my chest. I heard an off-duty officer state that there was a bus versus semi accident on 24 coming into Rushville and I wasn't for sure what was going on, because we hadn't got toned out for it or dispatch hadn't said nothing. So myself and Chief Rick Wright from Rushville PD were

working together on a vehicle theft on Lawn Street and we both looked at each other and took off towards the scene of the accident.

Q. Okay.

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A. When I turned on to Route 24, I was heading west towards the accident scene. I could see a semi laying, trailer laying on its side and a lot of black smoke and flames, but I could not see the school bus at that time. As I passed the semi truck that was in the ditch, there was nothing on the roadway, it was in the ditch on the north side of the road, I could clearly see a yellow school bus, short school bus, and there was flames coming out of every window. The roof was still on the bus, the semi tractor part was in flames.

And when I say flames, I mean very big flames, the wind -- it was wind-driven flames, the wind was blowing decently out of the west to the east, so it was blowing flames from the bus straight into the semi. I immediately knew that if there was drivers in the vehicle that they were probably deceased because we were told that the drivers did not exit the semi or the bus.

- Q. Okay.
 - A. So I pulled onto the shoulder, Chief Wright went past me, heading west, and blocked off vehicles coming from the west towards Rushville, so vehicles traveling east were shut down. I got out of my vehicle and I stood probably, what I would say, you know, a hundred and 50 feet away from the bus that was burning

- because I could hear the tires exploding, pops and bangs and different things.

I'm going to be talking to 6 Firefighter Eric Thurman with the Rushville Fire Department 7 regarding crash Number HWY24MH005. It is approximately five minutes to 2 o'clock in the afternoon here in Rushville. 8 9 And Mr. Thurman, why don't you spell your first name and last 10 name and give me your title, please. 11 MR. THURMAN: First name, Eric, E-r-i-c. Last name Thurman, 12 T-h-u-r-m-a-n. I'm the public works director for the City of 13 Rushville and a volunteer firefighter for Schuyler Fire Protection 14 District/Rushville Fire Department. 15 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay, what's a good phone number for you? 16 MR. THURMAN: 17 18 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. And do you have any problem with me 19 recording this conversation? 2.0 No, that's okay. MR. THURMAN: 21 MR. KAMINSKI: Thank you. INTERVIEW OF ERIC THURMAN 22 BY MR. KAMINSKI: 23 24 So why don't you just start from the time when you learned

about the crash or heard the crash and what all you did.

- A. I was discussing with some of my workers out by the area it happened, we heard a big bang and as we got across the parking lot, some other people were out looking, I found out what it was, I heard it was a bus and a tractor trailer. I started on my way to -- on the way to the firehouse, while I'm in the process of coming here, I did hear the page. I was trying to listen to the page and get here as quick as possible. I got here, I got suited
- 8 up, I got in the truck, I waited for the next firefighter to
- 9 arrive on scene and when the next firefighter arrived here, then
- 10 we took off toward the scene.
- 11 | Q. Okay. And what vehicle were you in?
- 12 A. I was driving Truck 2.
- 13 Q. Okay.
- 14 A. When we were arriving on scene, I was looking to see -- the
- 15 | smoke was rolling towards the highway, so I drove past the scene
- 16 \parallel and at a decent distance where Mr. Wilson pulled some hose, I
- 17 | helped pull some hose, he notified me of which line we had pulled,
- 18 | I charged the line and he started fighting the fire.
- 19 Q. Okay. And after you suppressed the fire, what did you all
- 20 do? Did you hang around and just wait in case there was another
- 21 | hot spot or something?
- 22 A. Yes, yeah, we -- yeah, we stayed on scene in case there was
- 23 any more hot spots or if anybody needed anything else there.
- 24 | Q. Okay. And have you had any training with the IFSI, Illinois
- 25 | Fire Safety Institute?

- $1 \mid A$. No, I have not.
- 2 | Q. Okay. And you -- well, you've done most of your training
- 3 here at the station?
- 4 A. Training, yeah. Training's been here and you learn from
- 5 older firefighters and -- um-hum.
- 6 Q. Okay. Anything else you want to add?
- 7 A. I was originally on Truck 2 and I wind up manning Truck 10
- 8 | for a little while, just --
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. -- for hot spots. We did pick up Truck 2 after, you know,
- 11 | most of the fire was down, so we -- but we stayed on scene and
- 12 | kept the line charged just in case there was any other.
- 13 | Q. Okay.
- 14 A. Anything was needed.
- 15 \parallel Q. And you don't mind if I call you back if I have any follow-up
- 16 | questions?
- 17 A. That's okay.
- 18 | Q. Okay.
- 19 | A. Yeah.
- 20 MR. KAMINSKI: Great. That will conclude our interview here
- 21 | at about three minutes to 2 o'clock.

