INTERVIEW OF CAROL BOSWELL

BY TPR. HENDERSON:

DR. BOSWELL: I hate it, but I'm not worried about where Marc is, so it's not a devastation, does that make sense?

TPR. HENDERSON: It makes total sense.

DR. BOSWELL: The type of person Marc was -- I tell people he was working 69 years to go home and he went home. It was before I wanted him to, but he went home.

TPR. HENDERSON: Understandable. What part of this is is trying to just figure -- even though he didn't contribute to the crash, we do this for every person that is -- every driver that is involved.

DR. BOSWELL: Thank you. Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: We just learn a little bit about them, their medical, sleep patterns, things of that nature.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: Just to -- maybe we're missing something.

DR. BOSWELL: Sure.

TPR. HENDERSON: It's just trying to uncover every single rock that's there.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, so the first thing I have to do is kind of start out about his medical history. Did he have any type of medical history, take any medications?

1 DR. BOSWELL: No. 2 TPR. HENDERSON: He didn't --3 DR. BOSWELL: He took some over the counter -- he took fish 4 oil and a vitamin. 5 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay. 6 That's the only two -- and an allicin (ph.). DR. BOSWELL: 7 Those were the -- as preventative stuff. TPR. HENDERSON: Understandable. 8 9 DR. BOSWELL: But that's -- he took very -- Advil if he just 10 really had to have it, but once every two to three months would be 11 about it. 12 TPR. HENDERSON: Understandable. 13 DR. BOSWELL: He --14 Did he have any history of fainting spells? TPR. HENDERSON: 15 DR. BOSWELL: No. 16 TPR. HENDERSON: Diabetes? 17 DR. BOSWELL: No. 18 TPR. HENDERSON: High blood pressure? 19 DR. BOSWELL: Nope. 20 TPR. HENDERSON: Anything -- any other medical? 21 DR. BOSWELL: No. 22 TPR. HENDERSON: Did he see a doctor on an annual basis? 23 DR. BOSWELL: He did see a doctor on an annual basis and it

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was Dr. Puri.

TPR. HENDERSON:

1 DR. BOSWELL: PURI. 2 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay. The only recent -- which was about -- was 3 DR. BOSWELL: 4 before COVID -- I do everything by COVID anymore. 5 I think we all do. TPR. HENDERSON: 6 DR. BOSWELL: He had some kidney -- and he had some bladder 7 stones that he had removed. 8 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay. 9 DR. BOSWELL: And had a , so some prostate. 10 TPR. HENDERSON: Things that happen when you get a little 11 (indiscernible). 12 DR. BOSWELL: You know, the -- yeah. 13 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay. 14 DR. BOSWELL: But those are the last two incidents that he 15 really had to see a physician about. I mean, I think he was -- he 16 talked about getting stiff, so I figured there was some arthritis 17 there, but he wasn't being treated for any of that. 18 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, can -- let's start the day before the 19 crash on Thursday. How did the day go around here around 20 Thursday, what was the atmosphere like amongst you all two? Okay, 21 was it a normal afternoon, did you eat supper? 22 DR. BOSWELL: Yes. 23 TPR. HENDERSON: Go to bed on time?

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Things of that nature?

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DR. BOSWELL: Yes.

TPR. HENDERSON:

DR. BOSWELL: I'm trying to think back to the -- you know, you kind of blank it out. He was working around the -- I mean, he usually -- his normal routine was he got up around 5:00 every morning, he would go up to the church building and walk his steps to get his steps in. He would be back here around 6:00-ish and read the paper, eat oatmeal, get his emails -- you know, all that kind of stuff, and then he went and would spend the morning up at the church building, working at the church building on stuff.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

DR. BOSWELL: He was jokingly called the elder in residence up there, so he would help out with finances and anything else. He always came home about lunch -- we -- I cooked lunch, we had chicken and rice.

TPR. HENDERSON: On Thursday?

DR. BOSWELL: On Thursday, if I remember right -- and ranch-style beans. His dad would come over and it'd be the four of us, my mother and my -- Marc would go and --

DR. BOSWELL: Mother, go onto your room.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Mother, you need to go to your room.

MOTHER: What?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Go to your room, they're doing something over there.

DR. BOSWELL: She's a bit confused.

TPR. HENDERSON: Understandable.

DR. BOSWELL: Anyway, as -- then in the afternoon, he would

work in the yard, he would work on Lions Club stuff, just whatever things he had to do. He would go over and stay an hour to an hour-and-a-half with his dad and sit over there and visit with his dad who lives across town from us. In the -- after -- I mean, after we would go out for supper, I -- no, we decided to eat supper here that day and so he had crackers, and peanut butter, and jelly, I think because I didn't fix him anything, so that's his usual. Then we just worked on stuff around here. He would be in -- he usually watched movies on the computer and listened to his music and we'd go to bed about -- if I remember right -- I mean, our usual was right about -- between 10:30 and 11:00 and start the next day.

BY TPR. HENDERSON:

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, so what time did he get up on Friday morning, just a rough guesstimate?

DR. BOSWELL: About the same time, right around 5:00.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: And go through a normal routine, did we go walk that morning?

