MS. COLLETTI: Okay. We're on the record for the David Guterres interview.

2.0

Good morning, today is February 9th, 2019. It is now 8:49 a.m. Pacific Time. My name is Alexandria Colletti, the investigator-in-charge for this accident for the National Transportation Safety Board in Washington, D.C.

We are at the Richmond Station Police Department Community
Room in San Francisco, California. This interview is being
conducted as part of the investigation into the Pacific Gas and
Electric gas release and fire that occurred on February 6th, 2019,
in San Francisco, California. The NTSB case number for this
accident is PLD19MR001.

This interview is being recorded and may be transcribed at a later date. A copy of the transcript will be provided to the interviewee, which is yourself, for review prior to being entered into the public docket.

You are permitted to have one person present during the interview. This is a person of your choice, it can be an attorney, it can be a supervisor, a friend, a family member or nobody at all.

David, please state for the record the spelling of your name, your job title and who you have selected to be present during this interview.

1 MR. GUTERRES: David Guterres, D-A-V-I-D, G-U-T-E-R-R-E-S, 2 I'm a GSR, gas service rep, for PG&E and I have --3 MS. JORDAN: Lise --4 MR. GUTERRES: -- the company, Lise --5 MS. JORDAN: -- Lise Jordan. 6 MR. GUTERRES: -- as representing me. Thank you. 7 MS. COLLETTI: Okay. Excellent, great. Now we're going to 8 go around the room and we're going to introduce everyone in the 9 room. As a reminder, folks, we've got to spell out our names. So 10 let's start with Nathan. 11 MS. SARINA: Nathan Sarina, N-A-T-H-A-N, S-A-R-I-N-A, I'm 12 with the CPUC. 13 Terence Eng, T-E-R-E-N-C-E, E-N-G, I am also with MR. ENG: 14 the California Public Utilities Commission. 15 MS. WEST: I'm Kim West, that's K-I-M, W-E-S-T, I'm a senior 16 accident investigator with PHMSA, Pipeline and Hazardous Materials 17 Safety Administration. 18 MR. COCHRANE: Michael Cochrane, M-I-C-H-A-E-L, C-O-C-H-R-A-19 N-E, assistant deputy chief, Homeland Security, San Francisco Fire 2.0 Department. 21 MS. COWSERT: Christine Cowsert, C-H-R-I-S-T-I-N-E, C-O-W-S-22 E-R-T, and I'm with Pacific Gas and Electric Company. 23 Kevin Souza, K-E-V-I-N, S-O-U-Z-A, with PG&E. MR. SOUZA: 24 MS. JORDAN: Lise Jordan, L-I-S-E, J-O-R-D-A-N, PG&E.

MS. COLLETTI:

INTERVIEW OF DAVID GUTERRES

2 BY MS. COLLETTI:

- 3 Q. So, David, just to get started, I'd like for you to talk to
- 4 | me about your work history, how long have you been with Pacific
- 5 | Gas and Electric, had you worked for other gas operators in the
- 6 past, just a little history on your background so we know your
- 7 qualifications?
- 8 A. I've been with the company it will be 38 years this year.
- 9 I've been a GSR, gas service rep, for -- since 1990 and, yeah, gas
- 10 service, yeah.
- 11 Q. You know, so just a few years, right, you just started? To
- 12 say 38 years, that's an accomplishment.
- 13 A. Yeah.
- 14 Q. Congratulations.
- 15 A. Yeah, thank you.
- 16 Q. So what I'd like to happen next is in as much detail as
- 17 possible I'd like for you to tell me what happened on February 6th
- 18 | from your -- from when you first received a call, being told to
- 19 arrive on the site, what you saw, what you heard, any kind of --
- 20 any observations that you can think of, there's no detail that's
- 21 too small.
- 22 A. Okay.
- 23 Q. And throughout the rest of the evening until you were
- 24 relieved so --
- 25 A. Well, I got the call around 1:00 something and it was an

explosion call so I responded and I think I got there within 15 minutes and I was on the west side of Geary, 3300 block. And I -- when I arrived I'm, okay, there's a big fire going on, a lot of fire trucks.

