2	(2:13 p.m.)
3	MS. HARLEY: Okay. So good afternoon. Once again, my name
4	is Sheryl Harley. I'm an investigator in the Office of Railroad,
5	Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Investigations for the National
6	Transportation Safety Board.
7	And today is March 29th of 2023. It is now 2:13 p.m. We are
8	located at the West Reading Police Department, 500 Chestnut Street
9	in West Reading, Pennsylvania.
10	And with me, I'm going to ask my colleagues to identify
11	themselves for the record.
12	MS. COOPER-SMITH: Terri Cooper-Smith with the Pennsylvania
13	Public Utility Commission, Pipeline Safety Division, and I'm
14	supervisor for Southeast Area. And I am an engineer and
15	inspector.
16	MS. HORTON: Ashley Horton, Department of Transportation,
17	Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, Accident
18	Investigator.
19	MS. HARLEY: And as you know and if you'd identify
20	yourself please for the record, sir.
21	CHIEF HOLBEN: Sure. Wayne W. Holben, Chief of Police the
22	West Reading Police Department.
23	MS. HARLEY: Thank you very much, sir.
24	INTERVIEW OF WAYNE W. HOLBEN
25	BY MS. HARLEY:

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- Q. And as you know, this is in regards to the pipeline explosion that occurred on Friday, at approximately 4:50 p.m. at the industry located at 17 South Second Street in West Reading. So if
- 4 you wouldn't mind, just kind of start me, how you were notified
- 5 and just kind of walk me through what happened.

- A. Sure. So, I was -- I left. I got done work at 4 o'clock. I
 went home after my shift. While I was home, I was contacted by
 our criminal investigator, Danny Voorhies, that an explosion
 happened at the R.M. Palmer Building. And, there were multiple
 reports coming in, even that a plane hit the building. So I
- 12 for command, incident command. Danny was on location at the time,

immediately responded. While en route to the incident, I asked

- and I believe he advised Berks Radio that he was on scene, and in
- 14 command. Also, I knew that there was a railroad bridge that went
- 15 over the property. So I made sure that Norfolk Southern was
- 16 notified that -- of the explosion. Berks Radio informed me that
- 17 they had already taken care of that for me or for everyone.
- I continued in. I advised that I was going to have incident
- 19 command set up at our Borough Garage. I responded to the
- 20 Department because I didn't have my personal radio. So I came
- 21 here, to the Department to gather what I needed and responded to
- 22 the Borough Garage to start setting up incident command.
- 23 While on location at the Borough Garage, it was -- most
- 24 everybody was still on scene. And so I decided to -- because
- 25 nobody was coming to the Borough Garage. So I decided to respond

to the scene to determine what was going on so I could get a better handle on everything. Once on location, Chief Phillips from the Wyomissing Police Department was there. I went to his location. Danny was also in the area as well. Prior to that though, I'm not sure who called me while I was at the Borough Garage, but they advised that a second building, Palmer building was possibly filling up with gas or had gas in it and there was fires. So I notified Berks Radio to have everyone notified of that, to move away from that building.

And then shortly after that, I did go to the location, and began to make sure that everybody's -- because residents were out on the street at that time, too, and John was there, and we were making sure that everybody was being pushed back away. All the residents, pushed back to Chestnut Street away from the other R.M. Palmer building while firefighters and EMS workers were there doing what they had to do to control the fire and the injuries.

So after that, it was determining what -- how many people were in the building, you know, trying to start accounting for people. Detective Voorhies responded to the back side of the Palmer property which is by where our Borough Garage is with I believe Palmer representatives to start taking a headcount of everyone that was inside the building. They did -- they had like a roster of people which they apparently did headcounts by each group. I don't know how they're set up there, but basically say, okay, you're in chocolate making, you know. Okay. So and so and

so is here. Yes, yes, yes, yes. Went down to the next one, so and so, you here? Yes, yes, and then if there was a no, I believe they highlighted it on the roster. So a list was compiled of the eight individuals that were missing or not accounted for.