DR. BOSWELL: Yes, he went and walked that morning. He was a little bit rushed. I don't remember what all was going on. He wanted to get some phone calls made and when he came in, he said he lost track of time is what he said because he didn't get the phone calls made to add dental insurance to our insurances. He

says this is the last day I could get it done, and I didn't get it done, and I got to get on up to get the bus. So, he went in, changed his clothes, and left to go get the bus.

TPR. HENDERSON: About what time did he leave to go get the bus?

DR. BOSWELL: 1:00.

TPR. HENDERSON: P.m.?

DR. BOSWELL: I think -- yeah, I think it was 1:00. It was after lunch and I think he had to be up there at 1:00 to pick up the bus and then he was supposed -- he was -- I think that's correct. I'm not sure about that, but right about that time.

TPR. HENDERSON: That wouldn't make sense because you think about an hour-and-a-half --

DR. BOSWELL: I thought they were leaving -- because it took them a long time to load the bus with all of the instruments. So, he would go get the bus and then take it up there. They would load the bus -- they usually had a little foo-foo or whatever up there, you know, test them, and then they would get on the buses and leave.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

DR. BOSWELL: So --

TPR. HENDERSON: Was -- how did he sleep that night before?

Does he normally get up every few hours to go to the bathroom

or is it all --

DR. BOSWELL: No, he gets up sometimes once or twice and I

don't remember him getting up at all.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

DR. BOSWELL: But he said he slept fine. I mean, in the

morning, he said he was fine, he didn't -- wasn't --

TPR. HENDERSON: Does he snore when he sleeps?

DR. BOSWELL: No, I do, but he doesn't.

TPR. HENDERSON: Well, I do too, so --

DR. BOSWELL: No, he doesn't.

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DR. BOSWELL: I think so if I remember right. This is my other son.

TPR. HENDERSON: How are you, sir?

MR. M BOSWELL: (Indiscernible) I thought you were going to call (indiscernible).

DR. MARSHALL: Yes, sir. Okay, I'm Rafael Marshall, NTSB.

MR. M BOSWELL: Michael Boswell.

DR. BOSWELL: You ought to pull up a chair.

19 TPR. HENDERSON: There you go, you can have this one and I'll 20 take -

21 MR. M BOSWELL: No, I'll pull it around.

TPR. HENDERSON: You're sure?

MR. M BOSWELL: Yeah, this one's right here. You got another

DR. BOSWELL: Two of them. There's another --

1 MR. M BOSWELL: That's huge. There's trees in your house 2 now. 3 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, you all ought to take one home. 4 What else? 5 BY TPR. HENDERSON: 6 TPR. HENDERSON: Do you know -- did he call you after they 7 left? 8 No, this time he didn't. He usually texted me DR. BOSWELL: 9 when he said we're ready to leave, see you tonight. But he didn't 10 this time, I will say that. 11 Okay, is there --TPR. HENDERSON: 12 DR. BOSWELL: He never calls me on it. He would text me when 13 he left, he would text me if they stopped to go to the bathroom, 14 he might text and say we're stopped at so and so, he would always 15 text me we're fixing to leave, we're -- they're getting on the bus 16 and I'll be home, you know --17 TPR. HENDERSON: Whenever. 18 DR. BOSWELL: Friday, he did not text me, no. 19 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, do you know if they stopped while in 20 route and he just didn't text you? 21 DR. BOSWELL: I don't think so. That would be a question 22 you'd need to ask Terry. But the only reason they would have to 23 have stopped is those buses did not have bathrooms on them. 24 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

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DR. BOSWELL: And so, sometimes those kids have to go.

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TPR. HENDERSON: Have to go.

DR. BOSWELL: And I know on

DR. BOSWELL: And I know on previous trips they sometimes had stopped, but he didn't -- I don't know this time. I got the feeling that no, they did not stop. They would've stopped in Big Spring.

MR. M BOSWELL: Big Spring, that's the first town, really.

DR. BOSWELL: That's the only town.

MR. M BOSWELL: Because there's no place to stop in Tarzan.

TPR. HENDERSON: Other than that gas station on the south side of --

MR. M BOSWELL: Is there one now? That's how I drove it --

DR. BOSWELL: No, they always stopped if they were going to -- in a bigger town because to let out that many kids to go to the bathroom, you want multiple stalls.

TPR. HENDERSON: True. Was there any kind of disagreement between you all? I mean, I -- like I said, this doesn't --

DR. BOSWELL: No, that's fine to ask. No.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

DR. BOSWELL: None whatsoever. We were -- no problems whatsoever.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, does he do any other kind of jobs besides the school -- I mean besides the church? I'm sorry.

DR. BOSWELL: Well, what do you mean jobs?

TPR. HENDERSON: Well, does he like --

MR. M BOSWELL: He runs the -- he does the Lions Club, he

does the Teachers' Association, he does --

DR. BOSWELL: He was the treasurer for the Teachers' -Retired Teachers' Association, he's the treasurer or secretary for
the Lions Club that meets on Tuesday, he's the president of the
Andrews Independent School Credit Bureau, he was on the Legacy --

MR. M BOSWELL: Legacy, that's what I was trying to think of.

DR. BOSWELL: The Legacy Committee here in -- he's -- but he's just a member this year. He was the president previously.

MR. M BOSWELL: Go find all those check books in there where he -- we've got to give them back to organizations because he was the signer on them.