First thing I did was call the dispatcher and told them we need a crew and they said that they were already on their way.

And then I called my supervisor, who was filling in. It was a fill in supervisor, Felix Gonzales, and told him what was going on. And then my immediate supervisor called me too after that and then I told him what was going on, and then a lot of other calls came in.

The digging specialist called me, the gas control called me getting -- trying to get information. And basically I said, right now I've got to gather stuff and figure out what's going on at that point. There was just too much going on to try to get the information right away so I waited, you know, to see what was going on before I -- I couldn't do anything, I was just watching at that point.

And, at that point, I was getting the calls, giving information to -- they usually want to know who's -- if there was any injuries so -- but, at that -- it wasn't there, I mean, I couldn't figure that out yet until I got out of the truck. And I saw somebody walking by who was a lieutenant, a fire chief or something, and he said he wasn't sure. I asked.

At that point I just was standing by waiting for -- and

- 1 | shortly later I saw crews coming on my side. I didn't -- I
- 2 | couldn't see on the -- there's four, what, four sides. I was on
- 3 one side of the block, you know, I couldn't see if there was other
- 4 people on the other side so I just stood by at that point.
- 5 Q. And what happened after that once --
- 6 A. Oh.
- 7 Q. -- once you had supervisors on scene, what were you directed
- 8 to do from there?
- 9 A. I was just -- standby because there's nothing you can do if
- 10 it's -- you know, I mean, until that thing is -- the fire was out,
- 11 you know, you only can standby at that point, you know. And, I
- 12 mean, shortly later I was -- as we were standing by as they were,
- 13 you know, putting the water on that, I took several pictures and
- 14 sent it to the bosses and just stood by waiting.
- 15 And I noticed that -- I was looking for the crew that was
- 16 involved. I could not see from the other side what the name of
- 17 | the crew was and then I -- for some reason I saw them at Mel's
- 18 Diner sitting -- standing by there, so I -- we have to fill out a
- 19 gas station first responder form.
- 20 So I proceeded to go over there and ask them questions on
- 21 | their USAA ticket and contractor's license I.D. and, you know,
- 22 | we're supposed to fill it out and basically I couldn't fill it out
- 23 | completely until the gas station specialist Esther came and she
- 24 | gave -- filled it out, gave me the USAA numbers because the
- 25 | contractor did not have it or his license at that point, and I got

- 1 | all that information from the fill in part with Esther, the
- 2 digging specialist. And basically I asked him what happened and
- 3 he filled out the form, what he was doing.
- 4 And then after, when all said and done, I handed it over to
- 5 the foreman that was first onsite. That's what we're supposed to
- 6 do and they fill out the rest.
- 7 Q. And what did you do after that, were you relieved from the
- 8 scene to go back to regular duties or --
- 9 A. No, no, no, we're just -- I mean, it was a couple of hours, I
- 10 | believe, you know, and we just stood by. The supervisors were all
- 11 | there already so we wait and see what's going on. Actually I
- 12 stayed until -- when the fire was out we were told to start
- 13 shutting down services that were affected that's why I stood by.
- 14 Q. Okay.
- 15 A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. Okay. So essentially in the beginning you're waiting for
- 17 | instruction?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Your role is not part of the excavation teams --
- 20 A. No.
- 21 Q. -- or any of that? So you assisted with gaining initial
- 22 | information by speaking to the excavation crew?
- 23 A. Yes.
- 24 Q. And then you passed off that information --
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. -- once that was done, and then you essentially were waiting
- 2 | for instruction until you could shut down services?
- 3 A. Well, whatever services were affected we were instructed to
- 4 shut down the services at the meter locations.
- 5 Q. Okay. How did you receive the information on which services
- 6 were to be shut down?
- 7 A. From out supervisors, they had a list that were the area that
- 8 were affected.
- 9 Q. About when did you receive that information to start doing
- 10 that?
- 11 A. Well, probably maybe 5:00, 4:00; I can't really say. But I
- 12 was about -- I was actually headed there. I was the first one to
- 13 start doing it and then they told me I had to go to another --
- 14 | somebody 2 blocks down was smelling gas so I stopped and went back
- 15 | into my truck to get my tools to respond to somebody calling in a
- 16 | gas leak down on 65 Parker, which is 2 blocks down, there was a
- 17 passerby that said that he smelled gas.
- 18 So the customer at the residence did not -- they said they
- 19 didn't call it in. So I called the number that called it in and
- 20 | he said, oh, I was just a little concerned, so I did what I would
- 21 | normally do, just kind of sweep the area.
- 22 Q. Okay.
- 23 A. Yeah. And then I went back to whatever I had to do.
- 24 Q. And you didn't detect any gas at that location?
- 25 A. No, no, no. There was a lot of smoke. You could smell a

