3 MS. GUNARATNAM: Good afternoon. My name -- or good morning.  
4 My name is Rachael Gunaratnam. I'm a hazmat investigator with the  
5 National Transportation Safety Board out of Washington, D.C.

6 Today is June 30, 2021, and the time is 11:19 a.m. Central  
7 Daylight Time. We are currently at the Collin County Sheriff's  
8 Office in McKinney, Texas, and we are here in response to the  
9 natural gas incident that occurred on June 28, 2021 in  
10 Farmersville, Texas. And today we are interviewing --

11 MS. GWYN: Christina Gwyn.

12 MS. GUNARATNAM: And can you spell that for the transcriber?

13 MS. GWYN: Christina, C-H-R-I-S-T-I-N-A, Gwyn, G-W-Y-N.

14 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay. And you're free to have a  
15 representative to consult with during the interview. Is there  
16 anyone you want with you at this time?

17 MS. GWYN: I don't think so.

18 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay. Just so you know, the purpose of this  
19 investigation is to improve safety, as I was saying to you  
20 earlier, not to assign fault or blame or liability. Our sole  
21 mission is to improve safety and prevent accidents, but I should  
22 tell you that we cannot offer any -- a guarantee of any  
23 confidentiality or immunity from any legal proceedings and such,  
24 and this transcript will be posted on our public docket.

25 MS. GWYN: Okay.

1 MS. GUNARATNAM: And you'll get a copy of it. If there's any  
2 issues with it, you get to review it before it gets posted.

3 MS. GWYN: Okay.

4 MS. GUNARATNAM: Yeah. Any questions? Okay.

5 MS. GWYN: Not so far.

6 MS. GUNARATNAM: Great. So, we'll go around quickly. We  
7 have also in the room --

8 MR. SMITH: Greg Smith with Atmos Energy. I am director of  
9 system integrity & compliance.

10 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay. Great. Thank you.

11 INTERVIEW OF CHRISTINA GWYN

12 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

13 Q. Okay. So just starting off, can you tell me a little bit  
14 about yourself. First start off with your title and your  
15 professional background.

16 A. I am the criminalist for the Collin County Sheriff's Office,  
17 and I've been in this position almost 3 years. And I have my  
18 bachelor's and master's in anthropology, emphasis on forensics.

19 Q. Did you do anything before this position?

20 A. No. Well, I worked in records and warrants for a year, but  
21 not crime scene related.

22 Q. Okay. And before that was school?

23 A. Um-hum.

24 Q. So you said you were here for 3 years. What kind of training  
25 did you get for this position?

1 A. I've been to a variety of classes. I've been to shooting  
2 reconstruction training, death scene investigation training,  
3 latent print analysis, which isn't exactly applicable to this  
4 scene specifically. But then I was also in sort of an in-house  
5 training for approximately 2 years where I was on scene always  
6 with another crime scene investigator.

7 Q. Okay. Did any of that involve natural gas training?

8 A. No.

9 Q. Okay. Thank you. So let's go back to when you arrived to  
10 the accident on June 28th. Tell me about your day, what -- you  
11 know, when did your shift start and --

12 A. It started at 7:30. I got here between -- to the office  
13 between 7:30 and 8. I was doing my normal sort of Monday catch  
14 up, check emails routine. I had a -- I got called out in the  
15 morning, I think around 10ish, to an unattended death scene.  
16 Finished that up around 2, I believe. Got back to the office, and  
17 then was handling the evidence from that scene and getting  
18 everything processed and put away when the call came out about  
19 this incident.

20 Q. And what time was that?

21 A. I want to say like 3:30ish. I believe I left the office  
22 around 4.

23 Q. Okay. And you arrived on the scene what time?

24 A. Probably 4:30. I believe it takes about 30 minutes to get  
25 out there.

1 Q. Okay. And, all right, so walk me through what you -- when  
2 you first came, who you interacted with first.

3 A. When I first got there, I saw -- our CID investigators are  
4 CID Sergeant Reim, and then Investigators Brandon Polk, Matthew  
5 Polk and Investigator Duncan, as well, were out there. And I just  
6 walked up to them and asked them sort of what the situation was.  
7 I had heard -- I read little bit on the call notes, kind of got an  
8 understanding that we did have two fatalities. And then we walked  
9 back to the area behind the fence, where they were back there.  
10 They were covered in -- covered with sheets because there was  
11 media present. So I didn't see the actual victims for quite some  
12 time, just because we didn't want to uncover them while the  
13 helicopters were flying around.