DR. BOSWELL: But those are the --

TPR. HENDERSON: How did he manage all this? I mean, that's impressive.

DR. BOSWELL: My husband was a servant and if somebody said I need something, he was going to -- he didn't need to finish this. If you need -- you know, if he was working -- he was watching a show and you called and said I need you, he would drop everything and go.

MR. M BOSWELL: I mean, he's got people like (indiscernible)
Conners that --

DR. BOSWELL: He had multiple elderly that he --

MR. M BOSWELL: He'd take them to the store.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

MR. M BOSWELL: He would go buy stuff for them and take them

home -- you know --

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DR. BOSWELL: If he had the time and could, he was going to help you.

TPR. HENDERSON: He was going to help you.

MR. M BOSWELL: So, he was busier in retirement than he was when he had a job.

DR. BOSWELL: And whenever they needed him to drive the buses.

TPR. HENDERSON: And what did he do full time before he retired?

DR. BOSWELL: He was -- originally, he -- his degree is a teacher -- an educator --

MR. M BOSWELL: Mathematics.

DR. BOSWELL: Mathematics and history. Then after several years here, he took over their --

MR. M BOSWELL: Data processing.

DR. BOSWELL: Data -- he was --

MR. M BOSWELL: He was just very -- yeah, took care of data processing.

DR. BOSWELL: When he retired, he was director of data processing.

MR. M BOSWELL: He got a masters in counseling, I think it --

DR. BOSWELL: No -- counseling, yeah, from Sul Ross.

MR. M BOSWELL: Okay, data processing was the IT department.

I don't know why they called it data processing.

DR. BOSWELL: I don't either.

MR. M BOSWELL: But he did that -- so, that's what we were talking about the other day. He quit teaching fulltime because, I mean, he still did a class one-off every so often when they didn't have enough computer teachers at the high school. He would -- on top of his data processing, he would run and teach one class and then go back. But he quit fulltime teaching probably '93. One of the reasons why he quit was for school -- I mean, you know, between '93 school years -- end of May in '93 because he taught us in '91 and '92 Algebra One and Two, and then, like, after we got out a year -- we were a year away from graduation and he quit teaching. I always said that we were the last ones, he got tired of dealing with us. He didn't want to teach us computers or nothing.

DR. BOSWELL: And then after that he was over it.

MR. M BOSWELL: He said I'm going to let somebody else teach those boys, I taught them math.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

MR. M BOSWELL: But -- and then he went full time into the data processing.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: Interesting.

MR. M BOSWELL: About '93 to 2017 when he retired?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 2017.

MR. M BOSWELL: 2017, 2018?

TPR. HENDERSON: Is when he retired from data processing? 1 2 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah. I don't remember for certain. He's been 3 MR. M BOSWELL: 4 retired for two or three years. 5 DR. BOSWELL: No, five. 6 MR. M BOSWELL: I was thinking it was closer to -- so, it was 7 probably '15 or '16 when he retired. 8 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, I started to say he's been --9 MR. M BOSWELL: I put in the paper '17, but I thought I may 10 be wrong because I remember he --11 Yeah, I think he's been -- I can go look, but DR. BOSWELL: 12 about five years. There's a plate in his office that says --13 MR. M BOSWELL: Yeah, it has his retirement. 14 DR. BOSWELL: Would you look at that plate and just see if it 15 has the date on it because I don't --16 He'd just retired and then he went --17 MR. M BOSWELL: He went full time. 18 DR. BOSWELL: He was so -- in some ways so excited because 19 then he could be this elder in residence and a friend of ours 20 prior -- years ago had been a -- would be one of the elders at the 21 church and he would spend half the day up there. And Marc was 22 looking forward to when he retired that he would get to go and 23 serve anyone who needed to come up to the church so he could do

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Yeah, interesting. So, the reason why

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that.

TPR. HENDERSON:

Rafael's involved, they're looking at maybe is it highway design, is there some kind of technology that could've prevented this.

So, that's really what brought the NTSB on board.

TPR. HENDERSON: Yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: Hoping we can prevent this kind of thing again.

DR. BOSWELL: Because there's been two wrecks -- bad wrecks of buses in that general area. I don't know where the --

TPR. HENDERSON: I worked on (indiscernible) too.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: That was an intoxicated driver that caused that one.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: I went to the autopsy of the wrong-way driver yesterday. He did not have any alcohol or any drugs in his system.

TPR. HENDERSON: Preliminary investigation through a urine sample, they took blood and tissue samples. They're going to send those off, so we'll wait to confirm the preliminary. But that's where it's looking at right now; there's no alcohol or drug involved. What's crazy is we interviewed his wife and he is a pastor of a church.

DR. BOSWELL: Oh, really?

TPR. HENDERSON: This is weird. He got on the interstate one mile away from where the crash happened. We don't know why, we

don't -- we've got video of him coming up, we've got video behind the crash that were following the buses, the truck had video, then we've got video of the wrong-way driver actually getting up on the interstate. We don't know if it's a highway design, we don't know if it's a medical problem, we don't know yet.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: But alcohol and drugs are not -- as of right now, preliminary, are not part of the problem. That will be confirmed once we get blood back because they'll test for a lot more different drugs than the mortuary does.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, I can't -- that part just --

MR. M BOSWELL: Well, you all fixed the roads.

