(10:04 a.m.)

2 3 All right, so the time is 10:04, Pacific. 4 The date is Wednesday, April 26th. I am 5 Lieutenant That's spelled I'm located at Trident Seafoods. In the room with me today is --6

SA HELLER: Special Agent Greg Heller with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, ATF. I'm a federal fire and explosives investigator.

SA PETRULAK: And also, I'm Nathan Petrulak, special agent My last name is spelled P E T R U L A K. with ATF.

: All right, and LT

Chief Warrant Officer with the U.S. CWO Coast Guard. I'm a marine investigator. Last name is spelled

> MR. LORING: Jeffrey Loring, L O R I N G, I'm a deckhand on the American Constellation.

: And Chief Warrant Officer and Mr. Loring LTare virtual on Teams. The three of us are in the room, those two are virtual and we're just here today to talk to Mr. Loring about what he saw on the morning of April 7th in relation to the fire on board the Kodiak Enterprise.

INTERVIEW OF JEFFREY LORING

BY LT

- Q. So, Jeff, could you kind of just tell us what's your position on board the vessel that you're on, what vessel you're on, and what you were doing that evening?
- A. I'm a deckhand on the American Constellation, you know, all exterior deck stuff is what we do. I was currently on night shift, midnight to noon, and taking out the trash at about, I don't know 3:30, 3:45. I look over at the Kodiak, which is probably about a hundred yards away -- a couple hundred yards and I saw a little puff of smoke come out the front, not a whole lot. So, I went a little closer and it smelled like fire, so I sprinted up to the security guard for Trident to let him know and he had no idea. His cameras didn't show anything, his alarms did go off. Then on my way back, I called 911 and got my mate up and my
- 15 Q. Okay, so where -- could you tell us where the American
 16 Constellation was moored in relation to the Kodiak Enterprise?
 - A. I think we were about -- I want to say a hundred yards north -- I think it was north. It's kind of hard -- yeah, we were on the end of the Tacoma pier, just at the very end the Kodiak was in the -- kind of the middle of the pier. I don't really know which direction. I think north.
- Q. Okay, good. Okay, so when you were -- then you said you were taking out the trash, were you on board the vessel or on the pier?
- 24 A. When I saw the smoke, I was on the pier.

captain up and that was about it.

25 | Q. Okay.

A. Our trash bins were pretty much right at the end of our gangway, so I didn't go too far from our ship.

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- Q. Okay, so you were looking -- what aspect were you looking at the *Kodiak Enterprise*, then, from where you were with the trash cans?
- A. So, I guess I turned to the aft side of our ship, which is
 the bow side of the *Kodiak* and I -- the smoke came out right from
 the front of the bow.
- Q. Okay, do you -- could you see specifically -- you said on the bow, could you see specifically where that smoke was coming? Was there a specific hatch it might've been coming from, a vent or anything like that?
- A. I couldn't really tell and it wasn't a whole lot of smoke at the beginning. It was just a couple smokes coming from the bow somewhere over there. I guess kind of on the portside. I'm not positive where it was really coming from.
- Q. Okay, and that initial smoke that you saw, could you -- I know it was night, but could you tell -- was it white smoke, black smoke? What was the color and what did it smell like?
- A. It was -- it smelled like, you know, kind of like a campfire and it was definitely white smoke -- or white-ish smoke. It was not black smoke.
- Q. Okay, and then you said you proceeded to the Trident guard shack. Where was that guard shack located?
- 25 $\mid A$. It was about a hundred more yards to the south of the *Kodiak*.

Yeah, I didn't really know if they -- you know, if they were doing something specific on there or something, so I wanted to let him know first before I, you know, got all the fire and ambulances and stuff like that. So, yeah, I just sprinted up there as fast as I could and he had no idea. So, he came -- we hopped on a little golf cart, and he came and looked at it, and then he called 911, and I called 911. Then that's about it. I went back to my ship and got my mate up.

Q. Okay, and then what occurred after that? So, after you got your captain and your mate up, did you guys leave port thereafter or how much longer were you in port?

We stayed there, I think, two more days afterwards. We were

- far enough away that the captain said we should be all right.

 Then I think it was Monday, the -- Trident came up to us and said

 there's freon on board it would be safe -- it would be better if

 you guys left. So, we left and then just kind of looped around to

 the other side of Tacoma. But we were definitely there a few

 days.
- Q. Okay, and then throughout the rest of that evening, were you watching what kind of went down or did you just go back to your duties inside the ship?
 - A. Yeah, we pretty much -- all of us kind of -- every time we were outside, we were checking on it and looking. You know, it's exciting to see firefighters putting out a fire, so pretty much at all times, someone was looking.