At that time, once we received that list, I advised our patrol guys over on the case to start running driver's license information to get pictures of these individuals so we had a photo of them in case they were pulled out of the rubble, and also ones that had responded to the hospital so they can start checking people off the list. And I also obviously advised our fire department of the list and so forth and anybody that was there, so we could start, you know, recovering people when we could.

Once things started to settle down on location and people were pushed back, UGI's out there turning off the gas, I guess to start making that area safe. And there was no more gas issue. Folks were allowed back in their residences. I don't know the exact timeline. My whole day was from Friday to Monday night.

But, you know, once things started to settle down, I said, command was going to be at the Borough Garage. A Reading PD chief came on location and said he could provide his command vehicle which I accepted. They brought the command vehicle down there, and we started setting up command down there.

Once we were down there, everybody started showing up. It was -- obviously Reading PD was there. The -- I think they had an ATF agent was on location. Hospital folks, some employees that

were -- had to be transported eventually back to -- I think they
twere doing some, I think they were doing some initial interview
down there. Our mayor who happens to be a firefighter who was
down there, she was there. And I do have some names that were
there. I do have like a picture of the board that we -- kind of

like the command, you know, post board, if you want that.

7 Q. Oh, absolutely. Thank you.

A. Yep. So, we initially didn't see the explosion, but apparently Fox News has a traffic camera on top of the Candlewood Suites. So we looked at the video, and when I showed the ATF agent the video, he said that's not good. We should start looking for people on top of buildings. That's how powerful the explosion was. So at that time, we had a drone already on location. The drone was set up to start looking on top of buildings in the surrounding area. I requested the PSP helicopter to be sent to our location to start look -- searching as well. I believe it did arrive and conducted their search.

And I mean everybody -- I mean there was a lot of people there to help out which I mean -- it was, it was an overwhelming amount of help that came there that day and, you know, I think -- I feel that everything as best as it could, you know.

So, from there, obviously at that point, I had to start thinking about the -- and this was after everything was settled down. The fire I believe was out at that time. I mean they kept having fires that would pop up, you know, even after, like hours

after because eventually it was decided probably around, I want to say 11 o'clock at night, that I was going to move the command post up to here because again they already had -- like EMS, there was a little parking lot next to C&S Medical Supply, where the where they had already started setting up tents and EMS was there. The fire department was there. So, we decided to put it right there basically about a half a block away from where this incident occurred. So that's where the command post then stayed until we -- it was basically shut down on like I think Monday.

So after that, obviously the media's here at that point, and I forget what time it was at night, but it has to be close to 11 or so that I had to come up here and give a statement, a brief statement and advise them that I had to be back down here. So it was a good excuse not to be in front of a camera too long.

So I -- but then after that, I went back down to the command post, and really was probably just there -- well, it was most of the night. I don't know how long I was over (indiscernible). It was way over 24 hours. So -- and then I had to start making sure that we had manpower to shut down the roads that needed to be shut down which we did at that time. It was -- well, I'm getting ahead of myself, but eventually in the future I'll start talking about that, but just to be down there, to have somebody down there. Because obviously we're 15, well, 14 man department right now. And unfortunately my one supervisor was had surgery and the other one was out on vacation. So I made sure I was just down there

- 1 and, you know, they would have had to make sure that was
- 2 eventually manned. So we had representation down there but for
- 3 | the most part, I was down there for Friday, Saturday, I mean and
- 4 Sunday.
- 5 Q. Okay. So I was curious about this. You said that there was
- 6 | at one point someone report that it might have been a plane that
- 7 | hit the building?
- 8 A. There was also a report of a missile strike.
- 9 0. Okay.
- 10 A. So -- I'm pretty sure. I didn't see that. I didn't, I
- 11 | didn't see that. I didn't see the missile strike. People were
- 12 | telling me, yeah, somebody reported a missile strike. So I'd have
- 13 to go through the CAD notes but I guess somebody did report a
- 14 plane struck and then somebody else said a missile strike. But,
- 15 you know, that's all in our CAD notes, I'm sure.
- 16 Q. Okay. All right. That's good which is off topic there.
- 17 A. Yeah, yeah.
- 18 Q. Okay. Let's see. Do you have some sense of how many people
- 19 ultimately were not accounted for initially?
- 20 A. Initially I believe there was nine. There was nine. The one
- 21 was located at home. I should have his name. I think his last
- 22 | name was White. I'd have to look at that.
- 23 Q. Um-hum.
- 24 A. So he was located at home. So then we went to eight, and
- 25 | then obviously seven unfortunately died. You know, one was