- 1 lot of smoke in that -- just that area, yeah.
- 2 Q. I'm sure you could smell it in the air.
- 3 A. Yeah, was, yeah.
- 4 Q. I imagine everyone smelled like gas --
- 5 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 6 Q. -- at the end of the evening.
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 Q. Okay. At the beginning you mentioned that you got a lot of
- 9 different calls from a lot of different folks?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. How did you coordinate that effort? Did you refer them back
- 12 to gas control or did you refer them to supervisors? Did you
- 13 provide them direct information?
- 14 A. At that point, I said I didn't get enough; I don't have
- 15 enough going on.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. When they first -- everybody calls at one time just pretty
- 18 much they want to know what's going on. I say, it's just still
- 19 blowing. I just kept relaying what was happening, you know.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. And I couldn't get enough information. I mean, there's
- 22 | nothing much more I could do other than the crews being there
- 23 trying to figure out what was going on, I mean.
- 24 Q. Okay. Once incident command had been fully setup, did you
- 25 have any kind of check-in or anything like that?

- 1 A. Yeah, yeah, that's when they got the list and, you know, for
- 2 us to do what we needed to do to shut down what was affected, the
- 3 | area that I was -- I got a list --
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. -- to go out and shut off all the services that were
- 6 affected.
- 7 Q. Okay, okay. As far as training for this kind of incident for
- 8 being the first person on scene, how did you know, for example,
- 9 that you needed to fill out the first responder form on scene, et
- 10 cetera?
- 11 A. That's what --
- 12 Q. What other training have you been given for incidents like
- 13 this?
- 14 A. Well, that's -- I mean, if I can control I can, right. It's
- 15 | blowing and we try to -- that's the first thing we were told is to
- 16 | call our dispatcher and get somebody out here as soon as possible,
- 17 | try to make the area safe. But that was too big so -- like all
- 18 the emergency personnel, police, were already there when I got
- 19 there, so they had pretty much, you know, kept it -- everybody
- 20 away from -- I actually went through the tape to -- closer to the
- 21 scene.
- 22 What we were trained to do, the first thing is to make sure
- 23 everything is safe and then fill out the forms and get information
- 24 as soon as I could but, you know, it was chaotic at that time so I
- 25 did it as accordingly to when things were a little bit not so

- 1 chaotic.
- 2 Q. Can you talk me through the conversation you had with the
- 3 | excavator while you were filling out that form, what specific
- 4 details did they give you, any impressions, as much detail as you
- 5 | can provide, please?
- 6 A. I just told them I have to -- I have this form I have to fill
- 7 | out, I'm the first responder and I just needed some information,
- 8 dates, that I put the dates, time. I asked them for the numbers,
- 9 their normal -- the company name, their numbers, license, USAA
- 10 numbers. He didn't have it. He only gave me the number and his
- 11 | company and what he was doing pretty much so at the time, yeah.
- 12 Q. And what exactly was he doing at the time, can you --
- 13 A. He said -- well, he wrote it down, so he was saying he was
- 14 shoveling and he was -- yeah, he was shoveling and it exploded.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. That's what he said.
- 17 Q. Interesting.
- 18 A. I mean, that's what he wrote, I'm sorry.
- 19 O. That's what he wrote?
- 20 A. Yes.
- MS. COLLETTI: I don't have any more at this time. Nathan,
- 22 do you have anything?
- 23 MR. SARINA: I guess in --
- MS. COLLETTI: Introduce yourself, yeah.
- 25 MR. SARINA: Sorry.

