MS. GUNARATNAM: Good morning, my name is Rachel Gunaratnam, and I am a hazmat investigator with the National Transportation Safety Board out of Washington, D.C.

Today is June 30th, 2021, and the time is 9:15 a.m., Central Daylight Time. We are currently at the Collin County Sherriff's Office in McKinney, Texas, and we are here in response to the natural gas incident that occurred on June 28th, 2021, in Farmersville, Texas. And today we are interviewing --

SGT REIM: Jay Reim.

MS. GUNARATNAM: Jay Reim, do you mind if I call you Jay?

SGT REIM: That's fine.

MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay, great. And you're free to have a representative to consult with during the interview, is there anyone you wanted before we begin?

SGT REIM: No.

MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay. Just so you know, the NTSB investigation, we're not here to assign blame or anything like that, we're just here to get your testimony, we're here to figure out, for safety purposes, what happened. So -- and just so you know, for the purpose -- our purposes are to improve safety, not to assign fault, and the NTSB cannot offer any guarantee of confidentiality or immunity from any legal proceedings by other agencies, local, state, or federal. And, as I said before, a

transcript of this interview will be place in the public docket for this investigation, which will be available to you. So, why don't we go ahead and start the interview.

MS. GUNARATNAM: If you could just start off with telling us about yourself? Also, can you spell your name for the transcriber, and your title?

SGT REIM: Sure, I'm Sergeant Jay, J-A-Y, Reim, R-E-I-M, and I am a sergeant with the Collin County Sherriff's Office. I serve as the sergeant of the Criminal Investigations Division.

INTERVIEW OF JAY REIM

BY MS. GUNARATNAM:

- \mathbb{Q} . Okay. R-E-I-M, right?
- 13 A. Correct.

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- Q. Okay, and how many years -- could you give us a -- just
- 15 | background on who you are professionally?
- 16 A. Okay. So, I've been a peace officer for over 27 years, I've
- 17 been with the Sherriff's Office for almost three years. I've
- 18 | spent -- my earlier career I spent 20-and-a-half years at the
- 19 | Frisco Police Department, and I worked at the Richmond Police
- 20 | Department, and Farmers Branch Police Department prior to that.
- 21 0. What were the titles? Was it all peace officer?
- 22 A. Yeah. I was a sergeant in Frisco for 16 years.
- 23 | Q. Okay.
- 24 | A. And then I was an officer everywhere else.
- 25 | Q. Okay.

- A. And then I retired from Frisco Police Department and then came here; I want to say next month will be my three years here.
- Q. Great, and what kind of -- can you give me a description of your training and what kind of training you've had?
- 5 | A. Lots --

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- 6 Q. Current training?
- A. Accident reconstructionist, I've attended a lot of crime scene, you know, death investigation classes, homicide conferences, search warrant classes, lots of varied training. I don't know how many hours of training I have, but quite a bit.
- Q. Okay, and so basically that was all for the criminal investigator position?
- A. Yes, just throughout my career. I've been in investigations several times throughout my career, I've worked in narcotics, like I said, I worked as an accident reconstructionist in Frisco for a while.
- 17 | 0. Got it.
- A. I've spent time as an SRO in the schools -- school resource officer in the schools, I've spent time in patrol, days, and nights, and then here I've been primarily in criminal investigations.
- Q. Okay, great. So, can you -- did you get any natural gas training at all throughout that time?
- 24 A. No.
- 25 Q. No? Okay, and -- okay. So, let's go back to -- on June

28th, tell me about how you started your day, and then how you heard about the incident and everything?

- A. Was that Monday?
- 4 Q. Yeah.

A. Okay. So, Monday I got at, like, 6:30 in the morning and started assigning the cases from the weekend, which is my normal duty to assign my cases. And then -- I'm trying to remember what all we did. It's been a busy couple of days, we've had five dead bodies in two days. And so, we're -- I know I was working a lot with -- we worked a case the night before, and I was helping clean up another case that I worked the week before -- a drowning that we worked the week before, and some other -- working on my cases and getting stuff situated.