DR. BOSWELL: I want a reason.

TPR. HENDERSON: I agree. I do too, that's why I'm here.

MR. M BOSWELL: Well, you all fixed the roads after the (indiscernible). I mean, that's what those cables -- keep the people on one side of the road than the --

TPR. HENDERSON: And had it not been for those cables, it would've been a lot worse. I've got an aerial photo of the scene, it doesn't show anything gory or anything like that. If you want to see it, tell me or --

DR. BOSWELL: I'm a nurse so it -- yeah, I would like to see it.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, it's not going to show -- I mean, I don't have any bad pictures or anything on here. This will just

make sense of how the crash happened and why.

DR. BOSWELL: I would like to --

TPR. HENDERSON: Where'd you retire from a nurse at, here?

DR. BOSWELL: Actually, I retired from Texas Tech University
Health Science Center. I was a professor of nursing at our Odessa
campus.

TPR. HENDERSON: How long ago?

DR. BOSWELL: April.

TPR. HENDERSON: Oh my gosh.

TPR. HENDERSON: My wife just graduated from Tech.

DR. BOSWELL: If she was --

TPR. HENDERSON: (Indiscernible)

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah. But, no, I -- and I taught -- I teach in the graduate program, so she might've had me possibly in Research or Community Health. I teach a section of Research and Community Health for the graduate students and then --

MR. M BOSWELL: Because you kind of got out of nursing and got into more of the teaching in the end of '80's, early '90's, right because you were --

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, about '90's.

MR. M BOSWELL: Because you went to more OC then over to Tech.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

MR. M BOSWELL: She did labor and delivery. She was telling the people up in (indiscernible) I kind of got them when they were

coming, we didn't have to deliver this kind of news because the 1 2 nurses are super nice up there. 3 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah. 4 MR. M BOSWELL: Because we had that (indiscernible) and 5 everything. DR. MARSHALL: It feels like it's hot. 6 7 (Indiscernible chatter) 8 DR. MARSHALL: I probably have one here that might --9 TPR. HENDERSON: It's a huge inverter because this is a mega 10 processing computer. Let me go get it real quick. 11 DR. BOSWELL: Okay. 12 DR. MARSHALL: My mom was a nurse as well. 13 DR. BOSWELL: Oh, is she? 14 DR. MARSHALL: Yeah, she had a masters in nursing. 15 I have a doctorate in education, I had a DR. BOSWELL: 16 masters in nursing and (indiscernible). 17 MR. M BOSWELL: Yeah, she's a MSN. DR. BOSWELL: I'm an MSN and a PEDD. 18 19 MR. M BOSWELL: I give her grief about the MSN because that's 20 the computer program I used to use. She's a MSN. DR. MARSHALL: PhD in education? 21 22 DR. BOSWELL: Well, an EDD in education. 23 MR. M BOSWELL: It was a doctorate.

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So, did they call you Dr. Nurse?

DR. BOSWELL: You know, actually at work they didn't because

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DR. MARSHALL:

I was said, you know, I'm just one of you all. I do consulting work for Midland Memorial as their nurse researcher and everyone over there calls me Dr. Boswell. No one calls me -- basically no one calls me by my first name in those places. I go please, call me Carol. But they respect and call me Dr. Boswell.

DR. MARSHALL: That's wonderful.

DR. BOSWELL: So, anyway. So, what are your thoughts about all this?

DR. MARSHALL: What are my thoughts?

DR. BOSWELL: Well, your --

DR. MARSHALL: I could tell you why I'm here, which is probably a little bit better. We're really interested in accidents like this where you've got wrong-way driving or something serious like that because what we do in the federal government is we try to improve transportation safety either through technologies or better design.

DR. BOSWELL: Right.

DR. MARSHALL: So, in this case, we're really interested in the highway design. We're interested in any way that we can possibly stop wrong-way driving.

DR. BOSWELL: Please.

DR. MARSHALL: I mean, we actually did a very scholarly report about nine years ago on this. But it's -- you know, it's still obviously a very big issue.

TPR. HENDERSON: It's got power.

DR. MARSHALL: But we're hoping that just the latest technologies, like, connect the vehicles and maybe even autonomous vehicles and automated vehicles might be able to help with this. So, that's what we're here for.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I know Terry made the comment that he has seen people going the wrong way on that interstate a couple of times and never been an issue. Like, he's seen them go by and he's like what can I do, you know, I can't call anybody, I just hope that everybody's going to be safe. So, it's definitely something that is -- happens from time to time is what he had kind of alluded to since he drives that road so much.

DR. BOSWELL: That's okay if you can't.

TPR. HENDERSON: Well, I'm going to --

TPR. HENDERSON: I might actually have something, yeah.

It'll take a while to find it, but --

DR. BOSWELL: That's okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: So, this the actual scene.

DR. MARSHALL: I've got a privacy screen on there so it's kind of hard to see.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay, I've got to get up.