BY MR. KAMINSKI:

- Q. Okay. And why don't you give us a description of what you were doing or when you got toned out and when you got out and seen what you all did at the scene.
- A. I received the page off of my phone while I was at the city shed and hopped in one of the trucks and got down to the station as soon as possible, grabbed my gear and hopped in the truck that Thurman had running already and we arrived at the scene. I grabbed a pre-connect 2 and got the hose all the way strung out and he got the pump started up and we started suppressing the fire as soon as possible.
- Q. Okay. And did you -- did you stay with the fire suppression

- l until it was out?
- $2 \mid A$. Um-hum.
- 3 | Q. And how many out there were you with hoses trying to put out
- 4 | the fire?
- 5 A. I'd say three.
- 6 | Q. Okay.
- 7 $\|A$. All three trucks were running, I believe.
- 8 \parallel Q. Okay. And you guys were all stationed around or --
- 9 A. Pretty much so, yes.
- 10 | Q. Okay. And so after the -- you just did the fire suppression,
- 11 | I shouldn't say "just did," but after the fire suppression, you
- 12 | just wrapped things up and anything else?
- 13 A. We kept the hose charged after the scene was turned over in
- 14 case if any hot spots came on, to get them down so then the
- 15 | coroner was able to do their job.
- 16 Q. Okay. You didn't have any issues out there, you had plenty
- 17 of water and all that?
- 18 | A. Um-hum. Yeah, no issues whatsoever.
- 19 | Q. And one thing I forgot to ask the deputy chief, but as for
- 20 | you guys, did you guys have your standard training, firefighting
- 21 | training that they do or even hazmat training, just your basic
- 22 | awareness class, you've taken that?
- 23 A. We've had trainings here during our meetings and stuff about
- 24 stuff like that.
- 25 | Q. Okay, okay. But I mean as for did you go to Illinois Fire

and Safety Institute? Are you guys doing any of that? 2 I have not, no. Α. 3 No, okay. So where do you get your training, then? Q. 4 At the station. 5 At this station here? 6 Α. Um-hum. 7 Okay. And they'll go over the suppression and things like 8 that? 9 Um-hum. 10 Okay. Okay, any problem, if I have any follow-up questions, 11 to give you a call back? 12 Α. No. MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. 1 INTERVIEW 2 (2:10 p.m.)3 MR. KAMINSKI: Today's date is March 13th, 2024, my name is Ronald Kaminski, K-a-m-i-n-s-k-i, with the National Transportation 4 5 Safety Board. I'm here at the Rushville Fire Department regarding 6 the crash HWY24MH005, it is approximately 10 minutes after 2:00 7 and I'm going to be talking to the EMT assistant chief for the 8 Schuyler County EMS and the rescue chief for the EMS. 9 So why don't we start off, if you could spell your -- oh, 10 first of all, are you both okay with me recording this 11 conversation? 12 MR. GRENLUND: Yes. 13 MS. HAYS: Yes. 14 And if you could each state and spell your MR. KAMINSKI: 15 first and last name and give me your title. 16 Andrew Grenlund, A-n-d-r-e-w G-r-e-n-l-u-n-d, MR. GRENLUND: 17 EMT-Basic, Assistant Chief of Rescue. 18 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. 19 MS. HAYS: Rosemary Hays, R-o-s-e-m-a-r-y, Hays, H-a-y-s, 2.0 Rescue Chief and EMT. 21 INTERVIEW OF ROSEMARY HAYS & ANDREW GRENLUND 22 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay, so why don't you all give me -- one of 23 you give me a description of you got toned out, you got out there 24 and what happened?

We received a call for a bus versus semi

MR. GRENLUND:

accident, we were the first on scene, me and my partner were.

Upon arrival we found a semi half on its side, fully engulfed in flames. We stopped on the east side of the accident to talk to bystanders, none of them were a patient. We proceeded to the west side of the accident where there were more vehicles and more people standing by, none of them were patients, they were just all bystanders, they stated the same thing as the first group, that they never seen anybody get out of the vehicles. About 60 seconds on scene, our second ambulance arrived, I had them stage on the east side of the accident to take care of anything that was on that end and we had the other end.

MR. KAMINSKI: You were on the west side?

MR. GRENLUND: Yes, sir, we were on the west side 3-Board-11.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okay.

2.0

MR. GRENLUND: Shortly after that, Rushville Fire Department showed up on scene --

MR. KAMINSKI: Oh, so you guys beat the fire department.

MR. GRENLUND: Yes, sir. Not by much. We were only there a minute or two before Rushville Fire Department showed up and they took over the scene due to the fire and the crash in that nature, they took over the scene until they got the fire put out.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okay.

MS. HAYS: I believe it was after they got the fire out is when it was confirmed that there was just more than the driver in the bus.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. And then once the fire was out, can you -- I hate to, again, put you through this, but if you can kind of give me a description of where the -- all the deceased were located that you removed.