- 1 | rescued from inside the building. We did receive a report later
- 2 on, I don't know if it was that night or the next night, like a
- 3 | friend was saying that one of her -- one of his friends, they
- 4 | hadn't heard from her. I did look into that, and the one of
- 5 Palmer's employees eventually called her, and she wasn't -- the
- 6 Palmer employee said she doesn't even work at that building or in
- 7 | that area. So she made contact with her, and she was a little,
- 8 you know, she wasn't there herself. So initially I think we had
- 9 | nine on our list, and then we later found out that that one -- the
- 10 mother who made the complaint found her home. She went home.
- 11 | Q. Okay. What's the name of the Reading Police chief?
- 12 A. Rich Tornielli.
- 13 Q. Okay. Tornielli. Okay. And you guys put up the drone?
- 14 A. We did not. I believe it was Western Berks Fire Department.
- 15 0. Western Berks?
- 16 A. Correct.
- 17 Q. Okay. And you said the Pennsylvania State Police did bring
- 18 | their helicopter in?
- 19 A. I'm pretty sure they did.
- 20 O. Okay.
- 21 | A. But also just so you know, too, not that's it's -- just
- 22 | something I thought of. Fox News had their helicopter overhead
- 23 | for a while, and actually I think Tornielli was able to -- I don't
- 24 know. Somebody had a no fly zone somehow.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- 1 A. And they left.
- 2 | Q. Okay. Do you have some sense of when the fire was out? Not
- 3 the spot fires, but the main bulk of the fire.
- 4 A. I couldn't give you an exact time. I'm not 100 percent sure.
- 5 I don't want to --
- 6 Q. Okay. I know that there was a report about gas and all that.
- 7 Did you smell any gas?
- 8 A. When I was there, I did not smell gas.
- 9 Q. Okay. And, let's see. One more question and I'll turn it
- 10 over to my colleagues. Are you aware of the church on the corner
- 11 | that rents out the place? Is it possible for you to give me the
- 12 | information? We're trying to verify where the occupants of that
- 13 | house has gone to and who actually owns that house there on the
- 14 corner. Do you know -- what church owns that?
- 15 A. I forget the church's name. I mean I --
- 16 Q. I mean that's something that can be done later on.
- 17 A. Yeah. I can --
- 18 Q. Okay.
- 19 A. Yeah, that's fine. I thought I had it because we were all
- 20 going back and forth to that. Yeah, I don't -- the property
- 21 owner?
- 22 Q. Yeah.
- 23 A. Jeffrey and Christine Reiner (ph.).
- 24 Q. Jeffrey and Christine Reiner.
- 25 A. Do you want the phone number?

- 1 Q. Yes.
- 2 A.
- 3 Q. Um-hum.
- 4 A.
- 5 Q.
- 6 A. That's Chris' number.
- 7 Q. Um-hum.
- 8 A. Do you want Jeff's?
- 9 Q. Yes, please.
- 10 A.
- 11 Q.
- 12 A. That's the owner of 5 South Second Avenue which is that whole
- 13 thing.
- 14 Q. Okay. Great.
- 15 MS. HARLEY: All right. I'll turn it over to Terri.
- 16 BY MS. COOPER-SMITH:
- 17 Q. Okay. Do you recall who told you that it was safe to go --
- 18 to be in that area? You said that you found out that, you know,
- 19 the gas was shut off or whatever. Do you know who told you that?
- 20 Was it UGI or was it the fire department or --
- 21 A. I don't remember.
- 22 Q. You don't remember. Okay.
- 23 A. Well, see --
- 24 Q. You had stated that you realized that it was okay to be in
- 25 that area. Like originally you had heard that --