And then I had something -- I had some kind of meeting, and then I left here, and I went and picked up some evidence, and then went home. I got home about 3:30, and then about 4:00 I got a page from Captain Fontana advising me of this incident and to respond. So, I got dressed and headed to the scene.

- 19 Q. That was 4:00 p.m.?
- 20 A. Correct.
- Q. Okay, and then tell me what -- when you came on scene what you saw and everything?
- A. So, I was briefed about the incident, I had my investigators respond, and the news helicopters were flying overhead, I learned that there was two deceased on scene and we weren't sure who they

- 1 were or anything like that. So, I had my investigators figure 2 out -- work on figuring out who the people were that were on scene that -- the injured and the deceased and worked on the next of kin 3 4 notification because we didn't want them to find out by a news 5
- 6 Ο. Right.

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helicopter.

- And found out that the company had -- one of the companies had already notified one of the families, and then I know one of the deceased, his dad worked for the same company, and he found out as well. So, he actually ended up showing up on scene.
- 11 Right. So, you were brief by several people or just 12 Captain Fontana?
- 13 It was kind of a conglomeration of -- I mean, there was 14 obviously a bunch of people out there.
- 15 Ο. Yeah.
- 16 So, getting kind of bits and pieces from everybody.
- 17 Ο. Yeah.
- And then learned that it was, you know, the fire -- we 18 19 originally thought that it was a fire, and so, that would fall 20 under the jurisdiction of the Fire Marshal's Office.
- 21 Right. Ο.
- 22 So, I had to talk to the fire marshal, and once we kind of 23 get -- got an understanding of what actually happened, we talking 24 to the Fire Marshal's Office and say hey, we'll take this since 25 it's not, like, a fire -- like a house fire kind of a deal, it's

- a -- you know, it was a brief fire.
- 2 Q. Right.

- A. So, then we said that we would take the lead in the investigation.
- 5 Q. So, even though it was a brief fire is because it was
- 6 an -- wasn't continuous, so --
- 7 A. Right.
- 8 0. Okay. All right.
- 9 A. And we had more experience in investigating, like, these
- 10 types of instances than the Fire Marshal's Office. They deal
- 11 | with, like, the house fires and somebody dies in a fire, that kind
- 12 of stuff, not, like, an industrial type setting job of a deal.
- 13 | Q. Okay.
- 14 | A. But prior to us -- the fire marshal was actually there very
- 15 | quick, and he actually started putting out the little number
- 16 | markers we use, the little tents -- numbered tents --
- 17 0. Uh-huh.
- 18 A. -- at the various places prior to us getting there because he
- 19 was actually right around the corner when the call came out. So,
- 20 | he was able to put that stuff in place.
- 21 Q. Where the bodies were?
- 22 A. And where the -- the bodies stayed where they were, but the
- 23 | injured, he marked where they were, and other things as well. So
- 24 those were all marked.
- 25 Q. Do you guys have pictures of that?

A. Uh-huh.

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- $2 \parallel Q$. Okay. They were removed by the time I was on scene.
 - A. Yeah, we removed them that night.
- $4 \parallel Q$. Oh, okay.
 - A. Because we were going to get more storms and they were going to blow away.
- $7 \parallel Q$. Oh, got it.
- 8 A. They're just -- I don't know if you -- the little plastic 9 tents deal, so they'll just -- a good breeze will blow them away.
- Q. Right, I got it. Yeah -- where the injured are -- okay, great. Yeah, I definitely would like a copy of those. So, did the fire marshal tell you anything about what happened?
 - A. Yeah, he explained that they were working and then the pig, I guess is what it's called, the pig flew out the -- and then there was, like, an expelling of gas, and then a quick flash of fire and then that was it, and then everything kind of stopped. And obviously medical personnel arrived, there was two transported to the hospital, the two deceased stayed on scene.