14 Q. Right. So when you talked to basically your -- you talked to  
15 your team first before coming in.

16 A. Um-hum.

17 Q. And what did they tell you?

18 A. Just that it had been -- at the time they believed or they  
19 had been told two fatalities. They had been -- these individuals  
20 had been cleaning the gas line or the gas pipe and a spark  
21 happened or a little explosion happened. The fire marshal was  
22 there as well. He was one of the first on scene. He told me that  
23 two had been transported; one who had been up and walking around  
24 and then one who was, they believed, in pretty critical condition  
25 who had been transported immediately. So my team was focused on

1 figuring out the identities and the next of kin and phone numbers  
2 and everything for those guys, as well as the two who were  
3 deceased.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. So as soon as they told me that, I started taking my overall  
6 photos, got my camera and started taking photos.

7 Q. Yeah, walk me through that part. So you take photos.

8 A. Um-hum.

9 Q. That's the first thing you want to -- that's what you're  
10 doing or taking notes?

11 A. Photos.

12 Q. Photos? Yeah. So --

13 A. That's the first thing.

14 Q. Yeah, walk me through what you saw through the lens, like  
15 what you started taking pictures of.

16 A. So I started taking photos from outside the fence, and then  
17 my approach, my walk up to the fence. And then once I got to the  
18 area where most of the, I guess, debris and victims were, taking,  
19 you know, 360 degrees, photos of every angle. Again, I didn't  
20 lift the sheets on the victims since there was a potential that  
21 the cameras could catch them, and just tried to capture every  
22 piece, every angle of the scene that we had there.

23 Q. And can you tell me what -- describe what you saw of the  
24 inside?

25 A. Inside, so the fire marshal who had been there previously, he



1 had already put out some numbered markers marking the areas where  
2 the victims were, the area where the critically injured victim  
3 happened, some pieces of evidence that he thought was important,  
4 like hardhats and such. And the -- I guess they call it a pig,  
5 the orange thing, and then the metal pipe that was I'm assuming at  
6 one point attached to the pig. I'm not really sure how all of  
7 those pieces were together and fit in, so --

8 Q. Okay. And where was the -- what's it called -- the  
9 excavator?

10 A. It was -- so where the white pipe was that I guess the pig  
11 was in, it was to the right of it sort of away near the corner of  
12 the fence.

13 Q. And when you looked -- when you were taking pictures of the  
14 pipe, what did you observe?

15 A. The door was -- or the hatch was closed on it. It had  
16 apparently been open when they arrived but someone had closed it.  
17 I didn't go over there and open it just because I don't know what  
18 all that is. It looked -- it had the, like a green pipe attached  
19 to it that was connected to the flame device or the fire device,  
20 but that was off. Everything seemed to have been pretty shut  
21 down.

22 Q. Did you notice any fire damage or anything?

23 A. Uh-uh. Not really. The pig looked -- I mean, it may have  
24 been dirt, it may have been char. It looked like it was maybe  
25 cracked a little bit. But nothing to make me think that there was

1 like a big fiery explosion or anything like that.

2 Q. So you took close-up pictures of the pig?

3 A. Um-hum.

4 Q. Yeah. What did you see on the pig?

5 A. It looked cracked. It looked dirty. It was -- I guess it  
6 was 180 degrees from like the direction it should have been. Or  
7 like the part that goes in the pipe was facing the opposite  
8 direction.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. It was quite a ways away from the pipe and it wasn't  
11 connected to that metal rod I guess that I'm assuming it connects  
12 to. I don't know.