- 1 A. Oh, yeah, yeah, yes. Yes.
- 2 Q. Right.
- 3 A. Yeah. No, I do not but I don't know if it might have been
- 4 | fire or somebody from fire, but I'm not sure.
- 5 Q. Okay. And so, while you were onsite, did you see bodies or,
- 6 | you know, victims onsite as you were walking --
- 7 A. In the beginning?
- 8 Q. Yes.
- 9 A. No.
- 10 O. No.
- MS. COOPER-SMITH: Okay. That's all I have.
- 12 BY MS. HORTON:
- 13 Q. I wanted to clarify what happened with Norfolk. Did you say
- 14 you called them or you were going to call them and someone else
- 15 | had already done that?
- 16 A. Yeah. So on my way in, I radioed to dispatcher, county
- 17 dispatch thing about that track, and our county dispatcher said it
- 18 was already taken care of.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. So the county must have called and said stop all trains.
- 21 Q. Okay. Do you know if the train was running at the time of
- 22 | the explosion?
- 23 A. That I don't know. I know they were running -- they run it
- 24 after it.
- 25 Q. Okay. You don't recall who told you Building 1 was filling

- 1 up with gas?
- 2 | A. I -- no, because I -- I know it wasn't dispatch because I
- 3 told, I told dispatch about that, to tell the other people. So I
- 4 | don't know if it was John that called me. He might have called me
- 5 because he didn't have his radio at the time because he came in
- 6 | right from home. Like he was more -- I just found out that --
- 7 because they had the SWAT vehicles down there. So he thought, you
- 8 know, that, you know, initiate that. So he might have called me.
- 9 I think he might have called me.
- 10 MS. HARLEY: I'm sorry. What's John's full name?
- 11 CHIEF HOLBEN: John Phillips.
- 12 MS. HARLEY: John Phillips. Oh, okay. All right. I see.
- 13 Okay. Yeah, gotcha. I just wanted to make sure.
- 14 BY MS. HORTON:
- 15 Q. Do you know if that was after UGI had shown up for gas?
- 16 A. I don't, I don't think so because I mean I don't even know --
- 17 | I'm trying to think. I don't think so. And I don't want to -- I
- 18 can't say yes or no because I wasn't on location when he provided
- 19 me that information.
- 20 O. Okay.
- 21 A. If that makes sense.
- 22 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Were you en route when he called?
- 23 CHIEF HOLBEN: So what happened was I came from home.
- MS. COOPER-SMITH: Right.
- 25 CHIEF HOLBEN: I went to set up an incident command away from

- 1 that.
- 2 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Right.
- 3 CHIEF HOLBEN: And I -- so I was at the location setting up
- 4 | the incident command. He phoned me that information --
- 5 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Gotcha.
- 6 CHIEF HOLBEN: -- and then since nobody would come, I went to
- 7 the location of the incident to start figuring stuff out so we
- 8 | could, you know, get it, you know, back there.
- 9 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Okay.
- 10 BY MS. HARLEY:
- 11 Q. Because you went straight to -- you went to the garage
- 12 | first --
- 13 A. Right.
- 14 O. -- and that was where the incident command was, and then you
- 15 | went to the scene. And then it went back to the garage at some
- 16 | point?
- 17 A. Correct. I mean my first stop was here at the hall, but
- 18 | then --
- 19 Q. Right.
- 20 A. -- yeah, I went to the garage to start setting up. Nobody
- 21 was coming.
- 22 Q. Yeah.
- 23 A. So I went to the location because our mayor called, too --
- 24 called me, too, because she was on scene because she's a
- 25 | firefighter. So, then I went there and -- because she was asking