And there was a fifth person that was actually operating the bobcat, and he was still on scene, but obviously very shaken up. I didn't talk to him until -- I talked to him more about hey -- you know, I wanted somebody to be there with him, but he wasn't from this area. We're trying to find somebody for him, and we could talk to him later if we need to or whatever, but I wasn't too concerned about getting an interview with him right then and

there --

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- Okay.
- 3 -- based on the circumstances because it wasn't -- we knew it 4 wasn't going to be criminal at that point. So, I knew we could 5 get him later, and then when all this started, I figure you all 6 would just take care of it and there wouldn't be any need for us
- to sit down for a formal interview with him.

So, you didn't interview him because we --

- 9 Not about the incident.
- 10 Right, okay. Did you see the injured?
- 11 Α. No.
- 12 0. Okay.
- 13 No. Α.
- 14 So, when you arrived on scene, what did you see exactly?
- 15 So, I saw the bobcat, the pipe that they were working on,
- 16 they had closed the pipe, and we were told the scene was secure
- 17 by -- somebody on scene said that it was -- everything was secure.
- 18 There was sheets over the bodies that were there, and then
- 19 everything else was left in place. The tent markers were done,
- 20 and then our crime scene responded and photographed, took
- 21 measurements, made a sketch.
- 22 And then we -- in the middle of that a storm blew through so
- 23 we ended up having to -- we got some tarps and had to put tarps
- 24 over the bodies. And then we had to run and get a bunch of monkey
- 25 wrenches from somewhere outside of that fenced in area, I'm not

- sure where they came from, to weigh down the tarps, and then we waited out the storm and then went back in.
- 3 | Q. Okay.

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- 4 A. So, if you see all those -- I don't know if they're still in there, but all those monkey wrenches --
- 6 Q. Yeah, we did.
- 7 | A. -- they aren't part of anything.
- 8 0. Right.
- 9 A. So, nobody was using those, those are complete 100 percent us, and those blue tarps that are off to the side by the bobcat, those were brought in by us as well.
- 12 Q. Okay, that's good to know.
- A. But everything else stayed the way it was. We didn't move anything, we didn't manipulate anything, the only thing we removed was the bodies.
- 16 | Q. Okay.
- 17 A. And then we -- like I said, we left everything there.
- 18 Q. Okay, great. So, when you -- when all that activity was
- 19 going on, what did you observe the condition of the bodies?
- 20 (Verbatim)
- 21 A. We didn't really -- we briefly looked at the bodies, but we
- 22 waited until the medical examiner got there -- the field agent,
- 23 and then when we rolled him we noticed that one of them had some
- 24 pretty severe, it looks like, burning or something on the face.
- 25 | The other one, period, was kind of covered it mud it almost looked

- like, the face, and then he had a severe wound to the back of his head.
- 3 | Q. Okay.
- $4 \mid A$. It looked like, just a guess on my part, but like the
- 5 pipe -- the steel pipe, you know, caught it on the head, and there
- 6 was fragments of skull and brain there on the ground as well.
- $7 \parallel Q$. Okay. That was the second one -- the second body?
- 8 A. Correct.
- 9 Q. Okay, the first one was burned?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 | Q. Okay. Were they facing down -- how were they facing down?
- 12 A. They were both kind of in a -- put in awkward positions, like
- 13 | they fell.
- 14 0. Backwards or forwards?
- 15 A. I believe more backwards, it looks like. But almost -- one
- 16 of them was laying kind of like this because you couldn't really
- 17 see the back of his head very much.
- 18 Q. Okay.
- 19 A. And then the other one, he was kind of more on his back.
- 20 Q. Okay, so --
- 21 A. We have photographs of all that.
- 22 Q. I'm just -- would you -- I your opinion, do you think they
- 23 were facing the pipe when it -- when all this happened? It would
- 24 | weird (ph.) --
- 25 A. I'm not so sure about the one with the head wound because

- l \parallel it's -- the front is all good, it's the back. So, I almost wonder
- 2 | if had his back turned --
- 3 | Q. Okay.