13 Q. Okay. And what else -- anything else you took pictures of in  
14 that area?

15 A. Everything. There were two hardhats that seemed to have  
16 been -- like the black piece that kind of fits around your head  
17 was detached from the actual hat. There was some brain matter and  
18 skull fragments as well on the ground. Let me think what else.  
19 It's been a crazy few days.

20 Q. Yeah.

21 A. We've had a lot happen. Let's see. There was a fire  
22 extinguisher on the ground. I don't know if there had been a  
23 small fire that was still burning or if it was just one sort of  
24 incident where when the explosion happened. But there was a fire  
25 extinguisher sort of close to the white pipe.

- 1 Q. Okay.
- 2 A. Yeah.
- 3 Q. Did you smell anything?
- 4 A. Gas.
- 5 Q. You did smell gas?
- 6 A. Yeah. It did smell like gas. You would get whiffs of it
- 7 pretty constantly. They told us that was normal and that it was
- 8 safe to be in there, so I trusted them.
- 9 Q. Who's they?
- 10 A. I believe the Atmos guys who were on scene. I'm not 100
- 11 percent sure.
- 12 Q. Okay. And did you interact -- okay, so how long did that
- 13 take you to take the photos?
- 14 A. The photographs?
- 15 Q. Yeah.
- 16 A. Maybe 10 minutes.
- 17 Q. Okay. So after you did that, what happened after that?
- 18 A. Our sheriff was -- he was in contact with the FBI and their
- 19 teams. So we were kind of in a waiting game, because we also
- 20 didn't know if it was going to be our scene or if it was going to
- 21 be the fire marshal or if it was going to be like the Railroad
- 22 Commission -- it was going back and forth through a bunch of
- 23 hands. So I took my photos and then we kind of backed off until
- 24 they found out who actually was going to take over.
- 25 Q. Oh, okay. And how long did that conversation --

1 A. It took a while, maybe 30 minutes. And then it started  
2 raining, and so we were just kind of in a waiting period  
3 because -- I think eventually it was decided that it was going to  
4 be ours, at least the deceased individuals part of it. And so  
5 Sergeant Reim was aware -- we were all aware that a storm was  
6 coming, and he had us do some more close-up photos because since  
7 the storm was coming, the helicopters had gone away. So I went in  
8 and did some close-up photos of the victims, took the sheets off,  
9 just so that I could document exactly where they were and the  
10 condition that they were in before it poured down rain. So I did  
11 that, and we put tarps over the bodies to preserve their location  
12 for the ME field agent to get her photographs as well. And then  
13 it was just -- it poured down rain, so we all kind of went back  
14 and sat in our cars and --

15 Q. And do you send your photos to ME or they just take their  
16 own?

17 A. They take their own.

18 Q. Okay. And -- okay, so after you took photos of the victims,  
19 what happened? You put the tarp over them --

20 A. Um-hum.

21 Q. -- and then?

22 A. So once the rain finished, I got out and I started taking  
23 measurements of the locations of the victims, of the items around  
24 the victims. There was like an umbrella stand, like standing  
25 umbrella, and where the pig was and where the bobcat was and where

1 all the pieces were, just so that if I needed to --

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. -- if we needed to put them back in, we could tell exactly  
4 where they were.

5 Q. Can you tell me how far -- can you tell me those  
6 measurements?

7 A. I don't know them offhand. I have them downstairs.

8 Q. Okay. And that'll be in your report?

9 A. Um-hum.

10 Q. Yeah.

11 A. Well, it will be scanned into our incident -- my rough  
12 sketch.

13 Q. Okay. I mean, could you tell me roughly like how far away  
14 the bodies were from the pipe?

15 A. It would be a total guess.

16 Q. All right. Don't worry about it then. Yeah.

17 Okay. And you took measurements from the bodies to the  
18 pipeline and the umbrella and the equipment?

19 A. So my like standards, I was going from the fence here to the  
20 bodies and then from the fence here too. So I was doing two  
21 measurements to everything. So, to the bobcat, to the pieces of  
22 the hardhats, to the pig, to the pipe that was in the middle, and  
23 then to the victims as well.

