1 INTERVIEW 2 (5:02 p.m.)3 MR. STANCIL: Okay. Today is April 26, 2019. It's 5:02 p.m. 4 We are at in Fort Worth, Texas, adjacent to the 5 location of a train derailment, Union Pacific train derailment that occurred on April 24, 2019. The NTSB accident number is 6 7 RRD19FR007. We are here interviewing the adjacent property owner, 8 Mr. Reyes, R-e-y-e-s, Herrera, H-e-r-r-e-r-a, who is the property 9 10 owner of He lives at 11 With me here is Francisco Gonzales, III, from the Federal Railroad Administration. He will be acting as a translator, and 12 13 Mr. Herrera will be narrating for us what exactly happened on the 14 night of the accident. Okay. 15 MR. GONZALEZ: Okav. 16 INTERVIEW OF REYES HERRERA 17 MR. GONZALEZ: So at around 1 o'clock in the morning that 18 night somebody called him. His house in another street, in 19 another -- away from here. And then somebody from here, from the 20 -- on the other site, call him around 1 o'clock in the morning 21 that it was some accident and there was fire. 22 His house in , Fort Worth, Texas. That's 23 where he was when this person over here, Juan Estrada, call him on 24 the phone and tell him that there was a fire going on. He came 25 here around -- in about 6 minutes he got here. 26 MR. STANCIL: Okay. So this gentleman lives across the

Jose Diaz is the one who called the fire department. And then they came and, apparently, he said that the fire department went in the other side close to the tracks. That's when they saw the problem. And then some other fire department came here. And then came here, saw there was a fire, and then they left. But before they left, they went that way, close all the streets, and they told them to get well away.

So when they told them to evacuate, they just told him, you -- these people over here, over here in those two houses, they says please evacuate and go because you cannot stay here; we're going to close all this. And so they close everything, so they left around -- so around 3 o'clock or 4 o'clock, they left. All the families left the property. But -- and they told him that they were going to tell him when to come back.

Go back a little more, around 1 -- so around 1 o'clock in the morning, 1 or 1:20, the fire was going, so somebody -- some guys, some young guys went over there and opened the stables to release all -- some of the horses. But when they left, there was already three already dead or burned.

MR. STANCIL: That was before he arrived?

MR. GONZALEZ: No, he was here. But he didn't go there, but the young guys went over there and opened up because they were concerned. And, of course, the fire was going.

And then after that, that's when they told him to go, they told him to leave the property. So they got together and everything; they left around 3 o'clock in the morning. And then he said he came around 8 o'clock -- 7 or 8 o'clock he came over here and the fire department were here. So the fire department were here when he showed up 7, 8 o'clock in the morning, the fire department was here and they already put the fire out and they left.

So he came here 8 o'clock and -- 7, 8 o'clock, the fire department was already put the fire out and left. And then around, he said around noon -- there was a police in the entrance over there not letting anybody in. And then around noon, they told him to -- you guys, can come up. But when -- he says, when they told him about the evacuation, he says, because the smoke is toxic and it will -- it was just dangerous to smell the fumes or the smoke, that's why they told him to leave. So around noon, they told him to come back.

MR. STANCIL: Did the people who had to evacuate, did they have a place to go?

MR. GONZALEZ: No, he say that the -- this family over here and the family over there, they left, and this family over here, which is -- this one over here is kind of family, the family of

MR. STANCIL: I'm very sorry for your loss, sir.

Is there anything else that he would like to tell us about what happened?

MR. GONZALEZ: So it was like one of those, like a camper that -- it was like a camper, one of those that you pull in a car, that is like for two or three people. They use -- they have it there kind of ready just to take a siesta or to relax, but not to sleep there or to live. Or they take -- so it was just to have it there just to take a nap or to relax, but not to live there or to take it other places.

MR. GONZALEZ: And that was destroyed.

18 MR. STANCIL: Yeah, I see there's some buildings also.

19 Buildings were destroyed or barns?

MR. GONZALEZ: So there was another trailer that he uses to move animals. So it was like a, it was like -- if they have to transport some of the animals, not the horses but the sheep or anything else, and then he put them in there, then take them somewhere. So it can be used for horse, you know, to transport a horse or all the animals.

MR. STANCIL: Okay. Okay. All right. Well, I think, unless there's anything else --

MR. GONZALEZ: I give him my card so if he remembers anything or he wants to say something else, he can call me or email me.

