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1	INTERVIEW
2	CWO : This is Chief Warrant Officer , lead
3	investigating officer for the Coast Guard regarding the Roger
4	Blough fire on 1 February. We are conducting an interview with
5	Mr. Ward.
6	MR. POPPENBERG: Mr. Ward Poppenberg.
7	CWO . Ward Poppenberg; and he's given us permission to
8	record the interview. We have other parties present. We'll now
9	go around the room and introduce those folks. We are sitting at
10	the safety room at Bay Ship. Tables are in a rectangular
11	configuration. We're all surrounded by them.
12	There are two exit points, I have one to my rear and right
13	and Ward has one directly to his left. There's bottled water in
14	the back, do you want one or anything like that?
15	MR. POPPENBERG: No, thank you.
16	CWO . No, okay, that's fine. All right. Ward, you
17	just state your position and then we'll go around the table so
18	everybody's on the record here.
19	MR. POPPENBERG: I'm a port coordinator for Great Lakes
20	Fleet. My job is to make rounds on the boat and make sure my guys
21	are doing the right jobs and stuff.
22	MR. TERBRACK: Bob Terbrack, counsel for the vessel owner.
23	MR. HARSHMAN: Rob Harshman, fire expert for the vessel
24	owner.
25	MR. STARR: Derek Starr, forensic engineer here on behalf of
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1 Bay Shipbuilders.

2	CWO Ward, do you have any identification on you? I
3	haven't had the privilege to talk to you. Do you have a driver's
4	license or something to that effect?
5	MR. POPPENBERG: Yes, I do.
6	CWO CTE : If you can give that to me, I'd like to take a
7	picture and enter you in our system. You're a new individual to
8	me to make sure I get your information correct. Thanks Ward.
9	MR. POPPENBERG: Yeah.
10	CWO CWO : That said, I'm going to turn it over to these
11	folks to ask their questions and I may pop in and out from time to
12	time.
13	INTERVIEW OF WARD POPPENBERG
14	BY MR. STARR:
15	Q. Ward, I'm Derek. It's nice to meet you, thanks for coming
16	here. Do you mind just describing, you know, in a bit more detail
17	your general duties as port coordinator?
18	A. My general duties, my general duties would be like, be like a
19	ship keeper. I'm a port coordinator; I coordinate the stuff that
20	gets done. I make sure the engineers get material that they need
21	and I make rounds on the boats myself for safety issues.
22	Q. So about how many ships are you responsible for helping
23	coordinate at one time?
24	A. Three.
25	Q. Three. What three ships are those?

1	A. The Callaway, the Munson and the Roger Blough.
2	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Do you hold a Coast Guard credential
3	in any capacity?
4	MR. POPPENBERG: No.
5	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Have you ever?
6	MR. POPPENBERG: No.
7	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How often are you on the Roger Blough
8	would you say?
9	MR. POPPENBERG: Two to three times a day.
10	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And of the times you're on the Roger
11	Blough how often are you making a round?
12	MR. POPPENBERG: Well, I've got the three ships; I'm making
13	rounds I usually go try to get over there every four to five
14	hours.
15	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.
16	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And if you don't have something
17	specific you're trying to, you know, arrange for someone or get
18	it; can you describe generally your process of going through the
19	ship (indiscernible)?
20	MR. POPPENBERG: I usually go down to the my job is to go
21	down to the tunnels and make sure all the sea (indiscernible)
22	running properly and stuff, the air is going to them. I just make
23	sure everyone's working when they're usually supposed to be
24	working, make sure there's no fire, you know, stuff on the ground
25	or hazards of tripping over.

1	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How was the <i>Blough</i> for hazards and
2	tripping over?
3	MR. POPPENBERG: I think the <i>Blough</i> was in very good shape.
4	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Were you on the <i>Blough</i> the day of the
5	fire?
6	MR. POPPENBERG: Yes.
7	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How many times that day?
8	MR. POPPENBERG: I think I was only down there once that day.
9	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What time?
10	MR. POPPENBERG: I think it was around 10:30, 11:00.
11	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: In the morning?
12	MR. POPPENBERG: Morning.
13	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So the 31st 10:30?
14	MR. POPPENBERG: 10:30 to 11, somewhere in there.
15	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How long were you onboard?
16	MR. POPPENBERG: Probably 45 minutes.
17	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 45?
18	MR. POPPENBERG: Yes.
19	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. Is that something that we can
20	substantiate with the, with the video we have of the yard that
21	shoots at the vessel, is that
22	MR. POPPENBERG: You can probably see me go on and off there.
23	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.
24	MR. POPPENBERG: I don't know if you've got cameras inside
25	but
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1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. That just helps. You know, 2 we're all covered up with these masks and hard hats and --3 MR. POPPENBERG: Right, right. 4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- it's hard to tell who's who. 5 Thanks. 6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So in general that morning what were 7 you doing and where did you go on the Blough? 8 MR. POPPENBERG: I made rounds on the boat. I usually start 9 out in the engine room. I either start out in the engine room, go 10 down to the lower engine room and work my way all the way up to 11 the top, do the galley, do the unloading area, the whole works and 12 usually take the tunnel up to the forward end, go through the 13 whole forward end and I walk, usually walk the deck back. 14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How many steps are you getting in in a 15 day? 16 MR. POPPENBERG: Ouite a few. 17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So you're all over the place between 18 the --19 MR. POPPENBERG: I don't normally go up forward or something 20 twice a day. 21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah. 22 MR. POPPENBERG: But I'll -- you know, definitely hit the 23 engine rooms. 24 Have you -- did you know Bruce Bishop UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 25 here in town that used to kind of do stuff for a little bit? 17	when I plugged it in I'd plug it in and it would go off and set
18	the alarm off by just putting it in there and telling me it was
19	faulty.
20	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Did you guys have a plan for when you
21	were going to address that?
22	MR. POPPENBERG: No, I was going to Duluth on Tuesday to pick
23	this stuff up and bring back a bunch of stuff and
24	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You were headed out there to get it?
25	MR. POPPENBERG: I had a contractor's class and I was going
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1 to grab all that stuff.

2	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Gotcha. So you planned to replace
3	that item when you got back?
4	MR. POPPENBERG: Yes.
5	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: When do you think that might have
6	happened if this incident happened?
7	MR. POPPENBERG: Well, I was going Tuesday and I would have
8	been back today. I would be back tomorrow, excuse me.
9	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Planned to replace on Friday the 5th?
10	MR. POPPENBERG: Yep.
11	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's all I have.
12	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: In talking with you later on offline
13	is just to establish some, some timeline sorts of things.
14	MR. POPPENBERG: Okay.