- A. -- and that happened, I don't know.
- 5 | 0. I see.
- 6 A. We'll obviously know more once, you know, we talk to the
- 7 | medical examiner, and that's what I would be waiting for as well
- 8 before I made any type of --
- 9 0. Okay.
- 10 | A. -- you know, judgement.
- 11 | Q. And when you were -- so, how long -- what time did -- you got
- 12 notification of it at 4:00 p.m., what time did you actually arrive
- 13 on scene?
- 14 A. I was probably there about 4:30.
- 15 Q. Okay, and did you speak to Atmos at all? Was Atmos on scene?
- 16 A. Yeah, Atmos was there, Bobcat was there, FESCO was there, the
- 17 | Railroad Commission was there. I don't remember names of who I
- 18 | talked to.
- 19 Q. That's fine. And did you smell anything when you arrived on
- 20 | scene?
- 21 A. Every so often we got some hints of gas, and I know when the
- 22 Railroad Commission got there they were walking around as well,
- 23 and they smelled it and they stopped everybody and said hey, so,
- 24 we all backed out. Atmos brought in -- I don't know what it is,
- 25 some kind of -- looked like a laser gun, and started doing some

- 1 stuff, and they said that it was safe. So, we went back in and 2 continued.
- Okay, and that was around the time you arrived at 4:30, they 3 4 did that?
- 5 Α. No, we --
- 6 Ο. Oh.
- 7 They did that much later. We were told the scene was safe, 8 we didn't know any better. We kind of -- we would smell it every 9 so often, just a whiff here and there as they were walking around.
- 10 They walked the whole facility, I mainly concentrated on where 11 everything happened.
- 12 Right. Ο.

nothing else.

- 13 But farther over they were smelling it more and so, they were 14 like hey, let's just get this checked just to make sure there's 15
- 16 And when you say they --
- 17 The Railroad Commission. So, I would say that was probably several hours into it. 18
- 19 Okay. Q.
- 20 Because I know it took them a while to get there as well.
- 21 Did the -- which responders were you interacting with
- 22 specifically when you arrived?
- 23 Mainly my team. Α.
- 24 Your team? Ο.
- From the Sherriff's Office. 25 Α.

- Q. Okay. But you also said you spoke to the state fire marshal?
- 2 A. The county fire marshal.
- 3 Q. County, sorry. County fire marshal.
- 4 A. Yes, he was there initially, and then -- he stayed for a
- 5 short time, and then after, you know, we told him we would take
- 6 the lead then he left the scene.
- 7 Q. Okay, and then he handed it over to you guys?
- 8 A. Correct.
- 9 Q. Okay, and how many of your investigators were on scene?
- 10 A. Three.

- 11 | Q. Okay.
- 12 A. And then my crime scene person.
- 13 Q. What's the crime scene person, is it a photographer or --
- 14 A. She's a criminalist.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. So, she does forensics and stuff like that.
- 17 Q. Okay. So, you have four all together?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. And then you?
- 20 A. Correct.
- 21 | Q. Okay, great. So, you -- so, tell me how you go about your
- 22 | investigation with the -- when you come on scene?
- 23 A. So, generally, like, in this type of situation with this
- 24 | being hurried with the media, our -- obviously our concern was
- 25 next of kin first, so, we worked on that, also trying to figure

- 1 out who was who. And then I sent my other criminalist to the
- 2 hospital where the injured were to have those photographs of the
- 3 | injuries and to figure out who they were as well so that we
- 4 were -- if we started missing names, we knew where people were and
- 5 we could kind of fill in the blank. Because, again, there was a
- 6 lot of people there and a lot of people kept arriving and so
- 7 | forth, so we did that; that was our main goal. And then at that
- 8 point, the medical examiner came out, we looked, didn't see
- 9 anything criminal from it, so at that point it was more of us just
- 10 documenting for whoever else was going to continue the
- 11 | investigation.
- 12 Q. Okay. So, you didn't see anything criminal, then what
- 13 | happens after that?
- 14 \mid A. We -- I mean, we'll initiate a report, we'll put all of our
- 15 | findings in there, and then we'll all type a supplement up of what
- 16 we did, and how we did it, and everything else, and then it'll be
- 17 | in our files if, you know, anybody needs it or whatever.
- 18 Q. Is that report done?
- 19 | A. No.
- 20 0. Not yet? Oh, okay. When would it be done? I mean,
- 21 | ballpark? I know you're balancing other cases, so --
- 22 | A. Yeah, we just got something big this morning too, so --
- 23 | Q. Yeah.
- 24 A. So, today's Wednesday -- I would hope by early next week.
- 25 \parallel Q. Oh, okay. Yeah. Would we be able to have a copy of that?