TPR. HENDERSON: So, this is going eastbound.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, they struck in the outside lane and if you look and see, these skid marks here are Mr. Boswell trying to

take evasive action. But because of the road curvature over here, I don't believe he had enough perception or reaction time to get over there faster. It hits the pickup, it rotated this way, he went off to the right, the guide wire kept him from going into the other lane, this truck was rotating, and the second bus, you can see their skid marks come through right here on the ride side.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, Terry says he went just right on the side. I knew that Marc tried to get out of the way, he just didn't -- that helps.

TPR. HENDERSON: He tried to do everything that he could. It's still early on, we still have got a lot of people to interview, video to watch, video to gather. We're trying to figure out where he came from.

DR. BOSWELL: You mean where the truck?

TPR. HENDERSON: Where the wrong-way driver came from.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: How did he get to where he got to.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

MR. M BOSWELL: So, where did this crash actually happen? Was it by the refinery area?

TPR. HENDERSON: It's west of the refinery. Right exactly where the 179 mile marker is eastbound, it's 152 feet west of that.

MR. M BOSWELL: Okay, I know where you're at then. I mean, I just --

TPR. HENDERSON: Because you kind of caught that turn and 1 2 then --3 MR. M BOSWELL: Yeah. 4 TPR. HENDERSON: And that's where he came around that curve -5 6 MR. M BOSWELL: He had been on -- so, Dad had -- I knew Dad 7 had enough time to get to 75 coming off the Andrews. So, I mean, 8 it had to have been down there at least a mile-and-a-half off of 9 where --10 DR. BOSWELL: Because they were --11 So, we have video of him passing a truck TPR. HENDERSON: 12 tractor and the truck tractor's trying to get up to speed. So, we 13 can probably figure out where he was going from there. 14 some other methods we have to kind of get that on that as well. 15 Because he -- they had cruise that -- Terry DR. BOSWELL: 16 said they were on cruise -- he was on cruise. 17 TPR. HENDERSON: Okay. 18 It's what Terry told me. He said I was on DR. BOSWELL: cruise when --19 20 MR. M BOSWELL: Because he said he almost ran into the back 21 of Dad because he was braking and weaving. 22 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, because Marc was braking and swerving. 23 MR. M BOSWELL: And that's when Terry said he just held to 24 the right because he told me and Jeremy what he had gone through 25 because he said I owe it to you to tell you what I saw because

I'll tell you what, I couldn't see what was coming. He goes all I saw was your dad start going fishtailing and everything, trying to get out of the way and he goes I was going to run into the back of him so I just held it right and went through all of the debris.

He goes and then all of a sudden it just cleared up, I pulled off and then I came to your fathers --

TPR. HENDERSON: Terry said he saw him swerving?

DR. BOSWELL: He -- before because he was the --

MR. M BOSWELL: Because right behind him.

DR. BOSWELL: He was the car -- I mean he was the bus right behind him.

MR. M BOSWELL: He was the bus right behind Dad.

DR. BOSWELL: And that Dad -- he did say --

MR. M BOSWELL: He went both ways.

DR. BOSWELL: Marc went --

TPR. HENDERSON: See, and that's part of some of the questions I want to ask Ms. Jones was were they kind of just -- everybody deciding which way to go, was the wrong-way driver trying to do the same thing, or was that the decision making process that mister --

MR. M BOSWELL: Terry said it went both ways.

DR. BOSWELL: Terry said that Marc's bus swerved and that he only had right to go.

MR. M BOSWELL: Only had right to go.

DR. MARSHALL: That makes sense.

MR. M BOSWELL: He said he couldn't go left, he only had right, and he goes when got to the front of the bus, there was just debris everywhere. It was just a smoke cloud, it was debris, and he said he just held it straight and he goes I couldn't see nothing and he goes I just went straight through it. He goes I was praying I didn't hit anything and he goes and then I got back and he looked and the whole side of his bus had been hit. But he said I just held it straight and went through it. He goes once I got through it -- he goes it didn't take three seconds, but it was clear.

DR. BOSWELL: But he did say that Marc swerved. I don't know how many times, but he did swerve. He said he moved from side to side.

MR. M BOSWELL: Is that what he told you too?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I was there when he was talking to

you, so, yes.

DR. BOSWELL: He told me that.

MR. M BOSWELL: He told me that in front of you? I didn't know you were out there with me.

TPR. HENDERSON: I'm just curious if the wrong-way driver was trying to do that as well.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That was what I assumed with what Terry said. I mean, of course, Terry couldn't see anything, so he had no clue.

TPR. HENDERSON: Exactly.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: But it's just the first thought that comes to your mind.

DR. BOSWELL: But you --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They were mimicking each other.

TPR. HENDERSON: So, that vehicle has what they have -- what they call EDR capability, electronic data recording.

DR. BOSWELL: Which one?

TPR. HENDERSON: It's -- both of them.

DR. BOSWELL: Oh, okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: And we've downloaded -- or we will or have downloaded from everything that's involved.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay, I thought --

TPR. HENDERSON: I think the Ford has steering wheel input that it captured, so that will help us answer that question and I'm hoping miss -- because we don't rely solely just on the EDR data. We want physical or interviews to confirm what we're reading on there.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, that was what Terry -- because he came over and visited with me a couple of different times and he did say he knew -- and I don't know -- he said swerve. He said he knew something was going on, but he couldn't see in front of Marc's bus to know what it was, but that Marc was trying to get out of the way. And so then he went -- he said the lane opened up on the right, so I took it.