Q. Okay.

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- 2 $\mid A$. And throughout the four or five days that we were there, you
- $3 \parallel$ know, they put it out and then a new set of fire would pop up.
- $4 \parallel So$, it, you know, didn't really go out for a long time.
- $5 \parallel Q$. Right, so in that first evening that you -- you know, you saw
- 6 | it initially and then you maybe saw it a few more times that
- 7 | evening, did you ever see flames out from -- you know, from your
- 8 | vantage point?
- 9 A. I did and we -- I have, actually, a picture of flames coming
- 10 out the bow-side door -- you know, the door that leads to the bow.
- 11 A few times, I saw separate flames come out there.
- 12 | Q. And do you have your phone with you? Could you see what time
- 13 | that picture was taken?
- 14 A. Actually, that's a good call. Let me see. It feels so long
- 15 ago now. There we go, 4:16 a.m.
- 16 | Q. Okay, and then can you just hold it up for us to see real
- 17 | quick?
- 18 | A. Sure.
- 19 \mathbb{Q} . And then I'll just have you email me the picture as well.
- 20 | But yeah, if you could just hold it up so we can see what you're
- 21 | talking about?
- 22 | A. I don't know how well you can see it. I'm outside.
- 23 CWO : Okay, yeah.
- 24 | LT : Okay.
- 25 CWO : Yeah, if you'd be willing to share that photo with

us, that would be -- at some point, that would be helpful.

MR. LORING: Okay, yeah, just -- I'll email it to the same one I got the link from.

LT : Yes, that would be perfect. Well, Jeff, that kind of concludes my part of the interview. I'm going to turn it over to Mr. Heller, here, I know he has some follow-up questions he'd like to know.

BY SA HELLER:

- Q. Yeah, first of all, I mean, thanks for being alert and actually flagging somebody down on this. It could've been a worse outcome for those on board if you had not taken action, so we appreciate that, first of all. So, a couple of quick questions, so how long had you guys been in port before this happened? Were you there all day?
- A. We'd been in there probably most of the season. We were there a couple of months, that's kind of where we ported for the off season.
- 18 | Q. Okay.

- A. But I was only on board for about two or three weeks before all of this went down.
- 21 Q. Got it.
- | A. So, I'm not actually positive how long they were there.
- Q. Sure, makes sense. Okay, and when you were taking out the trash on the -- so, you had been -- remind me, what was your shift? You said 8:00 to midnight?

- A. It's midnight to noon.
- Q. Midnight to noon, okay. Had you been on the exterior of your vessel most of that time or were you inside?
- $4 \parallel A$. Inside most of the time.
- 5 | Q. Okay.

- 6 A. You know, we do rounds every out.
- 7 0. Sure.
- A. We kind of come outside and look, but there's not a whole lot outside and it could've happened before I saw it.
- 10 | Q. Yeah.
- 11 A. But yeah, it was about 3:30, 3:45 that was, you know,
- 12 outside -- in and out a lot more taking the trash out.
- 13 Q. Okay, the -- leading up to that for your shift, had you seen
- 14 | anything going on over there at the vessel? Any people coming and
- 15 going or anything that struck you as unusual?
- 16 A. I know they were doing some maintenance on the board -- on
- 17 | board a couple days prior. But apart from that, everything seemed
- 18 | normal.
- 19 Q. Okay, but that night, from midnight on, had you seen anyone
- 20 | around that ship or anything unusual on the pier?
- 21 A. Not that I can really remember.
- 22 | Q. Okay.
- 23 | A. You know, I didn't pay a whole lot of attention to it.
- 24 Q. Of course, yeah.
- 25 | A. But no, I mean, everything seemed normal.

- Q. Okay, in general, at that time of night on the pier there, I
 assume it's -- there's not a lot of foot traffic or much happening
 out there?
- 4 A. The security gate actually closes between -- I think it's 5 9:30 and 6:00 a.m.
- 6 | Q. Okay.
- 7 A. So, there's really nobody out there.
- Q. Got it, and when you walked up to the -- you know, to kind of go look closer and then eventually to go walk and find the security guard, did you encounter anybody else on the pier at that point?
- 12 A. Nope.
- 13 | Q. Okay.

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- 14 $\mid A$. It was just me and then the fire and the security guard.
- 15 Q. Got it, okay, and then when you said you saw the smoke, you

described it as, like, puffs. Was it, in fact, like, separate

- 17 puffs, or was it, like, one continuous thing of smoke?
- 18 A. It was one continuous, but -- it was definitely one

continuous, but there wasn't much of it.

Okay.

- 21 A. So, maybe, you know, the wind was kind of pretty heavy that
- 22 | night, so maybe that's where the puffs came from, they were
- 23 | blowing it in certain ways.
- Q. Okay, and was it in -- you said it was on the bow. I'm assuming it was in front of the pilot house?

A. Yes.

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- 2 Q. Okay, were you able to -- other than that, were you able to
- 3 see how far towards the bow or on what deck?
- 4 A. I can't really tell what deck. It seemed like it was coming
- 5 | from the bottom.
- 6 | Q. Okay.
- $7 \parallel A$. But rising up to the top. It's a little hard to tell.
- 8 Q. Sure.
- 9 A. But it was pretty -- far forward on the bow, you know, you've
- 10 got that door and then maybe, I don't know, 50 feet of bow and it
- 11 was somewhere on there.
- 12 Q. Okay, when you say that door, which door are you referring
- 13 | to?
- 14 | A. It's hard to -- I mean the -- just like on this vessel, you
- 15 know, the door that leads to that very front bow with all the
- 16 | lines and stuff.
- 17 Q. Got it.
- 18 A. It's on this picture, here.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. So, I can -- when I email it, you'll see better.
- $21 \parallel Q$. Okay, so on that picture, where you're seeing flames, is that
- 22 | where you were seeing smoke initially?
- 23 | A. Actually, I saw the smoke a little -- you know what, yeah,
- 24 pretty much.
- 25 | Q. Okay.