24 Q. Oh, okay. And that's just for the purpose of documenting the  
25 scene of what it was?

1 A. Um-hum.

2 Q. Okay. Did any of that play a role in the investigation  
3 findings?

4 A. I just -- I take the measurements and I hand them over to the  
5 investigators. So it's kind of up to them if they're going to --

6 Q. Okay, okay.

7 A. -- what they do with them.

8 Q. So you're just documenting the --

9 A. Yeah. So I just document the scene.

10 Q. Okay. And so then, after you did the measurements, what did  
11 you do?

12 A. After I do the measurements, they wanted me to come back to  
13 the office to get our FARO scanner, our 3D scanner. So I left and  
14 came back to the office to grab that. I came back to the scene.  
15 We didn't actually get any 3D scans. Once I got the FARO out, it  
16 immediately fogged up, because it's a laser and prisms and --

17 Q. Right.

18 A. -- the mirrors fogged up. And so it was unfortunate that we  
19 didn't do that, but --

20 MR. SMITH: What does a FARO scanner do?

21 MS. GWYN: It's just a 3D scanner. So it'll create a 3D  
22 rendering of the scene. It just scans everything and -- so  
23 usually you'll take a couple and it will piece the scans together  
24 so you can have a 3D --

25 MS. GUNARATNAM: Visual of --

1 MS. GWYN: -- visual of your scene.

2 MR. SMITH: And then you can take measurements  
3 electronically?

4 MS. GWYN: Um-hum. You can. If you have a measuring tape or  
5 something in the scan, you can tell it this is 1 inch so it'll  
6 scale everything. But we weren't able to do that.

7 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

8 Q. You weren't able to do it. Okay.

9 A. Yeah. Because it was really, really humid and muggy outside,  
10 so --

11 Q. Yeah. Okay. So after that, what happened?

12 A. After that, so when I got back the ME field agent had  
13 arrived, so she was taking her overall photos. We tried to do the  
14 FARO scan and it didn't work. And then she started her thing,  
15 moving the bodies. And we were able to move them, take photos of  
16 the back of them, the other sides. Because originally the one  
17 victim, I knew he had head trauma but we couldn't see it because I  
18 believe they tried to pack it with a rag. So she was able to move  
19 that and took more detailed photos of their injuries. And then  
20 they were loaded up by the transport to go back to the medical  
21 examiner's office.

22 Q. Okay. And then after that?

23 A. After that, cleared the scene.

24 Q. Okay. And what time was that?

25 A. Around 9.

1 Q. Okay. So you stayed until you handed it over to Atmos.

2 Okay. Did you see anyone doing any monitoring, gas monitoring or  
3 anything?

4 A. I did not pay attention to that, no. So I don't know.

5 Q. Did you -- other than your own team, did you talk to anyone  
6 else, like other responding agencies or Atmos or --

7 A. I didn't speak to any Atmos. I spoke to one of the troopers  
8 and the fire marshal who was on scene.

9 Q. And what did the trooper tell you?

10 A. My interaction with him was more in reference to the fact  
11 that my car overheated on me.

12 Q. Oh. Okay.

13 A. So he was helping me fix that.

14 Q. Oh, okay. And the fire marshal?

15 A. He -- I believe he was one of the first on scene, at least as  
16 far as investigators go. So he was kind of relaying information  
17 to me of who the victims were and that sort of thing, which ones  
18 had been transported. Because I contacted the other crime scene  
19 investigator and he went to the hospital, I believe, to take  
20 photos of the two surviving victims. So I was kind of gathering  
21 information about those two and relaying that to him.

22 Q. Okay. All right.

23 MR. SMITH: So there are pictures of the injured personnel  
24 that went to the hospital?

25 MS. GWYN: I'm not sure if he actually got pictures. I could



1 check. It's just that I haven't had a chance to really talk to  
2 him yet.

3 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

4 Q. Yeah. So you go -- do they go to the hospital to just find  
5 their names?

6 A. We had their names by the time -- I believe by the time he  
7 got to the hospital.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. But yes. But one of them was unidentified. We didn't know  
10 what his name was, so he was -- if we hadn't -- if they hadn't  
11 found it out, he would have been trying to get that information as  
12 well.