MR. M BOSWELL: The lane opened up on the right is what he

told -- the way he worded it to me.

TPR. HENDERSON: I'm telling you, he did one heck of a job driving that. I don't know how he didn't roll it to be honest with you. He was literally that far from rolling it.

DR. BOSWELL: Marc or Terry?

MR. M BOSWELL: Who, Terry or --

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: When he went to the right, he almost went completely off the road and if that would've happened, I'm not sure it would've been worse.

DR. BOSWELL: The lord --

TPR. HENDERSON: The good lord was watching.

MR. M BOSWELL: Yeah, in my opinion, yeah.

TPR. HENDERSON: Yes, well I agree.

DR. BOSWELL: For all of it. But he did say the lane opened up on the right and -- after Marc was swerving and he called it swerving. You know, when you interview him, he'll better --

MR. M BOSWELL: He may use a different word that means -- I mean, because he'll -- like I said, he was trying to explain to us because -- of course, he's been -- he's like a second dad to me as far as Terry goes and we've been friends for -- I mean, she helped deliver one of the Duzan's last kids. So, that's how close these families are and Marc and Terry are as close as you can get. I mean, Marc had -- Dad had five or six close friends and Terry was top two of those. He felt horrible that they originally

1 pronounced him dead and then found a pulse afterwards and so, 2 Terry had a lot of guilt --DR. BOSWELL: Or covered him up, I don't know that -- they 3 4 didn't pronounce him dead. But they --5 MR. M BOSWELL: Well, I guess you don't pronounce him dead, 6 but they --7 They covered him at the scene, so Terry called 8 and told his wife, who was with me, that he was dead and then had 9 to call back a little bit later and say he's not, they've got a 10 pulse and they're airlifting him. 11 TPR. HENDERSON: That's another question that I had. 12 notified you that he had passed away? 13 DR. BOSWELL: That he passed away? 14 Correct, that was --TPR. HENDERSON: 15 DR. BOSWELL: Officially passed away? 16 TPR. HENDERSON: Declared deceased, yes. 17 DR. BOSWELL: The doctor. MR. M BOSWELL: The doctor told us he --18 19 DR. BOSWELL: We were up at UMC. And so, she said I'm coming to talk to you and tell where we are and what we're doing and then she came in twice and then the doctor came in the third time and -- well, and told us -- I don't guess --

MR. M BOSWELL: No, the doctor came in once and --

DR. BOSWELL: The doctor came in once and then --

MR. M BOSWELL: She left and then came back, like, 20 minutes later.

DR. BOSWELL: Boy, I'm remembering it --

MR. M BOSWELL: She came in one time because she asked you what you said -- what you thought and so then she left.

DR. BOSWELL: I thought that was the nurse practitioner that did that.

MR. M BOSWELL: Well, that too. She came in twice and then -

DR. BOSWELL: Okay, so really, the one who pronounced him dead, I would tell you that no one told me that he was pronounced

dead because when they came back and said his status, we talked about what Marc and I had talked about back -- all the way -- I mean, many years ago, but particularly in 2018, we confirmed to each other what our expectations was. I told them he did not want to be kept alive and I would rather we not continue excessive treatments if that wasn't going to be bringing him back to his precondition. It was agreed upon between them and me that we would not and so we actually went into the room and I told him to turn the vent (sic) off and we stayed with him until he died.

- MR. M BOSWELL: And then they -- I guess they had --
- DR. BOSWELL: So, to say somebody pronounced him, I'm not for sure if anybody ever has told me they pronounced him dead officially.
- MR. M BOSWELL: Because they said -- the nurses said we'll have the doctor come in and pronounce him dead.
 - DR. BOSWELL: But no one came back.
- MR. M BOSWELL: But it's going to be after us.
- 18 DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

- MR. M BOSWELL: We were there when they turned the machines off.
 - DR. BOSWELL: I told them to turn the machines off and we watched him go away.
 - TPR. HENDERSON: Did you all get all of his personal effects from him at the hospital?
- 25 DR. BOSWELL: Yes -- no.

MR. M BOSWELL: No, we didn't get the ring.

DR. BOSWELL: We got everything but his -- I don't have his wedding ring. I think that's -- and his watch, but I'm not really as worried about his watch, but I would like his wedding ring.

But no, you all -- they had his billfold and his --

MR. M BOSWELL: Phone.

DR. BOSWELL: -- phone, and the keys, and his change, and the knife.

MR. M BOSWELL: The knife.

DR. BOSWELL: And we asked if we could go ahead and have the billfold at least because the credit cards, we just wanted to have access to them so that we could know which ones he had for sure. And they called and got permission from you all -- some group and was given permission to go ahead and release to me and so we did get those before we came back, so I have all of them.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay, so we have a sergeant that's going to be attending his autopsy -- I think it's going to be tomorrow, I'm not a hundred -- they haven't given us a date and time.

DR. BOSWELL: He's just getting down there today, yes.

TPR. HENDERSON: Correct. So, I will call that sergeant and tell them to make sure that that ring and watch -- make sure it's there and make sure it comes back.

DR. BOSWELL: We did not see a watch on his wrist.

TPR. HENDERSON: Okay.