- 1 BY MR. SARINA:
- 2 Q. Nathan Sarina, CPUC. Just so -- so he gave you the phone
- 3 | number and his company name?
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. What number did he give you?
- 6 A. Just whatever the -- I mean, whatever. He wrote it down so
- 7 but pretty much. I don't recall it because I handed it off. If I
- 8 would have made a copy. I should have took a picture maybe but we
- 9 were just told just to hand it off to the foreman that was first
- 10 at the scene so one of the foremen had it so they fill out the
- 11 rest.
- 12 Q. Okay. During, and you mentioned the emergency -- your
- 13 emergency training --
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. -- for the making the area safe. Are you guys -- can you
- 16 recall if there's anything where you assist the fire department in
- 17 evacuation or anything else along that -- or along those lines or
- 18 aid the fire department?
- 19 A. If they weren't there or if they --
- 20 Q. If they are there --
- 21 A. Yeah.
- 22 Q. -- are you trained to assist them in helping clear any of the
- 23 nearby buildings?
- 24 A. Yeah. We were told if the fire department, if it's blowing
- and stuff, they already secured the area but we're the first

- 1 responders so we would ask for assistance from the fire department
- 2 | if we need to go back further or we would be considered incident
- 3 command at that point for our company and we would ask assistance
- 4 from the police and fire if we needed to have more space and make
- 5 | it safe, that's what we were trained to do to let them know to
- 6 help us out.
- 7 Q. And then how far or how far had the fire department already
- 8 pushed back people?
- 9 A. It was over -- I was a block away and it was probably 2
- 10 blocks from my side.
- 11 Q. Okay.
- 12 A. It was almost 2 blocks. I was in the first block and then
- 13 there was another barricade even further so --
- 14 Q. And then I think you said -- so you approached from the west
- 15 | side of Parker or --
- 16 A. Yeah, yeah, there's four sides, there's Parker, east, south
- 17 and north and west and east of Geary. It was right in the middle
- 18 of the intersection so --
- 19 Q. Okay. So, I guess, how did you -- or from what direction did
- 20 you approach?
- 21 A. I came from the west side standing and came up towards the --
- 22 | I was right across from Mel's Diner, 3300 block, in the middle of
- 23 that block, yeah.
- MR. SARINA: No more questions right now.
- 25 BY MS. WEST:

- 1 Q. Okay. Kim West, I just have a quick question. Kind of
- 2 following up on the training idea, do you have formalized training
- 3 | that you go through beyond what you're (inaudible)?
- 4 A. The, I mean, protocol was standard, what we need to get
- 5 assistance from the fire department and the police.
- 6 Q. I see.
- 7 A. You know, I mean, that's what we were told to do to try to
- 8 get -- work with the fire department and police department.
- 9 Q. I'll maybe put it a different way --
- 10 A. All right.
- 11 Q. -- your background in terms of training for emergency
- 12 response.
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. So what type of training do you get and how often?
- 15 A. Yeah. Yeah, we do it yearly, yes.
- 16 Q. Do it yearly?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. And does that involve interfacing with the fire
- 19 department or --
- 20 A. Yes, yes.
- 21 Q. -- other emergency services?
- 22 A. Yeah, yes.
- 23 Q. Okay. Just a clarification, you mentioned that you met with
- 24 | your foreman onsite.
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. Who was that?
- 2 A. That was -- everybody was out there, I mean, you know. The
- 3 | first person I saw was -- the supervisor was -- there were several
- 4 | supervisors. Our superintendent, which was Matt Ramirez, Wyman
- 5 | Cole, Joel Hart was just my immediate supervisor, yes.
- 6 Q. Okay.
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. And I was just going to go back a little bit talking about
- 9 you had received a gas odor call a little further up away from the
- 10 site.
- 11 A. Yes.
- 12 Q. And you called it in. Did you call it into their gas
- 13 dispatcher or --
- 14 A. Not a dispatcher. Somebody, somebody called --
- 15 Q. Called it into you?
- 16 A. Yeah, my boss told me to go up before I was doing the other
- 17 part so I responded to that one too.
- 18 Q. Okay.
- 19 A. Yeah. It was 2 blocks down but it -- there was nothing. He
- 20 was just walking by, he was concerned so --
- MS. WEST: Thank you. That's all I have.
- MR. GUTERRES: Okay.
- BY MR. COCHRANE:
- 24 Q. Mike Cochrane, San Francisco Fire. Good morning, sir.
- 25 A. Sir.