13 Q. Did they interview them, the injured?

14 A. I don't believe so.

15 Q. Okay. And -- yeah, I guess --

16 MS. GUNARATNAM: Do you have any questions?

17 BY MR. SMITH:

18 Q. You mentioned the rag.

19 A. Um-hum.

20 Q. Was there any other evidence that you saw of first aid that  
21 had been rendered to the ones that were injured or the victims?

22 It's not out there now. On site there's no evidence of any --

23 A. Right.

24 Q. -- first aid materials. Did you --

25 A. No. I don't think they had any first aid. If they did,

1 there wasn't any like, trash or anything from --

2 Q. That you noticed?

3 A. No. On the two that were there, it was just the rag on the  
4 one.

5 Q. Okay. Did you notice any equipment running while you were  
6 there? The backhoe, the vehicles?

7 A. No. Everything was powered off by the time I got there.

8 Q. You mentioned the flare was off to the side, the green pipe  
9 that was the flare --

10 A. Oh. Yes.

11 Q. Did you notice it operating?

12 A. It wasn't operating, no. It was off when I got there.

13 Q. And then what -- I'm sorry. What time did you arrive, do you  
14 think?

15 A. I believe it would have been about 4:30. I can check my call  
16 log, but --

17 Q. Were you there as long as the sergeant was --

18 A. Um-hum.

19 Q. -- up till 9:30?

20 A. I left a little bit before he did, but -- yeah, I was one of  
21 the last ones there.

22 Q. So the scene had already been turned back over to Atmos when  
23 you left?

24 A. He was -- yeah, my sergeant was talking to the Atmos guy, so  
25 I'm assuming that's what was going on when I was leaving.

1 MR. SMITH: That's all I have.

2 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay.

3 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

4 Q. Is there anything else you want -- any interesting  
5 observations you noticed when you were on scene that you want to  
6 let us know?

7 A. What -- I mean, what specifically would you be looking for?  
8 Like, their injuries or --

9 Q. When you saw the bodies, were they facing face down or were  
10 they on their back?

11 A. One -- the one who was more severely injured was face down  
12 with his head sort of turned, and then the one who was less  
13 injured was sort of on his side.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. And I believe he -- the one on his chest, face down was -- I  
16 believe he got the brunt of it because his injuries were much more  
17 severe than the second guy. I think he may have --

18 Q. Were they facing the pipe?

19 A. Their heads were towards the pipe.

20 Q. Pipe. Oh, okay.

21 A. Um-hum. And feet towards the bobcat.

22 Q. Oh, okay. All right. Thank you. I'm just trying to think  
23 if there's anything else.

24 It did rain, right?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. How long did it rain for?

2 A. It was off and on. The biggest downpour was maybe 15, 20  
3 minutes, and then it was raining off and on after that.

4 Q. And have you ever been -- seen a scene like this, an accident  
5 like this before?

6 A. Not specifically involving gas. We did have a scene where I  
7 believe they were replacing like, a sewer pipe or a big sewer  
8 thing and it fell on a worker. So I have been -- that was the  
9 only other sort of workplace accident that we've had before.

10 Q. Yeah. But not involving natural gas?

11 A. But -- no, it was not involving gas, not involving an  
12 explosion of any kind.

13 Q. Okay. Okay.

14 BY MR. SMITH:

15 Q. Sergeant Reim mentioned one of the victims was covered in  
16 mud, it appeared his face was covered in mud. Does that --

17 A. I thought it was blood.

18 Q. Okay.

19 A. I thought his face was pretty bloody. It may have been a  
20 mixture of blood and mud. He was laying -- one side of his face  
21 was on the ground, and then it rained, so --

22 Q. Okay. So that's -- you thought it was from the ground he  
23 fell to?

24 A. I think so.

25 Q. I took the sergeant's comment meaning something sprayed him,

1 but I wasn't sure.

2 A. I mean, I really -- I can't say for sure.

3 Q. Okay.

4 A. I would think that it was maybe from the -- probably from the  
5 ground where they were, where they were thrown and landed, but I  
6 can't be sure.

7 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

8 Q. Yeah. And you said their feet was towards the bobcat?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Okay. Where was the equipment when you arrived on scene?