MR. GRENLUND: We'll start with the semi. The semi driver was in a kneeling position in between the driver's seat and the passenger seat.

MS. HAYS: It was like his shoulder was wedged behind the passenger seat.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okay.

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MR. GRENLUND: It would've been his right shoulder.

MS. HAYS: Right shoulder.

MR. KAMINSKI: Um-hum.

MS. HAYS: So he was like slumped over and his right shoulder was between like the back of the seat and the --

MR. KAMINSKI: The cab back --

MS. HAYS: Yeah.

MR. GRENLUND: Yes.

MR. KAMINSKI: -- and the seat back.

MS. HAYS: Yes.

MR. KAMINSKI: Okay.

MS. HAYS: Because he had -- when we went to remove him, he had to be lifted up to get from wedged between the seat and the back of the semi.

KAMINSKI: But they remained on the floor --10 They were on the floor. MS. HAYS: 11 MR. KAMINSKI: -- at that position there? 12 MR. GRENLUND: Correct. 13 So it maybe looks like they were either in the MR. KAMINSKI: 14 aisle seat or in the passenger seat, but right there --15 MS. HAYS: Yeah. MR. KAMINSKI: -- in that second seat. 16 17 MS. HAYS: And it appeared that he was sitting in that seat 18 by himself. 19 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. And the other child? 2.0 MS. HAYS: The two other decedents, I believe, were driver 21 side Seat --22 MR. GRENLUND: One. 23 MS. HAYS: -- 1, I believe. One, I think they said, appeared 24 he might've been in the aisle, like he had either fallen out of the seat or -- but he was located more in the aisle than the --

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1 MR. GRENLUND: That would've been the --2 MS. HAYS: The seat. 3 -- passenger side Seat 1. MR. GRENLUND: 4 MS. HAYS: Yes. Well, behind the driver, Row 1. 5 There's two -- there's two of them, one was in MR. GRENLUND: 6 Seat 2, passenger side; one was in Seat 1, passenger side; one was 7 in Seat 1, driver's side. 8 Okay, passenger Seat 1, passenger side, Seat MR. KAMINSKI: 9 1, Row 1, and then passenger side, Row 2 --10 MR. GRENLUND: Correct. 11 MR. KAMINSKI: -- there's somebody right at those positions, 12 what looked to be. 13 MS. HAYS: Well, they said the -- it appeared the one that 14 they classified as Seat 1, passenger side, it appeared that he had 15 fallen out into the aisle is where they found him, he was kind of 16 in the aisle. 17 Okay. And then the child that was on the MR. KAMINSKI: 18 driver's side, was that in Row 2 or Row --19 MR. GRENLUND: Row 1. 2.0 So we had two in what looks --MR. KAMINSKI: 21 MR. GRENLUND: Row 1, Row 1, driver's Row 1, passengers Row 22 2, passenger. 23 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay.

HAYS: And then they were handed out the window. 12 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. Did you take off any doors, cut any 13 doors, remove any --14 MR. GRENLUND: No. 15 MS. HAYS: No. 16 MR. KAMINSKI: -- windows, anything like that? 17 MS. HAYS: No. All the windows were already gone. 18 Broke out, gone. Yeah, it was just a shell. MR. KAMINSKI: 19 MR. GRENLUND: Yeah, there was just a shell. 2.0 MR. KAMINSKI: Yeah. 21 MR. GRENLUND: The only thing that we did have to do is we 22 used the fire department's spreaders because the driver of the bus 23 was pinned --24 MR. KAMINSKI: Um-hum.

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MS. HAYS: Between the engine compartments.

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1 Right, right leg, right lower leg --MR. GRENLUND: 2 MR. KAMINSKI: Okay. 3 MR. GRENLUND: -- was pinned between the floorboard, the 4 dash, and the motor compartment. 5 MR. KAMINSKI: Um-hum. 6 MR. GRENLUND: So we used their spreaders and kind of spread 7 everything back apart to where we could remove -- remove her. 8 MS. HAYS: And we did end up having to remove part of her 9 lower limb to --10 Right, lower leg we had to remove. MR. GRENLUND: 11 MS. HAYS: -- get her out. And then she was taken out the 12 back of the --13 MR. KAMINSKI: Out the back door? 14 MS. HAYS: Um-hum. 15 MR. GRENLUND: Um-hum. 16 I did notice that was ajar, so --MR. KAMINSKI: 17 MS. HAYS: Well, we didn't even have to open it, it was 18 already busted. 19 MR. KAMINSKI: The back door was already open? 2.0 Yeah, it was -- there was nothing but the MR. GRENLUND: 21 metal. 22 MS. HAYS: It was just the frame. 23 MR. GRENLUND: It was just the outside frame. 24 The windows were already broken. MS. HAYS: 25 Oh, yeah. But I did note that the door itself