- 1 for me, too. So, I went there to figure the stuff out and so I
- 2 moved it back to the Borough Garage.
- 3 Q. Okay. So I'm just trying to get straight on documentation
- 4 here. So we have the Western Berks Fire Department that had a
- 5 drone. We had the Pennsylvania State Patrol who had their
- 6 | helicopter. Were you aware of anyone else that was either
- 7 | videoing, taking photographs or anything at the scene? Did you
- 8 have like a crime scene officer or something out there?
- 9 A. No. I mean later on our criminal investigator snap photos of
- 10 | the scene just to take photos, but I knew obviously the state
- 11 police were involved. So they have their photos.
- 12 Q. Um-hum.
- 13 A. Eventually we did -- I forgot, while we were at incident
- 14 command, ask for PEMA and their dogs and the SARS team just
- 15 | because of, you know, they're offering their services, to get them
- 16 out there because of the magnitude of what happened.
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. And, you know, we're missing people. So they came out as
- 19 | well. And I know that PEMA, they have -- I have learned that they
- 20 | take pictures of everything when they -- especially when they find
- 21 | bodies and they also ping, they also have things to ping locations
- 22 of people. So I think they could map out where people were when
- 23 they found them.
- MS. HORTON: Are you saying FEMA or PEMA?
- 25 CHIEF HOLBEN: PEMA, yeah, so PEMA, Pennsylvania Emergency

- Management.
- 2 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Yeah.
- 3 CHIEF HOLBEN: Yeah, I'm still trying to get all the acronyms
- 4 straight.

- 5 MS. COOPER-SMITH: And PEMA was the organization that set up
- 6 for U-S-A-R.
- 7 CHIEF HOLBEN: SARS.
- 8 MS. HARLEY: SARS.
- 9 MS. COOPER-SMITH: SARS.
- 10 CHIEF HOLBEN: Of the main cell, yeah.
- MS. COOPER-SMITH: Okay.
- 12 CHIEF HOLBEN: Yeah.
- 13 BY MS. HARLEY:
- 14 Q. And with that, are you aware of who extracted the victims
- 15 | from the Building 2 which was the building that was actually part
- of the explosion? Was it the fire department or --
- 17 A. So initially I believe there was a female found under some
- 18 | rubble. Well, I have to think about that, because I know PEMA's
- 19 mostly taken, taken the bodies out because they were taking
- 20 pictures. And then obviously like -- I mean if there's something
- 21 | that could help, they would, like EMS or, you know, help pull them
- 22 out.
- 23 O. Yeah.
- 24 A. But I think PEMA or that group, that search and rescue, were
- 25 | the ones like --

- 1 Q. The ones doing the extrication.
- 2 A. -- they take the pictures, they ping their location, and then
- 3 they brought in the gurney to help bring them out.
- 4 | Q. Got it.
- 5 MS. HARLEY: Terri.
- 6 MS. COOPER-SMITH: I'm good.
- 7 MS. HARLEY: Ashley?
- 8 BY MS. HORTON:
- 9 Q. I have a few other clarifying questions.
- 10 A. Sure.
- 11 | Q. Okay. You said you all saw the video and sent the drone.
- 12 Was that the video from Candlewood Suites?
- 13 A. Correct.
- 14 Q. Okay.
- 15 A. So when I showed the ATF agent that video, that somebody sent
- or had on their phone or sent it to me, it was from -- it said Fox
- News.
- 18 Q. Okay.
- 19 A. And it showed like the live feed right before it exploded
- 20 and, you know, boom. So that's what we -- that's the video was
- 21 saw.
- 22 Q. So that wasn't --
- 23 A. That wasn't drone footage or that was -- what's your
- 24 question. I'm sorry.
- 25 Q. You're good. I didn't know if someone from Candlewood Suites