11 A. So the bobcat was the furthest away from the pipe. It was  
12 kind of backed up almost in the corner of the fence. And then the  
13 two bodies were in front of it and there was a metal -- the metal  
14 rod or metal pipe that I'm assuming is attached -- supposed to be  
15 attached to the pig, I don't know, was in between them. And then  
16 the pig was on the side, on the far side closest to the fence next  
17 to the victim who was the most severely injured.

18 Q. Okay. Was there any like biological matter from the fatal --  
19 on any of the equipment that you were taking pictures of?

20 A. It didn't look like it. I would assume -- I didn't really --  
21 I didn't move the pig. I would assume there was probably some  
22 blood, might have been some blood on it. I'm not sure. Just  
23 with -- if it hit one of them, it may have been too fast of an  
24 impact to get any on there. There was kind of trailing from the  
25 victim's head some skull fragments, and then a piece of brain

1 matter was on the ground, but it wasn't on the pipe or the rod  
2 that was in between them.

3 Q. Okay. So nothing on the pig or the metal rod that you  
4 observed?

5 A. Not that I noticed, no.

6 Q. Okay. But you took -- how close of a photo did you take?  
7 Like were you very close to the guy?

8 A. Yeah. Yeah, yeah.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. There was like a screw -- not a screw, but like a bigger --  
11 bigger than a screw, but it had the --

12 MR. SMITH: Threads.

13 MS. GWYN: Threads on it. It was broken off next to this  
14 victim's head, that I'm assuming came off of some of the  
15 equipment. It had blood on it.

16 MR. SMITH: Sort of like a bolt?

17 MS. GWYN: Yes. Like a bolt. It didn't -- I'm assuming it  
18 came off of the pig, but some of those bolts looked a lot bigger  
19 than that one. But it did have blood on it and it was right by  
20 the victim who was most severely injured.

21 MS. GUNARATNAM: Oh, okay.

22 MS. GWYN: Right by his head, and by the -- which was right  
23 next to the pig.

24 BY MS. GUNARATNAM

25 Q. Okay. And no one told you where that bolt was associated?

1 What piece of equipment it was associated with?

2 A. Uh-uh.

3 Q. Does anyone from your team identify that?

4 A. The bolt?

5 Q. Yeah. Like do they look and figure out how these people may  
6 have died?

7 A. I'm not sure --

8 Q. Oh, okay.

9 A. -- if they would look at that.

10 Q. Okay. You have pictures of that, right?

11 A. Yes. Um-hum.

12 Q. Okay. Great. I will probably request those photos. I don't  
13 need exactly the victims, the close-ups of the victims, but any of  
14 the equipment. It's okay if they're covered, but I don't -- but,  
15 anyway, I'll ask obviously those guys there. But those are the  
16 things I'll be requesting, anything equipment related.

17 A. Okay.

18 Q. Yeah. I don't need face-on shots of the victims.

19 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay. That's it for me.

20 Do you have anything else?

21 MR. SMITH: No.

22 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

23 Q. Okay. So you left the scene, you didn't talk to anyone else,  
24 that's it? Okay. And then you came back to the office?

25 A. I had to go to the service center to swap out cars because

1 mine --

2 Q. Right. Overheated.

3 A. -- overheated and they wanted to look at it in the morning.

4 So --

5 Q. Okay. And are you part of processing the report or you just  
6 hand over your stuff?

7 A. Well, I will be writing sort of like a report just detailing  
8 basically what I told you, what I did when I arrived, all of that.  
9 I haven't had a chance to yet.

10 Q. Yeah.

11 A. But I will, and I'll scan in my measurements. Usually if  
12 it's going to be like -- if it were like a criminal case for us, I  
13 can put my measurements onto photos. I don't know if you all  
14 would be interested in that.

15 Q. Yeah.

16 A. But I can do that. We got some -- I believe the Wylie Fire  
17 Department, they have a drone, so they took some overhead drone  
18 shots that we have as well.

19 Q. Okay. Great. Yeah, we're definitely interested in that.  
20 Sure.

21 A. Okay.