- 1 Q. I guess my only question is if you're there that quickly, is
- 2 | there a protocol for you to go to the command post and say I'm
- 3 | from PG&E and I've notified until you're relieved or did you feel
- 4 | it was unsafe to go up and tell the fire department I'm from PG&E,
- 5 I'm here, everybody's coming?
- 6 A. I would, I --
- 7 Q. I'm just wondering if that's in place or if it's unsafe? I'm
- 8 not sure that's right.
- 9 A. I didn't even know which part because there was four sites to
- 10 it. So, I mean, I saw the guy with the white hat which is -- it
- 11 | wasn't the chief but I asked him. And he said -- first thing I
- 12 asked him was there injuries and he said that he wasn't sure.
- So I -- with all the phone calls coming in, I didn't even
- 14 know where the command post was for --
- 15 Q. That's good. The person in the white hat is good. That's
- 16 the chief. I just wondered if you -- if there's a first step for
- 17 you? Okay.
- 18 A. Yeah, I mean, normally in a case like that I would look.
- 19 This incident was all sides so I didn't really -- at that point, I
- 20 did not go directly to where the incident command was at that
- 21 point. No, no, I didn't.
- MR. COCHRANE: Okay.
- BY MR. SOUZA:
- 24 Q. Kevin Souza, PG&E. Good morning.
- 25 A. Good morning.

- 1 Q. Just to follow up, I have a question from the last -- for
- 2 clarification. Was it unclear to you where Fire IC was set up due
- 3 to the amount of fire personnel --
- 4 A. Yeah.
- 5 Q. -- spread out around the fire?
- 6 A. Yes.
- 7 Q. A lot of fire fighters?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. A lot of different color helmets?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. Right, so --
- 12 A. Shortly after the crews were coming in from all sides, it was
- 13 four sides. I didn't even realize it was all four sides, you
- 14 know.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. I was only on one side, so until I actually, you know,
- 17 started to go, I said, oh, shoot, over there, over there, what,
- 18 all four sides.
- 19 0. Just because of the size of the incident?
- 20 A. Yeah, yes.
- 21 Q. Okay. Thank you. And just last question, do you feel that
- 22 you were supported from PG&E from your supervisors, from
- 23 management, from --
- 24 A. Yes, with the calls, yeah, they were calling in and that was
- 25 kind of hectic because I had no answers at that point. I say,