A. Sure.

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- $2 \mid \mid Q$. Okay, and if anything is confidential just stamp it, like, or
- 3 | just tell me this is -- you know, pages such and such are
- 4 | confidential.
- 5 | A. Okay.
- 6 Q. Or if you don't want it -- you don't want to give it to us,
- 7 | if you don't think it'll help the investigation don't -- you don't
- 8 have to give it to us.
- 9 | A. Okay.
- 10 Q. And it's confidential. So, okay. So, you -- how long were
- 11 you on scene?
- 12 | A. I was there from -- I would say approximately 4:30 until
- 13 | about 9:15.
- 14 | Q. Okay. So, after you sent the two -- a couple of
- 15 | investigators to the hospital, what else were you doing as part of
- 16 | your investigation?
- 17 A. Just waiting. The FBI was notified and so they were sending
- 18 their evidence crew and bomb technicians. So, we were pretty much
- 19 concluded with our part, and then waiting on the FBI to show up.
- 20 | Q. When did you make your conclusions -- like you were pretty
- 21 | sure you were -- what happened?
- 22 A. I would say probably within an hour into it, you know,
- 23 looking at everything.
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 A. And, you know, determining that it wasn't criminal --

O. Sure.

happened?

- A. -- and then clearing, you know, there wasn't any tampering or anything else, it appeared it was routine maintenance that went wrong is what it appeared from everything that we were, you know, gathering from the scene.
- Q. Right. Did you get any -- did you talk to anyone on scene about what they routine maintenance was specifically?
- A. Not specifically from any of the companies, but I did talk to the Railroad Commission people and just asked them. Because I had no idea what a pig was, and everybody kept -- so, I'm looking for a four-legged pig and I'm like I don't know what you're talking about. So, they finally pointed that out to me, and I was like okay, what are we doing here and how -- in a perfect world, how is this supposed to happen?

And so, they explained it to me how, you know, they shut off the one valve and then the pipes attach to the flare or whatever it's called, and that burns off the gas in between. And then once the gas is burned off, they can -- they run tests to make sure, and then they can insert the pig with the pipes and do what they need to do. They can use the bobcat sometimes, and then -- but apparently, I guess, it was inserted and there was some back-up gas and it shot it out is what we're assuming. And then the gas came out, and then sparked and ignited quickly and then -- Q. Did they by any chance point to you where the sparking

- A. No, I don't. I don't remember that. Just --
- $2 \parallel Q$. They just told you?

- 3 | A. -- based on what, you know, what I was -- what I saw on
- 4 scene, I didn't see any burn areas or anything like that. I don't
- 5 know if that happened -- you know, if it ignited in the pipe and
- 6 came out, I don't know. Again, I'm not the expert in that field
- 7 or that part, so --
- 8 Q. Who would look at that if there was any burn issues, like,
- 9 burn patterns or anything?
- 10 A. I'm believing that would be, like, you all or --
- 11 | Q. I'm saying, like, locally, like, would it be the Fire
- 12 Department or --
- 13 A. I mean, they could.
- 14 0. Okay. Yeah.
- 15 A. But like I said, there was no fire on scene, and, like I
- 16 | said, it was deemed safe by the Fire Department so --
- 17 Q. Okay. So, Farmersville Fire Department declared it safe?
- 18 | A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. They were there, and I believe Wylie Fire was there as well.
- 21 Q. Okay. So, once you -- Railroad Commission explained all this
- 22 | to you, what happened next after you understood kind of what was
- 23 | going on?
- $24 \parallel A$. We waited for the FBI, they showed up, they looked, they
- 25 didn't see anything that met their criteria, and the medical