MR. M BOSWELL: He usually carried it on -- he had it on his

right wrist and that's the wrist -- the arm that they showed us.

They cleaned it up so that it wasn't just full of blood and then
- but there was no -- he had IV's and stuff, but no watch.

DR. BOSWELL: There wasn't a -- yeah, there wasn't a watch

I don't know. But he carried it in it because it had his other papers that he used for keeping the statistics for the football game.

TPR. HENDERSON: I got you. I do remember seeing a black bag that was stuck in wreckage and I pulled on it to get it out.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: Because I remember telling everybody do not be throwing these bags around because there's probably laptops or something in them. We loaded them on the back of the wrecker, we weighed the bus that -- the other bus that had been involved, then we loaded all that stuff on that bus and weighed it again so we knew how much that stuff weighed because weight comes into play when we're investigating a crash. So, that's why we need to kind of get a better idea of where everything laid.

DR. BOSWELL: Did you need to know anything else about that -- you said about who reported --

TPR. HENDERSON: No, that's it, and you basically witnessed it so, that pretty much --

DR. BOSWELL: I witnessed his death, yes.

TPR. HENDERSON: That pretty much takes care of everything.

DR. BOSWELL: That was our agreed upon thing was that we

1 would not keep each other on the bench as to be having a body. 2 TPR. HENDERSON: All right. Same as mine and my wife's. 3 MR. M BOSWELL: Well, the doctor told her -- I mean, they 4 talked nursing. TPR. HENDERSON: How long had he been driving the bus? How many years if you had to guess?

DR. BOSWELL: He has been driving a school bus since 1976.

TPR. HENDERSON: A couple --

MR. M BOSWELL: No.

DR. BOSWELL: '65.

MR. M BOSWELL: '65 because he drove them in college.

DR. BOSWELL: He drove -- well, but that was the year he was in -- he graduated in '71, come on.

MR. M BOSWELL: That's what I'm saying.

TPR. HENDERSON: So, it would've been in the '70's?

DR. BOSWELL: Not '60's, he didn't -- he started when we got married and we were down in Lohn, which we moved down in Lohn in '74 after we got married. L O H N. And he was bus driver at -- for that school district, so he's had CDL ever since then. He may have had it before then because he worked for TNMNO and cleaned buses as his job at Tech when he was -- that was his night job.

MR. M BOSWELL: That was his night job. They allowed him to do studying while there were no buses. DR. BOSWELL: Between the buses, yes. MR. M BOSWELL: And so he would study and then a bus would come in and he'd drive it around, he'd clean it, and then he'd drive it back around, he'd go back and started doing his homework. That was his college job. They paid him --DR. BOSWELL: So, he may have -- I didn't look at his divers' license then, but I know he had the CDL when we were in Lohn, which was in '74, so he's had them since. MR. M BOSWELL: Dad had to go get something else, though, because didn't he have to study when he went back into it?

TPR. HENDERSON: Well, it was probably when they came out with the passenger endorsement. They used to not have a passenger endorsement.

MR. M BOSWELL: That's what it -- he had to get his passenger endorsement because that's what I've got. I've got a class two with passenger and that's what he -- we were talking about it because, like, when he went back into it this time, he had to have -- he had to go do some test.

TPR. HENDERSON: Now, he might've had to do a school bus.

DR. BOSWELL: School bus.

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TPR. HENDERSON: That's for home to school, school to home You have to actually do a physical for drive test for operation. that one.

MR. M BOSWELL: Okay, that's what -- I bet it's what he had to do.

DR. BOSWELL: He maybe -- he used --

MR. M BOSWELL: I don't remember if it was '17 or when he went back to -- when he retired and he moved to do this, he had to do -- he had to take some test.

DR. BOSWELL: He drove school buses, just a regular morning and evening route at Lohn for all the time that we were at Lohn. When we were in Seagraves, he drove a regular route each morning and evening. When we came here in '81, he quit driving a school bus and drove the school -- the church, school -- the church buses and other -- you know, when they needed him. Mainly church buses trips and that kind of thing, so not as much bus driving during that period of time. Then when he retired -- I mean -- no, when he became the -- really, when he retired, he went back to driving a lot more. As soon as he retired, he started driving for nearly --

MR. M BOSWELL: He wasn't going to do it. I remember laughing at him because I said I thought you said you weren't going to do it? He goes but, you know, they just asked and I just can't say no.

DR. BOSWELL: And you could ask, but he drove every, I think, sporting event and UIL --

MR. M BOSWELL: I had the computer guy come up to me and he goes your dad just drove the Robotics Club two weeks ago and, of

course, he didn't stay. He drove them in there, come back, drove back to --

DR. BOSWELL: To Odessa.

MR. M BOSWELL: Odessa. But, I mean, Flemming (ph.) came up to me at the memorial and said -- we were laughing about it because --

DR. BOSWELL: But the only sports he hadn't driven for was soccer. They asked him, but he was busy that day. We just got a new soccer team, so that was the first time.

TPR. HENDERSON: I was wondering about that. I'm from Kermit originally.

DR. BOSWELL: They had their first game and he was supposed to drive them to that soccer game and I had plans and he came home and said they asked me to drive the bus today and I said and you told them what? And he said I told them I wasn't driving.

TPR. HENDERSON: Smart man.