MR. STANCIL: That would be great. Thank you.

MR. GONZALEZ: I tell him -- he says, what -- I don't going to get in trouble to telling you this much. I said, no, we investigating an accident and we want to know what's going on with the lake and the water so we can tell the railroads or somebody to fix this.

He said about a year ago or last year, because of this problem, he says that a lot of the ballast -- so he says about a year ago some -- you know, a lot of the ballast went all the way to the other side and then it dump it over there. He says if we want to go, we can stop over there and we see all the ballast in there.

So he said that the ballast that is over there, now is 1 2 stopping the water from going to another stream on that side. Не 3 says it's about a year. He said that the person -- he doesn't live there, but he has 4 5 some of his stables there. And then he also -- he already went 6 into the City of Fort Worth and complain to do something with the 7 water because at one point his stables were flooded because all 8 the ballast was obstructing the flow of the stream. Okay. 9 called the City of Fort Worth and somebody came and talked to him 10 and went over there to show him what the problem was. 11 MR. STANCIL: When did this happen? 12 MR. GONZALEZ: So somebody from the city came last Wednesday 13 just before the accident. And they went over there and told 14 him --15 MR. HERRERA: (In English) Sorry. 16 MR. GONZALEZ: No, no this is good. 17 MR. HERRERA: Oh, okay. 18 MR. GONZALEZ: It's good. No, no --19 MR. HERRERA: Oh, okay. 20 MR. GONZALEZ: So there's another -- okay. So this guy 21 called the city and somebody came this Wednesday, which is the -what's that, the 20- -- what are we now? 22 23 MR. STANCIL: It's like a week before the accident? 24 MR. GONZALEZ: No, no, the day before the accident. 25 MR. STANCIL: Oh, day before. Okay.

MR. GONZALEZ: The Wednesday before the accident. 1 somebody came and then he took him over there to the -- and tell 3 him what the problem was. And then the accident happened that night. 5 And then another one, he says that one guy who lives over 6 here, David, goes to the community center when they have like a 7 town hall meetings every month. Like a community center, they 8 have like town hall every month. And so people come over here. 9 So David, the guy who lives -- David, who lives around here in the 10 neighborhood, goes over there about a month ago on the last 11 meeting. So on the last meeting, he told them about the problem. 12 MR. STANCIL: And that would have been a month ago? 1.3 MR. GONZALEZ: About a month ago. 14 MR. STANCIL: Okay. 15 MR. GONZALEZ: And then this last Wednesday -- so today, 16 David told him that about a month or 2 months ago -- he doesn't 17 remember -- that he went to that meeting and told them about the 18 So let's say 2 months. problem. 19 MR. STANCIL: Okay. Who is David? 20 It's a neighbor that lives -- David Gonzalez. MR. GONZALEZ: 21 MR. STANCIL: David Gonzalez. Okay. 22 MR. GONZALEZ: So he is a neighbor that -- David Gonzalez who 23 lives in 1 -- like 2 blocks from here. And then he told him this

talking, they were just chatting today around 2 o'clock, and he

told him, he says, yeah, I went to that community center in the 1 2 meeting, the town hall, and told them about it about a month, 2 3 months ago. MR. STANCIL: And who at the town hall? Was it a city 5 official that he told? 6 MR. GONZALEZ: So he said, yeah, and he used to go there but 7 because he doesn't speak English, he didn't understand much. 8 it's a policeman, people from the city or the community. So they 9 talk about the -- how -- you know, community. And so David 10 Gonzalez mention that a month to 2 months ago, he went to that 11 meeting and mention about the problem of the flooding. 12 MR. STANCIL: Okay. All right. Very good. 13 Can we have permission to photograph the damage to his 14 property? 15 MR. GONZALEZ: Yeah, he said it's okay. 16 MR. STANCIL: Okay, sir --17 MR. GONZALEZ: He says he wish that everything gets better 18 and with those here. But he doesn't want to say, wow, this guy 19 was a whistleblower or something and then come and do something to 20 him. 21 MR. STANCIL: Okay. 22 MR. GONZALEZ: So --23 MR. STANCIL: Well, one thing I wanted to stress to him that the information that we gather is public, but, you know, we're --24 25 again, it's used to prevent accidents, for accident prevention, to