- 1 like came out and --
- 2 A. No, no, that -- I believe they just got that online because
- 3 | that was literally like online instantly --
- 4 Q. Gotcha.
- 5 A. -- which is probably why it got caught up in the news as much
- 6 as it did.
- 7 Q. I have another question just about UGI. Have you worked with
- 8 | them on any other incidents?
- 9 A. I mean they're always in the borough, you know. We also have
- 10 streets that need to be -- whatever they do, paving and all that
- 11 stuff. I'm trying to think of any other incidents. I mean there
- were times we've called them out for gas leaks. So they've been
- out and taken care of the problem for sure, yeah.
- 14 Q. Do you all have meetings with them to talk about what their
- 15 | role would be in this kind of situation?
- 16 A. Meetings specifically with them? No, I know -- I think we
- 17 | went up to their -- I have to make sure of this. I think it was
- 18 | their main building or whatever and they had a tour in case
- 19 something would happen. Like I don't know if it was just at the
- 20 | building or not, but I don't think we've ever sat down here and
- 21 specifically talked about it.
- 22 Q. Okay. Did you see what they were doing on scene?
- 23 A. I know when I was on scene, they were going around -- I don't
- 24 know how to describe it, almost -- it's probably like a
- 25 stethoscope going around the street with, you know, I'm assuming

- 1 | seeing if gas is coming out of asphalt, and I don't know how those
- 2 things work. Also, they dug a big hole right at the corner of
- 3 Franklin and South Second, but they were all around. I know every
- 4 specific thing.
- 5 Q. At the intersection of Second and Franklin. Is that what you
- 6 said?
- 7 A. Yeah, on second but at that intersection, there's a big plate
- 8 | there now. And then eventually later on, they were -- because
- 9 they did that that night I think. But all the other ones, you
- 10 know, later on.
- MS. HORTON: Go ahead, Terri.
- 12 MS. COOPER-SMITH: Yeah.
- 13 BY MS. COOPER-SMITH:
- 14 Q. I wanted to piggyback. Do you recall at all having -- did
- 15 you see any kind of correspondence from UGI to talk about doing an
- 16 emergency drill or to -- you said you've gone somewhere.
- 17 A. Yeah.
- 18 Q. Their building or something.
- 19 A. I think it was their building. I'd have to look to be honest
- 20 to make sure. I think it was UGI. But, you know what? It might
- 21 | have been -- I'm sorry. That might have been Met-Ed.
- 22 Q. Oh, Met-Ed, okay.
- 23 A. Yeah. So disregard that.
- 24 Q. Okay.
- 25 A. But, no, I don't -- we never had any correspondence I believe

- 1 on any kind of emergency drill or anything like that.
- 2 Q. Okay. All right. Thank you.
- 3 BY MS. HORTON:
- 4 Q. When you got to the incident, did you take over as incident
- 5 commander?
- 6 A. Yes.
- 7 \mathbb{Q} . Okay. And that would be you over the fire chief?
- 8 A. The incident command is people but, yeah, I've --
- 9 Q. It's kind of like a parallel incident command or --
- 10 A. I mean it's, you know, you're I guess in charge of the whole
- 11 scene, but the fire chief is in charge of his people obviously. I
- 12 don't know if it's parallel, but it's close enough. Everybody's
- 13 working together at that time, you know what I mean?
- MS. COOPER-SMITH: Right.
- 15 MS. HORTON: Yeah.
- MS. COOPER-SMITH: I'm good.
- MS. HORTON: I'm good, too.
- 18 BY MS. HARLEY:
- 19 Q. All right. Well, this is a question that I always ask all
- 20 our interviewees. Is there anything you think we should have
- 21 | asked you and failed to ask you about this incident?
- 22 | A. That's a good question. I can't think of anything.
- 23 Q. You can't think of anything. Well, you have our cards. So
- 24 | if you ever have something come to mind or you want to add
- 25 anything, please feel free to reach out.

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         MS. HARLEY: And what I'm going to do now is go ahead, and
    I'll end the interview. And, it's now 2:44 p.m.