- 1 A. So, I guess not quite the bow. There's kind of a deck right
- 2 above the bow, it looks like, and that's where that door is, and
- 3 | that's where most of the smoke came from.
- $4 \parallel Q$. Got it, okay, and you said it was a lighter colored smoke,
- 5 | like white?
- $6 \mid A$. Yes.
- 7 \mathbb{Q} . But definitely not black?
- 8 A. Definitely not black.
- 9 \mathbb{Q} . And then you said it was sort of like a campfire smell? So,
- 10 | like, when you say that, you mean like a wood campfire, I assume?
- 11 | A. Yeah, and that's kind of what I would sound. I really -- I
- 12 didn't notice it until I walked up there and then, you know, I
- 13 was like that definitely sounds like kind of a campfire. I knew at
- 14 | that point that there was a fire.
- 15 \parallel Q. How close would you say you got to it when you were sort of
- 16 | checking it out? Were you right next to it on the pier?
- 17 A. When I ran to the security guard, I was pretty close.
- 18 | Q. Okay.
- 19 A. I would say probably a hundred feet from it.
- 20 \parallel Q. Okay, and so then you met with the security guard at the
- 21 | gate, you both drove back to -- in the golf cart and then you both
- 22 | made 911 calls, is that right?
- 23 | A. Yeah.
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 A. I'm pretty sure his was first and then I was like, you know,

- just in case, I'll do one too.
- Q. Okay.

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- $3 \parallel A$. But yeah.
- Q. Okay, and then what is your -- obviously, there was a lot going on and it's been a while since then, what is causing you to
- 6 estimate the time at about 3:45? Did you look at your watch, or
- 7 look at your clock?
- A. I called my mate at about 4:00 and, you know, between me finding it and then running to the security guard -- we also do rounds, you know, at the top of the hour and I hadn't quite done
- 11 mine yet, but I was getting ready to.
- 12 | Q. Okay.
- A. So, I'm going to say about 3:45 I saw it. But it is definitely an estimate.
- 15 0. Got it.
- 16 A. Between 3:30 and 4:00, for sure.
- 17 Q. Okay, would it surprise you if -- just to try to help you
- 18 orient in time, but the 911 calls were about 3:00 -- I think about
- 19 | 3:19.
- A. Was it really that much? Oh, so maybe it was 2:45 and I just
- 21 have my hour wrong. Let me see --
- 22 | Q. I guess more importantly, because we'll be able to see when
- 23 the 911 call was, how much time would you say elapsed between when
- 24 you first saw it and when you called 911?
- 25 | A. Not too long, I guess, 30 minutes, maybe, 20 minutes. Not

- too long. That'd be the max.
- 2 Q. Okay, about 20 minutes from when you first saw the smoke to
- 3 when you figure out and call 911?
- 4 | A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. Okay, do you still happen to have that 911 call in your call
- 6 log or has it been too long?
- 7 | A. I don't.
- 8 Q. Yeah, that's fine. We'll get it on the other end. Yeah,
- 9 | that's -- I'm not in any way criticizing you. It's been a while
- 10 and it's a lot to remember the timing. But it's important for us
- 11 | to know --
- 12 A. Yeah, I was so nervous.
- 13 Q. Yeah, so it's about -- but it's somewhere around 20 minutes
- 14 \parallel or so between you see the smoke and then eventually when you place
- 15 | your 911 call?
- 16 A. Yeah.
- 17 | Q. Okay, that's perfect. That's helpful for us, thank you.
- 18 | Then I just -- can we get -- I know we have your email, can we get
- 19 | a phone number for you?
- 20 | A. Yeah, it's (801) 833-2780.
- 21 SA HELLER: Perfect. That's all -- I think that's all I
- 22 | have.
- 23 Anything to add here, Nate?
- 24 SA PETRULAK: No, (indiscernible).
- 25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.

1 SA HELLER: Okay. 2 , do you have any follow-up questions. LT3 No, I don't. I don't have any follow-up CWO 4 questions. 5 LTOkay. Well, Jeff, yeah, like I said, we appreciate you 6 SA HELLER: 7 taking action that night. As you probably know, there were people 8 sleeping on board that weren't aware there was a fire, so thank 9 you for doing that and thank you for your time and the information 10 you helped provide us today. We've talked to a lot of people and 11 we're just trying to piece together what happened. So, thanks for 12 your help. 13 MR. LORING: All right, yeah, thank you. 14 All right, well the time is now 10:20. 15 going to conclude the interview. 16 (Whereupon, at 10:20 a.m., the interview was concluded.) 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25