- examiner came out, and then the transport came out and we loaded the bodies.
- 3 | Q. Okay.
- 4 A. We did show the father of one of the victims the body, and 5 then we cleared the scene.
- 6 Q. Okay.
- 7 A. And then turned it over to Atmos security who'd hired a 8 couple of off-duty officers to secure the scene until --
- 9 Q. Right. So, have you ever seen anything -- have you ever been 10 to that facility before?
- 11 | A. No.
- Q. Okay, and have you ever been to a gas incident like something like this?
- 14 A. Not like this, no.
- 15 Q. Not this? Okay. Is there anything you'd like to share with
- 16 us that you observed on scene? Maybe anything unique or that you
- 17 | thought was different?
- 18 A. No. I mean, it just -- like I said, it just looked like a
- 19 tragic accident to me. It didn't -- you know, and I -- like,
- 20 | safety protocols, I have no clue --
- 21 | Q. Right.
- 22 A. -- of any of that stuff. But whatever transpired was, you
- 23 know, from our aspect, it was, you know, nothing that we would
- 24 continue to investigate.
- 25 | Q. Okay. Were -- you weren't on scene when Farmersville was

- 1 | there -- the Fire Department?
- $2 \mid \mid A$. The Fire Department was there, yes.
- $3 \parallel Q$. When you were there?
 - A. Yeah, there -- I mean, there was a fire truck there --
- 5 | 0. Okay.

- A. -- when I was there, and there was several firemen running around, I don't know exactly which agencies they're from because a
- 8 lot of times when that happens, we get a big response.
- 9 0. Right.
- 10 A. And there's a lot of volunteer out here in the county,
- 11 | Volunteer Fire Departments. So, if they hear it come on and
- 12 | they're close, then they respond. So, I don't know exactly how
- 13 many fire agencies responded, all the ambulances were gone by the
- 14 | time I got there.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. So -- but I don't know which fire agencies and all were
- 17 | there.
- 18 | Q. Right. Did the -- did you see the Farmersville Police?
- 19 A. I saw Chief Sullivan at one point during --
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. But, I mean, I think that was much later.
- 22 | Q. Okay. So, you saw -- did you see one engine or multiple
- 23 | engines?
- 24 A. I saw one engine there.
- 25 Q. One engine? Okay.

- A. Can you just give me one second?
- $2 \parallel$ MS. GUNARATNAM: Sure. We're going to pause the recording.
- 3 (Off the record)
- 4 (On the record)
- 5 MS. GUNARATNAM: All right, we're returning.
- 6 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:
- $7 \parallel Q$. Okay. So, there's one name and all the ambulances had left,
- 8 | fire department declared it safe for you to go in before you went
- 9 | in?

- 10 A. Correct.
- 11 | Q. Okay. Was -- did you have to -- when you came in there was
- 12 the gate there, did you have to, like, check in with anyone?
- 13 A. When I got there, we hadn't -- it hadn't been really
- 14 established, I established the crime scene, put the tape across
- 15 when I got there to the scene.
- 16 | Q. Okay.
- 17 A. Everything was still kind of -- hadn't settled. I don't know
- 18 | if you've been to those, but, you know, once you get -- when you
- 19 get police and fire together, everybody gets in there and is doing
- 20 things. And then when we show up it's kind of like everything
- 21 | is -- it's time for everything to settle down now. And so, I
- 22 | roped it off and made -- basically where that folding gate is,
- 23 | that was my crime scene.
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 $\mid A$. And then we ended up having to make another one because the

media started showing up. So, we made another row of tape back farther, which is common in those instances because you could look straight in and see the bodies so --

MR. SMITH: You had to back it up farther.

SGT REIM: Yeah, we didn't want the media, you know, having access to the bodies.

MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay.

SGT REIM: So, while we were in and out trying to do our stuff --

MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay.

Do you have any questions?

MR. SMITH: A couple now that we're about through it.

13 BY MR. SMITH:

- Q. The -- were there any forensics or samples taken from any of the equipment?
- 16 | A. No.