DR. BOSWELL: I said good, that was smart.

DR. MARSHALL: Was he familiar with this bus? I mean, is this a bus he had driven often?

DR. BOSWELL: Oh, yes, this type of bus.

DR. MARSHALL: Yeah, this type of bus.

DR. BOSWELL: Now, I don't know which one. He had driven those, he had driven the other big -- he's driven the -- he doesn't -- he didn't particularly like doing the yellow dogs because you could go -- you had to go 55.

DR. MARSHALL: Yeah.

DR. BOSWELL: But he would -- I mean, you know --

MR. M BOSWELL: Andrews was pretty good about you driving the same bus every time.

DR. BOSWELL: The same type of bus. So, he did those big trucks. He liked the ones that had the bathrooms on better than the others because you didn't have to stop.

TPR. HENDERSON: You didn't have to stop.

DR. BOSWELL: You know, but -- you know, no, he's driven those and the others. They pretty well had him in -- I don't know, the train -- I mean, whatever these big buses that had the big (indiscernible).

DR. MARSHALL: The motor coaches?

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, he's been driving the motor coaches nearly the whole time because he drove for -- like I said, every week for the band during football season. He would drive the band to it and then doing the -- keep stats on the football team and then drive the band back. But he would drive for the swim team, he drove for the choir, he drove for the cross country, he's -- tennis he had not ever driven, but that's because Terry Duzan is the tennis driver because he's one of the tennis coaches. He's driven for -- he took the elementary school kids on Wednesday of last week to Seminole for UIL. He takes -- yeah, he was real familiar with.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, very comfortable in that. I could see the fire and I have the most 6 respect for you all, but you all did a hell of a job and I 7 remember the showed the care and the attention you all did in 8 making sure that his wallet got -- I mean, just stuff that you all 9 take for granted. But maybe it's what you all do naturally, but 10 it meant a lot to us. 11 TPR. HENDERSON: The at-fault driver, their family has told 12 me to tell everybody that you all are in their prayers with them. 13 This is not what they wanted. 14 Did I miss anything of what they said? 15 Let them know that we're praying for them. 16 DR. MR. M BOSWELL: I guess, what, Ms. John's going to get the rest of hers done next month because she had to be out three weeks?

DR. BOSWELL: She said about two weeks is when they would go back, but they had to get the cleaning and have a little bit of -they had closed the wound and done some of that and then would go back too. But her heel was completely gone and then both bones in the ankle and it was a compound fracture, so they had to clean and put the bone back in at least and close it up.

TPR. HENDERSON: Was she having hip issues or just bone?

DR. BOSWELL: The only I saw in the -- she does not have any hip injury that required surgical intervention or anything. She has a huge bruise on the left thigh -- all around the whole thigh and she said she has three broken ribs.

MR. M BOSWELL: I didn't know she got that.

TPR. HENDERSON: On the left side or the right side?

DR. BOSWELL: I don't know whether -- she pointed this direction when she said when I woke up, there was a student on top

of her is what she was telling us this morning and she told the student get off of me, I can't find my husband. She said I think Mr. Johns -- so she was pushing the kid off of her to find her husband and then she realized that this foot was bleeding and all of that. And I know she said then she remembers Terry, who was down with my husband trying to wake him, and talk to him, and comfort him, and another gentleman and Dr. Azam (ph.) and she said they talked to me, but she said I have no idea what they said or what they were saying.

TPR. HENDERSON: In a stressful situation, the first thing to go is your hearing.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah, and --

TPR. HENDERSON: All your blood flow goes to your eyes, that's why you get tunnel vision.

DR. BOSWELL: And she said I know you all were talking, but I don't know what you were talking about and so, that's the only part of the accident that she would -- she could relay to us. But we did not press her either. I really just wanted to hold her and tell her that I care.

TPR. HENDERSON: You all have been a huge help. I hope I have helped answer some questions that you might've had.

DR. BOSWELL: Yes, you've given me peace -- more peace. I still have questions.

TPR. HENDERSON: Understandable.

DR. BOSWELL: But you don't have the answers yet.

TPR. HENDERSON: Not yet. I hope I will.

DR. BOSWELL: Yeah.

MR. M BOSWELL: You've got a tough job.

TPR. HENDERSON: It's tough when kids are involved.

MR. M BOSWELL: You all both do.

TPR. HENDERSON: Man, that (indiscernible) school bus crash was -- it was pretty bad.

DR. BOSWELL: I'm sorry, yeah we keep saying that Marc was the hero because at least none of the kids were severely hurt. I mean, we had a couple and, you know, 11 is more than we wish.

TPR. HENDERSON: I think those 11 were treated and released, though.

TPR. HENDERSON: I agree. Okay, well, we will go meet with

Ms. Johns. Like I said, don't hesitate to call me.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay, thank you.

TPR. HENDERSON: I will try and keep you updated on where we're at.

DR. BOSWELL: If you would.

TPR. HENDERSON: I'm expecting -- oh, I didn't get her name and it started out with Andrea Magdelina (ph.) -- oh, Susie Mugda (ph.) is the lady that's supposed to be calling back.

DR. BOSWELL: Okay.

TPR. HENDERSON: She should be -- she's out of Lubbock -- I mean out of Amarillo, so she should be reaching out to you.