- 1 | it's burning. I mean, the fire department was doing what they do,
- 2 police was doing what they were doing, you know, and it seemed
- 3 | like as long as it's, you know, not contained but, you know,
- 4 they're doing to try to keep it from going further so, you know.
- 5 MR. SOUZA: Yeah. I have no other questions.
- 6 BY MS. COLLETTI:
- 7 Q. This is Alex Colletti again, just a couple of follow-up
- 8 questions. Do you know the name of the foreman that you passed
- 9 along that first responder form to?
- 10 A. No, they have so many new faces there but I can -- he's a
- 11 | husky guy. I know -- I asked -- I went to one of the other -- it
- 12 was different foremen so I handed it to him and he said, no, no,
- 13 no. He was the first one here so I went to two different foremen.
- And I don't even -- the foreman I know but he's not worked.
- 15 | I think he was injured or something but is José but he wasn't even
- 16 there. But I handed it to the other quy, which is a huskier quy.
- 17 I wish I knew his name but I don't.
- 18 Q. That's okay. That's all right, that's all right. I'd rather
- 19 you not quess.
- 20 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 21 Q. Thank you. Going back to when you were at the scene, did you
- 22 | feel like you had clear instruction on what you were supposed to
- 23 be doing at that time, that you were supposed to be on standby
- 24 or --
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. -- did you feel that you were not sure what to do?
- 2 A. At that point, it was -- I mean, everybody had kind of came
- 3 right after me so, I mean, I was on standby, yes, because there's
- 4 nothing you can do, you know, when something -- I mean, I got the
- 5 calls, I made the calls.
- And as far as trying to -- everybody's doing their thing, you
- 7 know, if I start trying to get information and I'd just be in the
- 8 way. But at that point I was just on standby, yes.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. And getting calls, you know, and trying to -- there wasn't
- 11 | much I could do but other than try to do what I was told --
- 12 trained to do as far as getting information and let them do their
- 13 thing, the fire department and stuff like that.
- 14 Q. Okay. So essentially your qualifications didn't allow you to
- 15 provide more support, is that --
- 16 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 17 Q. Okay, okay, great. Going back to training a little bit, we
- 18 talked about annual training that you had mentioned yearly.
- 19 A. Yeah.
- 20 O. What does that look like, who runs that, who all's involved?
- 21 A. It's pretty much a web-based training --
- 22 Q. Okay.
- 23 A. -- that you have to go through and answer questions to the,
- 24 to the training, yes.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- 1 A. Yes.
- MS. COLLETTI: Okay. That's all I have.
- 3 BY MR. SARINA:
- 4 Q. Nathan Sarina with the CPUC. Going back to a little bit
- 5 before the emergency or -- and the events leading up to the
- 6 emergency, so what did your day originally look like prior to the
- 7 emergency?
- 8 A. Maintenance, a lot of maintenance work. Oh, you mean, what I
- 9 was doing before the emergency call?
- 10 Q. Correct. What were you doing before the emergency call, yes?
- 11 A. Yeah, I was doing maintenance work, what they call AC
- 12 inspections, meter maintenance, corrosion inspections and between
- 13 that and service calls and response calls we have a full day of
- 14 work.
- 15 Q. Okay. Then, I guess, just as a point of clarification, when
- 16 | you arrived at the scene were you -- and you were -- you know that
- 17 | you're supposed to fill out the forms and try to get the
- 18 | contractor's information or anything else?
- 19 A. Uh-huh.
- 20 Q. Did any of the dispatchers or supervisors you contacted
- 21 instruct you to do anything outside of that besides that form?
- 22 A. No.
- 23 Q. And then --
- 24 A. Not until later.
- 25 Q. Not until -- for the --

1 Α. Yes. 2 So, I guess, the only instruction then was the odor call that 3 you later -- or, I mean, how much or what were you instructed to 4 do later or what was it? The gas leak odor call, yes. 5 6 Okay. Yes, the odor. And then during the emergency response 7 at what point were you released? 8 Until we started -- after -- we were told to shut down the 9 affected areas, the meters up to the valves and whoever was home, 10 you know, just to get into all the units and shut them down, the 11 ones that were affected. And then I -- at that -- it was probably 12 about 9-something when I was relieved, yeah. 13 MR. SARINA: 9-something, okay. No further questions. 14 MS. WEST: Kim West, no further questions. 15 MR. COCHRANE: Mike Cochrane, no further questions. 16 MR. SOUZA: Kevin Souza, no further questions. 17 MS. COLLETTI: In that case, this concludes our interview and we're off the record. 18 19 (Whereupon, the interview was concluded.) 2.0 21 22