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- 17 \parallel Q. The pig, the backhoe, anything collected from your team?
- 18 A. No, sir.
- 19 Q. Okay. What's the typical role of the FBI in these kind of 20 situations?
- 21 A. I'm not real sure, this is the first time that I've had that 22 response.
- 23 | Q. Okay.
- A. So, my understanding is basically, I guess, because the initial reports were explosion -- gas explosion, not supposed to

- happen, obviously, everybody automatically switches to the
- 2 | terrorism end of it.
- 3 | Q. Okay.
- 4 A. So, I think what the FBI response was, was basically let's 5 rule this out as a terrorist act.
- 6 Q. It hit them right on because of --
- 7 A. Correct.
- 8 0. Okay.
- 9 A. So, literally they came out and spent a very short amount of time, looked, and said there's no bomb, there's no shrapnel,
- 11 there's nothing here for us, there's nothing we can do, you know.
- 12 0. You mentioned the father of one of the deceased showed up?
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. And you all eventually gave him access to the body, but was
- 15 he allowed in the -- was he allowed access to the site?
- 16 A. He did walk into the site because we had two bodies and we
- 17 loaded one. So, we walked him in -- he was escorted by us, and --
- 18 Q. That's where he viewed?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 | Q. Okay.
- 21 A. We had the body loaded in the bag and just unzipped just the
- 22 | head part so he could view that, and then he was not -- he knew he
- 23 was not allowed to touch anything or do anything else --
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 $\mid A$. -- and then was escorted back out of the scene.

- Q. And then just finally, what time did you release the scene
- 2 back over to Atmos energy?
- 3 A. Probably around 9:15.
- $4 \parallel Q$. Okay. Right before you left?
- 5 | A. Yes.
- 6 Q. So, 9:15?
- A. Yeah, because when I was walking out of that fenced in area for the last time, the off-duty officers showed up and they were asking if we were done, and I was -- then I was wrapping up a few
- 10 things and I said yeah, we're done in there, and then we were
- 11 turning it over to them.
- 12 Q. And at that time, we already had security arranged to --
- 13 A. Correct. And then I think they were doing one more -- like 14 dealing with the laser gun --
- 15 | 0. Sort of that --
- 16 A. -- did that one more time to make sure the gas levels were
- 17 okay, and then everybody was going to clear out. And they
- 18 were -- whoever that was from Atmos was escorted as well by
- 19 somebody.
- 20 Q. While they were doing the survey inside, they were escorted?
- 21 A. Correct.
- 22 Q. From somebody in your team?
- 23 A. Not my team. I believe either the Railroad Commission or it
- 24 | may have been somebody from the security that was assigned.
- 25 Q. Just to have a witness they were --

A. Yes.

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- 2 MR. SMITH: Okay, thank you.
- 3 SGT REIM: Uh-huh.
- 4 MS. GUNARATNAM: I'm sorry, I meant to introduce you. Can you just say your name and title?
 - MR. SMITH: Yes. I'm Greg Smith, director of pipeline integrity and compliance with Atmos Energy.
- 8 MS. GUNARATNAM: Okay, thank you. I meant to do that in the 9 beginning. Okay.
- 10 BY MS. GUNARATNAM:
- Q. Just one last question. When you were speaking with Railroad
- 12 Commission, did they have any -- did they explain -- after they
- 13 explained the whole process to you about, you know, pigging, did
- 14 | they say anything about any discussion about what they think may
- 15 have gone wrong?
- 16 A. They didn't have any -- I mean, to discuss with me, they were waiting on other people as well.
- 18 | 0. Okay.
- 19 A. So, it was -- everybody just kind of understood what
- 20 | should've happened and then, you know, nobody knows what went
- 21 wrong at that point.
- 22 0. Got it.
- 23 A. It's not like anybody went oh, well that, you know --
- 24 | Q. Right.
- 25 | A | A. -- that was this or that was that. That was -- there were

1	none of those discussions that was privy to me.
2	Q. Right.
3	A. So
4	MS. GUNARATNAM: All right. Before I conclude, any last
5	questions?
6	MR. SMITH: No.
7	MS. GUNARATNAM: All right, thank you very much. We'll end
8	the interview.
